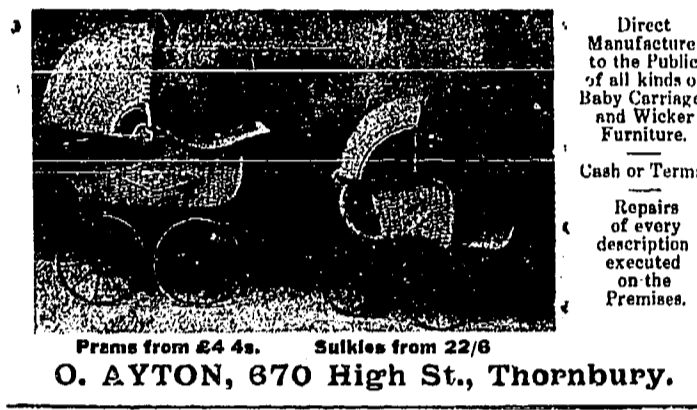

St. Kilda, however, owe their strong position to the number of chances that were missed.

Play was commenced at 11.12 on Monday, but rain delayed the game and affected the attendance. St. Kilda added substantially to their score, reaching 312 before the last wicket fell. Ferguson, who did so well on Saturday, added 11 to his score before he was caught by Gibaud. He hit for four in the last 20 minutes and hit 10 fours, and the circumstance made his fine effort doubly valuable. Woodbury caught him, and Guthrie gave a negative distinction to the game in enabling Hartkopf in the slips to reach out and catch the ball. Cohen followed, and then followed the ball, focus it, and then hold it. He did all these things perfectly, and was cheered for his contribution. When the end of the innings seemed to be near, Blackie astonished the Northcote bowlers with some first class batting. He hit up 30 runs in 40 minutes, with five fours. Gibaud, the last bowler tried—late in the innings—got three wickets for 12 runs in 10 minutes, a reflection upon the captain; but such incongruities are common enough in cricket.

McPherson, 5/- and 10/- costs; and 4/- costs (third offence), 15/- and 4/- costs (third offence), 15/- and 4/- costs.

PAINTERS' CLAIM.

Theo. Chas. Cottle, builder, 14 Derby street, stated that on March 19 he saw Miss Mater. He corroborated the statement of the last witness as to what took place when they first visited the house with Miss Mater. Miss Mater asked the witness to build a stoep to the house, and he said £275, but that would be without agent's commission. "Yes," said Miss Mater, "but your people would not live there, but Mr. Chapple decided to take the house, and Miss Mater said she would take the contract of sale was fixed up."

Mr. Nolan: Who is occupying the house now?

Witness: Miss Mater's people. Continuing, witness said Chapple gave him a written statement indemnifying him (Cottle), if there was any claim for commission.

Witness: Miss Mater admitted that she had taken her to see the house at S. Derby street, and she would have taken it, but her mother said she would refuse to live in it now. Witness: Yes, but there was no where else to go.

Continuing, witness said Mr. Chapple and she were engaged, and when she told Chapple her people would not have the house, he (Chapple) said he would take it himself.

Mr. Nolan: Did you subsequently to your first seeing the house, come as far as Brooke street with Mr. Chapple, and then let him go to S. Derby street and have an interview about the house?

Witness: I have done that on a number of occasions in connection with houses.

To Mr. Jones, J.P.: I was present when Chapple paid the deposit to Cottle. We were living in the house a little more than a week afterwards.

Mr. Frederick Joseph Cottle said he met Miss Mater as she was going to Lyndoch, and they went to see the house at S. Derby street together. He subsequently bought the house, when Miss Mater's people would not take it. He did not go into the house immediately it was bought.

Mr. Nolan: Isn't that rather extraordinary, seeing that you bought the house.

The capacity of the human body was also early put to use of measurement; thus we have the expression "A hop, step and jump," "Within a horse's shot away," "In rural Germany they speak of places being so many hours distant, meaning of course, by walking; and in a recent issue of Schleswig-Holstein they say that a place is a pipe, or two pipes, or three pipes off according to the number of pipes one could smoke while walking there."

Shorter distances are reckoned by "back." A village under a mile away would be two or three dogs' barks, as we say "Within calling distance."

WHY DOGS BARK.

It is Only An Acquired Habit.

Curiously enough, barking, which seems to us so characteristic of the dog, is not one of its natural sounds. Wild dogs do not bark. They howl or yelp. Moreover, dogs in the dog pound for any considerable length of time of the companionship of human beings seem to lose the faculty.

Thus a number of dogs turned loose on an uninhabited island in the South Sea Pacific, where they subsisted on wild roots and pigs for a period of five or six years, were found at the end of that time to have completely lost the habit, though they soon reacquired it.

These facts have led some observers to conclude that the artificially acquired bark of the dog is the animal's method of attempting to communicate with man, and in this connection it is worthy of note that the habit can be eliminated when desired, as in some breeds of dogs favored by poachers.

WHY THE NEGRO'S SKIN IS BLACK.

The baby negro is not born black. Even so long ago as 1765 Le Cat noticed that the newly-born negro has a reddish color. That observation has since been frequently confirmed, and it is now pretty widely known that though the baby negro begins to follow the color of his parents as regards color within a few days after birth, yet at the moment of birth he shows a disposition to aspire towards the Caucasian race, being white or at worst red, in hue. It is generally assumed that the chief of all the causes of a negro's blackness is the hot sun of his native land, and that the rays of the sun are so powerful that they are doomed to live. There is, however, a physiological condition of the skin which differentiates the white man from the instrument of the white race. In other words, there is a difference in what is known as "pigmentation."

"The negro," says a scientist, "possesses a more developed vascular system than we do." In other words, he has more and larger sweat glands, and they are more liberally supplied with blood. By means of these he perspires much more abundantly. This condition is possibly a contributory factor to his blackness. It is an important element in the investigation to remember, however, that the blackest of all-black people are almost invariably found under certain very definite climatic conditions.

That is to say, they are found where there is great heat, and where the atmosphere is very moist, and where the sun is very hot. The blackest negroes in Africa are those who live in the bush, where the greatest amount of rain annually falls. But the people who live in the dry section of the Nile basin desert have red skins."

CONTROLLING HEAVY MOTOR TRAFFIC.

The town clerk, Melbourne, wrote stating that a conference of representatives of Metropolitan municipalities would be held at Melbourne Town Hall at 2 p.m. on Thursday, June 6, to consider the question of the introduction of legislation relating to the control of motor omnibuses and heavy motor vehicles generally. Writer asked that Council appoint two delegates.
