The Northcote Fire Brigade hold a meeting next Monday night.

The shower on Monday afternoon put a damper on many a smiling face, and also on a large number of white dresses, we are told.

The Wesleyan Spray School anniversary, High-street Preston, is to be held on Sunday. A tea and public meeting on Monday next.

We would draw attention to the sale of drapery at Mr. Hopkins' store, in High-street, Northcote. The goods are all priced and speak for themselves.

We are glad to notice that the much needed improvements to the footbridge leading up the hill in High-street, Northcote, are in progress. The rotten tumble down state of it was positively dangerous to pedestrians.

The marriage of Miss M. E. Coad of Sandhurst to Mr. Thomas Greenaway of Northcote, which took place at Sandhurst, was a very brilliant affair The happy couple received a large number of beautiful presents and congratulations.

The dust fiend has held power in Northcote and Preston the last two days. The Northcoteites seemed to take it very badly, complaining bitterly of the fact that it was approaching afternoon before the watercart had by any means conquered the enemy. The Prestonites had nothing to do but grin and bear it.

A very interesting ceremony took place last Monday, being the marriage of Miss Gordon to Mr. Lionel J. S. Welch by Rev. D. M. Barry, incumbent of all Saints' Church. Both are valued helpers in the Parish, and respected residents of Northcote. Mr. Welch is the superintendent of Trinity Church Sunday school. Miss Gordon is a teacher in All Saints Sunday school. The happy couple left the same day to spend their honeymoon at the seaside.

Diptheria and typhoid fever is now prevalent in Northcote. Dr. Bird has reported to the council that a death from diptheria has occurred in Andrew street. The drainage being in a very bad condition. A case of typhoid fever has occurred in St. George's Park. In this the doctor reports there is absolutely no drainage at all.

On reference to our advertising columns it will be noticed that the Independent Order of Oddfellows are establishing a branch of the society in Northcote. The benefits from these societies are too well known to need recapitulation. As there are plenty of push in the men who are organising it, we cannot but predict success.

The inhabitants of Northcote and Preston whose business leads them to and fro have long had cause to complain of the excessive fares charged on the passenger waggonnettes running between the two places. The fare from Preston to Northcote and vice versa being 6d., the same as the whole distance-viz: to Clifton Hill, unless the passenger chooses to alight at the Croxton Park Hotel, where the charge is 3d; but such a landmark is beyond all reason, benefitting, comparatively speaking, no one. We are convinced that if the landmark is altered a little nearer Northcote, the increase in the number of passengers would far and above cover the small gain incurred by the present excessive charges.

The Preston Fire Brigade hold meeting on Wednesday evening next. Among the matters for consideration is the raising of money for the purchase and erection of a fire bell. Mr. J. W. Story has promised to give the timber. They will also fix the date when the competition for Mr. Story's (12) silver medals will take place. Kirwan was fined on the 30th January for assaulting his wife. Annie Morrison v. Grace Johns (both live in Thornbury Park) for assault during a quarrel. Proprietor Croxton Park Hotel v. George Harrington (better known as Johnny Come Lately) on two charges-wilfully breaking windows and using insulting words with intent to provoke a breach of the

### Local Items.

A meeting of the Northcote and Preston Building Society will be held in Bradford Hall, Preston, to-night.

The South Preston Wesleyan Sunday school anniversary which took place last Sunday, and the tea and public meeting on Monday proved very successful.

A lunatic named John Smith, who escaped from the Yarra Bend Asylum on Thursday, was captured yesterday afternoon by Senior-constable Marks, in High-st., Northcote.

A young man named Charles Beal has been arrested for embezzling money's from Mr. M'Intosh, baker, High-st., Northcote. He will be brought up at the local court on Monday.

At a meeting of the Preston Fire Brigade on Wednesday the date was fixed for the medal competition and races for the 26th May. The concert and ball in connection with the above is to be held the following Tuesday. The bell tower is to be erected. Its height is to be 48 feet, and will cost about £50.

Mr. Henry Bayliss, greengrocer, High-street, Northcote, has had some very undesirable visitors during the past week. Last Monday a horse was stolen from a paddock belonging to him. Three boys of the larrikin class were seen with the horse near the Exhibition Building on Monday. Enquiries have been instituted by the local police.

The Tanners and Curriers Society held a concert at the Bradford Hall last Tuesday evening to raise funds towards defraying the cost of a new banner. The hall was well packed, and it proved very successful.

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Yesterday afternoon two young larrikins named Joseph Thomas and William Simms, supposed to come from Fitzrov, were detected removing a till from Mr. Bayliss' shop. On the alarm being raised they made a bolt, but were soon captured and lodged in the watchouse. They will be brought up before the court on Monday.

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At the last meeting of the Northcote Borough Council a petition was received from nine residents of Union street, praying the council to construct the said street; as at present it was dangerous to traffic. The application of the Northcote and Preston Tram Syndicate for permission to construct trams in High-street, which was recommended by the tramway committee, providing the details are satisfactory, was proposed, seconded, and adopted. The report of the public works committee that accounts amounting to £336 15s 5d be passed for payment out of the general account and £145 out of the loan account was adopted. The new loan of £12,500 has been successfully floated, the highest tender being from the National Bank, at £102 0s 6d, which is very satisfactory.

The Preston Council held their meeting on Monday evening. Correspondence was received from the secretary of the Northern Gas Company, stating that the pipes are now being delivered, and that the work of laving the mains is to be pushed on with all possible speed. From the Postal Department, stating that from the beginning of April there would be two deliveries of letters in the principal portions of the district. From same, stating that at an early date it is proposed to alter the name of South Preston to Gowerville. This met with general objections.

On Thursday last a young man, whose name is unknown, cashed a forged chequeat Mrs. Nielsen's drapery establishment in High-street, Northcote. The cheque was for £1 15s, on London Chartered Bank, and signed P. Smith. He walked into the shop about four in the afternoon, and in an off-handed manner requested payment of the cheque, stating that he was a brother to Mr. Smith, of High-street. # The Spell Broken.

THE formation of a Vigilance Committee for Northcote is an accomplished fact. and not before it was needed. Such institutions have done good in other localities where councillors seemed to forget their duties to the public, in fact seemed to think they had a vested interest in their seats, and that it was almost blasphemy to question the assumption, although they did no single act deserving of approbation. But as soon as the Vigilance Committee was started lethargy was at once galvanised into activity, and abuses of long standing were remedied. It would be a piece of truculent folly for us to affirm that the Northcote Council has done what it might have done, and what the public had a right to expect from their representatives. It would be pleasant writing to clap them on the backs and say "Well done good and faithful sorvants," if facts would warrant it but it would be a piece of hypocracy und flunkeyism on our part were we to say that this "well done" was deserved. We cannot say that. A worse managed municipality could not, perhaps, be found within ten miles of Melbourne, if indeed in the colony at large. Northcote has natural advantages, that with proper management, and anything like the spirit of enlightened enterprise, would have made it very prominent among the suburbs of the Queen City of the South. But where is it to-day? Just waking up after a Rip-van-Wynkle sleep of about a quarter of a century! Where, for example is the town hall or public offices? Where are the side streets asphalted as they ought to have been? How is it people have their eyes choked up with dust, and their goods spoiled when a little common sense would have stopped the nuisance? In what borough BUT Northcote will you find steps sticking out into the footpath to upset the unwary pedestrian while passing along the street. Is this nuisance winked at to please some of the council's pets? How is it that hundreds, not to say thousands of pounds sterling are spent in metalling High-street when a STEEL TRAM might have been laid down, that would have saved an abnormal waste

of revenue, facilitated heavy cartage and very materially tended to prevent the place being smothered with dust? What has been done in the way of drainage or tree-planting? Then again, look at the apologies for footbridges. Some of these fine days the ratepayers may have to pay heavy damages arising from accidents through these faulty constructions. Should the Vigilant Committee go about their work in a business-like manner, good must result from its inauguration, but something more is needed before Northcote takes the position it is entitled to, and that is a RADICAL AND SWEEPING CHANGE IN THE COUNCIL ITSELF. New blood is wanted, and plenty of it. The ratepayers, therefore will only have themselves to blame if they don't see that it is speedily introduced.

Notes & Comments.

A meeting of the congregation and guardians of All Saints' Church was held on Tuesday evening, to consider the appointment of Rev. Mr. Berry's successor. A deputation is to wait on the Bishop to request that the Rev. Mr. Marsh be appointed.

Things are not at all rosy in the happy family of the Secularists. It seems the Anarchists' diet is altogether too strong for the stomachs of Mr. Symes and his friends. It is worse than Christianity, says he! No doubt of it; very much worse, and little better, if any, than the gospel according to Symes.

Strange but true. A gentleman was nervously searching and enquiring for his walking stick in a city office this week. Said the clerk, "Why you've got it in your hand." The man, dumbfounded, "Bless me so I have!"

At the meeting of the Northcote Fire Brigade on Monday evening, it was decided to send four men to compete in the hose and reel contest at the Demonstration on the 24th May. The four are in active preparation for the event. Two or three new members were enrolled. The new uniform is to be ready before the demonstrations date. A special meeting was held on Tuesday evening, when the Association rules were read. The brigade decided to abide by them.

Supposed Suicide.

On Wednesday afternoon about 4 p.m. Mrs. Rogers of Lydia-st., Bruns wick, handed a note to the police stating that she had found it tied to a tree close to the Merri Creek, on the Northcote side, near the Inchriate Retreat, a few hours previously. The note is as follows: "Being tired of life and worn out with disappointments, I am about to end my days. If any one should find this note, their also you will find my dead body in this gully, and may the Great God and judge of all mankind have mercy upon my poor soul. God forgive me for this wicked deed. My love I leave to all behind." On the back of the paperwhich had evidently been torn out of a pocket book-stated "Letters of identification will be found upon my body." The writing is a good specimen of a female's handwriting of more than usual education, although one word is in error. Dragging operations have been commenced, but unsuccessfully as yet. It is rumoured that a girl who was employed at Mr Carr's the manager of the London Chartered Bank, as domestic, left a few days ago without their knowledge, and since is missing. She is a stranger to Melbourne, being from the Northern districts, and it is feared that she has got amongst bad companions. Her friends will no doubt be very anxious to hear some tidings of the missing one.

Railway Accident.

Another railway accident of a serious character and resulting from gross carelessness on the part of some official, took place yesterday. The 4.46 a.m. up goods train from Woodend, in charge of Driver Turner, came into collision at Footscray with a goods train which was laden with stone, at 8. 40 a.n., whilst the latter was in the act of leaving Munro and Co.'s siding to get on the main line. The engine of the 4.45 ran into the central truck of the other train and threw that vehicle. two other trucks and the guard's van off the rails, scattering the stones in all directions. The guard was much shaken, but is not otherwise injured, It was found that it was impossible to remove the wreckage from the lines with the assistance at hand, so stationmaster at Footscray telegraph to Spencer-street for a gang of men to be forwarded for the purpose. These were immediatly despatched, and after two hours' work the rails were cleared. In the meanwhile, the up traffic from Sandhurst was carried on by the loop line from Braybrook to Newport, and thence over the Williamstown up track to Melbourne. The stationmaster at Footscray reports that stone train coming out of Munro's siding was protected from the advance of any train from the main Sandhurst track by P a signal which was at danger, and it therefore appears that this accident arose from an utter disregard of the signal on the part of Driver Turner.

### Brutal Assault by a Sailor

At the Port Melbourne court on Monday, Hugh Pugh, a seaman belonging to the ship Helenslea, proceeded against Robert Kerr, chief officer of the same vessel, for assault. There was a cross summons, Kerr charging Pugh with a similar offence. The seaman stated that on Monday morning the 9th inst the second mate came into the forecastle, where he was lving in his bunk, and told him to go and wash decks. Witness replied that it wanted 10 minutes to 9 o'clock, and that he would not go to work before his proper time. The second officer then left, and shortly aftewards the first mate came into the forecastle and ordered him to go afr. Witness replied that he would not do any work until the captain came on board, whereupon the chief officer struck him a violent blow on the face, caught him by the throat, and tried to drag him out on deck and illused him. In reply to Mr Emerson, who appeared for Kerr Pugh acknowledged that he bit the former's nose while they were struggling but denied that he struck him with a marlingspike. Robert Kerr, chief officer, deposed that when the second mute reported Pugh's disobedience he went to forecastle and ordered him to go aft to his work. He refused used bad language and told him he could do the work himself. Witness then tried to pull him out of forecastle, when Pugh struck him several violent blows on the head with a marlingspike. He caught his assailant by the throat and after a struggle they both fell and while on deck Pug: worried him like a dog and bit his nose right through Two witnesses correcorated the chief officer's evidence. The case against Mr. Kerr was dismissed with £2 2s costs. Pugh was fined £10, with £2 2s costs in default, three months' im prisonment for the assault.

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The ferry steamer Pearl ran into Commodore Wilson's yacht Lao on Sunday afternoon. The latter immediately sank, but the occupants, three ladies and seven or eight gentle. men, were saved. It is alleged that the captain of the steamer left the wheel in charge of a passenger who did not understand its working, and thus caused the collision.

On Tuesday a ten and public meeting was held in connection therewith, and it proved very successful; over £20 clear was raised. The ladies who took an active part were-Mesdames Evans, Taylor (2), Windzer, Leadbeater, Cornish, Roberts, Machon, Shade and Membray. At the public meeting afterwards Mr Thomas Agar occupied the chair, in the absence of Mr Thomas Peters, who was advertised to have taken it, he having sent an apology and cheque. The speakers were Revs Bray, Jones, Nicholls, Copeland, Bracewell and Mr W. Taylor.

### New Northcote Brick Company.

The fourth half-yearly general meeting of the New Northcote Brick Co. was held on Wednesday afternoon at Scott's Hotel, Collins-street. The chairman, Mr J. F. M'Carron, in submitting the directors' report and balance sheet, stated that after deducting working expenses and repairs to machinery and buildings, the balance to the credit of the profit and loss account was £2031 13s 2d, which it was proposed to divide in the following manner :- Dividend, at the rate of 10 per cent. per annum, £960; suspense account to provide for bad debts. £200 rextinction of preliminary expenses. £570 14s 10d; carried forward, £300 18s 2d. During the past half-year the anticipations of the directors were fully realised, the demand for bricks being far in excess of the output, and prices fairly satisfactory. In view of the large increase in the company's business, the directors had decided to immediately proceed with another Hoffmann kiln. In order to do this it was arranged to issue 14,000 reserved shares pro-rata to the present shareholders at a premium of 1s, per share. The report and balance sheet were unanimously adopted. Messrs J. F. M'Carron and J. H. Thomas were re-elected directors, and A. W. Cleveland and A. C. M'Bean auditors. The meeting then closed.

On Thursday last Miss Louisa Jane Collins, of Templestowe, near Heidelberg was married to Mr. Robert Camm. of Hawthorn, by Rev. Mr. Berry, at All Saints' Church. The harry couple left with the hearty congratulations of a large number of friends.

A railway accident, causing great damage, occurred at Traralgon on Monday afternoon. An engine, while shunting, ran into some waggons through the driver missing the points. The guard's van was thrown off the line, the buffers were knocked off the front of the engine and the end of one of the trucks was smashed. The engine was able to resume its journey to Maffra and Stratford, and the wreckage was soon cleared away.

### Shocking Tram Accident.

A lad, nine years of age, named Thomas Stewart, who resided with his parents in Union-place, off Drummondstreet, Carlton, was taken to the Melbourne Hospital at 10 minutes to 6 on Tuesday evening, and died just after admission. The child was taken with some difficulty from underneath the dummy of a car in Lygon-street. but it is not known how he got there. So far as could be ascertained the gripman did not see him on the track, The first knowledge of an accident having happened was conveyed by the agonising screams of the poor ladcoming apparently from under the gripman's feet. The car immediately pulled up, and it was then found that the front portion of the safety guard underneath the dummy had been broken off. No one seems to have actually witnessed the occurrence. The boy, when taken from beneath the tram, was conveyed in charge of a constable to the hospital, but he had scarcely been admitted to ward when he succumbed to his injuries, having been in reality crushed to death. An inquest has been held and a verdict of accidental death returned.

### Narrow Escape.

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A remarkable escape from death took place at the Collmann and Tacchi mine on Wednesday evening. Two men named Barrass and Hunken fired some holes in the stope, and went back into an apparently safe place. The shock of the explosion seems to have loosened the ground above them, for about 2 tons of earth fell on them, besides a lot of timber, which, fortunately, fell in such a manner as to keep the burben of the earth off the two men, though they were completely imprisoned. A relief party was soon at work, and, two the surprise of all, the men were got out comparatively uninjured. Hunken sustained a scalp wound, but the othe injuries of the two men were slight.
