NORTHCOTE TOWN COUNCIL.

MONDAY, 16th May.

Present.—Crs. Hayes (mayor), Mitchell, Hastings, Archbold, Harry, Tharratt, Woolhouse, Dennis, Lees, Bainbridge, McIntosh, and Plant.

Apologies were received for Crs. Smith and Williams.

ST. GEORGE'S ROAD.

The Metropolitan Board of Works wrote stating that the water supply committee would receive a deputation of property owners in St. George's road relative to the fencing of the pipe track.

The mayor reported that the property owners had placed their case before the board that day, and the board would give its decision next Monday.

RAILWAY FOOTBRIDGE.

The Railway Commissioners wrote intimating that in view of the fact that there was no intention of duplicating the railway bridge over the Merri Creek in the immediate future an interview with reference to providing a footbridge would be unnecessary at the present time.—Recoiled.

IMMEDIATE RETREAT RESERVE.

The Lands Department forwarded a plan of the Inebriate Retreat grounds, showing that 9a 17 7p had been reserved for recreation purposes. This would be under the control of the council who had permissive occupancy of the reserve.

Cr. Hastings moved that a letter be sent to the Fitzroy Cricket Club intimating that councillors were willing to meet representatives of their club on the ground to discuss the position.

Cr. Plant seconded.—Carried.

REPRESENTATIVES OF THE SOUTH AND CENTRAL WARDS WERE APPOINTED TO ATTEND.

IMPERIAL DRAINAGE.

The Public Health Department wrote relative to drainage in the vicinity of Mr. Cady's property, 282 High street, and asking to be informed of what had been done in the matter.

A report was read from R. Gunst, sanitary inspector, to the effect that he had seen the owners but had been unable to arrange an amicable settlement. He therefore recommended that an order be made on the owner of No. 1 Bank st. to construct an impervious drain from the premises to the lane at the north thereof and the owner of No. 282-4 High street to thoroughly clear away all offensive matter lying on the premises and fill up the depression caused by the filling of drains.

The town clerk stated that in order to give effect to the order a plan would be prepared, and on the motion of Cr. Plant this was ordered to be done.

WEST-THIRD STREET DRAINAGE.

The Public Health Department forwarded a report regarding the case of lymphoid fever in West-third street, and requesting to know what the council had done in regard to the Green street drainage, the subject of complaint by Mr. Baker.

The town clerk said he had forwarded a copy of the inspector's report to the Health Department.

Cr. Harry moved that the department be informed that the matter was under the consideration of the works committee.—Carried.

HERN STREET PRIVATE HOSPITAL.

The Public Board of Health forwarded a copy of an appeal from Mrs. Kate Wood regarding an application for registration as a private hospital of premises situated in Merri street, Northcote, which had been refused by the council. The Board wished to be supplied with the council's reason for refusing registration.

Cr. Archbold moved that the letter be referred to the committee of the whole. Cr. Mitchell seconded.—Carried.

EXTENSION OF GAS MAINS.

Metropolitan Gas Co. wrote stating they had decided to extend the mains in South Crescent to a point between Parsons street and Victoria road and also in Mason street as far as Roberts street. The question of extension to Waterloo road was still under consideration.—Recoiled.

POLICE PROTECTION WANTED.

J. W. Nicholson, secretary Northcote South Progress Association, wrote asking for police protection for the south eastern portion of the town, pointing out that owing to the rapid increase of population and new dwellings police protection was urgently required. Cases of house-breaking and indecent behavior had recently occurred.

Cr. Dennis moved that a copy of the letter be sent to the Sergeant of Police for consideration.—Carried.

PUBLIC WORKS COMMITTEE.

Cr. Harry (chairman) moved that the following accounts, amounting to £708 12/11, including £388 12/11 general expenditure and £320 loan expenditure, be passed for payment.—Carried.

2. Channell, Mitchell street, south side, from Northcote street to Hartley street.—That the town surveyor be authorized to carry out the work, the cost of same to be charged to the east ward.

COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE.

The mayor submitted the report as follows:—

Rate collector.—That Mr. John A. Thompson be appointed as rate collector to this council at a salary at the rate of £156 per annum, subject to the duties and conditions adopted by the council.—Adopted.

ORDINARY BUSINESS.

Cr. Plant moved that the applying of the north side of Bay View street be referred to the public works committee for completion, the cost to come out of the east ward appropriation.—Carried.

Cr. Mitchell moved that the plans for the construction of McCracken's Avenue and Hartington street be referred to the public works committee, so that fresh appointments could be made.—Carried.

The mayor reported that a deputation had waited on the Minister of Education with reference to the establishment of a Technical school in Northcote, but received to say that they met with very little encouragement, owing to the uncertainty of the State finances, Mr. Tate, however, had promised to start a school on a modified scale in the school room at the Helen street school.

Cr. Tharratt moved that Railway Department be asked to place a gate opposite Kynmp street when effecting the station improvements at Croxton.—Carried.

Cr. Woolhouse moved that the street lamp in Gadd street and St George's road be lighted with gas, now that the mains had been laid.—Carried.

Cr. Bainbridge said he thought it would be an advantage to the municipality if they entered into an arrangement with the Gas Coy. to pay for all gas consumed on the average system. It would save considerable expense in the supply and repair of gas boxes. He moved that the matter be referred to the public works committee.—Carried.

Cr. Archbold pointed out that the Color and Essendon councils had their own stone crushers and quarries and were effecting a considerable saving by their use. He moved that a letter be written to the Essendon council asking if they would arrange for an inspection of their plant by the Northcote council.—Carried.

The mayor said they heard a lot about the amalgamation of municipalities, and it struck him that it would be a good idea if they combined with Preston in purchasing a one-cylinder plant.

In answer to Cr. Bainbridge the surveyor stated that he expected a report re the Westgarth street drain, at any time.

Cr. Mitchell complained of the checking condition of some of the streets leading from High street to St. George's road, and Cr. Harry moved that Benson's Road and Arthurton Road be referred to the public works committee for report.—Carried.

Cr. Dennis said that a fence had been erected across the footpath near the bridge in St. George's road, and moved that the matter be referred to the committee of the whole.

Cr. Woolhouse drew attention to the bad state of the drainage, St. George's Road, between Shaftesbury Parade and Woolton Avenue, and moved that it be attended to.—Carried.

Cr. Harry moved that the improvement of Dennis street be referred to the public works committee.—Carried.

The mayor moved that the attention of the police be directed to the street that motor cars and motor cyclists drove through the town.—Carried.

Cr. Archbold said that the interval between some of the trams was getting longer and longer and moved that the tram committee look into the matter.—Carried.

ORDINERS OF THE DAY.

The mayor moved the adoption of the undermentioned clauses, which were agreed to:—

1. That the supplementary valuation of rateable property made by Mr. H. Clappell, amounting to £2097, as entered in the council's rate book and dated 26th April, 1910, be hereby adopted and form part of the valuation of rateable property of the town in force, subject to the amendment of the respective assessments affected.

2. That the rate made by the council on the 18th day of December, 1909, be altered and amended in consequence of a supplementary valuation of the respective assessments as set out in the valuer's return, and entered in the council's rate book.

EPPING SHIRE COUNCIL.

MONDAY, MAY 16.

Present.—Crs. McCormack (president), McCoy, Morgan, Dea, and Brown.

CORRESPONDENCE.

From Municipal Association forwarding copy of message of loyalty and sympathy they had sent on receipt of the news of the King's death.—The resolution was endorsed, on the motion of Crs. Morgan and Brown.

From Education Department asking co-operation of the council and Board of Advice in celebrating Empire Day.

Cr. Morgan said that prior to the last meeting it had been published in the daily papers that in consequence of the death of the King this year's celebrations would be cancelled. Accordingly the meeting decided not to go on with the celebration, and to return the subscriptions already collected. It was, however, decided to ask the president to call a public meeting during the first week in August to ascertain whether there is a desire to hold a picnic on that day.

From Borough of Donnelly asking this council's co-operation in securing free passes on the railway for State School children desiring to attend technical schools, sloyd classes, &c.

Cr. Brown remarked that if they started this kind of thing it would be hard to know where to stop. Already the Railway Department gave substantial concessions to country children desiring to attend secondary schools.

The matter was referred to the council's representative on the Municipal Association to use his discretion when the matter came up.

From Shire of Strathfield asking assistance in getting the Forest Act amended so that municipalities would be free to get road-making material from State Forest lands.

The request was considered a fair one and it was decided to ask the member for the district to support it when the matter came up in Parliament.

From Infectious Diseases Hospital reporting reception of case of scarlet fever and diphtheria—Tasman Gruff, Thomastown.

From J. Bateman and Son bringing under notice their scheme for introducing acetylene gas into country houses.

FINANCE.

The treasurer (Mr. G. McClelland) reported having received since last meeting £10 5/- and present B. balance £149 6s 5d.

The accounts for the month amounting to £118 10s 9d were passed for payment on the motion of Crs. Morgan and Dea.

ENGINEER'S REPORT.

1. Have inspected Glenvale Road, near Gadd's. The worst portion is north of the bridge. Would suggest that 8 chains of the flat ground be metalled, including 3 chains that had been pitched 40 years ago.

Cr. Brown said this work was really necessary, and if the council could possibly do it it should be done. He would move that tenders be called for the 3 chains and also for the 5 chains as recommended by the engineer.

Cr. McCoy—If the road was made 40 years ago it must surely want some repairs. (Laughter).

The motion was carried on the understanding that the work would be carried out if the prices were not too high.

2. On Contract 137 Keating and Brazil have 11 1/2 yards of extra metal; cost £35 7s 6d.

Cr. Morgan moved and Cr. McCoy seconded that the extra be allowed.—Carried.

DOG REGISTRATION.

The application of John Pratt, sen., was the only one sent in for the position of collector of dog fees.—Mr. Pratt was given the appointment, on the motion of Crs. Morgan and Dea.

ORDINARY BUSINESS.

Cr. Brown moved that application be made to the Murrumbidgee council for the loan of the road roller for use at the upper end of the shire.

Cr. M. McCormack seconded.—Carried.

Cr. Brown called the council's attention to the fact that the railing from the culvert on the Main road, Murrumbidgee, had been taken away, leaving some dangerous exposure.

Cr. Morgan and other councillors expressed the hope that the engineer would see to it in getting the metal out on the main road.

Attention was called to the way the traffic was cutting up the footpaths at the southern end of the shire, and it was even worse in Prestonshire. "Soon," said Cr. Morgan, "pedestrian traffic from the station would be forced out on to the middle of the road."

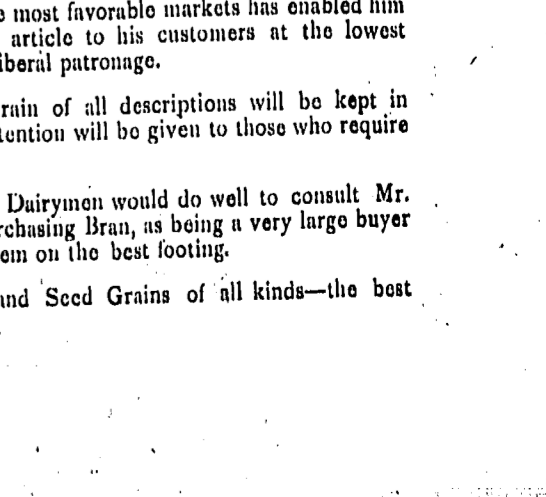
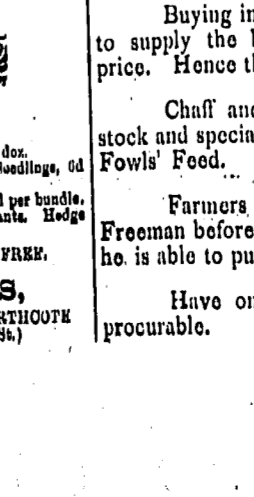
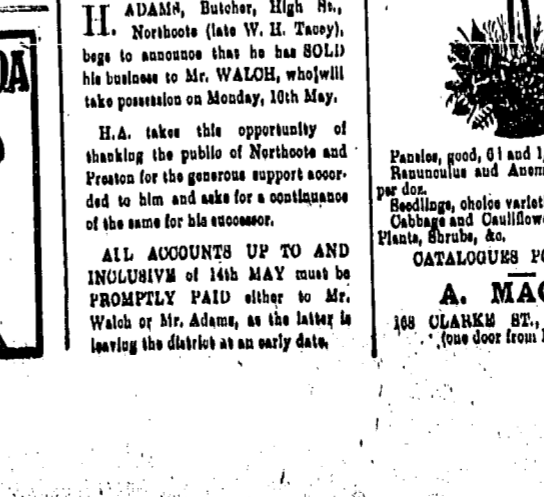
