Orchardist Succeeds in Claim for Damages

COLLISION WITH WAGGON THREE VEHICLES INVOLVED

ARISING out of an accident in Heidelberg road, Fairfield on February 5, Oscar Van Acker, orchardist, of Hurstbridge, began an action against Arthur Watson, Scotchmer street, North Fitzroy, and Allan Guthrie, of Ash Grove, Ivanhoe, claiming £49 damages, at the Northcote Court on June 14. The case stood part heard when the court rose, and the hearing was completed on Tuesday last.

The evidence for the complainant was that Van Acker was driving his wagon along Heidelberg road on February 5 at about 10.15 p.m. when he heard a crash and was jolted from his seat. The wagon was damaged, and amongst the special damages claimed were: Smashed case of eggs £1/5; cartage of fruit to market 10; cartage of cases to Hurstbridge 10; repairs to wagon £13/5. There was also a claim for £30 for loss of profits covering six weeks at £5 a week.

Both Guthrie and Watson were driving motor cars.

Watson said: "I was overtaking Van Acker's wagon, and after waiting for some other cars travelling in the opposite direction, to pass, I swung out to pass the wagon, I was abreast of it when I felt a bump at the rear of my car. I was dislodged from my seat, and thrown forward with my foot hard on the accelerator. I stopped within 30 or 40 yards.

On going back I saw a motor with its bonnet under Van Acker's wagon and I later ascertained that Guthrie was the driver of the other car. I heard two men talking, one of whom was Guthrie. His companion said: "It was an accident." I said "What? When I got hit on the back?" One of the men said "I don't want the police in on this." I said "What about my car?" He said "We'll fix that all right." That statement was made in the presence of Guthrie, but it was not he who spoke. A man in the crowd said to Guthrie "It was your fault. You were going too fast and could not pull up." Guthrie did not say anything.

Cross-examined:—You had plenty of room to pass the wagon on your correct side of the road?—Yes.

Why did you slow down for the oncoming traffic?—It was a wet night and I always slow down when I have dazzling lights against me.

You did not know Guthrie was behind you?—No.

Guthrie said: "I was following Watson's car, and when about eight feet behind it, sounded my horn and swung out to pass. As I drew abreast of Watson's car, that vehicle swung out suddenly, forcing me to go over the crown of the road. Then to avoid a head on collision with oncoming traffic I had to regain my correct side of the road, and in swinging back, my car touched Watson's, and skidding crashed into Van Acker's wagon, which I saw then for the first time."

Cross-Examined:—Do you own the car you were driving?—No. But I had permission to use it.

The P.M. (Mr. E. C. Tibb):—Was the swerve you said Watson made the only one he made whilst in front of you?—Yes.

Your brakes were in good order?—Yes.

John Alan McWhirter, Martin street, Heidelberg, said that he was in Guthrie's car and that later he reported the matter to the Heidelberg police.

The P.M. said that he had no hesitation in finding that the collision was caused by the negligence of Guthrie, who, in his opinion, had not exercised all the precautions a reasonable driver should have taken. The swerve described as having been taken by Watson was one that might have been taken in the ordinary course of driving.

Judgment was entered for £33 damages for Van Acker against Guthrie together with £13/19/6 costs. The P.M. said that in that amount he had allowed Van Acker loss of profits for two and a half weeks at £5 a week.

The claim against Watson was dismissed, and Van Acker was ordered to pay him £9/8/6 costs, but Van Acker was given the right to recover these costs from Guthrie.

Cross-examined:—Did your husband tell you he was "on the rocks"?—He always says that.

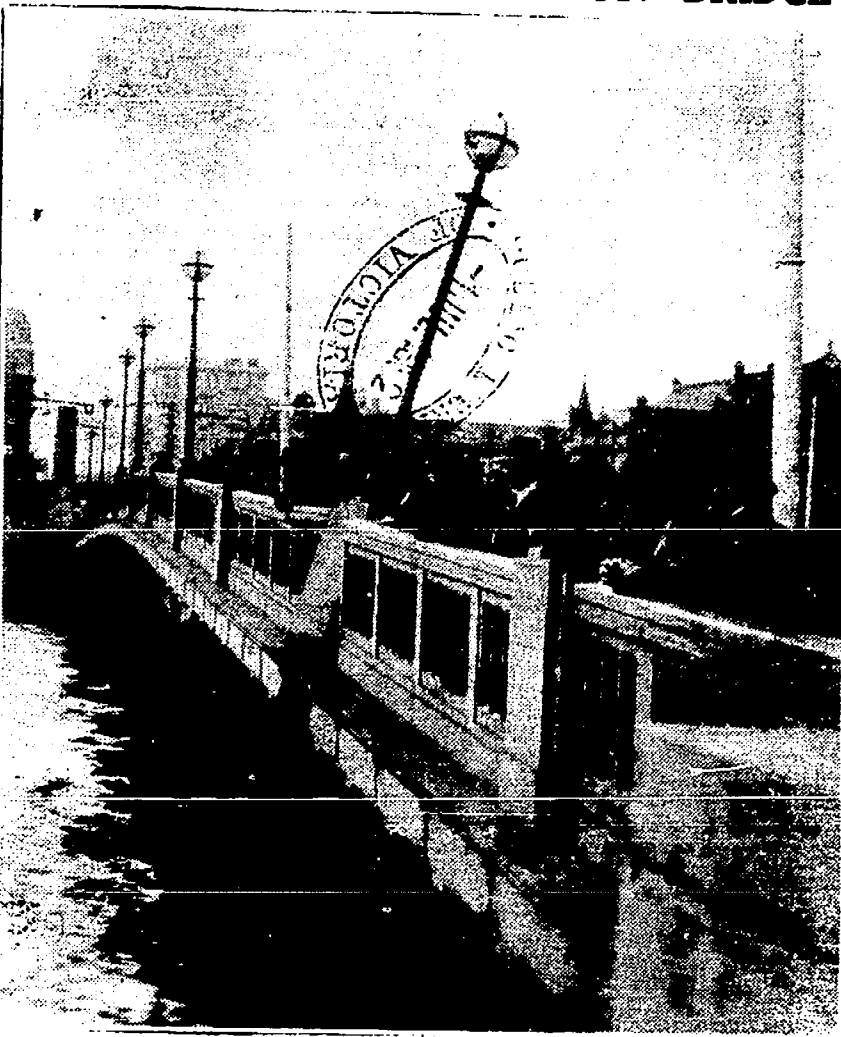

UNDERTAKERS IN COURT DISPUTE OVER EQUIPMENT

In the County Court on Tuesday, before Judge Williams, Charles P. Frilay, undertaker, of High street, Preston brought an action against Michael Mulqueen, senior, of Blyth street, Brunswick claiming the return of a black and silver pall, which he valued at £25, and other undertaker's equipment, or alternatively £99 damages.

It was stated that the dispute arose out of the sale of an undertaker's business by Frilay to Mulqueen in March last year.

For the defence it was contended that the articles claimed went with the business.

Judge Williams found that all the equipment with the exception of the pall were the property of Mulqueen. He ordered that the pall be returned, and judgment was entered for plaintiff for 1/ together with £10/10/ costs. The pall was returned.

FINE OF £3

Reginald Howard, of South Crescent, Westgarth was fined £3 together with £2/2/ costs at Northcote Court on Tuesday on a charge of having thrown on a roadway, vegetable refuse which might furnish forage for rats.

The evidence was that on June 11 at 4.55 a.m. two officers of the Northcote council saw decayed cauliflower and cabbage leaves being thrown out of a cart in South Crescent, near the Dennis Station. In the cart were Howard and his son, also a quantity of vegetable leaves similar to those thrown on the roadway. Before the cart passed there were no such leaves on the road.

Mr. A. M. Lonie (Maddock, Jamieson and Lonie) appeared to prosecute on behalf of the Northcote City Council, action being taken under the Health Act.

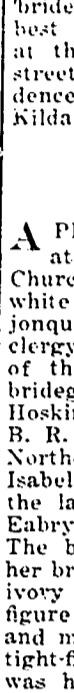

Elated by this success and that of our first reunion dinner on which I will shortly touch, the branch considered it timely that a start should be made towards preserving its history.

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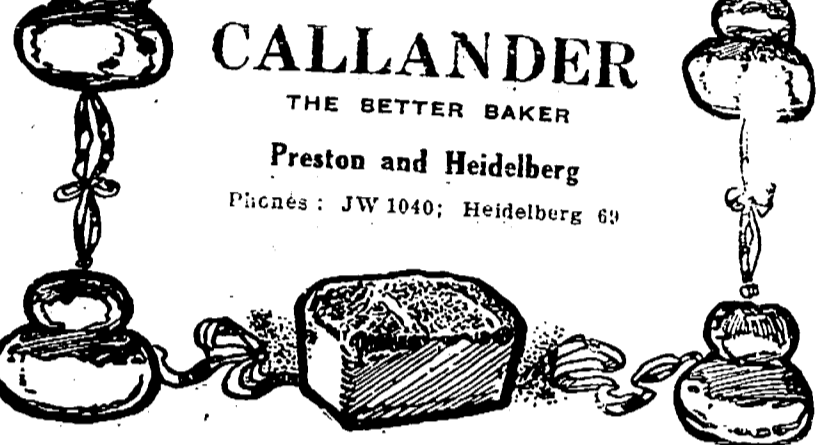

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NORTHCOTE'S NEGLECTED CEMETERY

(To the Editor)
Sir.—Once again I crave your indulgence in publishing this letter in order to bring about some alteration in the management, and attention to this most neglected cemetery. When the original trustees were appointed, it was kept in fair order, but since the local council took it over, it has become a wilderness of weeds and refuse. Footpaths have disappeared and complete chaos reigns. Every glass-protected wreath placed on the graves of loved ones has been ruthlessly destroyed. Even when protected by wire netting it has been torn off in order to smash the protecting glass. Marble vases have been smashed and thrown aside, and the result appears to have been taken against these cemetery ghoulies. One would imagine that in these times of unemployment the Northcote Council would avail themselves of the opportunity to convert the cemetery into a garden cemetery as there would be very little required, except labor to do so, and at the same time provide work for some of the unemployed.

Comparatively speaking, the Northcote people are aware of the cemetery, and from an inspection of this spot in Separation street, Northcote, it is even more apparent that even fewer care than DISGUSTED.

The cemetery is in a most untidy and neglected state, being overgrown with long grass and weeds; the once level path has been washed out; an avenue (?) of trees is sadly neglected with branches hanging out in all directions; and generally the place bears an air of neglect.

In many cases headstones have fallen down through subsidence of the ground, and others are tottering. Again a number of wooden railings, stones and railings are broken, while a number have been defaced—probably by vandals who are too fond to lead to the general air of dilapidation and desolation.

Here and there, by way of compensation to the other graves, but these are the exception rather than the rule. It would seem that the headstones have been laid to rest as entirely forgotten.

An inspection disclosed that even in cases where graves have been care-fully tended by relatives, this did not make them immune from the depredations of vandals. There is not a permanent wreath on the cemetery in some cases attempts have been made to protect the glass with wire netting. In some cases the surface has been scratched and dirting up and again the leaden lettering of other headstones has been picked out.

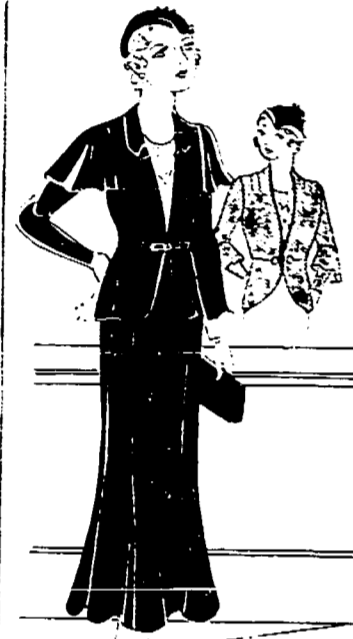
