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CARS COLLIDE AT CROSSROADS ROBBERY

ONE CATCHES FIRE
 WOMAN KNOCKED DOWN

Excitement was caused in High street at the corner of Darebin street at about 10 o'clock on Sunday night when two cars collided and one caught fire. A pedestrian was knocked down and one of the drivers seriously injured.

A car driven by Mr. Alfred J. Marson, Barkly street, East Brunswick when travelling along High street, struck Mrs. Francis R. Galvin, 50 years of age, Johnson street, Northcote, as she was crossing the intersection. Marson's car then collided with one driven by Mr. W. A. Feltham, of Gooch street, Northcote and burst into flames.

Dragged from Burning Car
 Mrs. Galvin was assisted by passers by, and others extricated Marson, who was injured, from his burning car. The Northcote Fire Brigade, summoned from a street alarm, was soon on the scene and extinguished the flames before much damage had been done.

Mrs. Galvin and Marson were taken to the Melbourne Hospital in an ambulance. Mrs. Galvin had both legs broken, whilst Marson sustained a broken leg, a possible fracture of the base of the skull, burns and lacerations. His condition is critical.

An eye-witness of the accident stated that Mr. Feltham behaved with unusual coolness. After the collision he extricated his wife and family from his own car and then rushed over and led in helping Marson, who was unconscious, from his vehicle. Had it not been for his action, Marson would have been very severely burned. As it was, Mr. Feltham's hands were burned and cut whilst effecting the rescue.

Two Men for Trial
 AT Northcote Court on Tuesday James Pearcey, 29 years, and John Edward Ross, 23 years, Barker street Brunswick, were each charged that on September 17 they broke into the house of William Anderson and stole suit cases, clothing, wireless equipment &c., valued at £100.

William Charles Anderson, electrical engineer, Woolhouse street, Croxton, said: "On September 17 I was absent from home between 6.30 and 11.30 p.m. and on my return found the house ransacked. A catch on a back window had been broken, and the back door was open. A large quantity of goods were stolen."

Both accused who, pleaded guilty, were committed for trial at General Sessions on October 17. Bail was fixed at £100 with a surety of a like amount for each accused.

Link With Early Northcote

IN our advertising columns appears an auction notice in reference to the sale of property in the estate of the late Mr. and Mrs. C. Schwabach who were among the oldest and most respected residents of the Northcote district.

Mr. Schwabach arrived in Northcote with his parents about 1849 and resided here until his death about 11 years ago. During that time he saw Northcote rise from a farming village to a city. Mrs. Schwabach died last year at the age of 90 years in the old home known as No. 571 High street. This was the first house built on the once famous Croxton Park Racecourse. Opposite the house was the forest surrounding the abattoirs upon the hill where now stands the mansion formerly known as McLean's. Darebin road was then the drive from High street to the slaughter pens. The Croxton Park Hotel, formerly known as the Pilgrim Inn, was originally called the Red House and was conducted by Donald Dinnie, the old Scotch wrestler, who walked abroad in national costume and entertained sporting and athletic fans including his wrestling opponent, Professor Miller, who, by the way, is still alive in America.

Robertson (Sec. of Australian Red Cross), and the latter gave an interesting address on Red Cross work, stating that the Junior Branch had subscribed a year's salary for an almoner to attend to infantile paralysis at the Children's Hospital. She also spoke of the work done by the Red Cross ladies from the depot at the State Relief, Spencer street, sorting and packing all clothing sent out to various unemployed relief centres.

A brief outline of Dorcas work was given by Mrs. M. A. Dennis, who complimented the auxiliary on their hospital work.

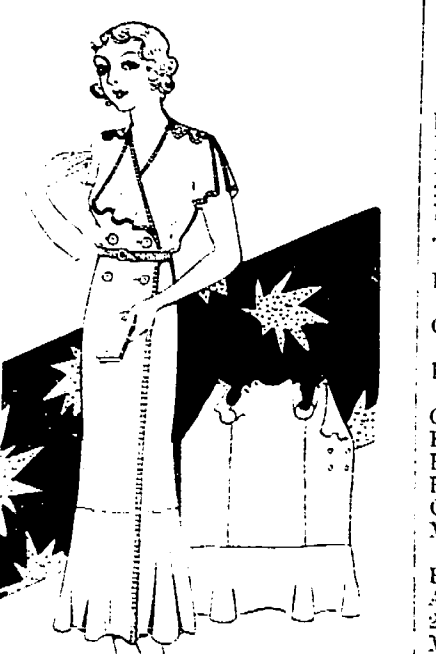

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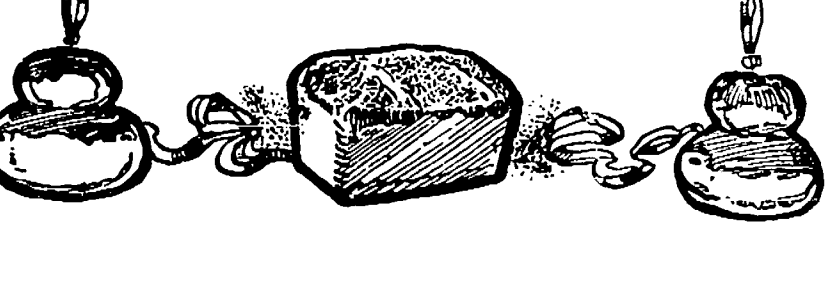

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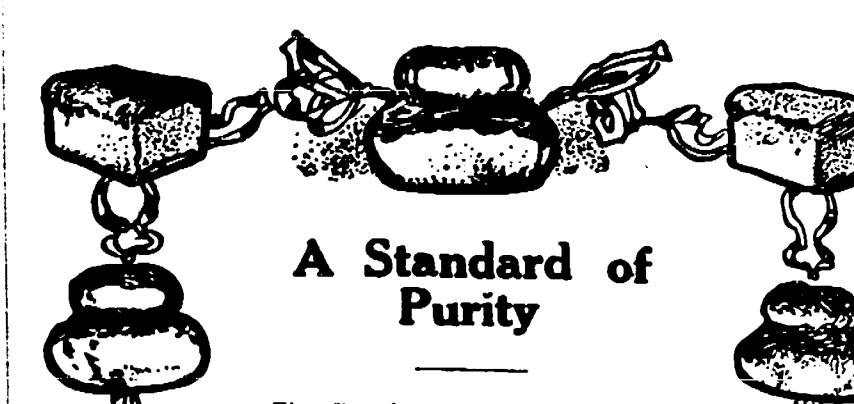
