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ASSAULT CHARGES DISMISSED

MAN ALLEGED TO HAVE BEEN STRUCK WITH BOTTLE
"CAN NOT CONVICT WITHOUT POSITIVE EVIDENCE" SAYS P.M.
In a brawl in Kemp street, on April 23 a man named John Roberts was struck on the head with a bottle and received such injuries that he had to receive medical attention, including the insertion of two stitches in the forehead.

One of the men said "What's up?" and hit me on the head with a bottle. I was dazed and clung to the fence for support. 

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

ACTIVITIES AT NORTHCOTE HIGH SCHOOL
 Harbour Trust Trip—Accepting the invitation of the Harbor Trust about 80 students spent an interesting and instructive morning inspecting various spheres of the Trust's activities. The visit was arranged by Mr. McCutcheon, who recently addressed the school on the subject of the work of this body.

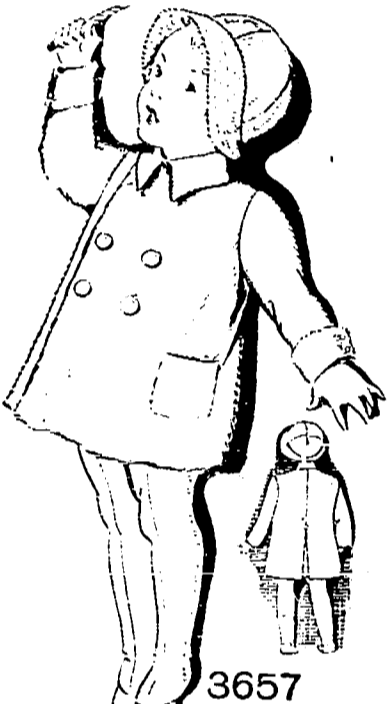
