From the Church of the Cappuccini monks to the Castle and Bridge of St. Angelo. This stronghold of ancient Rome was built by the Emperor Hadrian as an imperial museum, and it obtained its present name from an alleged miraculous vision. In 690 a plague ravished the city. In that year Gregory the Great was chosen Pope. He instituted pestilential processions to avert the plague, and in one of these, while crossing the bridge, saw Michael the Archangel breathing a bloody sword. From that moment the plague ceased.

The noble bridge which spans the Tiber was also built by Hadrian. It is still in good condition, having withstood many floods which destroyed more recent bridges across the river. A striking feature of the solidity of the work of the Romans.

After passing the castle a plain wall is seen on the right crossing the road towards St. Peter's. This is a covered way to afford the comfort of the Vatican a means of escape to the castle in time of war. The most interesting feature of the river is the narrow tunnel through which a narrow track passes. It is through this tunnel are three more drawbridges, commanded by three different cannons, making the castle almost impregnable. We visited the dungeons where the Pope committed all his political foes, &c., abiding their time to be assassinated and then thrown into the Tiber. Most certainly the Pope would not have been so kind to those who lead underground to the Tiber. Next, the room where all the Senators of the Roman Empire were seated. Cicero was found; then on to the hall of the legislation, where all prisoners were tortured before that tribunal. In the floor and walls were to be seen the habits where the various instruments were used. Thank God those days are past; we really do not know the meaning of the word liberty.

In the corner of the same room stands two immense iron chests, where were kept the keys of the city, valued at £21,000,000 for safety. The Catholic church in Rome, our guide informed us, is the largest in the world, and it traces a year from the Government, but they decline to draw it on the grounds that they are not authorized to recognize that power, which they decline to do, and also believe that the day is not far when the church will take the reins of government. Most certainly things are pointing that way. What is wrong the Vatican states we were shown about a dozen of the "State Carriages," which would compare favorably with the royal carriage of the Emperor and his sons, to say that were in the Jubilee procession. When asked when they would be out again in the streets of Rome, the reply was "Never until the Pope goes as King of Italy."

From the castle to the "Arch of Septimus Severus, built in honor of the Emperor and his sons, to commemorate victories over the Parthians and Arabians. A broken chariot with six horses and a statue of Severus, formerly carried the summit. In the middle upon the arch was used as a fortification. Behind the arch is the church of St. Joseph of the Carpenters. Below this church is the Magnificent Forum, consisting of two chambers, one above the other. Through the archway leading of the roof of the lower chamber the prisoners were thrown, and left to die of hunger and cold. Here the converts to the faith, caused a miraculous spring to flow, and in it baptised the converts. On the staircase, a hole in the wall, impressed by iron nails, said to be the impression of St. Peter's head when pushed against the wall by a jailer. An iron door in the same place closes the tunnel, which leads to the Cloaca Maxima, the great sewer of ancient and modern Rome. You can imagine what took place here without the recalling any one of the harrowing scenes.

On crossing the Tiber again we left our conveyance to view the traditional remains of the bridge associated with the brave Horatius and immortalized by Mosca. DEATH RATE.

STRIKING FIGURES AT THE QUEEN VICTORIA HOME.

The Hon. Dr. MacLennan, in seconding a resolution of the report and balance-sheet at the annual meeting of the committee of the Queen Victoria Home for Consumptive Patients (see the Evening News, of June 28th), gave some interesting statistics with regard to the number of deaths in N.S.W. from that dread disease, consumption. He said that up to ten years ago the number of deaths was very much smaller. In 1885 there were 1055 deaths due to this cause. For the year ending 1885 consumption had been increasing most rapidly that the population, while now, although the population has increased 50 per cent, the number of deaths was very much less. In 1885 there were 271 deaths of young children from consumption. The increase in deaths from this disease has attracted attention at home also. The Weekly Dispatch, of London, writing on the same subject, says that in 1885 the deaths from consumption in Great Britain were to the number of 29,844 per thousand of the population. In 1892 the number had fallen to 20,000, and it has not risen since.
