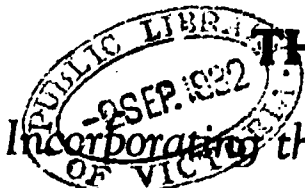

## HOLD-UP AT ALPHINGTON

### ARMED MAN TAKES MONEY

AT about 9.30 on Tuesday night an armed and masked man "held-up" Mrs. Mary Hill at the residence at the rear of her son's postal agency and confectionery shop at Heidelberg road, Alphington, and stole £5/5/8.

The business is conducted by Robert Hill, and he has only had it for about nine months. On that night he had gone to a dance in the city, and his mother was alone in the residence, which is at the back of the shop.

Going out into the yard of the shop Mrs. Hill was accosted by a masked man who pushed a revolver into her face and demanded the keys of the safe, threatening that if they were not given to him, he would "blow her brains out."

Mrs. Hill replied that she did not have the keys of the safe, and after some parleying, the man entered the shop and took all the money from the till drawer which was unlocked. Mrs. Hill protested saying that as it was government money she and her son would have to make it good. The man said "I am taking it because it is government money. My wife and kids are starving."

The man left by the back door. Mrs. Hill ran into the street and had a telegraph message sent to the police. A police patrol searched the locality without result.

Mrs. Hill, at the time, had the keys of the safe, which contained £50.

## BOARD OF WORKS RATE

### DISCUSSION BY NORTHCOTE COUNCIL

#### OPPOSITION TO INCREASE

ON Monday night Northcote council received letters from the West Ward Progress Association and Mr. W. J. Canty urging that the council protest against the possibility of an increase of 3d in the 2 in the Board of Works rate.

Cr. Bird moved that the council enter an emphatic protest against any increase. He said that the proposed increase was equal to 25 per cent. These were not the times for increases, and although he realised that the Board of Works was "up against it" the members should look on their finances in a business light and economise in the same way as private businesses had been compelled to do.

Cr. Turner, in seconding the motion, said that the Northcote Council had also experienced great financial difficulties, but in the face of them economies had been effected, and last year the rates were reduced. It was true that the reduction had not been much, but the decrease was a gesture that the council was doing what it could to assist its ratepayers. To-day there were on every side wage reductions. Many people were struggling to keep their homes in which they had invested their life savings, and any increase in rates at the present time by the Board of Works would have the effect of bringing nearer the time when many would have to get out of their homes. In quite normal times there would be a violent protest at any increase of 25 per cent. in rates, and at the present time the position was worse. Many were now unable to pay their rates.

#### Commissioner's Statement

Cr. Dennis, the council's representative on the Board of Works, said that the very fact that many were unable to pay their rates, was one of the causes of the Board's present financial condition. There had been a fall in valuations of properties rated by the Board, of something between £2,000,000 and £2,500,000. A deficit of £80,000 had been carried forward from last year, and this year the amount would be about twice as much. If there was no increase in the rate, the people could not expect to get the service they were getting. As far as he could see there was not any prospect of relief from an increased rate, except by the juggling of figures; and taking moneys set aside for renewal accounts. He would use his judgment when exercising his vote. If it was a question of repudiation, sooner than vote for it, he would retire.

In past years the Board had decreased its rate whenever possible, instead of building up a huge reserve fund, as it could have done, and it was now most unfortunate that the Board would have at this juncture to contemplate an increased rate. In his opinion if the increase were only 2d the Board would carry over a deficit into the following year.

Cr. Olver said the council should not arbitrarily issue an instruction to its commissioner, that he should do something which was against his conscience. The present position had been brought about largely by the fact that the Board had difficulty in raising moneys abroad, and this was in a large measure due to the attitude of New South Wales, in which many parliamentarians were openly preaching a policy of repudiation. Consequently the money which had been raised by the Board by loan had been at a high rate of interest, and further there was now the added burden on the interest sent abroad on all its overseas loans. The Board's commitments ran into millions, raised mostly overseas, and there was a possibility that during the coming year many of these loans would be re-floated and converted at a lower rate of interest. If that were done, it would afford a good deal of relief. If in view of this possibility the Board should budget to carry over a deficit into next year, rather than impose an increased rate of 3d; an in-

crease of 1d or 2d might meet the case.

Cr. Hayes said the Board had seemed to realise its trouble all of a sudden. There must have been considerable lack on the part of the financial advisers of the Board to have allowed the drift to go so far before discovering it. He had yet to learn that anything had been done in the way of effecting economies—and there appeared to be plenty of avenues. This year there had been a loss of £13,000 on the Werribee farm.

Cr. Dennis:—Cattle are cheaper. Cr. Hayes:—That may be so, but it is hard to justify a loss to the people who have to make it good.

Cr. Johnson said that any increase in the rate would make it extremely hard for property owners, who, after paying rates and taxes, in many cases thing much had been said about economies.

Cr. Dennis:—The Board had decreased its expenditure by thousands of pounds, and has also reduced its staffs too.

Cr. Peters: The people as a whole are making sacrifices, and the Board should share them instead of wanting increased rates.

The mayor (Cr. Oldis): The most alarming thing about the whole matter that I can see is that concurrent with a proposal to increase its rates, the Board is seeking an increase in borrowing powers. It is time that an intimation is given to the Board that the people have not unlimited funds to meet the Board's demands. The motion was carried.

#### INCREASE OF 1d. IN £ PROBABLE

At a special meeting of the Board of Works on Tuesday afternoon the question of increasing rates was discussed.

No official announcement was made, but it is understood that the majority of the representatives are in favor of an increase of one penny thus making the rate 1/ in the £. To enable the Board to carry on its activities without a greater increase, there is a strong likelihood that during the year there will be no strengthening of the Renewals account which would in the ordinary course receive approximately £120,000. This fund now stands at £1,087,000.

It is also likely that a committee will be appointed to go into the question of effecting further economies.

## Failed To Return New Number Plates

### CASE BEFORE NORTHCOTE COURT

#### OBLIGATIONS OF MOTORISTS

THOUGH a large number of people drive motor vehicles, few are aware of all the regulations governing the use of these vehicles, and it is only when cases come before the courts from time to time, that motorists realise that through ignorance they have been committing breaches of the Motor Car Act.

A case of this nature came before the court on Tuesday, when Archibald Wellington Clarke, of Woolton avenue, Thornbury, was charged that on August 4, his motor registration having expired, he failed to immediately return his number plates to the Motor Registration Branch.

The evidence showed that Clarke's car was registered for a six month period and expired on August 1, owing to the non-payment of the renewal fee. The number plates issued by the Motor Registration Branch were not returned to the police by Clarke until August 18, and then only after the police had visited Clarke's home and requested their return.

Clarke said:—When I paid my registration fee for six months there were issued to me a registration disc and a car title, both of which stated that the registration was current for twelve months from the date of issue although I had paid a fee covering six months.

As soon as I learned I had to return the number plates issued by the Motor Registration Branch, I did so, even though I considered them my own property, having paid 3/ for them when they were issued to me.

The P.M. (Mr. Hauser) said that in view of the circumstances a nominal penalty of 5/ would be imposed. He added that motorists should make themselves familiar with the provisions of the Motor Car Act.

**First of Its Kind**  
This case was stated to be the first of its kind brought before the courts since the introduction of the amended Motor Car Act, though it is stated on good authority that further prosecutions of a similar nature are pending.

## A COURAGEOUS RESCUE

### BY YOUTH WHO COULD NOT SWIM

ON Friday afternoon Ronnie Blythe, 15 years, of Vauxhall road, Northcote, saved a four-year-old boy, Norman Anthonson, of Flinders street, Thornbury, from drowning.

Blythe was bailing out a punt on the river at Fairfield and had seen two small boys approach. He heard a scream and saw one of the lads had fallen into the river. Although he could not swim, Blythe jumped, fully-clothed, from a spring board into the river, and got the boy safely ashore. A council employee named Sullivan carried the rescued boy, who was unconscious to the Fairfield police station where he was treated by Mrs. Williamson, wife of Sergeant Williamson, and Constable Shaw. The boy recovered and was taken home.

It was learned afterwards that Blythe could not swim, but knew enough about "dog-paddling"—the first step in learning to swim—to keep himself above water. At the time the Yarra was in flood and at the spot where the rescue was effected the water was more than 10ft deep.

At the meeting of Northcote council on Monday Cr. Glanfield spoke of the high courage shown by Ronnie Blyth in effecting the rescue of the child at the risk of his own life, and in recognition of the courage shown it was resolved to forward to Ronnie a letter, under seal, from the council; and also to bring the matter before the notice of the Royal Humane Society.

## Can Preston Shopkeepers Supply Your Needs?

YOU hear th's question asked many times daily. In answering, people often jump to conclusions, and without much reflection a highly technical and intricate situation is summed up and answered in one word containing either two or three letters. Herein the position is briefly reviewed, and new and all important sidelights are thrown upon the subject.

Ordinary Preston presents to the casual visitor a splendid array of shops extending from the vicinity of Bell Street to Murray road. These shops are modern, efficiently lighted and laid out to enable the shopkeeper to display to best advantage his wares, also to give the public an opportunity of inspecting and forming their own opinions before they enter. Generally speaking, the attention to customers is all that can be desired, and we must say that from this point of view the shopkeeper displays his willingness to attract custom.

Next we consider the class of shop and the range of goods kept. A shop must thoroughly understand what retail business is in order to discuss this point of view. A generally accepted definition of the word retailer is a trader who buys goods from a manufacturer, wholesaler or warehouse in quantities and offers these goods to the public in single lots.

A shopkeeper has to work upon a certain capital—it may be £50; it may be £500 or £10,000, depending upon the nature of his business and its market value. Whatever the amount he has a certain amount to lay-out in goods for resale, and he stocks his shop accordingly. It is the buying public who enter the picture. If he has bought wisely and receives the buyer's appreciation he can turn over his wares once, twice or several times per annum. If the trader has done his part and fails to find a ready market (which means the public must buy), it is apparent he cannot purchase new stock or can only purchase in limited quantities. This means either the trader has to increase his margin of profit or eventually go out of business.

Let us investigate an example. A trader commences with £1,000. He has to invest in stock, and he has to pay for his premises, and he has to pay for his staff. He has to pay for his advertising, and he has to pay for his losses. He has to pay for his rent, and he has to pay for his taxes. He has to pay for his insurance, and he has to pay for his depreciation. He has to pay for his interest, and he has to pay for his overheads. He has to pay for his contingencies, and he has to pay for his unexpected expenses. He has to pay for his losses, and he has to pay for his depreciation. Mr. Briggs, whose advertisement appears in another column, has one of the finest and oldest established cake and pastry businesses in Preston, and has always been noted for the quality of his goods made by skilled workmen in a commodious bakehouse behind the shop, only local tradesmen being employed. Before taking over his present premises nearly seven years ago he was in sole charge of the bakery attached to the famous Thistle Cafe (not now in business) for close on 14 years, and catered for the needs of Preston and the same care as exercised in that company.

spends £100 in counters, fittings, lighting effects, etc. £500 is spent in stock, and £100 is kept as a reserve. The first £100 has been locked up and does not reproduce. The £200 is working in the form of "live stock." The average retail trader turns his money over twice yearly. That gives a turnover for the year of £400. If the gross profit (before expenses are deducted) was 20 per cent, a yield of £80 would have been earned for the year. From this amount the expenses—electric current, telephone, lighting, rent, etc.—must be deducted. These charges would probably amount to £200 per annum. If the business was run by the proprietor without assistance, it would only give £120 as interest upon the money and for his wages combined. If the turnover were increased, the stock turned over three times per annum instead of twice, the yield would be £120. In addition, lighting and other charges would not be increased. It is apparent, then, that the more often goods are turned over the better the position of the trader, and the lower need be his percentage of profit added to the purchase price.

By patronising local shopkeepers, the buying public are not only assisting local traders and helping to maintain the local shopkeepers, but they are also helping the trader to keep his stock fresh and up-to-date. At the same time they are helping themselves to lower prices and avoiding queues of time and money in the form of transport.

Another important factor is that a suburban trader, by reason of his limited number of customers, must treat his customers properly and give them every satisfaction for their money. How different from the city emporium, where in the reckless haste, one loses his sense of proportion, and complaints made a day or two afterwards are without avail.

Looking at the situation all round, one may say that Preston shopkeepers are capable of supplying your needs.

During the latter part of last week a scheme was set afoot whereby each purchaser in Association shops receives stamps to the value of the amount of goods purchased. For instance, 3/6 in stamps will be handed to the purchaser who spends 3/6. The stamps are of the denomination of 6d. each, and anyone spending 3/6 receives seven stamps. A sheet is provided upon which the stamps can be affixed, and when 25 stamps have been obtained a present can be claimed.

**Dried Fruit Publicity Drive**  
In connection with the above Cr. H. P. Zwar, M.L.A., attended the Girls' School at Preston and delivered an interesting address on the above subject. In the course of his remarks the member for Heidelberg referred to the wonderful achievement connected with the Australian dried fruit industry, of the success won by the men and women of courage and determination who had gone into the virgin country and gradually evolved and brought into being one of the most interesting and picturesque industries in our midst. Its possible annual export value is considered to be between two and three million pounds. The area under cultivation in Australia in current statistics amounts to approximately 60,000 acres, including 27,000 in Victoria, with 5,519 growers in all. Of the Australian production of 72,194 tons for season 1930, 46,738 tons were grown in Victoria. As the Commonwealth consumption of dried fruit is only about 13,000 tons, the great bulk of the stock is sold overseas. The consumption of dried fruit in Australia is only approximately 5lbs. per head per annum, and wonder was expressed by Cr. Zwar from a health point of view why the people in this land did not partake more freely of such fruits and make them a part of the daily diet. The address was listened to with interest by the school girls.

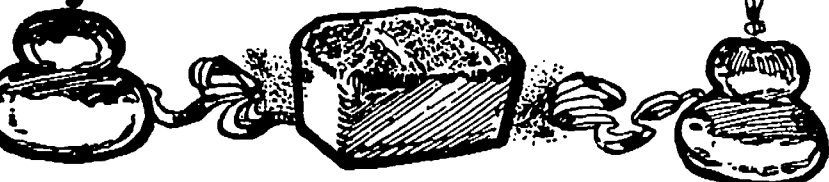

**MOTOR CAP AS CLUE**

**OWNER RECOGNISES IT IN THORNBURY ROBBERY**

**Youth For Trial**

**RECOGNISING A CAP, WHICH HAD BEEN PART OF THE PROCEEDS OF A ROBBERY FROM HIS HOME, ALBERT ADAMS, RENNIE STREET, THORNBURY, SPOKE TO A YOUTH IN ST. GEORGE'S ROAD, NORTHCOTE. THE YOUTH EVIDENTLY BECAME SUSPICIOUS AND FLED, AND ADAMS GAVE CHASE. HE OVERTOOK HIS QUARRY, BUT ONCE AGAIN THE YOUTH GOT AWAY. THE SAME NIGHT, HOWEVER, ADAMS AGAIN CAUGHT THE YOUTH AND SENT FOR THE POLICE.**

The sound was the appearance of Frederick Benjamin Caulfield, 17 years of Rennie street, Preston, on a charge that on August 19 he broke into the house of Albert Adams and stole a leather motor cap, jewellery, clothing and other articles valued at £30.

Ellis Adams, textile worker, Rennie street, Thornbury, said: "On August 19 when I returned to my home, I found the back door had been forced. Albert George Adams Jun. said that a number of articles had been stolen from the house, amongst which were two boxes of cartridges and a leather cap. The property was worth about £30.

"On the morning of September 13 in St. George's road, whilst riding along I saw Allen. He was wearing a leather cap similar to the one I owned. Next day I again saw him and asked him where he had got the cap. He said he had purchased it at a city store. I asked to be allowed to examine it and he was about to hand it to me when he snatched it away and fled. I gave chase and caught him after a short run. I said that he had stolen it from me and escaped. On the next night I cornered him on the Merri Bridge in St. George's road and held him whilst I sent for the police. Later that night with the police I visited Allen's home where I identified some cartridges which had been stolen from me.

Constable Beavington said he took Allen into custody at the Merri Bridge. Allen then denied that he had ever worn a leather motor cap. After visiting Allen's home, I showed him two packets of cartridges and he said: "I know nothing about them."

Constable F. B. Mensch and Senior Constable Matthews also gave evidence.

This was the police case.

Caulfield said: "I have never been in trouble before. I was not wearing a motor cap on my way to work on September 14. Prior to that day I had never seen the bullets until the police found them in the drawer. My brother and his wife were at the house two months before that, but they have since gone on the track and I don't know where they are now. I never owned a leather motor cap, and was never spoken to by Adams on either of the mornings of September 13 or 14."

Iris Rebecca Caulfield, married, Roseberry avenue, Preston, said: "Defendant is my son. My husband has deserted me, and pays me 10/- weekly for the support of a young child."

"Defendant is a good son and has never given me any trouble. He is the best son a mother could have."

Allen was committed for trial at General Sessions on October 3. Bail was fixed at £25 with a surety of a like amount.

The motion was seconded by Cr. A. Bird, and supported by Mr. Frank Brennan, formerly Federal member for Batman) and several pensioners who would be affected by the government's proposal.

The motion was carried unanimously.

**A GIGANTIC UNDERTAKING**

Comprehensive Work of the Central Relief Committee

**SUSTENANCE DISBURSEMENTS ALMOST £40,000**

ALTHOUGH it is generally known that the relief of distress in Northcote caused by unemployment has reached vast dimensions, few people have any conception of what work is actually being done. The work is controlled by the Northcote Central Relief Committee, upon which is represented the following bodies—Northcote Council, in your own home. Patterns cut to measure. part of the second annual report of the Central Relief Committee for the year ended August 1932. Cr. O'Leary gave the Northcote City Council a brief insight into the widespread workings of the committee.

He said that the relief of distress had reached gigantic dimensions, and a splendid work was being performed by the committee and the citizens generally. The many public bodies, clubs, churches, progress associations, industrial and various other societies had co-operated wholeheartedly, and their assistance had been much appreciated.

**Facts and Figures**

The report showed that in August 1932 there were 1543 in receipt of sustenance, and it was pleasing to note that the figures at August 1932 had dropped to 1176. During the year the value of government sustenance orders issued had been £27,000 and with the exception of perhaps, bread, most of these orders had gone to local tradespeople. During the year several amendments were made in the rates of sustenance, by which 50 per cent. received an increase and approximately 70 families were struck by the amendments. Members of the Northcote Ladies' Benevolent Society had rendered considerable services in investigating cases where applications were made for sustenance.

At the instance of Mr. H. H. Olney M.L.C., a Northern Province Relief Council had been inaugurated, comprising the relief committees in that area. This had had the effect of enabling the various relief committees to assist each other and eliminate overlapping in giving relief.

**Boot Repairs.**—During the year 8092 pairs of boots were repaired at the Town Hall boot repair shop and leather was supplied for 5,232 pairs. The Memorial Hall shop repaired 1221 pairs, a grand total of 15,445 pairs.

Of the leather required the government provided 3,646 lb and the committee 1,066 lb 18 dozen cut soles and 248.

A booting-up ship had been contracted the labor being voluntary.

Childing.—The requests for assistance were numerous. The government supplied secondhand and some new clothing and a large quantity was purchased by and donated to the committee. Between 5,500 and 6,000 articles were distributed during the year. The Dorcas Society and Ladies' Benevolent Society, and also a sewing circle under Mrs. J. A. 
