

ELECTION OF MAYOR BY THE RATEPAYERS. NORTHCOOTE COUNCIL, EVENLY DIVIDED. F. Duffield, hon. sec. conference Raterspayers' associations, wrote on Tuesday evening informing the council that they had adopted a plank in favour of election of mayor by the people, and requesting the council to take the voice of the people to the above before electing the next mayor.

Mr. Hastings moved that the letter be considered with Mr. Lees's motion of motion.

Mr. Lees, at a subsequent stage, moved the resolution of which he had given notice, as follows:— "That this council urge upon the Municipal Association the desirability of approaching the State Government with a view of having the Local Government Act amended so as to enable the mayor of a municipality being elected by the ratepayers."

Mr. Lees said the hour was late, and that matter non-contradictory (although) he would content himself with simply moving the adoption of the resolution. He would like to say, however, that he had no knowledge of the letter which he requested to see referred for consideration with his motion.

Mr. Plant said this would only be asking the association to do something the council believed in themselves. They could hardly ask the association to take it up for them. In Footscray a vote was obtained and the election of the ratepayers was formally endorsed by the council. But all the same every body of men elected their own chairmen, and he did not see how they were going to get better results by the alteration proposed. Councillors should surely be the best judges of the best man to rule over them. He would vote for the mayor being elected by the ratepayers, but he would not vote that all municipalities be compelled to do the same thing.

Mr. Hastings said this same question had been before the Municipal Association on many occasions and always thrown out by large majorities, so it was no use again sending it on to that body. Councillors were responsible to the ratepayers for their actions, and if they could not be trusted to choose their own chairmen they were not worth their salt. The way things were going they would simply be expected to swallow certain "planks" and vote in accordance with them. If that was going to constitute public life it was not worth being in it. They were asked to have a very democratic form of government, yet it was left to the members of the House to elect their Speaker. The electors as a whole were not asked to do it.

Mr. McIntosh said he was going to oppose the motion, as he was quite sure the council was the right party to elect the mayor of the town.

Mr. Tharatt said that the association which had written to them that night claimed the right to choose their own chairmen, and he had not noticed that the workers as a whole were consulted when a chairman of that body was to be appointed. Election by the ratepayers might mean the return of a very unpopular man, who would cause nothing but turmoil and trouble in the council.

Mr. Harry said this was a strong argument for a change. The council might "set" and keep out of the mayorship a man the ratepayers generally thought the right man for the position. He considered the position would carry more honour with it if the choice were by the ratepayers as a whole.

Mr. Smith said he thought he was the last mayor who sat without remuneration. He would sooner take the position without remuneration than he would for, for a man could then do as he liked, but if you took "the paltry £75"—which does not keep the room yonder going at the pace that it goes"—then Bill, Dick, Tom, and Harry felt they were not as much right to the mayor's room and its contents as the mayor himself.

Mr. Lees, in reply, said it had been stated that it was not the custom in other bodies for the various units to elect their chairmen, but they must remember that "what is not always best" is not always right. They must be progressive and not content always to follow old rules. The opponents of change invited to do one important exception, and that was the election of the president of the United States by the people. He knew and all councillors knew that at times a great deal of heart-burning had been engendered in connection with the election of mayor by the council, and which sort of spirit animated councillors for their public duties. If giving it to the ratepayers to elect the mayor they got over that difficulty and the tendency would be towards better and harmonious working.

On the question being put the voting was even.

The mayor—That's awkward! but I give my casting vote for the motion.

Mr. Plant—What's that?

The mayor—I think I've made a mistake.

Mr. Harry reminded the mayor that the purchase of the tram was carried on the casting vote of a mayor.

Our Young Manhood. Mr. J. G. Membray, M.L.A., delivered an address last Tuesday night at the meeting of the Northcoote South Hatespayers' Association, his subject being "Our Young Manhood." To produce a strong young manhood and womanhood, physically, morally and mentally, said Mr. Membray, should be the aim of every nation. During the South African war England was alarmed to find that the stamina of her young manhood was deteriorating, and at the same time her child life was being sacrificed. Slum life, overworking, impure air, drunkenness, and insufficient food were the chief contributing causes to this most undesirable condition of things. To-day a strenuous effort was being made throughout England to strengthen the growing manhood, physically and morally, and to save the child life, 90 per cent of which was born healthy.

Mr. Membray, Australia is to take her proper place among the nations of the world she must look to the physical, intellectual and religious education of her youth. In Australia, with three million square miles of territory and a population less than four and a half millions, there was no need for over-crowding and they should profit by the experience of older countries. The ideal number of persons to the acre in cities was estimated at 25, but in parts of London there were between 200 and 300 to the acre, and in one part of Whitechapel 3000 creatures were crammed into an acre of space. In their own most densely settled cities they found in Fitzroy 35 persons to the acre, Collingwood 31, and Richmond 28, which was vastly different to the figures of other lands. To prevent excessive overcrowding in and around Melbourne Mr. Membray suggested that the railway fares should be reduced to the lowest possible profit to the outer suburbs.

Speaking on education Mr. Membray said that a thorough system of education was the greatest safeguard of a nation. Whilst a number of young Australians had distinguished themselves, the great majority simply passed through the State School curriculum. Statistics showed that only 2 per cent of country boys and girls received any of the primary and secondary school education. Victoria's great need was the establishment of more secondary schools where young people between the age of 14 and 17 could continue their education, instead of wandering aimlessly about with apparently no desire for knowledge. After dealing with agricultural education and the economic advantages derived from it in such countries as Holland, Denmark, Germany, and Switzerland, Mr. Membray concluded an informative address by referring to the immense value a sound moral and home training would be to their boys and girls.

SOCIAL EVENING AND PRESENTATIONS. A splendidly attended social evening was held at the All Saints' (Preston) parish hall on Wednesday night, the occasion being a farewell and presentation to Mr. F. J. Ashton, late secretary of the church, for many years one of the pillars of All Saints' Church.
