NORTHCOLE COUNCIL. THE FIRST WARD REPRESENTATIVES. CHANGES BROUGHT IN THREE DECADES. ONLY THREE SURVIVORS.

The representatives of the wards after the sub-division of the municipality in 1890 were as follows:—South Ward—Cra. C. J. Verso, W. H. Dennis (Cr. S. Dennis's father), J. C. Norris, J. H. Ward—Cra. F. H. McLean, F. Waters, W. Hutten, East Ward—Cra. A. McIntosh, W. Taylor (father of the late ex-Cr. Taylor), G. H. Taylor, J. C. Norris, G. C. Yoomans, G. C. Clausen, E. Baatjes (grandfather of ex-Cr. Baatjes), West Ward—Cra. W. T. Clapham, Kenneth Munro, and W. Pearl.

With the death of Cr. Pearl a fortnight since not one of the fifteen who left in municipal harness, and all but three have passed to "that bourne whence no traveller returns," after doing in most cases good and useful work for the municipality. The survivors are ex-Cra. C. J. Verso (whose name, with that of his five figures on the foundation stone of the town hall, ex-Cr. Kenneth Munro, and ex-Cr. Condy. The two first-named did not remain long in the office, but the bursting of the land boom they sought fresh fields for the exercise of their energies. Ex-Cr. Verso, who had been the contractor for the laying down of the Northcote Tramway, became a fruit grower at Diamond Creek, and is still an active organizer in connection with the industry, while ex-Cr. Munro went to his native State, Tasmania, and then to the gold fields of the South West after serving the South Ward ratpayers for many years, eventually gave place to someone else, but still, as most local folk know, in his profession as a solicitor, and manages to preserve a remarkably fresh and youthful appearance.

A SILENT SIDED EX-COUNCILLOR. In the year 1890 ex-Cr. Munro wrote a series of articles in the paper under the heading of "Prospective Northcotes." The note he struck was a sanguine one. He predicted that in 20 years the municipality would be one of the "greatest, healthiest, and wealthiest suburbs of Greater Melbourne." FOUR HUNDRED MILES inland, and to get to it there was no alternative but to walk. The party set off in highest spirits, but day after day's tramping over the burning sands and mounds of ash, leaving the residue of the lava flow in their wake, and the reports of those on their way back. They cursed Cuca with the bitterest curses, declaring it was a death-blow, and that the gold was a myth. This caused desertions from the party, the break of each day finding many missing. They had been away in the night. Finally ex-Cr. Munro, with some comparatively few others, arrived at the destination. In the "shows" he had to be met with poor fortune, and it was not long before he found his money gone. In his straits he undertook a plying business, making buckets for the Government. He had never done such work before, but he applied himself to the job with such energy that when the bucket came to him and saw the pile he had made he said to him "Don't you know this is Government work. What have you engaged to get the idea of making a GOLD SAVING MACHINE.

Gold, in more or less payable quantities, could be found anywhere on this field, but there was no water to extract it in the ordinary way. About other places available, the miners had to rely on the wind to blow away dust, pulverised soil, leaving the residue of gold or a certain portion of it. On still days, then, of which there were many, the field was in a state of illness. It was only on days when the wind was blowing that the work of gold-dusting could be carried on, and then in a dust that amounted to nothing. After nights and days of thought Munro eventually hit upon an idea that he knew must be successful. Then came the problem of making a machine with the crude materials at hand. While engaged in the work—hard to be done in the open—his attention was attracted by a target for their shafts of just and ridicule. Like another Fallacy the Potter was looked upon as a madman. Never was a more pronounced case of a "prophet having no honor in his own community." His coarse suggestion, made by one individual, how much gold could be saved than by this machine. But the inventor held on till he had completed his job. The day of testing had been arranged, but before it arrived a man—an Irishman—came in from a far-off field, said he had stolen the machine, and would like to try it. The trial was such a success that the man insisted on giving for it not only the price asked, £40, but £10 over, and stipulating, however, that it should be made portable, so that the new owner's name might come and use it secretly away in the night. The inventor's success was only a matter of time, and all who could afford a machine clamored to have one made, and from being a butt for their ridicule Munro became the autocrat of the place. In due time the author of the coarse suggestion was called to the notice of his own dirty methods. It was sweet revenge. Working now 20 hours a day, 7 days a week, he saved with his own hands

for the next eight weeks. This seems incredible but it is nevertheless a fact. Afterwards he took on the erection of a mine, and after five years he returned to Melbourne with a competency, wedded "the girl he left behind him," built a home at Parkville with so many unique features that deputations from the Institute of Architects used to make special visits for inspection. He frequented the floors after the manner of the old palaces of France, and decorated the rooms with rare and costly furniture. Also for some years he amused himself by playing the clarinet in the Marshall-Hall orchestra. His invention led into the realm of invention in conjunction with Mr. F. Raynor, manager of the Munro sawmill at Mount Baw, of a motor saw, which through every wheel being made a "pulling" wheel, can, with its own gear, draw a load of 10 tons of logs in a groove in the girdling curves in timber track at an ordinary motor could not track at.

When a boy learning wood-turning at Hobart his master used to say to him "You've got a wonderful pair of hands, Munro, but no brains." He was half-right anyway.

NO WATER FOR KEON STREET. The Metropolitan Board of Works wrote stating they were not prepared to lay the water in Keon street, as it would only show a return of 2 per cent on £330.—Received, and referred to Commissioner.

CR. TURNER PRO QUO ASKED. H. Griffiths wrote on behalf of Mr. P. Heron, his wife and himself to be relieved of paying rates on three blocks of High street land (brick council being allowed to store their electric light poles there).

CLARKE STREET STAFF SCHOOL. A. T. Hodges, hon. sec. Clarke Street Staff School Promotion Committee, wrote forwarding the following resolution they had carried.—That a meeting of residents be called for the 17th April, 1923, at 8 p.m., to be held in the Baptist Church hall, Simpson street, to devise steps that are necessary to hasten the erection of the school, and that the Northcote City councillors be asked to attend.—Received, and request complied with.

NON PAYING DANKE. C. L. Smithwick wrote intimating that he was discontinuing his Saturday night dances at the town hall as from 7th inst. He would ask for the return of his deposit on account of heavy loss sustained since commencing.—Received.

Cr. Cain moved that fresh tenders be called, and Mr. Smithwick's request be referred to the finance committee.

PUBLIC WORKS COMMITTEE. Cr. Dennis (chairman) submitted the report, recommending:—

Mr. Walter Mann's offer was £30 for severance and £15 an acre.

On the day in question she began to clear the bar at 5 minutes to 6 o'clock, and had got them all out when the clock came to the front door. Her daughter answered it. It was a little girl for a bottle of stout. She (her daughter) said "Run away, it is five minutes past 6." Soon after the two constables entered. McFarlane was very excited, saying to her, "I'm told you do what you like, and from what I can see you do."

What do you have in there?" pointing to the bar. She opened the door and her 2 daughters were there. It was taken about three-quarters of an hour to clear up the bar. It was only a quarter past 6 by her clock when the constables had gone.

Davis, licensed book-maker, stated that when he left the hotel at 5 minutes to 6 the licensee was preparing to clear the customers out.

The P.M. said it was just a question of the time and he believed the witness as for the defence. The case would be dismissed.


