PRESTON SHIRE COUNCIL.

Present:—Cra. Howe, (president), Paterson, Newton, Braithwaite, Crisp, Stables, and Nichol.

M. J. S. Gair wrote intimating that the Commissioners would receive the application for an improvement on the Preston line at the Railway office on Wednesday, 16th at 3 p.m.—Received.

THE CHAIRMAN'S REPORT. The secretary of the Crown Land Department wrote:—I am directed by the Attorney-General to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 15th inst., and to say for the information of the council that the questions asked by you should be referred to Mr. Herald, solicitor, as he (the Attorney-General) was only a consultative party to the proceedings and was not entitled to retain and did not incur any cost.

Cr. Braithwaite failed to say why they should be referred to Mr. Herald, solicitor, to the Northcote council. This matter, Mr. Herald seems to be master of the situation, as he is the Attorney-General and the Northcote council but appeared to control the Attorney-General as well. The only objection to the main intention of the Attorney-General's reply was that he took no notice of the council's question which would tend to go to the detriment of the Council.

It was held that the council should have had to look to the Attorney-General's action, and the position was approved by that gentleman disclaiming all liability.

The president suggested that the letter be referred to the committee of the whole. Cr. Braithwaite did not think they should be referred to the matter, seeing that they had been referred to Mr. Herald's report by the committee of the whole. The matter then dropped.
