A Dash for Liberty : Shots Fired in High Street

TWO MEN CAPTURED

A few minutes before 10 o'clock on Thursday morning a sensation occurred in High street, Northcote, when two men, who were being escorted by plainclothes constables, made a dash for liberty, and during the chase revolvers were drawn by constables and shots were fired.

The escort was apparently proceeding along High street, when one of the men made a dash for liberty, and immediately the other decided to follow his example.

The men separated, one proceeding along High street and running at break-neck speed in the direction of Bastings street. The other darted along High street and turned into Mitchell street.

Revolvers were drawn and several shots were fired by the police, one constable following each man. The escapee who took the route along High street and Mitchell street was "run out" in front of the fire station and again taken into custody without any show of resistance.

The scene in Bastings street attracted a number of people who followed up and witnessed the capture. It is alleged by bystanders that in this case the prisoner was roughly handled, and in a scuffle he was knocked down and brutally kicked before being finally handcuffed.

A large number of people were in the vicinity, and the incident, which occurred with such startling suddenness, was discussed for a long time after the capture had been effected.

A Forgiving Wife

HUSBAND'S PROMISE TO MEND HIS WAYS

In September last year Catherine Margaret Keogh obtained a maintenance order against her husband, James William Keogh. After living apart for some time, Mrs. Keogh returned to her husband in April last, upon Keogh promising to mend his ways.

Mrs. Keogh, who formerly lived at Charles street, Northcote, but is now a resident of Albert Park, told the bench at the Northcote Court on Tuesday that her husband, who lives at Nott street, Port Melbourne, did not mend his ways as he promised. He had threatened to poison himself if she did not return to him, and she complied with that request for the sake of the children.

The husband came home drunk and chased her with an axe and later threatened her with a carving knife. On June 7 the wife left after having been threatened with poison.

Mr. Hugh Marsland (for the husband) said that all the prior misbehaviour was admitted, but the husband had reformed. Keogh's work precluded him from drinking. The wife had left of her own accord, even though Keogh wished her to stay. He had been so worried about the wife's actions in continually bringing him before the court that he had tried to commit suicide.

Keogh gave evidence along these lines. The bench made an order for the payment of £1 weekly to the wife and 10/ a week for each of two children. Keogh was also ordered to find a surety of £35 and to pay £2/7/ costs.

VICIOUS FOOTBALL ENCOUNTER

UNSEEMLY INCIDENTS AT NORTHCOTE

SIX PLAYERS REPORTED

The match between Northcote and Port Melbourne at Northcote Park last Saturday was expected to be vigorous, but few thought that they would witness the many regrettable incidents which occurred during a bitter, spiteful game. Players resorted to many questionable tactics, some of which went unnoticed by the umpire; others were seen and several players were reported.

The onus of checking such incidents is not laid upon the umpires alone, who cannot be expected to see everything of an unseemly nature. Responsibility also rests on the clubs who should take every precaution at least to safeguard players who are likely to be injured.

If the Association is to progress, it is the bounden duty of the respective clubs to rid the game of these questionable and unpleasant tactics which did much to mar the match last Saturday.

For some unaccountable reason it was evident that Seymour (whose object is always the ball) was apparently singled out and though he was twice deliberately felled still played the game and finished up a trying ordeal by notching eight goals.

The Association, in order to promote its welfare and safeguard its interests, should institute an inquiry in which the clubs concerned should only be too ready to assist. Passing through the race leading

to the dressing room at the conclusion of the match, a Port Melbourne player struck a spectator, whom he alleged, addressed an insulting remark to him.

During the contest a disturbance arose among spectators and only the arrival of the police checked what looked like developing into a serious melee.

The following players—in the main Port Melbourneites—were reported as the outcome of the vicious encounter.

Buckley (P.M.) has been charged with having struck Seymour (Northcote) in the second quarter; Bills (P.M.) is alleged to have kicked J. Woods (N) in the last quarter; E. Perrett (P.M.) has been charged with having elbowed J. Woods (N) in the last quarter; and J. Woods (N) with having kicked Bills (P.M.) in the last quarter. Goulett (N) is alleged to have elbowed Baker (P.M.) in the second quarter, and Buckley (P.M.) to have struck Byrne (N) in the last quarter. A charge against E. Perrett (P.M.) is that he elbowed Byrne (N) in the last quarter.

ASSOCIATION HEARS CHARGES

Four Players Suspended

The Association Tribunal, on Wednesday night, heard evidence against several players who were charged with rough play on the occasion of the Northcote-Port Melbourne match last Saturday.

After hearing evidence Goulett (N) was disqualified for six premier-ship matches for elbowing. A charge against Buckley (P.M.) for having struck Seymour (N) in the second quarter was dismissed.

Woods (N) was disqualified for six premier-ship matches and Bills (P.M.) for 12 matches. These players were charged with kicking at each other, though both denied the charges. Perrett (P.M.) was disqualified for three matches for elbowing Woods (N).

Charges against Perrett of having struck Byrne (N), against Buckley of having elbowed Byrne, and against Bedford (P.M.) of having struck Seymour (N) in the last quarter of the same match were adjourned until Friday night.

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HUSBAND'S OBJECTION TO MOTHER-IN-LAW

ROW BECAUSE WIFE WENT HOME

During the hearing of a case at Northcote Court on Tuesday, Mrs. Emma Hanson said that because her husband objected, she did not see her mother for three years. Then she was told to "get out."

The case was one in which Mrs. Hanson, Collins street, Thornbury, sought a maintenance order against her husband, Andrew Hanson, of Raleigh street, Thornbury, for her self and child.

Mr. R. R. Gray appeared for the wife. Hanson said: "The marriage took place in January, 1929 and there are two children, one of whom I wish my husband. We lived in Collingwood for some months and later moved to Raleigh street, Thornbury. My husband drank heavily, and I had a very hard time of it. When I asked him out late at night, he would say 'That's my business.' He always handed the money, giving me a few shillings to go to day at the same time saying what he would have for meals. When he came home he wanted to know what I had spent."

He objected to me going to see my parents with the result that I did not see my mother for three years. What he was away for a week-end in January I visited my mother, but when he heard of it he told me to "get back to my own home." He told me that so often that I left. A day or so later I asked him what he intended to do and he said "Nothing. I am finished with you." He gave me a case to me and told me to get my things. I was away for a month in goal rather than pay anything. He was examined: You asked your husband to take you back?—Yes. He said he would not have me as a wife. Are you still desirous of going back?—Not now. He has never treated me properly. Hanson said: "I have not been frequently drunk, as my wife alleges. When we moved to Thornbury I provided a good home and everything we wanted. When I got out of work I went to where she was for a cheaper rent. I was away for a week-end in January and on returning I found her sisters at the house. I told her to get away from me as I did not want them there, and we had some words. A day or so later we had another argument and I told her that if she preferred to go away from me, she could go to them. I went out for a walk, and when I returned she was gone. In May she came to the house and asked me for money, but I was only working now and again, I had none to give her. I have only had four full weeks' work this year, and have had to sell some of the furniture to get money to keep myself and the child which is with me. Cross-examined: You object to your wife seeing her people?—Yes. In her own interests they would do you no good. Did you dole out money to her?

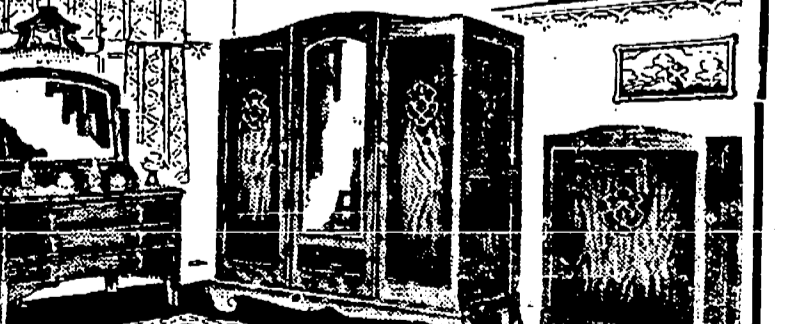

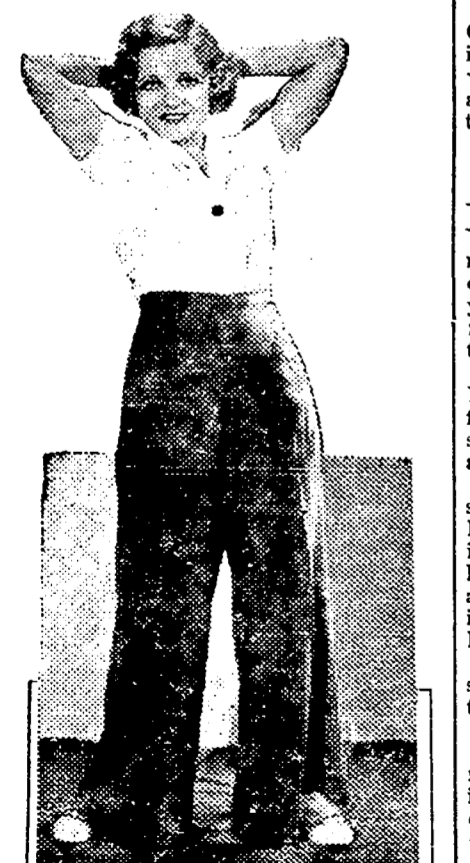

General Outlook Brighter

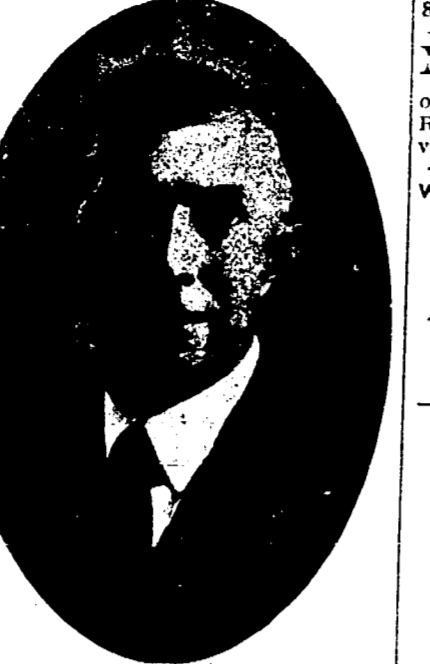

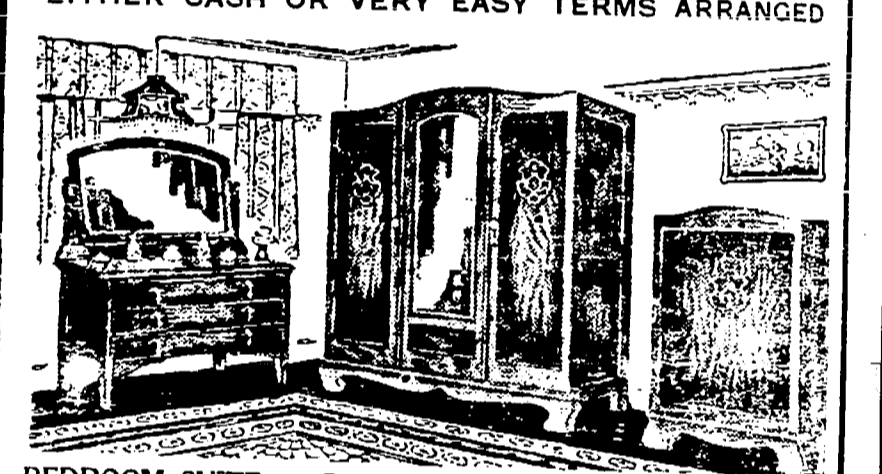
