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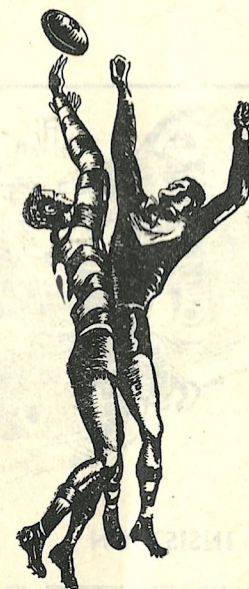

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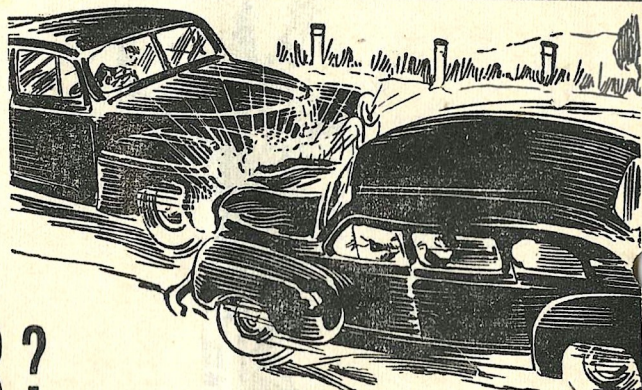
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TODAY'S GAME

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RESERVOIR PROVE TOO STRONG FOR BRUNSWICK

Reservoir, with more system and open play on the forward line easily defeated last year's semi finalists Brunswick at Royal Park last Saturday.

Against the wind, Reservoir attacked and Wallace goaled. Whittenbury gave great drive from the ruck and rovers Hosking and Merrett sent the visitors forward again. Ward scored "full points" and from the bounce Brunswick with direct football kicked their first goal. With a winning half forward line, Reservoir opened the game and a goal to Ward just before the $\frac{1}{4}$ time gave Rezza a handy lead. The second term saw Reservoir into attack again and BAHEN snapped a sixer with his left foot, then followed up with another to increase the strong lead. Brunswick surged forward but McArthur and McCrimmon turned them out. Billy Hawkless was a tower of strength in the back pocket and the nippy Brunswick rovers could not get away from him. Don Sutton was sending his side into attack and good play by Richmond created many opportunities.

After half time Brunswick seemed revitalised but could not pass the invincible Reservoir defence. This quarter turned into a battle of defences and play was on the "dead" side of the ground where scoring was very limited. Reservoir lost a lot of drive and Ward kicked their only goal for the term.

accomplished cricketer. He works at Myers in the clerical division and lives at Reservoir.

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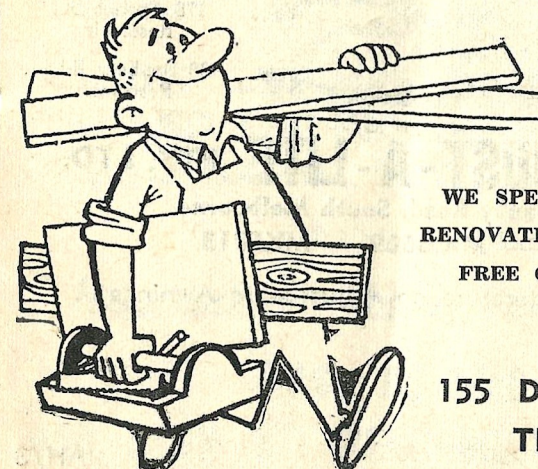
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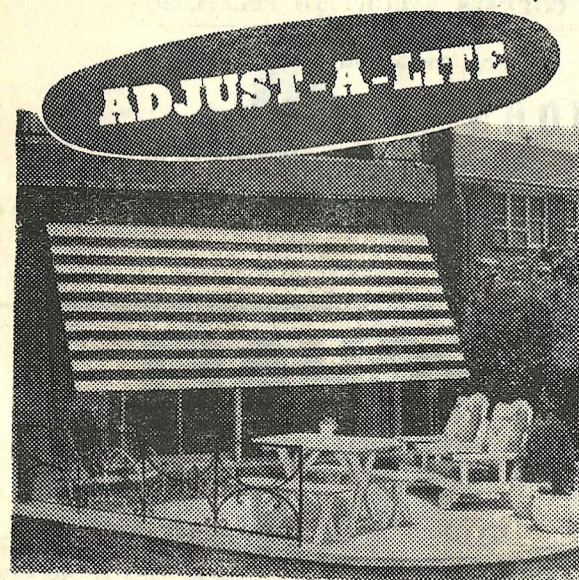

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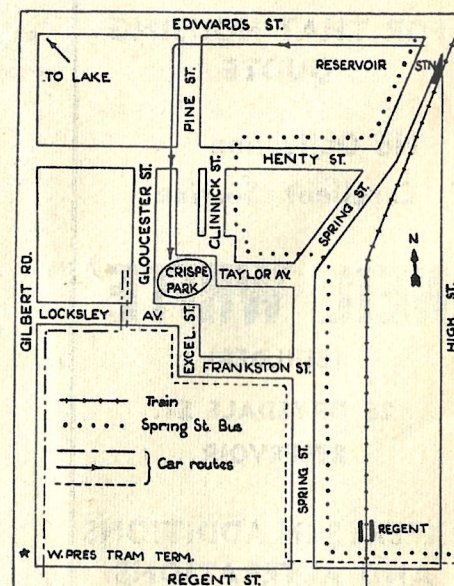
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ROUND AND ABOUT

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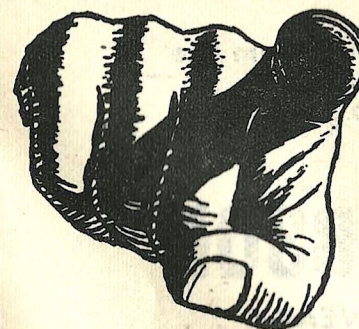
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
