FACTS ABOUT QUARRY ON MERRI CREEK.

Sir—I am instructed by my association to reply to your valuable paper to refute certain statements appearing in the "Northcote Leader" of April 18th, over the name of W. H. Bysouth. My association has no place before the ratepayers of Northcote in the history of the Merri Creek, and the association took no part in the quarry on the Merri Creek. Mr. Bysouth says he had a permit to quarry. This is correct, but at that time the Northcote Council had no power to prevent Mr. Bysouth carrying out quarrying operations. Unfortunately, he did not avail himself of that opportunity till after the Fitzroy Council had approached the Northcote Council on July 7th, and had been refused permission to quarry on the Merri Creek. Neither Mr. Bysouth nor the Fitzroy Council were owners of the land at this time, and therefore Mr. Bysouth was not bound to purchase and convey the land to the Fitzroy Council, but immediately the Fitzroy Council were refused permission to quarry, Mr. Bysouth made haste to purchase and convey the land to the Fitzroy Council, notwithstanding the fact that a new by-law existed (Gazetted on January 16, 1924), which he was aware of, and in full knowledge of the fact that permission had already been refused to the Fitzroy Council. A shed being erected and a track being made for the removal of the stones of members of our association and we inspected the site on Saturday, August 16th, after which inspection the council issued the south letter threatening legal proceedings. Mr. Bysouth says in his letter that the building was just about completed and he had spent only £100 on it. Our deputation waited on the council on or about August 25th. This is wrong and misleading; our deputation waited on the council on July 28th, and on Saturday, August 16th, the council visited the site, and at that time nothing had been done except the erection of a small shed, and a track was being made. Now it is quite evident that Mr. Bysouth was endeavouring to force the hands of the council for although he had not received a permit under the new by-law, he commenced to erect a crusher and made all arrangements to erect a permit extension. At a later date he sought the aid of the Court, and was unsuccessful in his application, the case being heard by the Practice Court, before Mr. Justice Schutt. He asked leave to appeal, which was granted, but informed the Northcote Council at a later date that he did not intend to proceed any further in the matter. It will be quite obvious to ratepayers that any expense incurred by Mr. Bysouth was done with the full knowledge that he was acting contrary to the by-laws of the Council. Yours, etc., J. L. 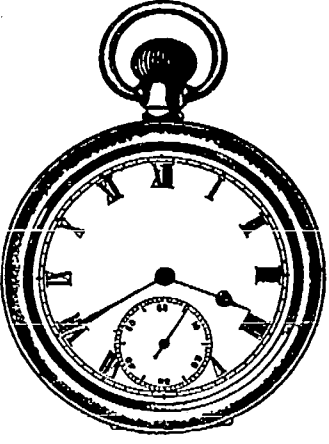

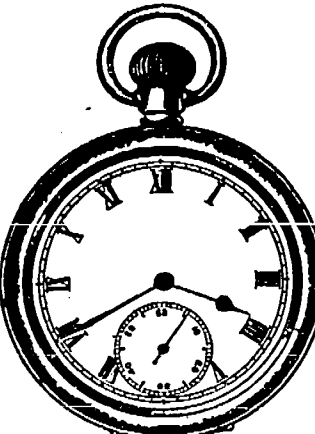

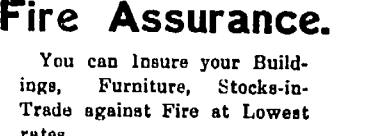

WHITTELESEA SHIRE COUNCIL.

WEDNESDAY, MAY 13.

The President (Cr. B. McCormack) occupied the chair at the usual monthly meeting of the Whittlesea Shire Council on Wednesday.

CORRESPONDENCE.

Public Health Department, stating re public health, where the floor space was less than 1000 square feet, council was authorised to give approval to the opening.

Same, stating the Public Hall, Glenvale, was satisfactory, except as regards ventilation. Alterations would be held over until building was lined, which must be done without the board's permission.

Same, enclosing copies of proposed general sanitary and eating house regulations. Received. Consideration postponed for one month.

Municipal Association, stating wages for next three months would be 12/2 per day, a reduction of 1d. Received.

Secretary for Railways, stating the necessary attention had been given to the road leading to the milk dock at Mernda station, and to the crossing referred to at South Morang. Received.

Town Clerk, Northcote, enclosing minutes of council meeting in connection with the proposed establishment of a High School for northern suburbs. Received.

Shire of Broadmeadows, re cost of repairing bridge over Merri Creek on Camp road, stating the President (Cr. Millar), Cr. McLean and the Secretary would wait on council.

Cr. Brown moved that the representatives of the Broadmeadows Council be invited to attend the next meeting of the council.

W. H. Everard, M.L.A., stating he had put in protests re sanitary depot at Janefeld, and would continue to do so in and out of Parliament. Received.

W. C. Anglish, M.L.C., promising to do all he could to secure the opening of the sanitary depot at Janefeld. Received.

J. W. McLean, re Janefeld sanitary depot, stating he was acting for several dairy farmers, to oppose the opening of the depot, and requesting certain information. To be furnished by Secretary.

Mrs. M. R. Saunders, re drawing attention to the state of drain in front of her property, which had silted up.

Cr. Clarke moved that the matter be referred to the Engineer. Cr. Thomas seconded. Carried.

D. Giddens, Strathewen, requesting permission to ringbark a few trees near his orchard. Referred to Forestry Commission.

A. McSmith, drawing attention to stinkwater in Bridge Inn Lane, near Doreen reserve. Letter be sent to Nioxious Weeds Inspector, Ernest F. Johnson, "Kelsey," South Morang, drawing attention to the Wilton Vale road, which was in a bad condition, and asking the council to require immediate attention.

Cr. Brownhill said this was a gravel road, and the culverts wanted putting in order. He moved that the dayman be put on to attend to it. Carried.

M. Joyce, secretary West Kingslake Progress Association, requesting permission to convey 30 or 40 feet of Devereux lane, about 300 yards from the main road. The work would be done by a working bee.

Cr. Downie moved that permission be granted. Cr. Higgs seconded. Carried.

National War Memorial Committee, an invitation to appoint a member. Cr. Clarke appointed.

Cr. Murphy, re pipes for Brennan's deviation, asking that 9-inch pipes be secured. Received. Re transfer of road to cemetery.

Cr. Murphy moved that the Engineer be asked to prepare a plan of both roads, and that the secretary draw up an agreement. Carried.

Amount received since last meeting, including current rates, £1619 16s. 6d., and arrears, £69 8s. 4d., £2205 16s. 3d.; County Roads Board Account, £2795 15s. 10d.; Special rate, £501 13s. 6d.; Loan Account, £124 16s. 6d.; Bank balance, £1344 17s. 3d.

Cr. Thomas pointed out that the County Roads Board account was overdrawn, £1795 15s. 10d. He congratulated the council on the improved state of the other accounts. The Engineer stated that £1022 was at the Treasury for the County Roads Board Account, and he had submitted vouchers for £1400 which would be paid shortly.

BUILDING BY-LAW.

The solicitor (Mr. J. Sabehberg) submitted a draft of the proposed by-law to govern building. It provided for a minimum shop front of 16 ft., with a depth of 120 ft., and minimum building allowances of 50 ft. frontage.

It was resolved that the draft copy be approved, and that it be signed and sealed.

ENGINEER'S REPORT.

Whittlesea Riding.—Culvert leading to football ground has been completed. The formation and graveling of Eden Park deviation from Black Flat to deviation has been completed, with the exception of a culvert at the entrance to the

road, and thus will be put in at an early date. I made application to the County Roads Board for an extension of time for expending the balance of the Federal grant. Dalbarrie's culvert on the Waiharu road should be completed very shortly, weather permitting. Culvert at Turley's, on the main Whittlesea road, has been put in, and further slight work is necessary to complete same. Culverts for the Whittlesea drainage and at Scrubby Creek School have been ordered, and as soon as same arrive this work will be proceeded with. Kinglake Road.—Good progress has been made with the day labour work at Kinglake, and but for the wet weather this work would have been completed by now. I have obtained permission from the Board to proceed with an additional 600 ft. on the southern end of the job.

Epping Riding.—Lamp in Cooper street repaired. Picher channel in Colestock street has been reset. 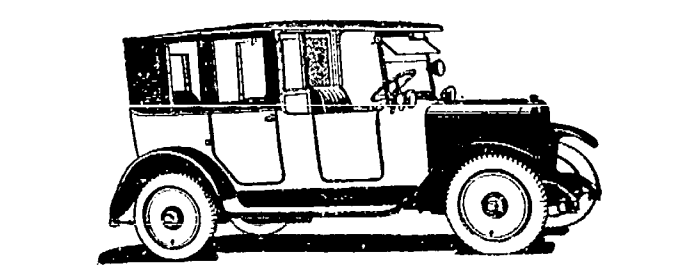

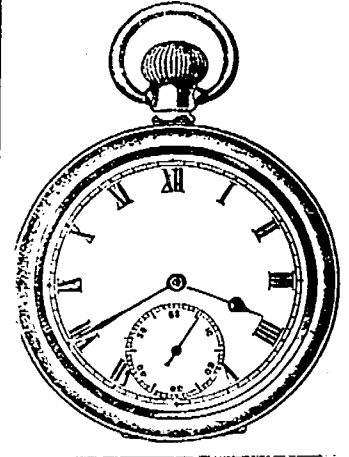
FOOTBALL. Northcote's First Defeat.
