**DRUIDS AT CRICKET.**  
GWALIA V. SANDHURST.

The above teams met at Croxton reserve on Monday last to play the second game for the challenge shield presented by the Gwalia and Sandhurst lodges.

Sandhurst batted first and compiled 107 (G. Fox 29, E. Hubbard 19, R. Howard 15, W. Carlson (four wickets) and B. O'Connor (three wickets) shared the bowling honors. Gwalia responded with 114 (Carnell 45, W. O'Connor 27, Carlson 18). Going in to bat a second time Sandhurst lost six wickets for 125 (H. Glen 57, E. Hubbard 20, Richards 16). **MAHARAJAH'S CHRISTMAS GIFT**  
"SCINDIA" AMBULANCE CAR.

The "Scindia" motor ambulance fleet, the Christmas gift of Major-General His Highness the Maharaja Scindia of Gwalior to the Army and Navy, was formally accepted by the King on behalf of his soldiers and sailors at Buckingham Palace on Monday.

The fleet, consisting of 11 ambulance cars, four cars for officers, five motor-lorries and repair wagons, and 10 motor-cycles, was taken into the Palace grounds by the Governor-General's staff, and driven slowly in file past the King, who was accompanied by the Queen, Princess Mary, Prince Henry, and the lords and ladies of the household. The Maharaja was represented by Colonel Sir David Barr.

Their Majesties examined the cars thoroughly and inquired particularly into such matters as the arrangements for heating and for food storage. The fleet afterwards left the grounds by the North Garden gate, and proceeded to the Mall through the forecourt of the Palace. Before the representatives of the Maharaja took their leave the King informed them of his intention to telegraph his thanks personally to his Highness.

**A GENEROUS PRINCE.**  
The fleet has now been handed over to the proper authorities, and it is understood that it will be sent to the seat of war almost immediately. The total cost of the fleet was £25,000.

It may be added that in addition to this magnificent gift the Maharaja is providing, in conjunction with the Begum of Bhopal, the hospital ship Loyalty (formerly the Canadian Pacific steamer Impress of India), which contains 500 beds; and that his Highness had made the following contributions for the purpose:—£10,000 for the National Relief Fund, £15,000 for motor transport, £5,000 for Belgian refugees, £5,000 for oil-cars, motor-cars, £1,000 for telecoaps, £1,000 for Queen Mary's Needle-work Guild, £100 for Princess Mary's Fund.

**WAR CHRISTMAS AT THE POST OFFICE.**  
HUGE VOLUME OF BUSINESS.

From its regular annual recurrence the London public has become more or less familiar with the effects of the "Christmas rush" on the General Post Office. But this year the difficulties were enormously increased owing to the pressure which already existed as a result of the war.

The ordinary Christmas business was less than usual, inasmuch as there was less miscellaneous present giving. The postal authorities reckoned on this and took on less than the usual number of extra Christmas hands. Last year 10,000 additional men were engaged. This year it was appalling that 16,000 would be enough, and there was some difficulty in getting that number, in spite of the fact that the salaries were increased from 24s to 26s and 28s a week for postmen and 25s to 32s for sorters, to which the pay for overtime has to be added. An interesting feature in the new year engaged was a party of Belgian postal employees from the General Post Office at Antwerp, who wore their Belgian uniforms at their work, and in spite of a very scanty knowledge of English, proved themselves thoroughly efficient sorters.

**POST OFFICE MEN AS SOLDIERS.**

It has to be born in mind, however, that the Post Office has just about 6,000 regular employees, who are on service. To replace these 6,000 there have been taken on 4,200 new men since the war began (though a proportion of the employees are women), the preference being given to married men and those over military age.

Few people probably realize that the war has been a great deal more work and give much more trouble than would the same amount of men in civil life. For a long time past the number of postal packages containing "warfare" of all kinds sent away are about 20,000 a day. It has risen as high as 48,000; and in the six days ended December 12, which was the last date at which packages were supposed to be received for delivery to the men for Christmas, parcels to the amount of £1,000,000 of value were sent. This amount of inadequate addressing is deplorable. And even greater and unnecessary is the burden of careless packing.

To all this volume of matter sent to the Army has to be added that, not much less, for the men in the Navy, for whom some 1,000 parcels a day are received at the General Post Office. These are sorted by ships and forwarded to destinations furnished by the Admiralty, every ship having its separate bags.
