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**NORTHCOLE TOWN COUNCIL.**  
MONDAY, MARCH 29.  
Present—Crs. Plant (mayor), Mc-  
Intosh, Smith, Tharratt, Woolhouse,  
Robb, Hayes, Archbold, Harry, Mit-  
chell, Williams, Hastings, Candy, and  
Little.  
Water for Edwards Street.  
The Metropolitan Board of Works  
wrote agreeing to extend the water  
reticulation into Edwards Street, from  
Westgarth street northwards 5 chains,  
subject to the owners at once making  
the connection with the mains.—It  
was resolved to notify the owners to  
this effect.  
Drain in Westgarth Street.  
The Board of Public Health wrote  
stating their inspector had found the  
bottom of the sewer in Westgarth  
street rough and uneven, which  
allowed a quantity of stagnant matter  
to accumulate. At the outlet there  
was a green slimy deposit from which  
a disagreeable smell was noticeable.  
They requested that the trouble be  
remedied as soon as possible.  
The town clerk said the Board's in-  
spector had called and he had told him  
the action the council had taken. He  
also went to the Railway Department  
and an officer had made a survey of  
the culvert, but they had not yet got  
his report.  
£154 for Licenses.  
The Treasury forwarded an account  
for £154, being that council's equiva-  
lent for licensing fees.—Received.  
Fender's Grove Park.  
J. E. Jenkins, Secretary Lands  
Purchase Board, wrote stating that the  
fourth instalment of £30 due on the  
park at Fender's Grove was now due.  
—Referred to finance committee.  
Yarra National Park.  
The City of Collingwood wrote stat-  
ing that the Minister of Water Sup-  
ply had expressed his willingness to  
take charge of the conference with re-  
gard to the reservation as a National  
Park of certain lands abutting on the  
Yarra. The date of the conference  
would be notified to the council's  
delegates.  
Cr. Candy moved that Crs. Robb  
and Williams be the council's dele-  
gates. (Laughter.) Carried.  
Replenishing the Trout Supply.  
The Geelong Fish Acclimatizing  
Society wrote stating they were now  
prepared to receive orders for trout  
yearlings.  
Cr. Candy moved that the usual  
supply be obtained. Carried.  
Private Hospital Registration.  
Mary Phillips wrote stating that  
she had complied with all the require-  
ments of the Central Board of Health  
and now applied for registration of her  
private hospital in Merri street.  
Cr. Candy moved that the applica-  
tion be sent on to the Board and that  
they get a report from their health  
officer. Carried.  
Share of Insurance Business.  
Ernest Lees wrote applying for a  
share in the council's insurance busi-  
ness. He understood that several  
policies would mature shortly.—Re-  
ferred to the finance committee.  
Construction of Gadd Street.  
David Gillingham, Chas. Swaine,  
A. Gibbs, G. Dinall, N. McLarty and  
13 other residents of Gadd street and  
neighborhood, wrote asking that the  
reconstruction of the public works  
committee, viz., "That Gadd street be  
constructed, be carried into effect, in  
the interests of public health at the  
earliest possible opportunity.  
The town clerk remarked that if the  
money were forwarded the street could  
be done right away.  
Cr. Tharratt said he did not think  
the owners were quite prepared to do  
that, but he would be glad to see  
them in a position to pay cash down,  
but they all wanted the work done  
as soon as possible.  
The mayor said there was a difficulty  
about getting the money for the last  
streets, and it would be just as well to  
give these people know that if they  
wanted this work done at once they  
would have to finance it themselves.  
If the money had to be got in the  
ordinary way it would take at least  
six months.  
Alteration of Plans and Specifications.  
W. H. Dennis wrote objecting to the  
plans for the construction of Lang-  
ston street being altered after having  
been adopted by the council. Before  
such alteration was made the  
whole matter should have been refer-  
red to the people who had to find the  
money. He would not pay under any  
plans than those adopted by the council  
and approved by the owners unless  
forced to do so.  
Cr. Tharratt maintained that no of-  
ficer had any right to alter plans and  
specifications which had been adopted  
by the council.  
The surveyor explained that the  
alteration had been made with the  
sanction of the committee of the whole.  
In the original specification all joints  
between the pavers were not to be  
more than 1/8 of an inch wide. No  
tenders were received on this specifica-  
tion, and the addition was made to the  
specification that any joint that would  
admit a 1/4 inch rod would be con-  
sidered.  
Cr. Archbold—Were not the spec-  
ifications prohibitive?  
Cr. Harry—The fact that no ten-  
ders were received shows that they  
must have been.  
Cr. Tharratt moved that the matter  
be referred to the committee of the  
whole and that in the meantime the  
advertisement calling for tenders be  
withdrawn.  
Cr. Smith seconded.—Carried.  
Obnoxious Odours.  
Dr. Degenhardt wrote complaining  
of the obnoxious odours arising from

the manhole of the stormwater sewer  
near his residence, Raleigh street.  
Sometimes the fumes pervaded the  
whole house, which surely could not be  
healthy, and was certainly disagree-  
able.  
The town clerk said he had referred  
the matter to the surveyor, and a  
wooden cover had already been ordered  
to put over the gating.  
Cr. Hayes said he called attention  
to this matter a considerable time ago,  
and was surprised it was not attended to.  
Sargood Street Path.  
Thos. G. Bartlett, Edward Axton,  
Frederick Wiso, and Robert Threlkeld  
wrote asking that Sargood street foot-  
path be improved by the addition of a  
few loads of earth or gravel.—Referred  
to the works committee on the motion  
of Crs. Woolhouse and Robb.  
Channelling for Dundas Street.  
W. T. Rowe wrote asking that some  
channelling be done in front of his  
premises in Dundas street. In its  
present state the channel was a nuisance  
and a menace to health.  
The engineer said he had already  
reported to the works committee re  
this matter and it was now in their  
hands.  
Public Meeting Resolutions.  
Terry Foley, acting secretary, wrote  
forwarding the resolutions carried at a  
public meeting of ratepayers at the  
Prothon Park on Tuesday evening,  
March 23, and published in the  
"Leader" of March 27.  
Cr. Archbold moved that the com-  
munication be received.  
Cr. Robb seconded.—Lost.  
Complaint against Tramway Gripsman.  
The Victorian Railways wrote com-  
plaining that on the night of the 29th  
inst., as Gateman Sullivan was closing  
the crossing gates near Clifton Hill  
station against the road traffic to  
permit the 8.5 p.m. "down" special  
train to Northcote to pass, the gripsman  
of the No. 3 "down" Northcote train  
ran the train into the gateway, stopping  
about a foot inside gate chaps, and  
thus preventing the gates being shut.  
As a consequence the gates had to be  
closed against the train and opened for  
road traffic. It is stated that the  
dummy of the train was crowded with  
passengers. It would appear that the  
gripsman, who refused to give his name,  
is in the habit of doing this, and they  
would be glad if the council would  
take the matter up and prevent it in  
the future, as the practice was very  
dangerous.  
The mayor said he understood that  
Mr. Meakin had almost demanded the  
letter; but the town clerk very rightly  
refused it, as it was the council's prop-  
erty. The practice was a most dan-  
gerous one and one that the council  
would have to deal with. If such a  
thing was allowed to go on they would  
never know when one of the cars might  
be run into by the train. He would  
move that the letter be referred to the  
tramway committee.  
Cr. Archbold seconded.—Carried.  
Referring to the above Mr. Meakin,  
the tramway lessee, wrote stating that  
as evidently the letter was sent to the  
council by mistake that it be handed  
to him, as he considered it his business  
to reply to the department, which he  
might say he was able to do with sat-  
isfactory effect so far as his gripsman  
was concerned.  
Cr. Bainbridge Applies for Leave.  
Cr. Bainbridge wrote asking for six  
months leave of absence, as he had  
decided to take a trip to the old  
country.  
The request was granted, the mayor  
remarking that though Cr. Bainbridge  
and himself did not agree municipally,  
they both would enjoy himself  
thoroughly and come back with stores  
of knowledge that would be of benefit  
to the town.  
On the suggestion of Cr. Tharratt it  
was decided to present Cr. Bainbridge  
with a letter that would serve as an  
introduction to municipalities in the  
old land.  
Compensation for Damages.  
Louis Waxman, solicitor, wrote  
bringing under notice an accident to  
Mrs. Margaret Ellen Hooker, of 399  
Bridge road, Richmond, which oc-  
curred in High street, Northcote,  
owing to her vehicle coming into con-  
tact with the coping stone near the  
Carters' Arms hotel. Following his

take much longer to develop. I have had them emerging the whole year round in our practically winterless climate. They mature usually in larval stage. The adults live an indefinite period—certainly many months—and lay eggs an indefinite number of times.

This brings us to an important branch of the subject—the connection between the mosquito and malaria. Some time ago a tropical disease, but the climate of Italy is very similar to that of Victoria, so that there is no climatic reason why malaria should be absent from Victoria. It was thought to be due, as the name implies, to "bad air." But in a house in the Campagna, a district near Rome, Mrs. S. and her family lived through the winter season. They slept with the windows wide open, and the exposed bed air and swamp mists were free to enter. The only precaution taken was to screen the windows and do so with closely woven wire gauze, and to retreat before sundown each evening to their bedrooms. Every day in the district had malarial patients, while those alone had none. Thus the air was shown to have nothing to do with it. The only other investigation, some mosquito tows were allowed to suck blood from malarial patients in Rome and were sent to London. They were allowed to suck blood from the patients, who had developed malarial fever. The importance of this discovery can hardly be overestimated, for, as Giles says, "Chills and malarial fever are the most common enemies that kill perhaps a few thousand a year, in an impressive manner. It is true that the quiet, insidious malarial fever kills its millions." Sierra Leone, formerly well known as the "White Man's Grave," is now reported to be quite free from the dreaded malarial epidemic.

The last link in the chain of evidence of the connection of the mosquito and malaria was established in Victoria. In response to an invitation from Mr. Chamberlain, mosquitoes were sent to the British Museum some time ago from Victoria, as well as from all the British dependencies. One of these brought a larva abundant in the malarial ponds of Victoria. It was seen that no Anopheles—the genus of mosquito that spreads malaria over the world—is present in Victoria. This is not a new discovery. It is well known that Victoria was malarious. Fortunately, this is not so. Indeed, it is quite the other way. Instead of having malaria through the mosquito, we have the Anopheles without malaria, for the insect has been since identified here. Since many malarial patients visit Victoria, it is, probably, only a matter of time for our mosquitoes to become infected with the disease causing parasite.

In addition to the connection with malaria fever, yellow fever has been proved by American doctors working in Cuba since the American Spanish war to be carried only by the mosquito. Now we have clear proof that two of our worst known diseases, at least, can be contracted only by the bite of a mosquito. Then the question is, are we going to quietly submit to that troublesome and most annoying pest? I think not. Many cases might be quoted of successful fights with mosquitoes—St. Sierra Leone, Havana, Khartoum, and other places. Are we in Australia to be pestered and used by this insatiable, blood-sucking insect? This raises the question, as to the best method of fighting it.

Screening seems the only effective method against adult mosquitoes. One factor has been determined to be of great importance in any work that is undertaken. It has been discovered that mosquitoes seldom travel from the pool where they were bred. In fact, 900 yds. is stated to be the limit for the malarial mosquito, and a mile for the common mosquito. Most are very frail of wing, and perish at once when a breeze springs up. When dusk-falling, we used to have mosquitoes standing in the open when a breeze was blowing. The draining and filling up of puddles, the emptying or screening of little ponds and tanks and barrels, will greatly reduce the number of breeding places. Stocking permanent pools with water hyacinths, and planting small fish, eels, will do good.

The great use made by this animal at all stages of the various film of water provides a simple and cheap method of killing them in great numbers. Kerosene will not mix with water, but spreads in a thin even layer over it. The eggs float on water, but they sink under the layer of kerosene, and so the young cannot develop. The larvae hold on the surface, and the water does not run between the legs; but they cannot hold on to the kerosene, which does run in between the legs, and so gets into the air tubes. The pupae have two fine breathing tubes, lined with hairs. Although water does not run into the sense does. The adult runs about on the surface of water, but not of kerosene. It is weak and brittle, and its wings are so fragile that it is unable to fly. It is thus the simple device of pouring oil on the water, which has been used successfully lives in times of storm, promises to save very many more lives than applied to standing water, and to get rid of a persistent and irritating pest—mosquitoes.

Received, the secretary intimating that the letter was received too late for the reply to be of any service.

FACTORY EXTENSION. R. Staples wrote applying for permission to make alterations to his existing premises in Gilbert road. The requirements as to advertising, &c., had been complied with. Grants, on the motion of Mr. Howe and Watt.

COMPLAINT FROM FENNER'S GROVE. The Fenner's Grove Settlers' Association wrote complaining of bad smells proceeding from Watson and Paterson's premises, Dundas street. The settlers have written to close their doors and windows and they hoped the council would take some action in the matter.—Referred to the inspector, on the motion of Mr. Watt and Stankle.

WATER FOR BRUCE STREET. A. J. Keel and Anna White wrote agreeing to guarantee any water on the street on the cost of laying a main in Bruce street.

Mr. Howe moved that the letters be received and the Board asked to complete the work as soon as possible.

Mr. Stankle seconded. Carried.

THE FIGHT AGAINST TUBERCULOSIS. The City of Collingwood wrote forwarding report of deputation of tuberculous conference to the Premier. Mr. Murray said it had been stated that consumption could be stamped out by proper action in about 25 or 30 years, and it was hard to understand why such action had not been taken long ago, especially when, as Mr. Murray would tell them, tuberculosis made a loss to the State of £750,000 every year. He could promise the deputation that the whole subject would be thoroughly gone into by the Government, and the conference would be notified as to the course which would be proposed.—Received.

REGISTRATION APPROVED. The Board of Public Health wrote approving of the registration of Staples and Alexander's alterations for the current year.—Received.

EXTENSION OF MEAT AREA. The Board of Public Health wrote approving of the addition to the meat area in the Street of Preston and asking to be supplied with a plan showing the boundaries of the area.—Engineer to supply information.

CLINCH AVENUE. W. Braithwaite wrote, in reply to council's letter, stating he had great pleasure in complying with the council's request that the names of Station street be altered to Clinch avenue, as the late Mr. Clinch's past services entitled him to special recognition and his memory deserves to be perpetuated.

It was understood that Mr. J. A. Sano and other owners had also given their consent.

FOOTBALL CLUB'S QUANTUM. W. H. Smith, secretary Preston Football Club, wrote acknowledging council's letter stating the conditions under which the park would be granted that he had been unable to know how the deposit of £3 against damages would apply, seeing two clubs were using the park in equal degree.
