NORTHCOTE TOWN COUNCIL.

MONDAY, OCTOBER 9.

Present:—Crs. Hastings (Mayor), Johnson, Schwaebel, Plant, Smith, Glanfield, Tharratt, Henderson, Hayes, Hayes, Redmond, Dennis, Lees, and Mason.

PROTECTION OF CHILD LIFE. The Public Health Department wrote inviting two representatives from this Council, together with its medical officer, to a conference with the proposal to establish municipal depots for the supply of milk to infants, the efficient inspection of dairy herds and dairies, the providing of a nurse or nurses to assist mothers in the care of their babies, etc.

REAR-WAY AT P.O. The Home Affairs Department wrote, agreeing to grant an easement for light and eaves space in connection with the municipal buildings. They suggested that an area ten feet wide be reserved for a common rear way to the Commissioners, and the Council referred to the finance committee.

CHURCH WASTED FOR PARK. The Church Settlement Board wrote stating that the 9th instalment of £20 on Pepler's Grove Park was now due, and requested payment.—Referred to finance committee, with power to pass cheque.

MOTOR CAR TRAFFIC. The Under-Secretary wrote, forwarding diagram of signs suggested by the Automobile Club, to indicate dangerous points, etc., upon the streets and roads for the safety of motor car traffic, and asking many of such signs would be required by the municipality.

THE NEW LEAN. The Under-Treasurer wrote, requesting to be supplied with a copy of the schedule of the works proposed to be undertaken with new lean.—The town clerk had supplied particulars.

THOSE SCREEN CLASS CARRIAGES. J. G. Menzies, M.L.A., wrote, stating he was attending to the Council's request for additional and better second class carriages on the local railway line.—Received.

PRESTON COUNCIL AND ELECTRIC. The Preston Shire Council again wrote, asking for a reply to their request as to whether this Council would allow an "electric feeder" to be run through their municipality. As the matter was of vital importance, an early reply would be welcomed a favour.—To be considered with report of committee of the whole.

GAS ON WATERLOO ROAD. The Metropolitan Gas Co. wrote agreeing to extend their mains in Waterloo Road.—Received.

HAY COFF OF FENCING. E. L. Lizard wrote, notifying that he proposed erecting a 3-foot paling fence adjoining the Council's land in Mansfield-street, and requesting Council to bear half cost.—Agreed to.

SEWERAGE CONTRACTOR AND APPOINTMENT. C. R. Nelder wrote, drawing attention to the condition in which the asphalt had been left by the sewerage contractor in front of his premises, West-gate-street.

It was reported by the surveyor that the matter had been fixed up, but another letter came in from Mr. Nelder stating the contrary.—It was understood that the engineer would give the matter his attention.

DRAINAGE BY FLYING STREET. C. J. Donagan wrote, stating that as he had noticed in the "Leader" that Flinders-street would not be constructed until the ratemakers were prepared to pay cash for same, he would ask that a channel be cut on the north side to take the drainage from Mr. Miller's house into the channel now existing.—Referred to the works committee, on the motion of Crs. Dennis and Redmond.

BUILDING DOWNS ORDERED TO. Dr. Vos wrote, asking that the Council take steps to have the building down at Morgan and 3rd-gate-street, established, Dundas-street, abolished.

It was intimated that Preston Council had refused to grant a building-down licence for this premises.

RUCKER STREET. E. Brothers wrote, asking that a handy heap of sewer pipes might be used for the improvement of Rucker-street, which was impassable.—Referred to works committee, on the motion of Crs. Mason and Lees.

W. H. Sutherland wrote, calling attention to the very bad condition of the right-of-way at the rear of Johnson-street.

Cr. Tharratt urged that temporary relief at least be given.

Cr. Johnson moved, and Cr. Henderson seconded, that the foreman report to the works committee on the matter.

Cr. Johnson said the only way out of the difficulty was the construction of the right-of-way.

Cr. Schwaebel said he lived in the neighbourhood of the right-of-way, and knew something about it. It was really a shame to see vehicles axle-deep in the right-of-way, which was at times so bad that horses could not get up it.

Cr. Harry thought Johnson-street would have to be made first.

The motion was carried.

BRONCKE STREET WASTES. W. Mills wrote, asking that something be done to improve the path in Broncke-street. More light was also wanted, leading to the station.—Referred to works committee, on the motion of Cr. Glanfield and Harry.

F. VAN DER STRAET. A. A. Muller wrote regarding the construction of Flinders-street, that he could not guarantee that the property-owners were willing to pay cash. Surely something might be done in the meantime in the way of putting down an asphalt drain (which could be funded) to connect with the storm-water sewer. If the Council would not move, he would have to try some other source.

Cr. Plant said if they wanted Flinders-street constructed at once, the only way was to pay cash. If they were not prepared to do this they must take their chance with the storm water. About 100 feet of the storm water sewer, which had been sealed by the representatives for the wards, came before Flinders-street. He was reported to have said that there were thousands of pounds available for the construction of private streets. So there was, but it was not the Council's money. He intimated that a reply be sent that no priority could be given in connection with this street.

Cr. Smith seconded.

optional to the members for the wards to change the order of construction according as circumstances warranted.

Cr. Tharratt said that Cr. Harry had just said that an "earnest endeavour" should be made to push on with street construction. They had long been talking like this. But, as Cr. Heathwaite had said the previous evening, Cr. Schwaebel said that for a long time he had heard that certain streets were going to be made, but he noticed that Crs. Plant and Tharratt were going very far before the work was started.

The Mayor said that they were not being made, so that the appointments in connection with several of the streets could be made.

The motion was carried.

PUBLIC WORKS COMMITTEE. Cr. Dennis (chairman) submitted the report, recommending—

1. That accounts amounting to £320 14s 11d be passed for payment.—Adopted.

2. Victorian Railway Commissioners to lease of land east side of Railway, from Rucker's Road to Beaconsfield Parade.—That the Council agree to lease this land for the purpose of forming a footpath under the conditions specified by the Railway Commissioners.—Adopted.

3. H. H. Hansen, to Bank Street.—That he be informed that the Council will proceed with the construction of the street if the ratemakers undertake to pay cash for the work.

Replying to Cr. Plant, Cr. Dennis said that the surveyor had reported that nothing short of construction of the street would meet the purpose.

Cr. Plant said he thought that a channel on the low side of the street would prevent the storm water which fell upon the street flowing on to Mr. Hansen's premises. The street otherwise did not need construction.

The surveyor said a pitched channel might take the drainage to Mitchell-street.

Cr. Smith said he thought the property owners would pay for this willingly.

The clause was adopted.

4. Channelling in St. George's Road, from Kemp Street to Beaconsfield Parade.—That the matter be deferred for consideration with the estimates.—Adopted.

FINANCE COMMITTEE. Cr. Lees (chairman) submitted the report, recommending—

1. That accounts amounting to 185s 7d be passed for payment.—Adopted.

2. Board of Public Health re Garage Disposal.—That the matter be deferred for consideration with the estimates.—Adopted.

3. P. Macaulay re compensation for alleged injury to cow.—That he be informed that the Council cannot acknowledge any liability in the matter.—Adopted.

4. G. Gibson re Stormwater, Mitchell Street to Separation Street.—That he be requested to grant a new easement to the Council on the eastern side of the road, when the stormwater drain will receive consideration.—Adopted.

5. W. Heath re Rookerie west side of High Street.—That he be informed that the estimated cost of the work is £40, towards which he has offered the sum of £10, and that as the Council is not any funds available for the purpose his offer cannot be accepted.

Cr. Lees stated that the engineer had interviewed several of the property owners adjoining Mr. Heath, but they could not contribute towards the cost of the improvements.

COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE. The mayor submitted the report, recommending—

Cr. Plant said that as the roadway in High-street at Rucker's Hill, east side, had got into a very bad state, he could not see how when it was going to be metalled and tarred.

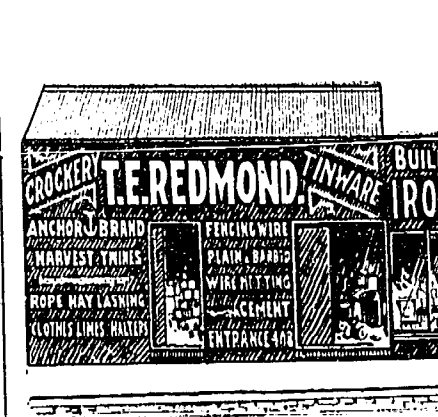
Cr. Dennis said they were just waiting for the metal to be broken. In the meantime some temporary relief should be given.

THE SELECTION OF A DAIRY COW

By W. R. Gilbert, in "Hoards' Dairyman."

It must be remembered that it is much more difficult to point out the indications of a good dairy cow than it is to point out the indications of a good beef animal.

The eye should be bright, of good size and prominent. The reason I like a prominent eye is that it is the indication of an animal that makes good use of its brain.

The horns should be long compared with the size of the cow; a spiky horn is an indication of coarseness.

Neck.

The neck should be long and slender—not too thick or too beefy. A short, thick neck denotes that the animal will not do well.

Shoulder.

The top of the shoulder should be pointed. This is a good point, if the process is not too high above the shoulder blades.

Barrel.

Coming back to the barrel, it should have the capacity to contain and assimilate large quantities of food.

Ribs.

The ribs of the dairy cow should be flat, not round as are often found in beef animals.

Backbone.

The backbone should be prominent. The reason I like a prominent backbone is that it is an indication of an animal that makes good use of its brain.

Loins.

The loins should be strong, so that the cow will be able to carry a large quantity of milk.

Hip.

The hips or "loin" bones should be prominent, and the shoulder blades should be prominent.

Flank.

The flank should be arched, indicating plenty of room for the cow's udder.

Limbs.

The limbs should be in proportion to the animal's size, but do not require too much development of bone.

Udder.

I now come to what should be considered one of the most important points in the dairy cow. One of the rules of a horseman is to judge a dairy cow by its udder.

NORTHCOOTE TOWN COUNCIL.

MONDAY, OCTOBER 23.

Present:—Crs. Hastings (mayor), Johnson, Schwabach, Lee, Hendon, Mason, Tharratt, Woodlands, Henderson, Plant, Smith, Glanfield, Hayes, Richmond and Harry.

Water Extension. The Metropolitan Board of Works wrote asking to extend the water in Amable street, from Martin street south six chains.—Received.

Return of Employees. The Chief Inspector of Factories wrote asking that "return in connection with non-accidents be forwarded.—The town clerk had supplied the information.

Preston Council and Electric Light. The Preston Council wrote intimating that they would be pleased to confer with this council re electric power through the municipality.—Received.

Merri Park. The Lands Department wrote asking for plan showing the 5 acres of Merri Park granted to Fitzroy C.C. E. C. Youmans, hon. sec. Northcoote C.C., wrote asking that the land granted to their club be defined.

A mayor moved that the letter be received. It would be necessary to have a conference between the two clubs, so that the position of each club be defined. In the meantime they would get a plan from the Lands Department showing the precise measurements.

Can't Give Gas. The Metropolitan Gas Co wrote stating that the gas was not near enough to make supply of gas available to street lamp in Clarke street east.—Received.

Wages of Tramway Employees. G. L. Prendergast, general president The Australian Tramway Employees' Association, wrote asking to be supplied with copy of the tramway lease, as far as such lease contains clauses governing the wages and conditions of employees. They had been informed that the conditions were not being carried out.

The mayor said he did not think they were called upon to provide a copy of the lease. If there was any complaint let it be made in writing. He moved that the letter be received.

The Late Mr. Harry Beard. F. R. Brennan wrote asking to be supplied with the names of councillors so that their patronage might be solicited for concert on behalf of the widow and family of the late Mr. Harry Beard.

Cr. Dennis moved that the necessary information be furnished.—Carried.

West Ward Drainage Matter. H. E. Brennan wrote calling attention to the bad state of the drainage existing at the corner of Harold and Raymond streets, Thornbury. The health of the residents would probably be affected if it was allowed to exist during the summer. He was about to build six houses. Only a ploughed furrow was required.—Referred to works committee, on the motion of Crs. Tharratt and Henderson.

Superfluous Notice. R. W. Bryan, Martin street, wrote stating there was no need of the sanitary inspector's notice to fill up the depression at the rear of his premises with soil, as he was in the course of having the matter attended to. He would like to call attention to the council's own property (opposite his house) which was not exactly a health resort, and he hoped the sanitary officer would inspect.—Received.

Against Jerry Buildings. Danlop & Hunt wrote suggesting that a bye-law be passed insisting that specifications as well as plans be submitted to the surveyor by those erecting new buildings. The idea was to prevent "Jerry buildings."—Received.

Filly Drain in the East. D. Caulfield wrote calling attention to the filthy state of the drain in front of his house. He hoped the council would do something if only for the sake of the health of the district. Six months ago they had offered to supply the labour if the council would supply the material. The drain carries the sewerage of about 20 houses. Last year they had to spend 10s in plenty to keep down the smell.—To be considered with Clause 4 of works committee's report.

Library Matters. H. Hastings (chairman) and R. J. Whalley (secretary) wrote forwarding copy of librarian's duties for council's approval.—Referred to committee of the whole.

R. J. Whalley, hon. secretary Northcoote Free Library, wrote asking for balance due of Government grant, namely £70, to which he accounts for books amounting to £70 to pay.—Referred to committee of the whole.

R. J. Whalley wrote forwarding the accounts under which the committee desired to work with the council, also a copy of last year's balance sheet duly audited, as well as a copy of the librarian's report to it of a meeting of the newly-constituted committee, showing the great popularity of the institution.—Referred to the committee of the whole.

The mayor reported that the newly-constituted committee had met for the first time, and important business was done. The committee intended, by means of special efforts, to supplement the council's contribution to the library to the greatest possible extent. The recommendation of the committee was that the council grant its contribution to them in quarterly amounts to expend in books and up-keep at their discretion. In view of their past good management he thought the committee might well be entrusted with this power. Without such power the position of the committee would be untenable.

Cr. Plant desired to know if the committee had given any instructions in regard to tarring the track. The mayor said instructions had been given to Mr. Neekin that the work must be done early in January. Personally he thought the new tramway engineer was going to look after the interests of the council.

The report was adopted.

Ordinary Business. Cr. Hayes reported having attended the sittings of the Municipal Association's Annual Conference. Legislation was recommended to prohibit unlighted hoardings in main streets. A resolution in favour of the election of mayor by the people was lost.

Cr. Johnson reported having, with Cr. Schwabach, attended the conference on Greater Melbourne Scheme, which proposed to take over water

West Ward Troubles.

S. T. Stevens, Woodlands street, wrote drawing attention to the difficulties under which residents west of St. George's road laboured, especially in the vicinity of Toad's road, owing to the impassable state of the streets. Since the road across to Dymally's street was fenced in they could not get the tradesmen to call on them. No vehicle could go along Gladstone street or Aberdeen street on account of an open drain running across them, so the only thing to do was to temporarily repair Bayley's road by improving the drainage and filling in a few of the worst parts. If this were done it would allow access to adjacent streets.

Referred to works committee, on the motion of Crs. Hendon and Smith.

Paifield House. The shire engineer, H. H. Berg, wrote forwarding plans for a completion of Paifield in a sewer for which tenders were to be called on the 23rd November.

Referred to the committee of the whole, on the motion of Cr. Hayes. Surveyor to report.

Edwards Street. The property owners in Edwards street wrote asking that the path be asphalted on the usual conditions.

Cr. Dennis moved and Cr. Mason seconded that consideration be given when the asphalted under the loan schedule is being decided.

Public Works Committee. Cr. Dennis (chairman) submitted the report, recommending—

1. That accounts amounting to £510 18s 8d, be passed for payment.—Adopted.

2. That plans and specifications be prepared for the construction of the southern portion of the lane at the rear of John's street and High street.—Adopted.

3. Building Pres.—That the Town Surveyor be authorised (under seal) to take the necessary proceedings for the recovery of building fees due by owners of buildings, and also to enforce the provisions of the regulations.—Adopted.

4. Drainage in Clarke Street.—That the Town Surveyor be authorised to regrade the channel on north side of Clarke Street, from Membery Street to the main drain, and also channels in Mason Street to conform therewith.

Cr. Dennis, chairman of the works committee, asked leave to withdraw this recommendation, as it was on the notice paper by mistake. While the committee sympathised with those who had this grievance, they could do nothing at present, as the surveyor informed them that the levels of the street would have to be altered, which would mean considerable expense. As it was unfair that the money for such a work should come out of the ward apportionment he would suggest that it be considered with the estimates.

The engineer said the channel would have to be lowered at Mason street 12 inches.

Cr. Plant said this was one of the most disgraceful channels in the town, and long ago the ward members thought they had dealt with it by allotting £15 of their apportionment for it, but this question of levels had cropped up and blocked it. He moved that the matter be referred to the committee of the whole, where they would have the opportunity of seeing whether there would be sufficient out of the £250 allocated for the east ward for drainage.

Cr. Smith seconded the motion, agreeing with Cr. Plant that the channel was in a disgraceful state. He was at a loss to know where the £55 apportioned to them had gone.

Cr. Henderson said this would mean delay and the ratepayers were disgusted with the slowness of the work done by the council. He moved an amendment that temporary relief be given.

Cr. Glanfield seconded the motion, saying it was no use "tiding them on" by referring it to the committee. The amendment was put and lost and the motion carried.

Finance Committee. Cr. Lees (chairman) submitted the report, showing that the receipts for the month were £38 13s 1d and the present Dr. balance £751 10s 1d; also recommending—

1. That accounts amounting to £273 4s 10d be passed for payment.—Adopted.

2. Jan Annual Charge.—That the matter of making a Jan Annual Charge of 9s per pan be considered at next meeting.—Adopted.

3. Board of Public Health Regulations to biograph entertainments.—That the officers of the Council be instructed to enforce the regulations.

4. Edwards Crescent.—That the Town Solicitor having advised that it will be necessary for a survey of all the properties to be made for the amendment of title and realignment of the street, arrangements be made with Mr. G. R. B. Steane to make the survey.—Adopted.

Tramway Committee. Cr. Harry (chairman) submitted the report, setting out that the Tramway Engineer has made an examination of the whole property, and has given notice to the Lessees for a further report to be submitted as to the progress made with the work.

Cr. Harry remarked that the report was sent on the table for perusal. The committee had approved of the action of the tramway engineer in serving notices to have certain matters attended to, but, on the other hand, they would urge the engineer to see that any fresh blocking be at once backed up with tarred metal and not allowed to go uncorrected for long periods as at present.
