**Improving Milk Supply.**  
BRINE COOLING NOT TO BE COMPULSORY.  
From the Milk Supply Committee the Minister for Agriculture (Mr. Bourchier) has received a report on the recommendations of a committee appointed at a conference of dairy-men in Melbourne some months ago. This report contains details of the conditions in dairies and the transportation and delivery of milk, with particular reference to the block system of delivery.  
Mr. Bourchier said that, in the main, the committee agreed with the recommendations. It was now preparing a report on the question of grading milk which would be presented to him shortly. He was of opinion that this report would suggest methods of overcoming difficulties previously encountered when efforts had been made to devise a means of improving the city milk supply.  
Mr. Bourchier has already intimated that he does not intend to make the brine-cooling of milk compulsory.

**WHAT WE EAT.**  
Should Bread be Wrapped.  
COST OF AUTOMATIC METHOD.  
The views of Victorian bakers on the question of the wrapping of loaves of bread for delivery to customers were set out in a letter from the Victorian Master Bakers' Association which was read at a meeting of the State Health Commission. The letter stated that a number of master bakers contemplated the installation of experimental bread-wrapping appliances, but added that the general adoption of such a "drugging" innovation would entail very considerable expense, and would lead to a large increase in the selling price of the loaf to the consumer. The commission was requested to receive a deputation from the association on the subject.  
The Chairman (Dr. Robertson)—The regulations provide that bread shall be wrapped. Any baker can be prosecuted for delivering bread in the way in which it is being delivered.  
Mr. Hancock—What difference does wrapping make? In many restaurants the diners simply "grab" the loaf in their left hands in order to eat it.  
Dr. Robertson—The regulations are framed to protect private persons.  
Dr. Hancock—Bread is often delivered at private houses by men who have been handling loaves.  
Dr. Robertson said that according to a schedule of prices which he had been provided, a machine costing £235, not including duty, would wrap 2,000 loaves an hour, or one costing £50, free of duty, would wrap 500 loaves an hour.  
Mr. Hancock—These machines should not be beyond the reach of any ordinary baker.  
Dr. Robertson—The bakers say that there are 15 different kinds of loaves on the market. Does that appear to be any necessity for that number?  
Mr. Hancock—If they are made to there must be a demand for them.  
The commission decided to receive a deputation of master bakers on Wednesday, October 7.

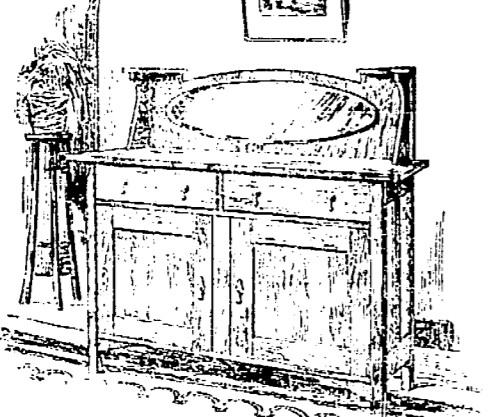

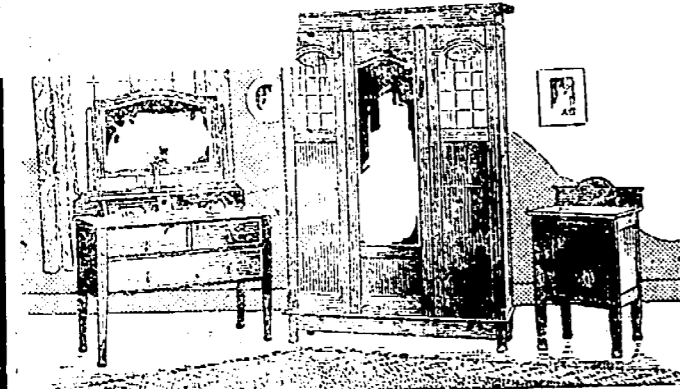

A Lake for Ivanhoe.

At a meeting of the Victorian branch of the Australian Forest League on Wednesday night Mr. J. Darley Meaby read a paper on the proposal to form a national park and lake at Ivanhoe.

The proposal, Mr. Meaby said, was to form a national park and lake at Ivanhoe, river and nearby districts, to include Studley Park, the Yarra Bend Asylum, the Infectious Diseases Hospital, the Kew Asylum and all the Government ground on either side of the river up as far as Templestowe.

The total area of this reserve would be about 3,300 acres. The lake, in which interest was chiefly centred at present, would be formed by building a weir across the river at Ivanhoe, and would have a storage capacity of about 900,000,000 cubic feet.

It would reach nine miles up the river and would be a great deal of the country which in times of flood was under water would be included in the lake. In order to assist in opening up the surrounding country, it was proposed to reopen the outer circle railway.

Mr. Meaby concluded his paper with some lantern views of submerged areas near Ivanhoe during the last floods, giving some idea of how the proposed lake would appear.

Northcote Fire Brigade. At 1.44 a.m. on Thursday the local brigade turned out in response to a call of fire in a two-story brick and iron building situated at 163-169 Noone street, Clifton Hill, owned by the Spicer Shoe Co.

Apart from this call, the Northcote Fire Brigade have been called out on several occasions by some irresponsible persons to false alarms. It is time the public was awake to the great danger arising from these senseless calls.

Blaze at Clifton Hill. A disastrous fire gutted the large two-story brick factory of the Spicer Shoe Co., Noone street, Clifton Hill, shortly before 2 a.m. on Thursday.

Large detachments of firemen, many of whom were summoned from the fire brigade's ball, in Brunswick street, Fitzroy, led by Chief Officer H. B. Lee and Deputy Chief Officer Wilkins. Some of the firemen did not have time to discard evening dress, and hastily jumped into their uniforms.

When sections from Northcote, North Melbourne, Bourville street, Lord street, Richmond; Zeddie street, and North Fitzroy arrived at the scene of the conflagration the factory was a mass of flames.

At 2 a.m. the fire had gained such a strong hold on the building that very little hope was entertained of saving even a portion of it. An hour later the flames were under control, but not before the main portion of the factory had been demolished.

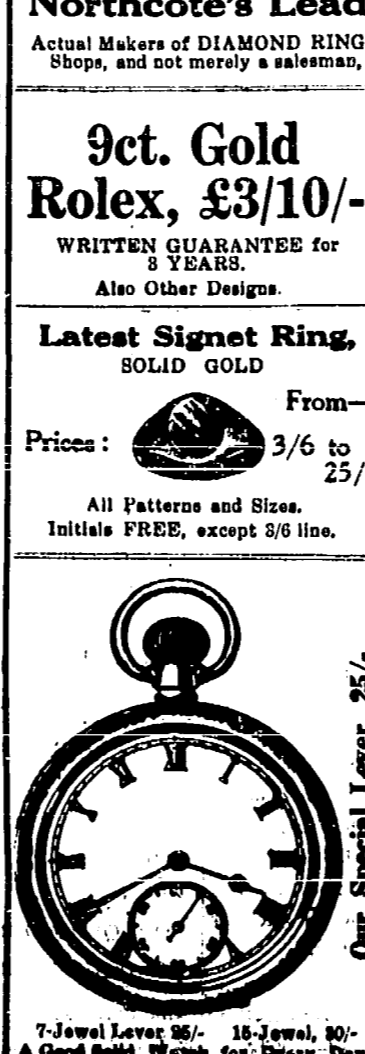

**RAN DOWN A CYCLIST.**  
BUS DRIVER FINED 5s.  
Harold Yates, Northcote street, East Brunswick, charged at Preston Police Court on Thursday last with having driven a motor bus in high speed on September 2 in a negligent manner.  
Alexander James Wainley, Northcote street, Preston, said that at about 10.30 on September 2 he was riding a bicycle along High street, and when near Murray road defendant's bus ran him down. No harm was done, and there was plenty of room for defendant's bus to pass him on the correct side. The defendant had the bus when he heard it rumbling behind him.  
The defendant, when the bus stopped, a wheel was pressing against witness, who was lying on the road for some minutes before the bus was reversed out of his bicycle.  
To Sgt. Range-Witness had been under the doctor ever since the accident, and had not been able to work.  
George Edward Martin, a passenger on the bus, said he heard a woman scream, and looking for ward saw Wainley disappear under the bus like a blur. The bus was only travelling at a walking pace. The bicycle was on its proper side, and prior to the accident the bus was slowing down to allow a passenger to alight. The bus driver had his head turned towards the door just about the time the bicycle was struck.  
To the P.M. (Mr. Conlon)—It was broad daylight.  
Edsel May Lee, a passenger on the bus, described the accident, and said both vehicles were on their correct side. The bus was stopped as soon as the accident happened. The bicycle was then under the bus, and Wainley was lying on the road a short distance away.  
Const. J. Higgins said he interviewed defendant, who said at the time of the accident his vehicle was doing 10 miles per hour. Defendant also stated he had passed the bicycle on the wrong side.  
Defendant—I do not remember telling the constable I passed the bicycle on the wrong side.  
Defendant said at the time of the accident there were a number of bicycles on the road. He showed down to set down a passenger, and as he was doing so Wainley was about six feet in front of the bus. Wainley looked round, stopped, and the bus struck the bicycle.  
The P.M.—You were driving a public conveyance, and should be an expert driver. This man should never have been struck as he was on the road in front of you, and did not come out of a side street or right-of-way. You will be fined 5s, with 10/- costs.

Const. Kelly said at 3.15 p.m. on September 21, he saw accused Bryant loading a dray with sand from a formed road known as Hamilton Avenue. Asked why he removed sand from the road, Bryant said he was going to tip it further down, to fill up a hollow. Later he said he was sent by his boss to get some sand. He admitted that what the third had been told by Bryant was a statement, which was later read to Aitken, who said: "That's right."

In a statement Aitken said the sand was taken from some sand from Hamilton Avenue.

To Mr. Home—This street had a narrow track, which was roughly ploughed out to form it. The sand had been taken from where the table drain in Hamilton Avenue was shown.

Andrew Watson, workman, said on or about September 21 he ordered sand from Aitken and paid 34s per ton for it. The sand was delivered by Bryant.

William Hamilton, accountant, Chesham street, Preston, said Hamilton Avenue was portion of ground he had bought and subdivided. He gave no authority to remove the sand. He claimed the road and the sand as his property.

To Mr. Home—He had had a plan of subdivision prepared, which was submitted to Preston Council for approval. The plan had on it streets and roads set out, and amongst them Hamilton Avenue. The plan was passed by the council. He had bought the land on a contract of which he did not produce allotments. Allotments on Hamilton Avenue had been disposed of to different purchasers. He had no doubt any rates in respect of Hamilton Avenue since the plan had been approved by the council. Hamilton Avenue was being used by the public.

Mr. Home submitted that there was no case to answer, as the land was in the possession of the public when the sand was taken. He asked the witness if he did not know. Aitken said he had a contract to buy sand from Bryant. The bench said that as Mr. Hamilton had sold the land, the public owned the road. Therefore no case could be brought against accused for taking sand as the property of Hamilton.

Both cases were dismissed.

SUBDIVIDING A BLOCK.

At the meeting of the Northcote City Council on Monday evening, a resolution was passed that the council should consider an application to build two houses on land 68 x 124 feet, bounded by the grounds on which the application had been refused, and requesting that the application be given further consideration.

Cr. Turner moved that Mrs. Dyer be informed of the provisions of the building regulations. He said he felt the council had not the power to grant this application if it so desired. The by-law was amended, and became the law of the land, and the council had no right to become law breakers.

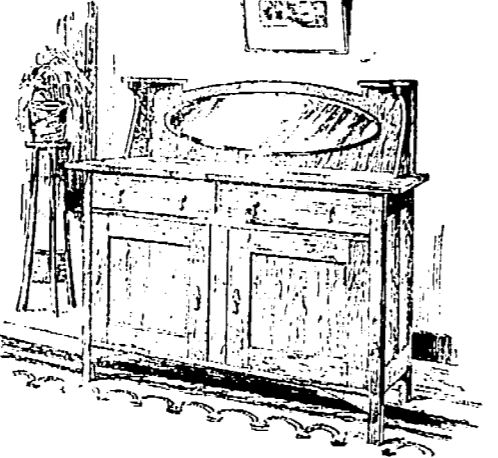

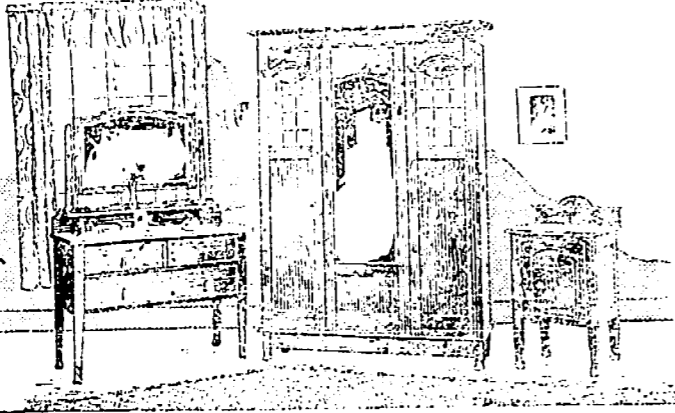

Tenants' Electric Light Deposits.

NORTHCOTE COUNCIL INCREASES THEM.

At the meeting of the Northcote City Council on Monday, the Electric Light Committee brought a resolution recommending to tenants' deposits that the regulation providing for a deposit of 5/- per house (tenants only), 10/- per business premises (tenants only), 21/- per house (owner) be increased to 10/-, 20/- and 42/- respectively.

Mr. Johnson said the Electric Light Committee had taken into consideration the matter of deposits, and had decided to recommend that they be raised from 5/- and 10/- to 10/- and 20/- respectively. The council had had to write off a fair amount, and if the deposits were raised people would not have to pay so much. He felt the proposition was reasonable.

Mr. Turner opposed the adoption of the clause. He said he had a number of tenants who had left owing money to the council for electricity. There were a number of tenants who had had to shift from house to house, and some would find it a burden to pay the increased deposit. He did not think the council was such a great deal.

The Mayor—541 odd in £32,000. Mr. Oldis, in support of the clause, said if the council could supply cheap current all the better, but if the council could not supply cheap current at all, it would be better to have a deposit of 10/- than to have a deposit of 5/- and have to pay the cost of collecting the small debts, which often cost more to collect than they amounted to.
