Ejectments
The State Savings Bank obtained an ejectment order against Ann Smith Sylvester grove Preston. This property was subject to a contract of sale and the payments were in arrears to the extent of two years. Ejectment order was also made against James Major, Madeline street East Preston.

Theft of Stove
Frank Jones, Thyne street, Carlton and John Barnett were each charged that on October 31 they stole a fire stove, valued at £2, the property of John Buchan and Co.

Henry Crozier, builder and contractor, employed by John Buchan and Co. said: "About three weeks ago I went through a house, the property of my employers, at Bricknell street, Reservoir. When I again visited the house on November 3 a stove was missing."

William O'Byrne, dairyfarmer Berwick street, Reservoir, said: "At about 1.30 p.m. on October 31 I saw the two accused drive up in a lorry to an empty house in Bricknell street, Reservoir. The two men went round the back of the house and after about 20 minutes the lorry was taken to the side of the house, and the two men carried something heavy from the house. I rode over and shut the gate of the paddock in which Bricknell street is. When the men saw me shutting the gate they drove off in the opposite direction to a dead end of the paddock. I followed and asked what they had on the lorry and what they were doing in the empty house. Jones said 'If we 'work it back' will you let us go?' I agreed. The men drove back and took off the stove. I also insisted that they also unload a copper, which they protested did not belong to the house. I again saw the men in St. George's road, Croxton, about an hour later. They had a copper and frame on the lorry, although there had been nothing on it when they left my place."

Senior Constable Joiner, of Reservoir, said: "On October 31 at about 2 p.m. I intercepted the two accused on a lorry in St. George's road. I said to Jones 'Why did you steal the stove and copper from Bricknell street, Reservoir?' He said: 'Things are tough and we wanted to make a few shillings. Barnett agreed in this answer. I enquired as to where the men had got a copper which was then on the lorry. They said: 'From an empty house,' adding that they did not know where it was."

Constable Brady, of the motor cycle patrol, gave similar evidence. Both men pleaded guilty and elected to be dealt with summarily. Each man admitted prior convictions. The P.M. said that the public must be protected against men of this type who deliberately went about robbing empty houses. There was no sudden temptation in these cases. Each man was sentenced to imprisonment for three months.

Unlawful Possession Charge
Barnett and Jones pleaded guilty to a charge of unlawful possession of a copper stand on October 31 and on a fourth charge that on October 31 at Reservoir, they had in their possession a copper suspected of having been stolen, each pleaded not guilty.

Frank Jones, Thyne street, Carlton denied that he ever had the copper in his possession. Each man was convicted and sentenced to imprisonment for one month on each charge of unlawful possession, and the two latter sentences were made concurrent.

PENDER'S GROVE AND DAN MORGAN, BUSHRANGER

Old identities will remember that Pender's Grove derived its name in connection with a strip or grove of wattle trees planted by Pender Bros., the original owners, in the early seventies. The grove faced the main road and extended from the Junction to Watson's blacksmith's shop near Separation street.

The paddock, at that period, virgin bush, now the eastern section of Thornbury and Croxton, was then thickly covered with huge trees and scrub, with tracks here and there, mostly leading toward the creek at the back, and for the boys of that generation, armed with shanghais or guns, was a happy hunting ground for parrots, possums, etc. It is a striking commentary on the development of Northcote, yet hard to realise, that this area now enjoying all the modern conveniences of transport, electric lighting, water supply, sanitation by sewerage, scientifically constructed roads and paths, schools, churches, &c., was, within the memory of many, almost a part of the forest primeval.

When the village settlement scheme was in operation, this paddock was selected for that purpose, but like most of government enterprises in that direction, it was unsuccessful. Later on the area was surveyed into streets, and residential blocks and its rapid development speaks for itself.

If my readers will forgive the personal note, the writer would like to state that when a boy, he once lost his bearings and was for a short while bushed in Pender's paddock. Recently he was again bushed in the maze of streets and forest of houses in about the same spot. On this occasion, after enquiring the way to a certain address from an elderly gentleman passing, I commented on the past and present aspect of the locality and then the floodgates of memory were opened and after an interchange of old reminiscences he referred to the fact that one of the first settlers in Pender's grove was a butcher whose establishment was near the spot on which we then stood. In those days the meat was slaughtered on the premises and it was here that the notorious outlaw, Dan Morgan started his career of crime developing into bushranging and murder. It is said that whilst employed here Morgan supplemented his wages with cattle duffing, secretly killing sheep and cattle and burying the skins and offal at the then unoccupied back of the paddock, near the creek, and disposing of the meat by the aid of accomplices. After a time suspicion was aroused, and Morgan was caught red-handed, convicted, tried and sentenced to a term of imprisonment in Pentridge. In the meantime settlement was progressing and after his liberation, Morgan came back to the scene of his former activities and took on a job at stonebreaking on the side of one of the roads then in the course of formation through the settlement.

In a short time, however, Morgan abandoned hard work, and soon became known as a bushranger, notorious for his ruthlessness, cruelty and disregard for human life. This is undoubtedly a sordid rather than romantic episode in connection with Pender's Grove, yet it brings into strong relief the past conditions that rendered possible a practice usually associated with the back blocks with the present quiet, orderly and protected business and domestic life transacted in the same area.

Before closing I would like to refer briefly to the corresponding area opposite Pender's paddock and now the western section of Thornbury and Croxton. At the time of which I write this area from about Arthurton road to the Junction, was then occupied solely by Messrs Job Smith and — the former dairy farmers, "Pritchard's" Abbatoirs and the Pilgrim Inn, afterwards the Red House and now the Croxton Hotel. The transformation to its present development has been more rapid owing largely perhaps to railway facilities and the other main artery St. George's road. Perhaps the reason

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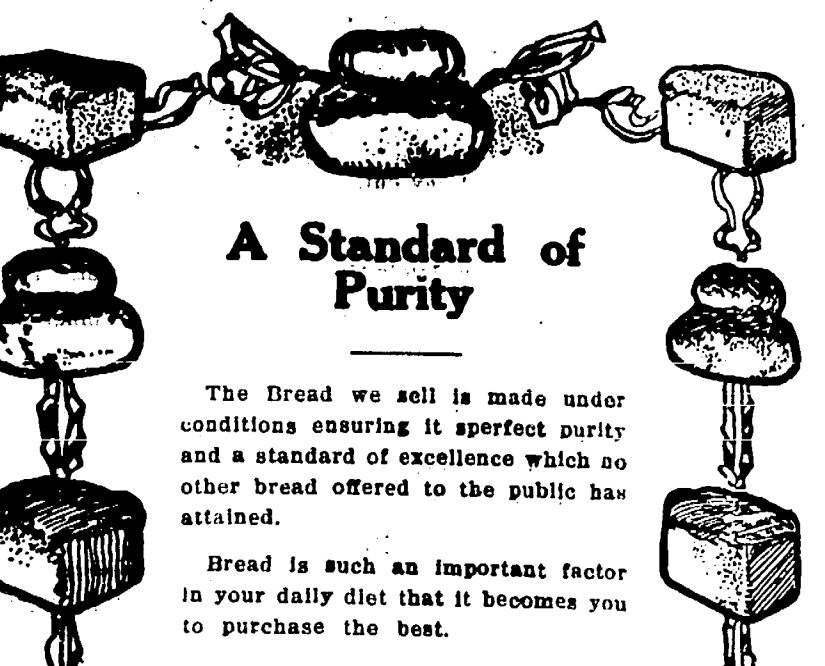
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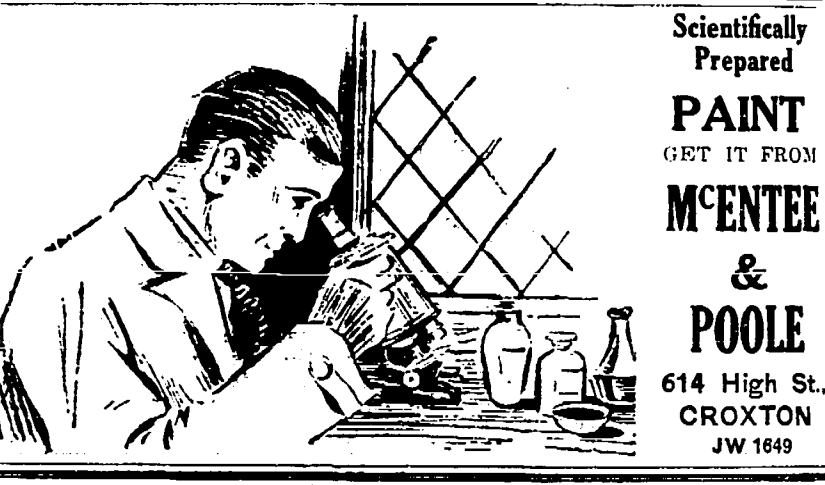

Radio in Czechoslovakia

There were 385,796 listeners in Czechoslovakia on January 1, 1932. This was an increase of 69,565 or 22 per cent. since January 1, 1931, when there were 315,241 listeners. This increase shows that radio is becoming more popular in this country.

Statistics from the British Ministry of Commerce show that more than thirty million receivers are in use all over the world. In addition there were used for the first time during stations.

Radio in Argentina

According to the latest statistics, the number of listeners in the Argentine has increased to half a million, notwithstanding the very severe economic conditions which that country is undergoing. Since the Argentine population amounts to approximately 11 million, about five per cent. of the total inhabitants are enjoying the possession of a radio set.

Microphone Professor

France has created a new title, that of Professor of Microphone! The first one to be endowed with this title is Mr. E. Andreu, who teaches radio and music at the Academie de Musique at Paris.

Radio Speech

The Pope will shortly make a speech through the microphone of the Vatican in the Latin language. This speech will be about the economical position of the world.

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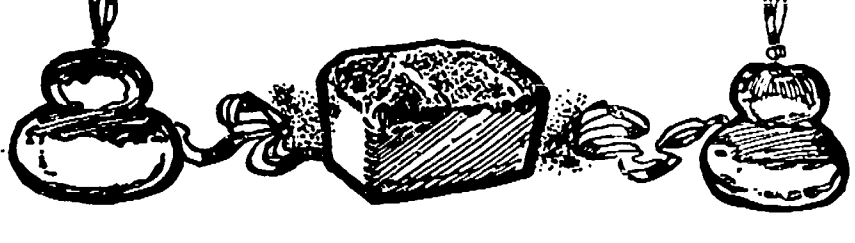

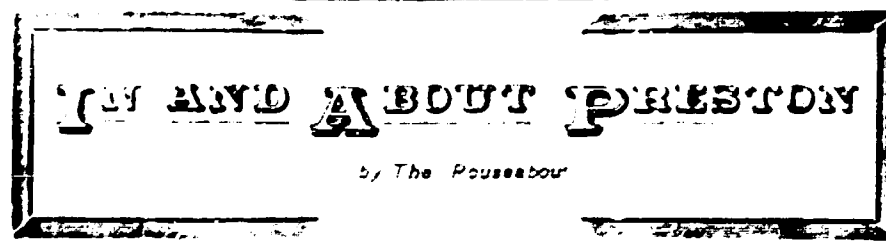
