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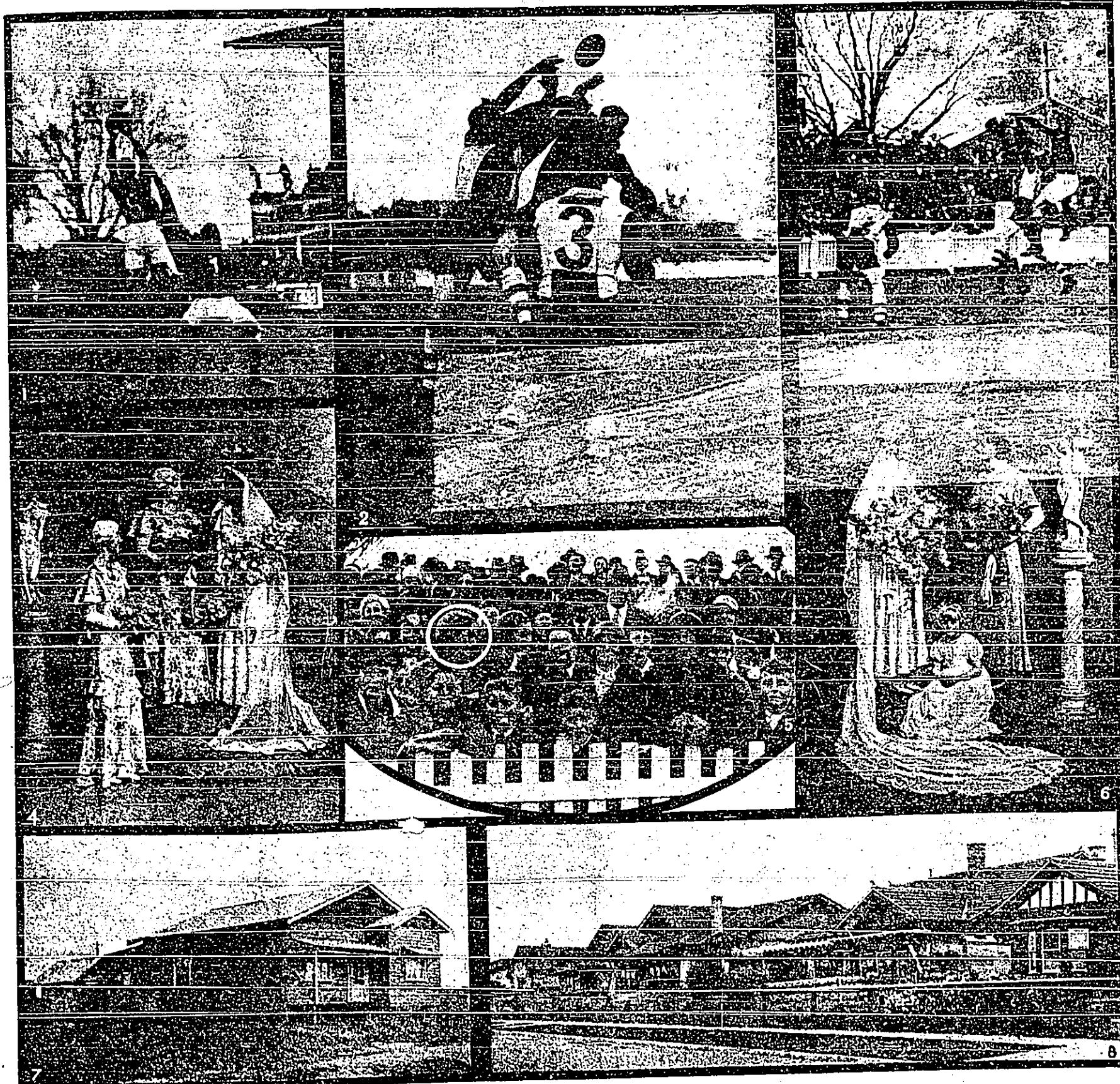

PAYMENT OF MUNICIPAL RATES

Saturday, June 10, is the last day upon which municipal rates may be paid in order to avoid paying six months' interest.

The Local Government Act provides as follows:—"If all sums payable in respect of rates made at three months intervals before the tenth day of June in any year, are not paid before or on that day, interest in respect of the said rates (calculated from the day on which such rates became payable) shall become payable immediately after that day, and further, every person who on the tenth day of June in any year is of the full age of twenty-one years and is liable to be rated in any year, and is property within any municipal district in respect of which all sums payable in respect of such rates have not been paid, shall be entitled to be enrolled in that year."

The Last Minute Rush

A number of ratepayers are in the habit of waiting until the 10th day of June before paying their rates. Rates received by post after the 10th day of June (even though the envelope shows that the letter was posted on or before that date) will bear six months' interest, and the ratepayer will not be enrolled on the municipal roll.

Opinions at Municipal Association: This subject was fully discussed by the Municipal Association recently and the following opinions were expressed:—Whatever time is fixed for the payment of rates to secure an enrolment, it is better to have it earlier, whether it be the 10th of June or the 11th, or any other date. It rates received by post on the 11th June are accepted, it would be equally logical next year for persons to move their rates in envelopes bearing the postmark of the 11th to be accepted as being paid in time, and so on ad infinitum. The ratepayer has no right of complaint, but he can personally at the office, sending them by a messenger, or through the agency of the post office. Whatever method he employs, it is his province to ensure that they are received in time, that is, before the close of office hours on the 10th June.

"The 10th day of June is not the one and only date for payment of rates—it is the last day of a period of six months. By the 10th June nearly three-fourths of the municipal year has passed, and if every ratepayer elected to withhold payment of his rates until that day the council would have to finance three-quarters of the year by means of bank overdraft, on which it is necessary to pay interest.

Many councils appeal to the good citizenship of their ratepayers to pay rates early and reduce the council's bill for interest. As a matter of fact, rates are legally recoverable 14 days after demand, so that the ratepayer does not pay for six months, but is receiving a concession. If, in his anxiety to save himself the little penny of interest, and avoid showing any consideration to the council, he is by accident or forgery, finds that his payment is made too late, he has no one to blame but himself, and he certainly has no claim on the consideration of the council.

It would be just as logical to urge that the 5 p.m. Sydney express should be regularly delayed until 5.15 p.m. for the benefit of those persons who take the risk of endeavouring to time their arrival to the last minute, and find that, through some unforeseen accident or delay, they are just too late. If rates received by post after the 10th June, and bearing a post mark showing same to have been posted on or before the 10th, were to be regarded as being paid on the 10th, it must be realised there are many places within the Commonwealth, from which letters might be posted on the 10th of June and would not reach the Municipal Office for a week.

If rates are not paid on or before the 10th interest shall be charged. This is a provision of the Act and the Rate Collector must enforce same.

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"NO HOLIDAY" Wife Granted Maintenance Order NOTICE OF APPEAL GIVEN

MARRIED life evidently was no holiday to the Hollidays, to judge from the stories told by man and wife at the Northcote Court on Tuesday. The wife alleged that her husband had been cruel and had neglected her for other women. She alleged that he wanted his wife to return to him. She refused, it evidently being a case of "No Holiday."

The case was one in which Grace Annie Holliday, of the street, Northcote, sued her husband, Charles Henry Holliday, of the corner of Court street, Preston, for maintenance.

Mrs. Holliday said: "I married defendant in 1918, at the time being a war widow with three children. There are no children of the present marriage.

After the marriage my life was unhappy as my husband continually assaulted me and was filthy language. In 1928 he was out of work and went away to Harcourt, where he obtained employment. Three weeks later he came back and gave me some money. After that I did not see him for six months, and he had reason to doubt his fidelity. I forgave him, and for six months we got on well together. After that he began to maltreat me. For two years while he was unemployed I took in boarders to keep the home together. Twelve months ago he again got a position, and up to the time I left we were £3 a week.

One night in February last he struck me twice on the face and I went to a neighbour's for protection. Soon after that he again struck me and I complained to the police. He left me on March 1st, and I struck me and used foul language. On March 10 he told me to 'clear out' and take my — daughters with me. "I am afraid of him and will not return."

Mr. Frank Brennan (for the husband) said:—"When you left did you not take your marriage lines?—No. I didn't want them. You are sure of the date you left?—I think it was March 10. "Waited until I took in boarders. Are you quite sure?—It was a Friday. I waited till I got his wages before I left. (Laughter). "Was that the same day that Harry Raymond left his home?—I don't know."

You know Raymond?—I have known both Raymond and his wife for 10 years. My husband introduced us. Raymond has visited at your present address?—Yes. How many times since you parted from your husband?—About a dozen. He comes to see my son-in-law. Do you know that the breaking up of the Raymond home was attributed to you?—No. You consider yourself a well behaved wife?—I am. Would it be wrong to say that you have frequently been drunk in late years?—It would. Have you ever stayed out at night without explanations?—Only once and then I sought the protection of a neighbour. You saw a lot of Raymond before the rupture with your husband?—Yes. He often visited your house while your husband was from home?—My husband had invited him to come any time. My daughters were always there. You know Raymond and his wife were not friendly?—My husband told me that. Did you know that that unfriendliness was through you?—No. Your husband has maintained you in the past two years?—Yes. Until we parted. Evidence of scenes between Holliday and the wife was given by Mrs. Holliday's daughters.

HUSBAND'S VERSION: Holliday said: "I am a tanner employed by Howe and Co. of Preston, and now earn £39 a week. While working I have always given my wages to my wife. Prior to three years ago there had been trouble between us and we were separated for a time. Since the re-conciliation there has been no serious trouble until recently. I have not assaulted my wife during the past three years, but I have, at times, used bad language when I had been sworn at. "Whatever trouble there is has been caused by my wife, who has been a fairly heavy drinker, and she also gambles. I have known Harry Raymond for about 12 years. He visited my home about once a month until a short time before Christmas, but since then his visits became much more frequent. Sometimes he came whilst I was at work, and he would come there at all hours of the day and night. He always came at about midnight and invited me to have a drink. I refused, but my wife got out of bed saying 'if

Jubilee Queen Coronation BRILLIANT AND IMPRESSIVE CEREMONY

£1,149 RAISED BY QUEENS

NORTHCOTE Town Hall wore an air of gravity on Wednesday evening when, to the subdued chime of cathedral bells, the winning Queen (Miss Irene Dennis) Queen of the South was crowned. This coronation was the culmination of the Jubilee Celebrations, and was carried out with pomp and majesty. The amount raised by the three Queens was £1,149/12/5, which goes to the Northcote Public Assistance Committee for the relief of unemployed.

During the past two months the committees of the Queens of the North, Centre, and South have worked assiduously to raise funds and many functions have been held with this object in view. The climax was reached on Wednesday night when Miss Irene Dennis (Queen of the South) was crowned Queen of Northcote for receiving £33,624 (1932/33). Miss Etta Johnson (Queen of Central) received 80,490 votes (£335/7/6); and Miss Mavis Jones 55,725 votes (£232/3/4). There was a grand and incidental music was played by Mr. Ron Bohme's orchestra.

Presentation of Trophies The Mayor (Cr. A. H. Oldis, J.P.) made the presentation of cups and trophies won for various events of cycling and racing at the sports carnival on May 20 at the Northcote Park.

THE ENTRY Heralded by four members of the Melbourne Fire Brigade in period costume, the Lord High Chancellor entered and took his place on the platform. Eight dancing girls followed and the music was played by the orchestra. They were Misses Audrey Hamilton, Pat Bourke, Amy Laird, Norma Hamilton, Audrey Scarfe, May Chapman, Bonnie Kellett, and Renea Bower.

Preceded by two courtiers and a maid of honor, the Queen of the North entered with her six maids and took her place on the right of the platform surrounded by her court. Next came the Queen of the Centre, preceded by two courtiers and a maid of honor and followed by her six ladies, forming a group on the left of the stage. Led by two courtiers and a maid of honor the Queen of the South entered next and with her six attendant maids took up her position on the left side of the royal throne.

The Queens were introduced by the Lord High Chancellor who also announced the number of votes each queen received to the plaudits of the assemblage.

THE CROWNING With due ceremony and stately dignity the Queen of the South, the winner, was led forward by the Lord Chancellor, presented to the assembly and bowed into the Royal Throne. A rich red ermine-trimmed train was then brought in by the dancing girls, followed by the crown and sceptre borne by a courtier. A canopy, held by four stalwart bearers, was then carried in and held over the Royal Queen. When all was in readiness the Mayor performed the crowning ceremony with the assistance of the Lord High Chancellor.

PRESENTATIONS In thanking the Queens and their committees for the excellent results achieved and their splendid efforts, the Mayor also congratulated the citizens who so nobly stood behind the whole Jubilee function, which had culminated in such satisfactory financial results. The Jubilee committee had decided to give a memento to each Queen and he had pleasure in presenting a crystal toilet set to each queen as a token of remembrance.

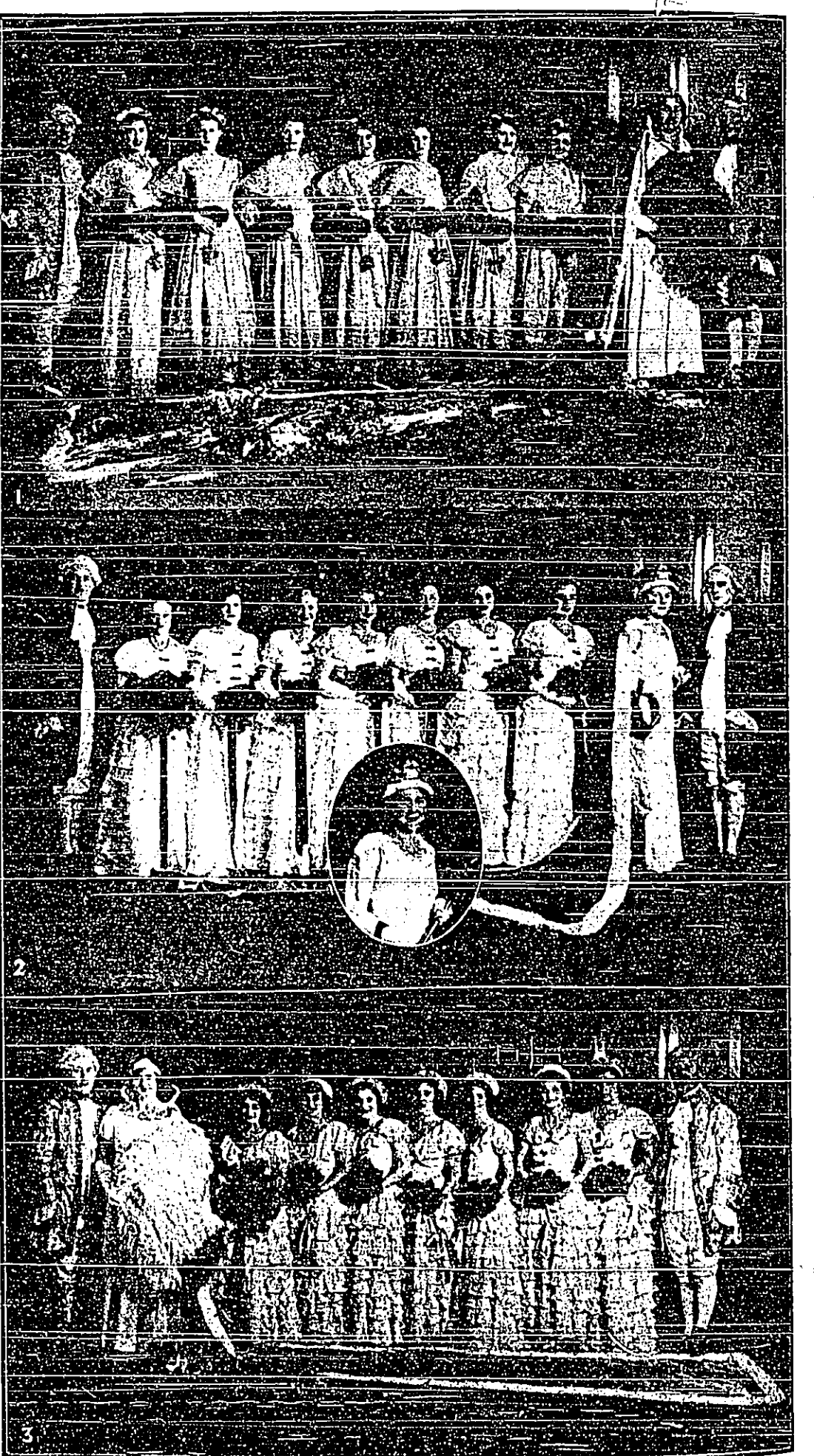

William Hodgkinson, as agent for the owner, obtained ejectment orders against L. Tyler, Westgate street, Northcote; H. Butler, Naroon road, Alphington.

No Lights Robert W. Allan, Bartley street, East Brunswick, charged that on April 15 he rode an unlighted bicycle in the main road, and fined £1. Ernest Hill, 11th street, Brunswick, who, on the morning of April 15 drove an unlighted milk cart, was fined £1/10.

Four on Motor Cycle Lindsay John Hedley, Melville street, North Fitzroy, was charged that on April 16, being the driver of a motor cycle, he was in such a position as not to have full control of the machine.

Traffic-Constable Stevenson said: "On April 16 I was on duty in High street when I saw defendant in control of a motor cycle. He was sitting right upon the tank and there were three others on the machine. I stopped defendant and said to him: 'How do you change gears?' He said: 'With my foot.' It is possible to do so. The machine was a solo motor cycle, and there were four on it. From his position defendant could not efficiently control the machine."

Cross-examined.—Is it not a fact that machines of this type are made so that gears can be changed by foot?—It has a long gear handle.

How were the men seated?—One on the pillion seat, one on the nudguard, one on the seat and defendant on the tank.

Did it take me long to stop when halted?—No, 10 to 15 yards.

What was his speed?—15 to 20 m.p.h.

The P.M.—How do you say that control the machine?—In case of emergency it would take him time to find the brake pedals among the legs on the side of the machine.

Hedley said that he was only travelling very slowly and he had full control of the machine. One foot being on the brake pedal and the other on the gear lever.

A conviction was recorded and a fine of £2 imposed.

Causing Damage Richard Gore, tobacconist and hairdresser, St. George's road and Hutton streets, was charged that on May 13 at Hoppers, where defendant had the management of a common gaming house at St. George's road.

Senior-Constable Thornbury said: "At 1.30 p.m. on May 13 I went to the corner of St. George's road and Hutton street, where defendant had a tobacconist's shop. ISSUED BY THORNBURY DAIRYMAN Percival William Tomkins, dairy man, of Macfield street, Thornbury, issued a Supreme Court writ on May 25 against William Mooney and Albert Alexander Birch of the Queen's Department of Health, Melbourne Bottle Recovery Ltd., and J. Jenner, both of Little Collins street, Melbourne. Jenner is said to be a servant of Melbourne Bottle Recovery Ltd. In the writ Tomkins says that at 3 o'clock on the morning of May 20 Mooney, Birch, and Jenner, together with other persons, the names of whom he does not state, stopped in a street a cart containing a quantity of milk belonging to him, and detained, and removed to bottles, in doing those acts Mooney and Birch pretended that they were acting in the execution of the Health Act, or for the purpose of executing it. Tomkins denies that they were acting in the execution of the act or bona fide for the purposes of executing it, and he says that they were acting for the purpose of assisting Jenner in carrying out his work as a servant of the company.

Tomkins alleges that because of his property he claims £5,000 damages, and seeks an injunction to restrain the defendants from continuing to do such acts. He asks that the writ be tried before Mr. Justice Kemp and that Mr. Justice Kemp and Mr. Justice Townshend issue the writ on behalf of Tomkins.

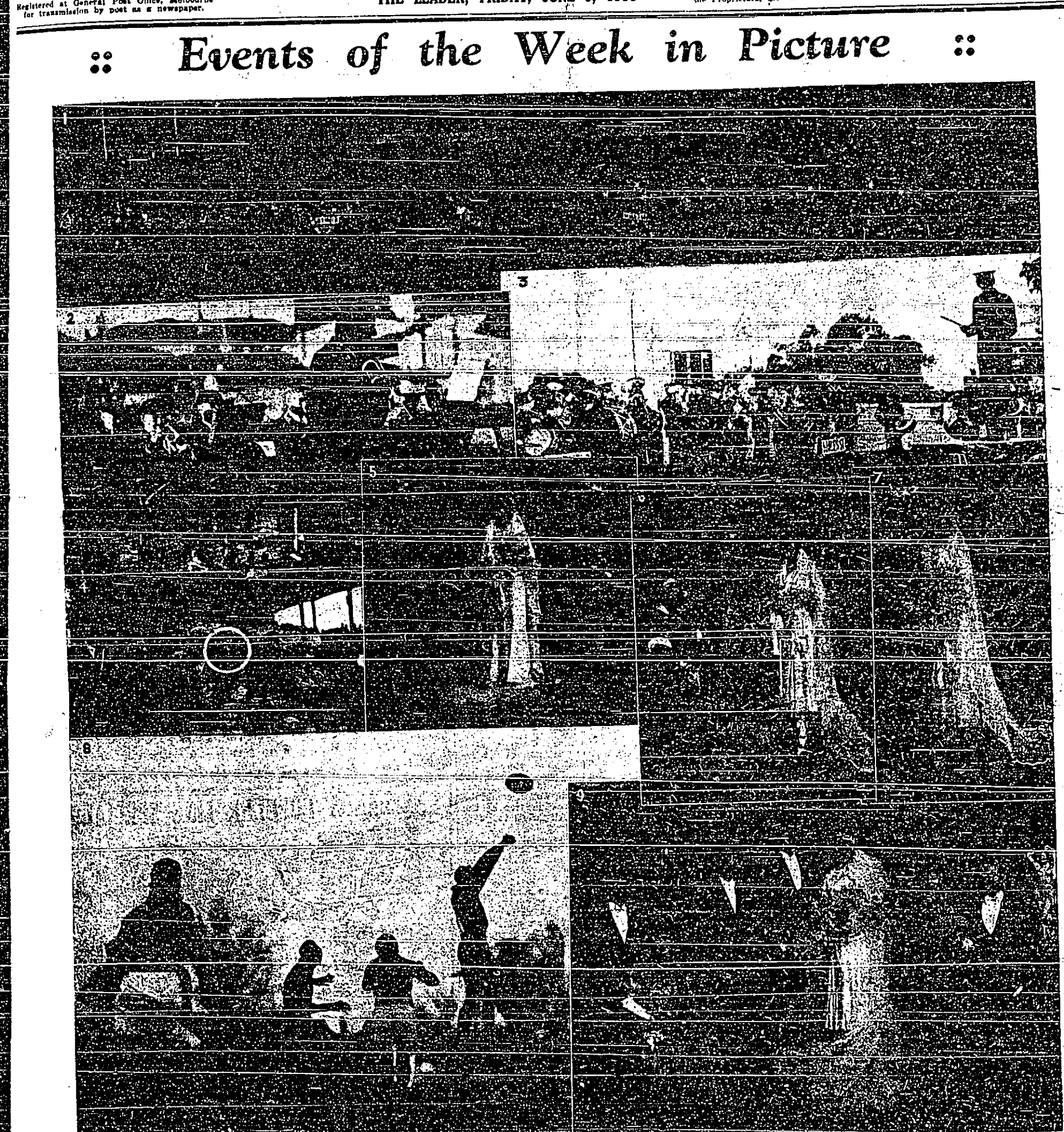

Mr. L. G. Mayfield, timekeeper for Dennis club, charged J. Dennis (Thornbury) for assaulting him, and Patrick (Thornbury) for assaulting and kicking R. Mayfield (Dennis). Umpire's Evidence. In evidence presented that from the start of the game he had to penalize Thornbury players for kicking in danger. They caught hold of Dennis players by the neck, and constantly tripped and pushed them. At half-time Barry deliberately elbowed Thompson, who was awarded a free kick. Immediately he had kicked the ball Barry rushed at him and pushed him violently. Barry refused to leave the field, but he refused to do so. 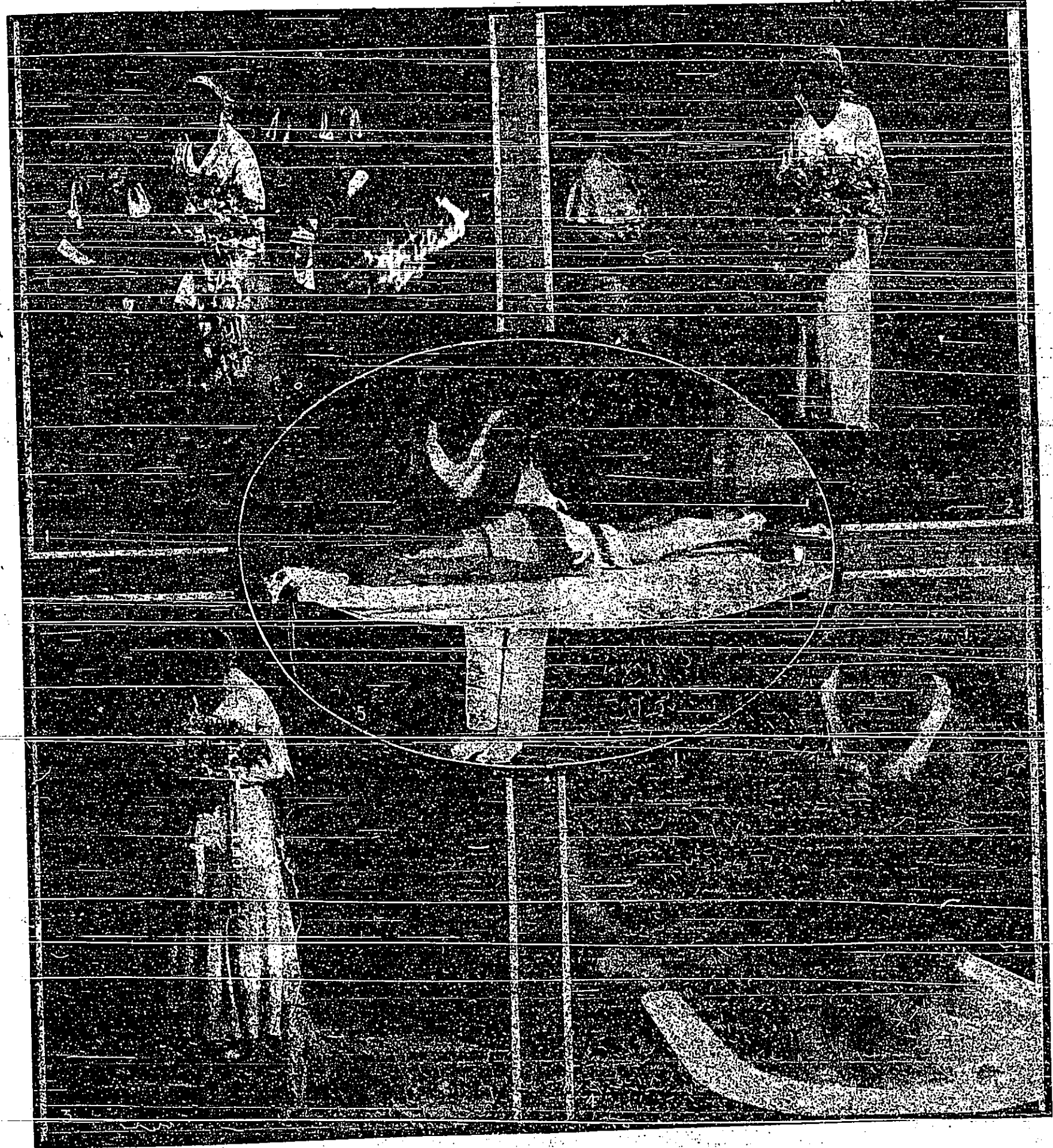

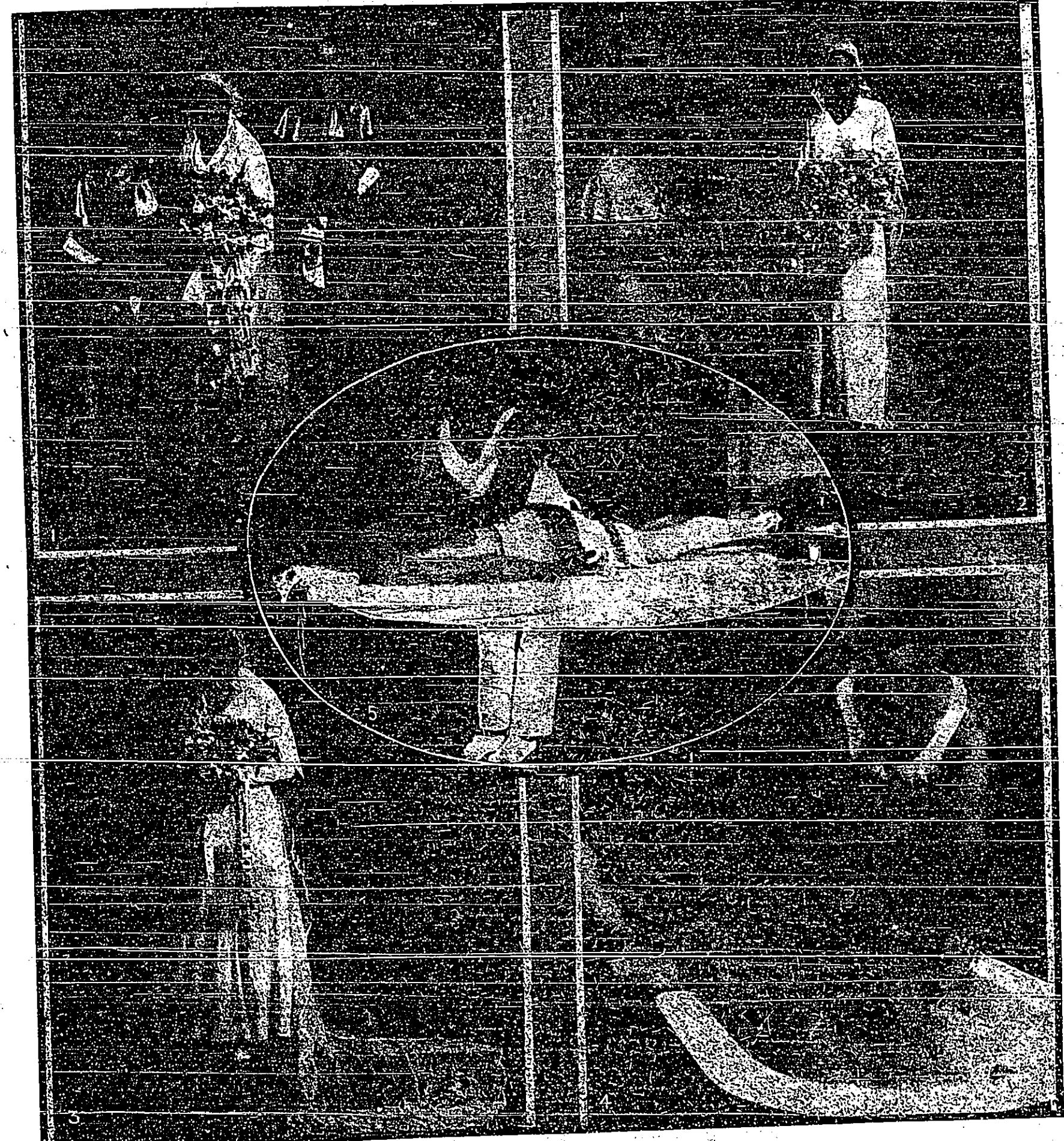

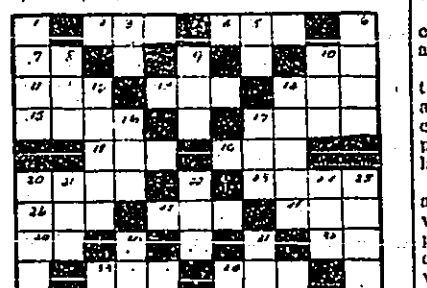

**THURSDAY, JUNE 16**  
Before Mr. G. Brown, P.M., and Mr. T. J. McMahon, J.P.

Leslie Beckett, as agent for owner, obtained an ejectment order against George Fowler.

S. P. Sleith, as agent for the owner, obtained an ejectment order against Gordon Collins.

T. Costin, health officer, Preston, was charged that on May 27, 1932, he sold gelatine which contained an excess of the prescribed amount of preservative (5 grains per lb.) and which was not labelled accordingly.

Mr. R. Wilkinson (Home and Wilkinsons) appeared to prosecute for the Preston City Council, and Mr. A. K. Lonie (Maddock, Jamieson and Lonie) appeared for the defence.

Inspector J. O. Hes said:—I purchased gelatine from Costin, telling him that if it contained an amount greater than 5 grains per lb. the gelatine must be rejected. Analysis showed that the gelatine contained 4.4 grains per lb. and it was not labelled.

Mr. Lonie:—You knew that the Health Commission had granted permission to Davis Gelatine Co. to use up stocks of this nature?

Witness:—I knew there had been negotiations.

Mr. Hes said that it was permissible for the sulphur dioxide content of gelatine to be up to 7 grains per lb., provided it was so labelled. Defendant had re-sold the gelatine as "not labelled when it was bought. A technical offence had been committed.

A fine of £1, with £1/14/10 costs, was imposed.

E. Toakin, High street, Preston, charged with a similar offence, was also fined £1, with £1/15/8 costs.

The facts were similar to those of the former case, except that upon analysis the gelatine was found to contain 2.2 grains of sulphur dioxide per lb. and the substance was not so labelled.

George Albert Brittingham, trading as Bert's Products, Plant street, Malvern, was charged that he sold a package containing imitation vanilla essence, which was not labelled in compliance with the health regulations.

Mr. Wilkinson (representing) paid in this case the essence had been purchased by the health inspector from a local trader in an unopened package, and action had been taken against the importer.

Inspector J. O. Hes said:—On April 27 I purchased a dozen bottles of essence of vanilla from Reeve's grocery store, and after mixing them together the essence into three samples for analysis. The essence complied with the standard for imitation vanilla essence, but the labelling was not in order. (The defendant "artificial" should have been "imitation," and was in the smaller lettering than the word "vanilla.")

Fined £1, with £3/3/ costs.

When the last order was made you knew he was not working?—Not at all. And you issued a warrant of commitment at once because he could not find a surety?—I issued the warrant, but he was not arrested until ten days later.

By what time he had made one payment under the order?—I did not know until later that he had made the payment. That order was subsequently quashed.

You were happy enough with him when he earned £5 to £8 a week, and left him when he fell on evil times?—No. I never complained when he was poor.

Did you complain that he went out at night?—I did. He was a member of the Preston East Ward Progress Association?—Yes, but he left that some time ago. He was also on the executive of the Trades Hall?—Yes.

Witness.—I know his voice. You are quite sure of that?—Yes. Was there not a man that there was a "row" on at Caulfield's, and that Caulfield was murdering his wife?—I remember the occasion.

Why did you rush into the street and tell someone else?—I spoke to a man named Clingis about it. I thought Caulfield was murdering his wife.

THIRD COMMONWEALTH CENSUS

WHY WE NEED A CENSUS

In early times the Census was taken primarily for military or taxation purposes, but the modern Census is used much more generally for administrative, sociological and economic purposes.

A National Stock-taking The periodical count and classification of the people may be considered as a national stock-taking. It is an endeavour to ascertain the stock of human units which constitutes the community; to classify that stock accordingly; to take cognizance of the changes which have taken place in its numbers and characteristics.

Statistical From a statistical point of view the Census is indispensable, since it provides a basis for the standardisation of all other statistics relating to the affairs of the community. Statistics of production, finance, shipping and vital statistics, &c., however carefully compiled, do not attain their full significance until it is possible to relate them to the population affected.

An accurate knowledge of the numbers and distribution of the population is of the utmost value when consideration is being given to public facilities for transport and communication, police protection, or any other of the many services which devolve on the Government. The equal representation of the people in their parliaments, which is fundamental to democracy, requires accurate knowledge of the distribution of the people throughout the country. Whether a community is increasing or diminishing in number; whether the people are concentrating in the towns or spreading over the country; whether existing or proposed expenditures of public moneys are justified by existing or anticipated local populations; whether the production of wealth in any locality represents benefits to a few or many, are questions which demand for their answer the solid basis of fact provided by the census.

Public Health Not least among the advantages of a census is that it enables the risk of disease and death due to sex or age or occupation to be separated from other risks, when it is desired to ascertain the relative healthiness of different communities or of the same community at different times. The health authorities are thus better informed as to significant differences in the prevalence of sickness and death, and the ground is laid to that extent, cleared for them in their search for special causes.

PLANTS OF FATE TROPICAL forests hold many strange plants, or rather plants with strange properties. In the hot lands of South America coca grows. Chemists have made the cocaine from it, but the small, light-green leaves have a bitter, aromatic taste, and the natives dry them and chew them mixed with lime. On nothing but coca a native can work hard for forty-eight hours; yet the leaves have none of the opiate property of cocaine, they are merely a stimulant.

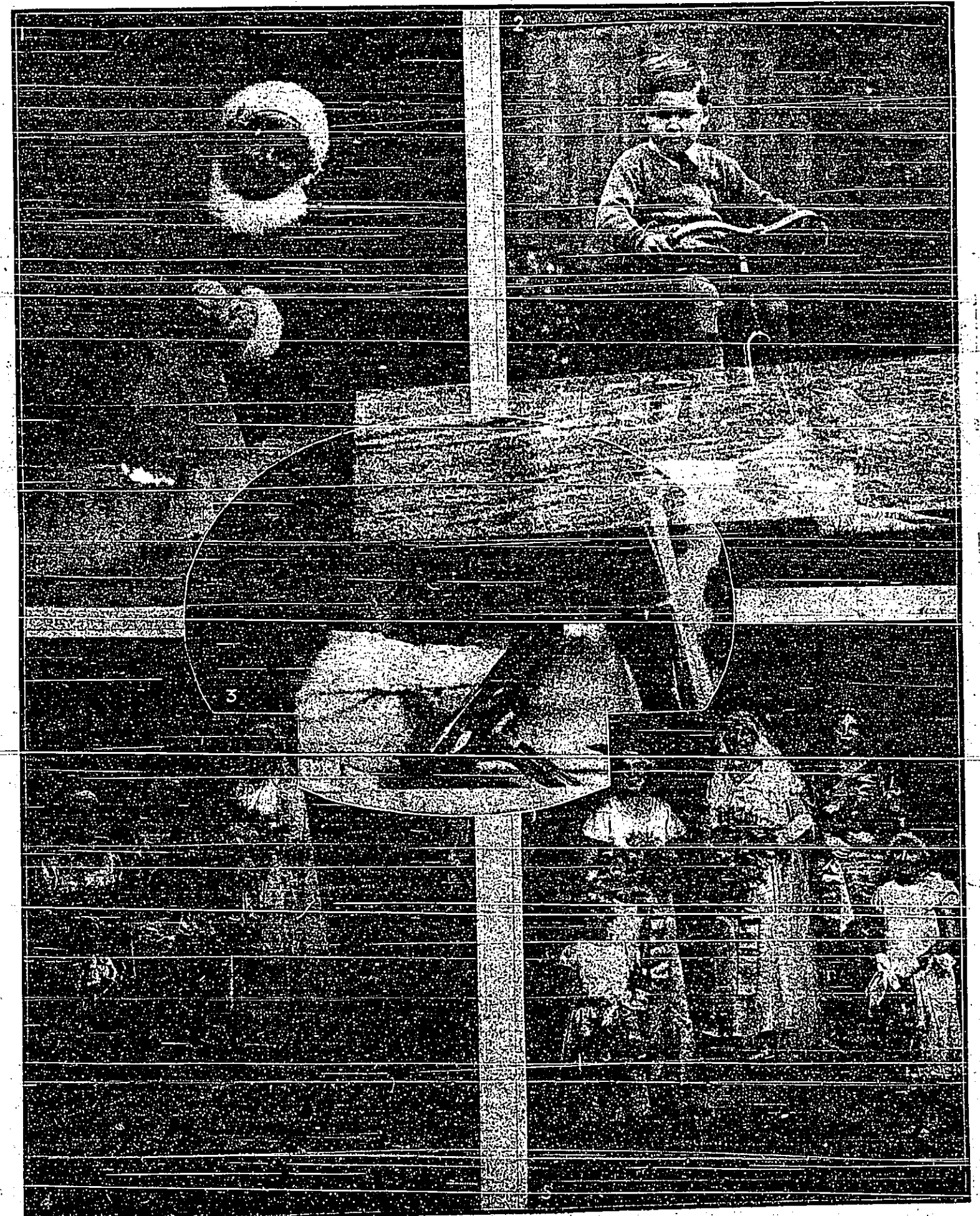
