EARLY REMINISCENCES OF PRESTON.

An old resident of Preston now living in Windsor, when seen recently spoke interestingly of his memories of the town in the early days.

"It is not generally known," he said, "that Preston was once called Irwin-town. A man named Jeffrey (I think Samuel) was the originator of this name."

"At that time it was almost a gala day when the farmers brought their wheat to the mill to be gristed," stated the raconteur.

They always appeared in top hat, long black coat and high collar, with large black bow tie.

Bags, needles, and twine were unknown in those days, and the edges of the grist logs would be caught up and tied with anything available.

Asked if he remembered many of the old identities of the late sixties the raconteur said: "Remember them? (Breathes) Yes, I do."

"A smiling shake of the head directed him to speak of John Chances, clerk, who was a councillor and a justice of the Peace.

"In those days," he continued, "North and South Preston, Thomstown and Epping were in one shire, and the Council met at the Junction Hotel in South Preston.

When we saw that a number of acres (11) in the road of Sheppards Run was for sale we decided to concentrate our efforts upon inducing the Council to purchase the land as a permanent recreation ground.

"Preston Park is an historic link with the past, for the first Australian Mounted Rifles (the Light Horse) painted in Sheppards Run under Colonel Tom Price, and the old Preston boys were the first Australians to wear khaki," concluded the raconteur.

COUNCIL EMPLOYEES' VOUCHES. The Federated Municipal and Shire Council Employees' Union proceeded against the Mayor, Councillors and Burgesses of the Town of Preston for not paying two municipal employees wages in accordance with the award of the Arbitration Court.

Mr. Merton for the prosecution pointed out that the agreement between the Municipal Association (as representing the council) and the Union was in operation from the 21st March, 1921, to 31st December, 1921; but the law was that this award continued till a new award is made.

The cases were then formally proved by calling Gilbert, Bernard and William Alfred Tanneck (the employees) first to the summons, Horace Edward Lawson, secretary to the Municipal Association; Jas. Thorneley, in charge of the Labor and Industrial Branch of the Commonwealth Statistician's office; and Daniel Howard Gray, the secretary of the Municipal Employees' Union. The last-named said that when he found the council was not paying the full rate he instructed the union's solicitor to issue a summons.

Dr. Cole—Don't you think it would have been a fair thing to have communicated with the council before issuing the summons, so as to give them a chance to right the wrong?

The witness—The council knew their liabilities.

Dr. Cole—Yes; but it's a fair thing to warn a man before going to litigation.

Jas. Keating, secretary of the Metropolitan Branch of the Municipal Employees' Union, said that when the Preston employees complained he got into communication by phone with Mr. Killy, who told him that the matter had been referred to their solicitor.

Mr. Killy, town clerk, I would like to say I have no recollection whatever of any enquiry being made by Mr. Keating. All he wished to say was that when the award was made last year the council obeyed it and paid the employees back pay amounting to £700. There was a doubt as to whether the old award continued beyond 31st December, which was added by a letter received from Mr. D. H. Gray, secretary of the Union, stating in reference to the award "I desire it to be extended to February, 28th, 1922."

The matter was then referred to their solicitor, and when on the 28th April he advised them that they were liable to pay on the 1921 award they immediately proceeded to prepare for paying the back pay, which proved a big job, as each man's pay sheet had to be gone through from January 1st, and the increases made according to the various rates of pay for different work.

The matter would be finished on Monday night next. He had told Mr. Gray that the matter would be fixed up within a week.

A fine of £10 was imposed in the first case, with £15/15/- costs, while the second case was withdrawn.

WHITTLESEA SHIRE COUNCIL.

WEDNESDAY, 14TH JUNE.

Present:—Crs. McCormack (president), Brown, Butler, Clarke, Thomas, Morgan, Cornfoot, Mitchell, Hurry, and Murphy.

An apology was made for Cr. Downie, who had to go to the city in connection with his wife's illness.

From Country Municipal Association, inviting this council to join its ranks with a view of having a united front in resisting the city influence which is steadily sapping the vitality of the State.—Consideration deferred till next meeting.

From Municipal Association, asking that a representative be appointed on deputation to the Minister of Railways to protest against the closing of goods sidings, which involved great loss and inconvenience to many municipalities.—The president was appointed to attend.

From Municipal Association, stating they intended to hold a special meeting to decide upon a resolution to the more equitable representation of municipalities on the Metropolitan Board of Works.—Cr. Clarke seconded that this council support the motion.—Carried.

From Railway Department, intimating that the Railway Commissioners would officially inspect the Whittlesea line on the 23rd May.

From Railway Department, asking what action had been taken in regard to certain drainage at Whittlesea.

Cr. Mitchell said they told Commissioner Clapp on the occasion of their visit that this matter was under consideration. He (Cr. Mitchell) considered it was entirely a matter for the Railway Department.—They want us to spend a lot of money to abate their nuisance. He would have a report at next meeting.

From Shire of Huntly, asking co-operation of this council in an endeavor to prevent the proposed imposition of a "gun tax" in country districts, as a gun is absolutely necessary in fruit-growing districts for the destruction of vermin.

The president moved that this council refuse to support the request, so that guns might be registered enabling the owners of same to be traced.

From Town of Preston, expressing willingness to join Whittlesea and Broadmeadows councils in a deputation to the Minister of Works, with a view of obtaining a grant towards the reconstruction of the bridge over Merri Creek in Mahoney's lane.—Cr. Butler moved and Cr. Brown seconded that Mr. Robertson, M.L.A., be asked to arrange for the deputation.

Cr. Thomas suggested that as many councillors as possible attend the deputation.—Carried.

From W. J. McKay, Campbellfield, claiming damages to the amount of £20, on account of crippling a horse through going through the decking of bridge over the Merri Creek (Mahoney's lane).

Referred to the Broadmeadows Council, on the motion of Crs. Clarke and Cornfoot.

Cr. Butler moved and Cr. Brown seconded that a reply be sent to Mr. McKay that this council accepts no liability in the matter.—Carried.

From C. M. Sanderson, calling attention to the disgraceful state of Cooper street, Epping, and asking that some attention be given to it. He asked that two culverts be put in and a few chains of road made. The president moved that the matter be attended to as soon as funds are available.—Carried.

From W. Young, asking that a culvert be put in crossing on Young's lane, south of the road.—Engineer to inspect and report.—On the motion of the president and Cr. Brown.

From J. McKay, Whittlesea, complaining that the road from the road flowing over his property and causing damage. The drain from main road to railway line also requires cleaning out.

Cr. Cornfoot asked the engineer inspect and report.—Carried.

DEPUTATION FROM KINGLAKE. Cr. Cornfoot introduced a deputation consisting of Messrs Dunstan, Carmen, and Preston from Kinglake.

The engineer said it seemed a retrograde step to ask them to do this, and would recommend that the offer be withdrawing a portion of the road be accepted.

Cr. Cornfoot moved and Cr. Mitchell seconded that the deputation's offer be accepted.—Carried.

Crs. Thomas and Cornfoot spoke in support of something being done to repair the main road.

Cr. Mitchell urged that the services of the road be put in the hands of the council, and that the council would give them permission they would themselves corduroy the section of the road across the gully in front of Kinglake West.

The president said he would like to remind the council that the Whittlesea Council had £18,000, and all the whole council had now left to spend was £130.

Cr. Brown said that while he sympathized with these ratepayers, it was very hard for the riding which was in debt to be spending money up there to repair the road, with £18,000 of a credit balance, had to turn down important works that day because the council had no funds to do them.

Cr. Clarke—Surely for the sake of £30 or £40 we are not going to prevent these settlers getting out with their produce.

Cr. Brown.—It is the council's duty to be neglecting their duty in not striking the necessary rate.

Cr. Butler said he was sure these ratepayers would be quite willing to pay an extra rate to get their work done, but no other way. He did not see how, under present conditions, they were going to get this work carried out even by a dayman, as there would not be money to pay the dayman, and he and others would not sign any cheques under the circumstances. While doing riding had a credit balance of £1,886 they had to put their daymen off. It was no use deceiving the deputation.

The president said if the council can't raise the money for a dayman, it was for a fortnight he would lend it free of interest. (Laughter.)

The motion was then put and carried. The matter of taking these ratepayers into Whittlesea shire who so desired was deferred, for further consideration, Mr. Dunstan promising to supply all the details.





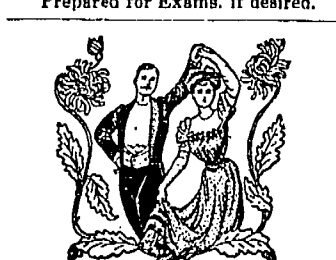
