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"I'll Drive You Mad," says Preston Husband.

WIFE WHO "BRUISED EASILY"

ALLEGES HUSBAND BEAT HER.

"The marriage took place in February, 1923, and there are two children. About five months ago the wife left the home because her husband continually beat her, and he was continually calling her vile and brutal names," said Mr. Norris.

After hearing the evidence in a case at Preston Court on Thursday, in which Mrs. Ethel Haley, of West St., Preston, proceeded against Eric Edward Haley, the bench decided not to make the order sought by the wife for support of herself and two children.

Mrs. Haley said—My husband has never given me a "fair go" right from the start. He has always kept me short of money, and often he treated me brutally. Once his mother spoke about my blackened arms, and he said "Oh, she bruises easily."

Continuing, Mrs. Haley said—My husband was for ever abusing me, calling me vile names and questioning my morals. He often said: "I'll drive you mad, and when you are in the asylum I'll come and see you." As for money he has never made me an allowance, but it was his habit to give me 6d or 1/- when he felt inclined, and tell me to go out and buy something. Since I left him he has not given me anything to keep myself or the children.

Mr. Sabelberg (for Haley)—Has your husband not supported you?—Not properly. He would go to his mother's and fill his own stomach, and if it had not been for my mother's help my children and I would have starved.

Do you know Kelly?—Yes. Where is he living?—At West St. I'm housekeeping for him. When you first left where did you go?—To Brunswick. I went to house-keep for Mr. Kelly.

Is your husband out of employment?—No. He is working for his father. Mr. Sabelberg said the defence would be a denial that the husband deserted his wife; that she was not left without reasonable means of support; that the husband had supported his wife to the best of his ability, he being out of work, and finally that the wife had committed adultery.

Haley said—Since my wife left me I have been living with my father. Just before my wife went I was away rabbit trapping and had to return because the car broke down. When I went to the house my wife and children were gone. I found them at her sister's, and asked her to come back. She refused, saying: "I can take care of myself and the children." I said: "Another man?" and she said "Not at present." I tried to get her

to return on the next day also for the sake of the children, but she again refused. The following day I went to see her again and could not find her. After inquiries I learned she had gone to Brunswick. I went to the address and from what I saw I came to the conclusion she was living with another man. When I taxed her with it she said: "I know what I'm doing. I've made up my mind, and you can do what you like." The next time I saw Kelly was at West St., Preston.

Continuing, Haley said—My wife has an uncontrollable temper, and often tried to scratch my face. I have had to hold her by the arms to restrain her, and that may have bruised her arms. I want the children, for whom my mother will care. Mr. Norris (for the wife)—Apart from occasional quarrels you were happy together?—Yes. She had fits of temper at times.

She was a clean living woman?—Yes.

You thought it alright for your wife to go to work?—I was away driving a car in the country at the time, and when I returned I found she had been working for a month. I earned £2/15/- a week at the time and sent her £2/12/6 of it.

You go to the races?—When I have means. Did you pawn your clothes to get money for the races?—No. It was to support the house.

Did you tell her you would drive her mad?—No. How old is Kelly?—About 43. And your wife?—27 or 28.

William Kelly, West St., Preston, said—I took a house at Brunswick in the name of John and Milly Kelly. That is my brother's name, and I did so because I had not had a house before. Mrs. Haley is nothing more to me than my housekeeper. On one occasion I gave her £10 for house-keeping expenses. On going to Preston I took the house in the name of William and Ethel Kelly.

Mr. Norris—You heard Haley's accusations of adultery?—Yes. There is no truth in them. Did Haley come and see you?—Yes. We talked for an hour and then Haley shook hands with me and said—"I'm pleased to know you. You are a different man to what I thought."

Luther Haley, father of the defendant, said—My wife and I are prepared to take the children and care for them.

Mr. Norris said that the wife, in view of the fact that Haley was out of work, would not seek maintenance. Mr. Walker, J.P., said that on the evidence the bench would make no order.

Women's Hospital Auxiliary

A beautiful wicker chair, the gift of Mrs. Disher, was disposed of. During the month the ladies have attended the Thornbury soup kitchen and the canteen of the Women's Hospital. Twenty-five members attended the meeting and received material to make into garments. Afternoon tea closed a very enjoyable meeting.

YOUNG WIFE DESERTED SIX MONTHS AFTER MARRIAGE.

"These parties were only married in April of this year," said Mr. R. T. Cahir, when appearing on behalf of Mrs. Phyllis Veronica Heaphy, who sought maintenance from her husband, Patrick John Heaphy, at the Preston court on Thursday. Continuing, Mr. Cahir said that even when the husband had a position he did not give his wife the support he should.

Mrs. Heaphy, Delaware St., Preston, said—After our marriage in April last we lived with my mother. My husband never supported me, and he has repeatedly refused positions which were offered to him. About a fortnight ago he "cleared out," and I issued a summons. He came to see me last Saturday night and said: "I'd sooner see you starve in the gutter than pay you any maintenance."

Mr. Walker, J.P.—Did she ever live with you? The wife—Yes. His mother is the cause of all the trouble. She encouraged him away.

Mr. Walker, J.P.—It is a pity the bench has not the power to send men of this calibre to gaol for six months. There will be an order that Heaphy pay his wife 30/- a week, and that he find a surety of £30 to comply with the order. Heaphy was further directed to pay £1/4/6 costs.

IN THE GARDEN

CLOVERS AND THEIR USES.

(By J. W. Adams, F.L.S., F.R.M.S., National Horticultural Melbourne.)

Clovers are leguminous plants, belonging to the genus trifolium (three leaves). There are about 250 distinct species, but I am going to write of only a few varieties, those which grow principally in Victoria. For example, the only species found growing spontaneously in pastures in any quantity are white clover (trifolium repens), slender clover (T. minus), creeping clover (T. cernuum), hop clover (T. prostratum), rough clover (T. scabrum), knotted clover (T. pratense), woolly-headed clover (T. montanum), narrow-leaf clover (T. angustifolium), and hare's foot clover (T. arvense).

Of course, there are other plants which are called clovers, so like, indeed, that many people cannot tell the difference. For instance, there are medicago, trigonella, and mellilotus; but these clovers can be distinguished from the two former by the pod, and from the latter by the compact flower-heads. Broadly speaking, there are white clovers, trifolium, and it is from now onwards till early Christmas that you will notice them in pasture lands.

Clover Varieties.
The varieties we grow in Victoria are principally white or Dutch clover, red clover, alsike, strawberry clover, subterranean clover, and clustered clover. White clover has the usual trifoliate foliage of bright green color and large fluffy white flower heads. Its stems creep along the ground and root at the joints like buffalo grass. Therefore it is very hardy. Red clover does not creep, but grows upward in an uneven, shaggy way. Its trifoliate leaves are more sharply pointed than white, and in color a pretty purplish red.

Alsike clover can always be easily distinguished by its pretty pinkish flowers. Strawberry clover, too, you will very quickly find, because its fruits just look like ripe strawberries, and it also sends out runners like strawberry plants, which soon establish themselves. Subterranean clover has been so called because its roots run along beneath the surface of the ground, and only dense masses of foliage appear above ground. On account of this creeping habit it does not grow tall, and it is not often met with growing more than a foot or two in height. Crimson clover, also known as scarlet, carnation or incarnate clover, is an annual of rather obscure origin, and is variously reputed as originally native to Germany, Italy and France. It is not so important as the perennials.

Economic Properties.
Clovers are not weeds, but are very valuable plants, and it would take a very long article indeed to tell of all their uses. In other countries they are used for a number of chemical purposes, such as the manufacture of vanilla; but, in Australia, we, as yet, have only used them in connection with stock-raising and bee-farming. Therefore, they are almost exclusively used on their flowers during the colder months of the year. When you see them busy about the clover flowers, you must not forget that besides collecting honey, they are performing a great service for us by carrying the pollen from flower to flower, and making the seed fertile. In New Zealand people have introduced a larger insect, called the bumble bee, for the fertilization of their clover crops.

Distinguishing Features.
Clovers differ from one another mainly in their length of life. Some are annual, some biennial, and some perennial, but most of the annual varieties have the habit of re-seeding themselves each year, so that they may be considered almost as permanent as the perennial varieties. Farmers who understand the cultivation of clovers know that there are kinds which will not bloom their first year, and they who know the varieties which suit their particular circumstances, they know that it would not be wise to plant alsike clover in a field because it is so shallow-rooted that it would die with the first bit of dry weather. They would want to clover, particularly manna-root clover, because its great tap-root goes down into the earth, sending down branches in all directions to gather every particle of moisture from the earth, or if the soil is not rich, they would perhaps use subterranean clover whose roots force themselves under the surface of the ground, crossing and over-arching into a dense mass of roots; and, though a soil, for poultry, and for the shrivel of the foliage, the roots may be found beneath the soil, ready to

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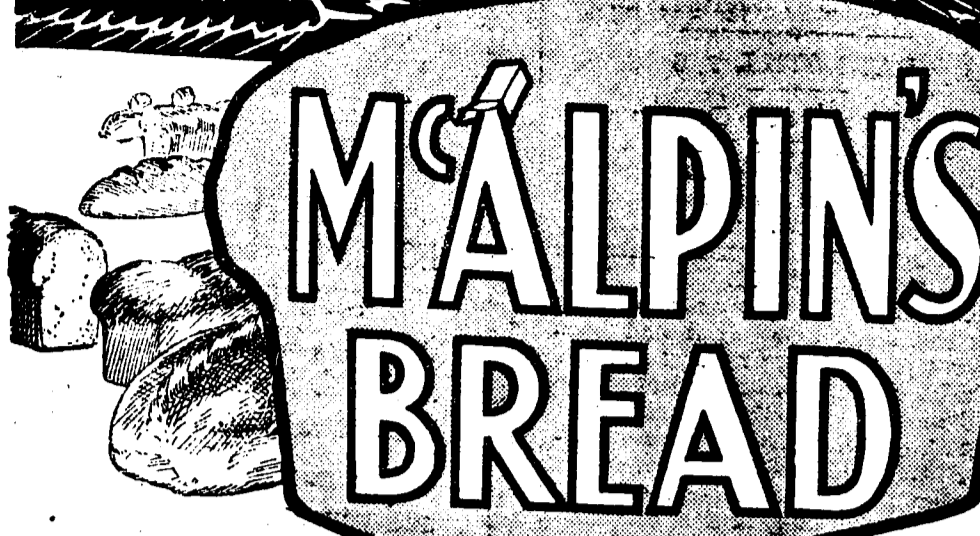

THE BAND NOISE AT PRESTON WEST
(To the Editor)
Sir—I will touch upon one phase of this tea-pot storm, with the hope that my few lines will make food for thought and that right will ever conquer. State schools have regulated hours for the conduct of all school matters. Now, in regard to the junior band, similar conditions apply. The boy in this band cannot function with the junior band during school hours because he is then under control of the school authority. By this it can be seen that we have two different bands functioning at two different periods. This being so, I claim that no rule has been broken. These facts are accepted by the people most concerned, i.e., the parents and the band's tutor. It is to be regretted that the authority is to be regretted that the tutor at the present time West Preston school has no band. Certainly a recruits' class has been started, but a recruits' class and a band are as far apart as the poles. If the authorities are prepared to look at things in a reasonable manner the parents are in the position to supply the much-needed goods, but only under their conditions, which have as their foundation that grand old British justice, without which we are as nothing.

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RHODODENDRONS

NOW GLORIOUSLY IN BLOOM

Rhododendrons are now gloriously in bloom. These shrubs thrive as well in metropolitan gardens as in the suburbs.

The rhododendron has been aptly termed "the king of winter flowers." Because they thrive so wonderfully at the foot of the Dandenong Ranges, and Gippsland (in Victoria), also in Tasmania, the idea has become prevalent that they are not suited for growing in suburban and metropolitan gardens.

Yet wherever these glorious shrubs are planted in suburban gardens and in their suitable positions, they thrive wonderfully, and demonstrate their ability for increased planting. Keep them away from rhododendrons. The rhododendron is a rhododendron, and should be in fact always planted in a rhododendron garden.

A HAND BEAUTIFIER.

An unfailing way to keep the hands soft and white and to prevent them from chapping in winter is to use quantities of lemon juice, caudal Cologne, and glycerine. Mix well in an airtight bottle. After shaking the bottle a little of the mixture should be well rubbed into the hands just before retiring, and gloves should be worn during sleep. This simple treatment will soften the roughest hands in a single night in a way the most expensive bought preparation cannot equal.

USEFUL HINTS.

After a cold, handkerchiefs become hard to wash. Soak them for an hour or two in salt and water, and you will be surprised how easy it is then to wash them. Should meat give the least suggestion of being tainted, wash thoroughly in weak Condy's crystals and water. Add a small teaspoon of glycerine to pastry if it has to be kept for a few days, as this will keep pastry moist. The same applies to cakes. Jellies, to set well, should be made with hot, not boiling water. When making pea soup, put the split peas in stock, bring to boiling point, then add a small pinch of carbonate of soda. Boil then 20 or 30 minutes longer. To obtain better results, beat eggs in the open air. They are better still if there is a wind blowing, and you tilt the basin to allow the current of air access to the mixture. Always lift the eggs with beater when beating so that the air gets under each "lift" of the beater. When a cake is cooked, place it on a rack, then the cake will not become sodden, or stick to paper.

MOVIE CAMERAMAN.

Tradesmen, Inventors, Students of Photo-Art

Overcome the light difficulties on location settings, Fishbeck perfected a small, portable dark room which takes with him on all assignments. From hour to hour he develops a bit of exposed film for a test. Then, by adding electric light or taking it away, he makes sure of a uniform "color." He is also the inventor of a new type of camera lens which catches the flashing lights from aquatics and other costume ornaments and produces a brilliant, whirling effect. This he used with success in dance sequences of "Paramount" on "Friday."

A novel under-sea recording camera is the contribution of Archie Stout, who employed it during the filming of thrilling sequences of "The Sea God." An ordinary electrically driven camera is encased in a square bronze box which protects it from the water. In the front of the box is a glass port-hole through which the action is photographed. Through a specially perfected finding system, similar in principle to the sights of a rifle, the operating cameraman is able to gauge his maneuvering of the camera to cover the action at all times.

Another innovation now makes it possible for a motion picture company to view the results of the day's work on an audible screen, within a few hours after filming. By connecting up an ordinary film projector to the sound system a talking picture theatre may be had wherever a unit is working.

The sound monitor's horn is wired out, or extended to the screen. The action film is run through the projector and the sound track through the unit gets synchronized action and sound from the screen of an improvised theatre with the same fidelity that there would be in the most elaborate of film palaces.

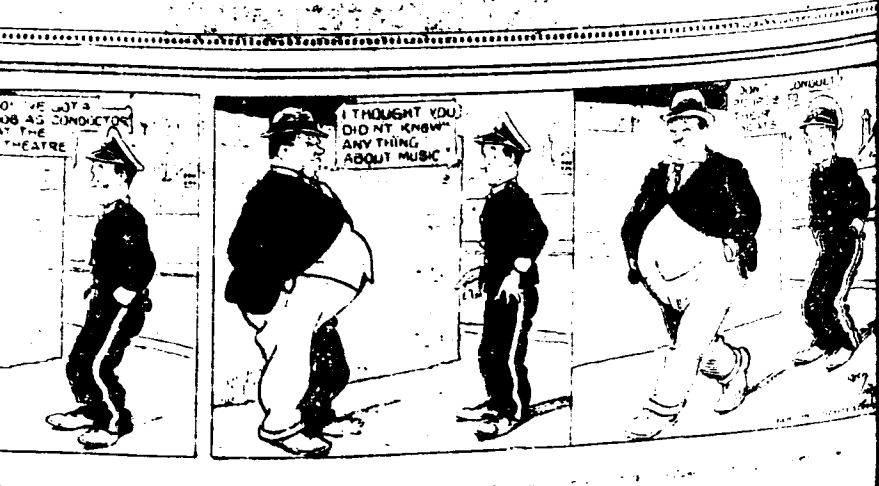
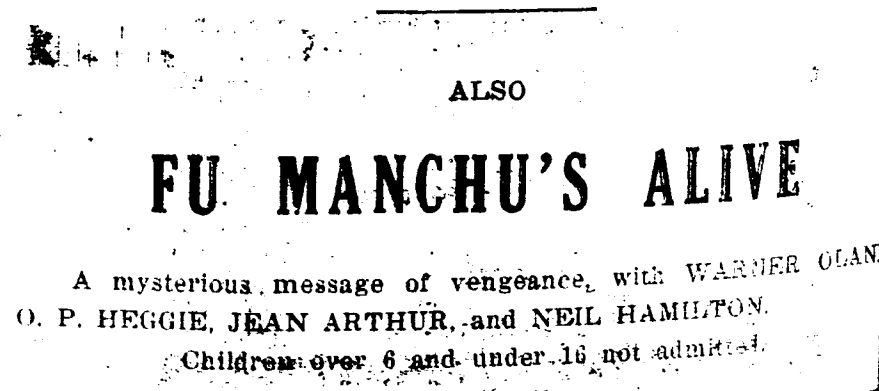
