WASHINGTON FINE EMBROIDERY.

AN UNEXPECTED MEET.

Never press on the right side of embroidery for this fitting of the board on which it is ironed should be covered with a thick blanket fold.

It is better in most cases to iron silk or satin first, depending on the heat of the iron to remove any wrinkles.

Which washing embroidery should not be washed with washing powder, and little or no starch; the thin fabrics should not be rubbed with a wringer, and in drying the garment it should be pulled out so that the embroidery parts do not dry crooked.

When washing embroidery for which white mercerized cotton has been used less careful washing than for cotton or silk.

A piece of washed embroidery which sets wrinkled can be re-pressed by putting it free downwards on the board and putting on top of it a damp cloth, wrung out of hot water. Use a fair hot iron for the purpose.

RAILWAY CASES. John Kuegh, George Robertson, Dorothy Stoneham, Chas Wilkinson, were each fined 5s, with 5s costs, for travelling to Coxton station on a Northcote ticket.

FACTORY ACT PROSECUTION. Samuel Ross, Raphael street, Albertford, was fined 10s, with £1 1s costs, for delivering bread on 1st Wednesday in the month (baker's holiday).

Herbert Strawbridge, 5 Col-laco street, East Brunswick, was charged with delivering firewood after 7 p.m. on June 7.

Inspector Hunt stated that as soon as defendant saw him he remarked: "Another 5 minutes, Mr Hunt, and I would have been home and dried (laughter)."

Defendant pleaded guilty, but said in mitigation that it was a very good day and he was through and cold as ice, and he accepted an invitation to have a cup of hot tea, which delayed him.

This man was being on a boat that he had fined 20s and £1 1s costs.

BEATING CASES. John McCann, senior detective of police, proceeded against Isidor Rosenberg, of the Peacock Hotel, Northcote, for having the care and management of a common gaming house known as the Peacock hotel.

Mr T. C. Brennan for the defence. Constable George Charles Leslie McCann, senior detective of police, on three separate dates, between June 3 and July 22nd he went to the Peacock hotel.

On every occasion he saw there a man he knew as "Monty" Mason, who was taking sums of money from men, who named certain racetracks to him.

He entered the racetracks in a book. On each occasion he was in the hotel 15 minutes. In that period he saw on the first and second visits 9 men hand Mason sums of money, on the third visit 10 men handed Mason sums of money.

He (Mason) sat at a table as he took the money. There were placards over the mounted picture showing lists of horses, with some of the names crossed out.

Constable Roberts gave similar evidence. Constable Davern said that on visiting the hotel on Friday evening, 21st July, he asked Mrs Rosenberg, wife of the licensee, if she knew betting was carried on in the hotel.

She mentioned that her husband was ill. Constable Cavanagh gave evidence that on Saturday, 22nd, at 3.10 p.m., he went to the Peacock hotel.

He said, "We are police; I believe it to be a common gaming house." Mason was there at the time, and threw a book on the floor. The book produced showed about 120 entries such as "Jack Gray, 5/2," "Front Rank, 2/5," "Lord Grey, 2/1."

Witness also produced a race book which Mason had in his hand at the time.

Detective McCann said that when he read the warrant over to Rosenberg on the 22nd he said, "Oh, I did not know betting was carried on here."

Witness said to him, "We have found betting books here. Betting has been going on for a considerable time."

The P.M. made a remark to the effect that he did not think the warning sufficient.

Detective McCann—I think 10 minutes would be sufficient warning to give anyone.

Isidor Rosenberg said he had been licensee of the Peacock hotel for three months. On 2nd June, when the police first called, he had only been there a month.

He bought the hotel from Mr Phillips for £16,000, paying from £2,000 of it in cash. There is a condition in the agreement that he loses everything, should he do anything to cause the forfeiture of the license.

He was ill in bed on the 21st July when the constable came with the warning that betting was being carried on on the premises.

He thought that when the constable came next day she said "For goodness sake don't let her see. Mr (Mason) said, "Don't you worry, I do not betting, I am an estate agent."

The P.M. announced that the case would be dismissed.

Detective McCann—On what grounds?

The P.M.—On the grounds that if any betting was done it was without the permission, consent, or knowledge of the licensee.

Harry Montague Mason was then charged that he, between 2nd June and 22nd July, did act in the conduct of a common gaming house, that is to say, a house known as the Peacock hotel.

After similar evidence was given to that in the last case, the case was dismissed.

Detective McCann asked for the grounds of the dismissal.

The P.M.—The licensee avers he did not know, and the evidence he did not know, and that he was told the night before.

The P.M. intimated that both were majority decisions, two magistrates dissenting in each case.

FAILING TO RETURN EQUIPMENT. Claud William Hazell, Arthur Olcott, and John W. Senger were proceeded against for failing to return military equipment, and were each fined £2, in default distress.

Mr Barnett, for the defendants, pleaded guilty, and asked as none of the defendants had been in trouble before, that only the minimum fine be imposed.

The Engineer.—I do not remember any such occasion. Cr. Timmins moved that a further application be made to the Railway Department regarding the asphalt of path from Union street to railway.

Cr. Timmins requested that the engineer report as to the cost of asphalt on the footway on St. George's road.

Cr. Harry had Mansfield street, adjacent to High street referred to works committee. Cr. Slater moved that immediate attention be given to the fence at the corporation yard.

Cr. Ollis moved that the electric committee consider the advisability of allowing consumers to purchase their meters outright. Cr. Turnbull said that St. George's road was in a disgraceful state, and moved that it be referred to the works committee.

In reply to Cr. Ollis the chairman of finance said that finally had not been reached regarding a further proposal. Cr. Pearl moved that the committee of the whole prepare a scheme for the disposal of all metal from the quarry based on the rates paid in each ward.

In seconding the motion Cr. Dennis said the existing system was fair and square, and under it the west ward had not suffered. The matter of constructing the easement between Mansfield street and Flinders street was referred to the works committee on the motion of Cr. Jones.

The bad state of Frolicke street was referred to the works committee on the motion of Cr. Ollis. On the motion of Crs. Oldis and Turner the chairman of the electric light committee was appointed to represent the council on the Central Defence Committee, a body appointed to watch the interests of the municipalities concerned in the future control of electricity.

COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE. The Mayor submitted the report, recommending—1. Prahran Council, re Valuation

of Gas Undertakings.—That this Council join with other Councils in authorising the City of Prahran to arrange for a revamp of the Metropolitan Gas Company's undertakings within the Metropolitan area, and bear its proportion of the cost of such revamp, not to exceed the sum of £15.—Adopted.

2. Returned Soldiers and Sailors' Imperial League, re Grant from Warriors' Appeal Fund.—(a) That the offer to donate the sum of £300 on the terms and conditions set out in the letter of 24th July, 1922, be accepted, and the Council also provide £300, the total of £600 to be expended on the following works, viz., Quarry Improvement £300, and Parks Improvement £300.

(b) That the sum of £300, being a proportion of profits, be transferred from the Electric Light Account to the Municipal Fund, to meet the expenditure for the employment of Returned Soldiers.

Cr. Timmins moved that the item be referred back to the committee, contending that the electric light committee should know where the money was to be spent.

Cr. Glanfield said that would mean holding up a certain amount of work that should be given without delay to town out of work. The clause was adopted.

TO POINT THE WAY TO CHURCH.

J. W. P. Peers asked to have a finger post placed at intersection of Plover road and Murray road directing the public to All Saints' Church of England.—Referred to committee.

AMENDING GAS BILL.

Mr. J. Cain, M.L.A., forwarded a letter he had received from the Town Clerk's office stating that the request that the introduction of an Amending Gas Bill to make an urgent matter would receive full consideration.—Received.

SLIGHTLY UNDER SIZE.

Edward Bailey applied for permission to build on two lots in Brighton avenue each containing 1716 square feet.—Referred to committee of the whole on the motion of Crs Bransgrove and McFadzean.

EXTRA TRAIN.

The Railway Department's train-including an additional train—had been scheduled to leave Riverside at 8.12 a.m., reaching Princes Bridge at 9.7 a.m.

Cr Robinson said the train was already proving very popular, and moved that the Committee be thanked.—Carried.

REQUEST TO REMOVE FENCE.

Wm. J. W. Strong wrote asking the council to take steps to move the existing fence along the east side of Gilbert road back to the eastern boundary of the 17 feet strip of land transferred to the council for the purpose of widening the road. He had been waiting some years for the council to complete its part of the bargain.—Referred to the committee for attention on the motion of Cr Jones.

LAMP FOR MAY STREET.

W. H. Jolly wrote supporting petition of his son and others that a street lamp be installed in May Street.—Referred to electric light committee on the motion of Crs Bartrop and Adams.

UNDERSIZED BLOCK.

Oscar Bayley asked permission to erect a house on a block 40 x 114 in Erin street.—Referred to committee of the whole.

CRICKET PITCHES WANTED.

C. King, hon. sec. Waratah C.C., Northcote, wrote asking if the council had any available cricket pitches.—Reply to be sent that the council has no pitches available.

Clifton Brick Co. wrote asking for permission for their employees to play cricket in the Bell street park during coming season.—Referred to parks committee.

CONFERENCE WANTED.

Wm. H. Davis, hon. sec. Preston C.C., asked that the parks committee meet with their members to discuss certain details re his club's tenure of the Craner street park.—Granted.

WANDERING CATTLE.

H. D. Adams, farm overseer at Bundoora Convalescent Home, wrote complaining of the depredations of wandering cattle. Not a day passes without some damage being done to the flower and vegetable garden.—Referred to the inspector on the motion of Cr Robinson, who said that if the applicants, instead of always leaving their gate open, kept it shut, they would find it a means of relief.

WATER REFUSED.

The Metropolitan Board were declining to extend the water to Tynan street and Daventry street, as the returns were only 1.1 per cent and 1.0 per cent, respectively.—It was decided on the motion of Crs Jones and McFadzean to make fresh applications in each of these cases, as houses are always going up, and settlement would further increase with a water supply.

WATER FOR SOUTHERN STREET.

The Board were stating they were ready to extend the water 3 chains in Southern street.—Cr Robinson moved that an extension of 6 chains be asked for. Cr Jones seconded Carried.

ELECTRICITY COMMISSION.

Correspondence was received from the Defence Committee in connection with electricity matters. The mayor said this committee had been found necessary in view of the threatened increase of power to the Electricity Commission, giving them the right to supply electric current retail to factories as well as in bulk for general consumption. This taking of their "day load" from them would render useless to municipalities electric undertakings on which they had spent so much money.

The matter was referred to the committee of the whole on the motion of Crs Jones and Robinson.

ENROLLMENT IN BUSINESS.

C. F. Young, secretary R.S.S.I.L.A., wrote asking council to paint their business notice boards, as there had been many alterations.—Granted, on the motion of Crs Bartrop and Adams.

THE TOTALITATOR.

The mayor would not allow Mr. Morley's letter re Totalitator Bill to be discussed. He said it was a matter for a public meeting.

FINANCE COMMITTEE.

Cr Robinson (chairman) submitted the report, recommending:— 1. That the accounts amounting to £418/10/6 be passed for payment.—Adopted.

PUBLIC WORKS COMMITTEE.

Cr Warr (chairman) submitted the report, recommending:— 1. That the accounts amounting to £631/0/6 be passed for payment.—Adopted.

ELECTRIC LIGHT COMMITTEE.

Cr Bartrop (chairman) submitted the report, recommending:— 1. That the accounts amounting to £638/5/7 be passed for payment.—Adopted.

PARKS COMMITTEE.

Cr McFadzean (chairman) submitted the report, recommending:— 1. From hon. sec. South Preston Methodist Cricket Club, asking for permission to use Bell Street Park on Tuesday and Thursday evenings in

each week for practice purposes.—That permission be granted during the pleasure of the Council.—Adopted. COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE.

Cr Bricknell (chairman) submitted the report, recommending:— 1. Consideration of joint letter of L. Allison and six others re the condition of Tyler Street, east of Plover Road.—That engineer be instructed to spend up to £50 in improving the condition of Tyler Street, cost to be debited to East Riding appropriation.

Cr Bricknell moved the adoption of the clause. Cr Adams seconded. Cr Adams said this was one of the streets gazetted in the "seventies." It was to all intents and purposes a private street and it was wrong morally to use the rates of people who had already paid for the construction of their own private streets to make this street.

Cr Jones said it would be more impartial to break the bargain the council had entered into with purchasers of land in these proclaimed streets. Clause adopted. Cr Robinson voting against.

2. Municipal Association, re abolition of payment of rates by the 10th June, to Municipal Franchise (Optional) Proportional Voting at Municipal Elections, and asking for the Council's opinion.—That Council favor continuing payment of rates by the 10th June, and that the District Parliamentary representative be asked to oppose both these Bills.

Cr Bricknell, in moving the adoption, said he could not understand how any municipal councillor could think of doing away with such a lever for getting in rates as disfranchisement if rates are not paid by 10th June. Messrs Pridham, Howe and Noyes reported having inspected and branded for the fortnight, carcasses of mules as follows:—Cattle, 173; sheep, 1733; pigs, 1957.

INSPECTOR.

Mr Tassie reported having impounded 16 head of wandering cattle for fortnight. Also that he had notified local businesses that they must comply with Board of Health Regulations, only one at present doing so.

The matter of a house reported as not fit for human habitation was referred to the committee of the whole.

ORDINARY BUSINESS.

Cr McFadzean moved that application be made to the Postmaster-General for cabinet telephones at Reservoir, Regent, and Preston stations, where there is no privacy at present in using instruments in the open.

Cr Robinson seconded. Carried. Cr McFadzean moved that the matter of making Throckley street be referred to the works committee.

Two out of the three councillors who were retiring, Crs Adams and Warr, were returned unopposed, but Cr Jones, who represented the same ward as himself, had fought his way back.

Cr Bartrop—It's not a fight, it's a cake-walk. The mayor—Cr Jones is a progressive man, has the interest of the district at heart, and has given valuable service. I do hope, therefore, under these circumstances, to see Cr Jones back with us again at next meeting.
