The Minister was ruling in favor of the G.M.A., when Mr. Lison (V.P.A.) had expressed dissatisfaction with the ruling of the Minister. The Minister's attitude at that stage had been that the Grounds Management Association was to be reduced to a mere advisory body. Mr. Lison had said that the V.P.A. would not agree to those conditions, and the Minister then said that the prices could stand until the end of the season.

"It was astounding," said Cr. Green, "to learn next meeting that the Minister had directed that the Association should be thrown open to the Association football on these terms." Cr. Turner said that it seemed to be a remarkable ruling. "The Minister had said the ground was to be thrown open to the public, and then agreed to increased charges for admission. SMASHING VICTORY
BELAR'S REMARKABLE PERFORMANCE
WINS G.N. HURDLE BY FIVE LENGTHS IN RECORD TIME

Belar registered a smashing victory in the Grand National Hurdle race, with five lengths to spare, and in record time. It was a remarkable performance, and one that will not be forgotten for many long days.

Belar's tearaway tactics broke up the field, and at the end of the first half mile the runners were spread over a furlong. At one stage he had a clear lead of 10 lengths. Five from home, Belar reduced the lead to three lengths, and for a time looked to have a chance of running down the tearaway, but Baanya could not sustain the lead, and was very weary at the finish.

Five from home, Lynden, with 21lb. more weight was 15 lengths behind. He made a game effort from that point but was still five lengths behind as Belar passed the post. Lynden hanging out hampered Lynden for a long way.

The form shown by Lynden on Saturday would have won nine out of ten Nationals. Saturday's was the exception, when he failed to strike a fast, starting lightweight.

Times Compared

To label Belar's performance as remarkable is an exaggeration, as may be judged from the following comparison of times.

PRESTON GIRL GUIDES LOCAL ASSOCIATION
 THE annual business meeting was held on June 22. In an endeavour to arouse interest in other activities were sent to a large number of people to join the Association at afternoon tea, at the Town Hall on June 28 to see the girls do something of the special work of guiding. Mrs. Howe, president of the local association welcomed the visitors and introduced Miss Barfus, who told what guiding meant. Miss Barfus has been in guide work for 13 years—nearly as long as guiding has been in Victoria. Guiding was started in England 22 years ago as the result of girls wanting a movement similar to that of their brothers in the Scouts. A girl of sixteen years was the first to start the movement in Victoria and she had come from England and was very keen. There are now 10,000 guides in Victoria. Guiding is carried on in 35 countries, 22 of them British. There are over one million girls and women associated with the movement. Guiding is a time of training and discipline, as well as a social life. Each girl belongs to a group of eight under a patrol leader. A girl learns the things she wants, when she wants to learn them. She has law and is on her honor. In games the children learn to give and take, and to play for the team, not the individual, and parents realize the good discipline the training teaches.

Girls are graded according to age. From 8 to 11 years the Brownies (captained by Brown Owl), 11 to 16 years the Guides, and 16 to 61 years (no 18) the Rangers. The girls are really self-governed, having their own court of honor (to settle differences), committee work, and their own finances. Then there is the benefit of outdoor work which adds a healthy interest—nature study, hiking, camping etc. This aid companionship and healthy living. The girls are taught to be level-headed and teaches neatness and cleanliness. It is also an outward sign of sisterhood. Miss Barfus said that guides have visited the "Junior League of Nations."

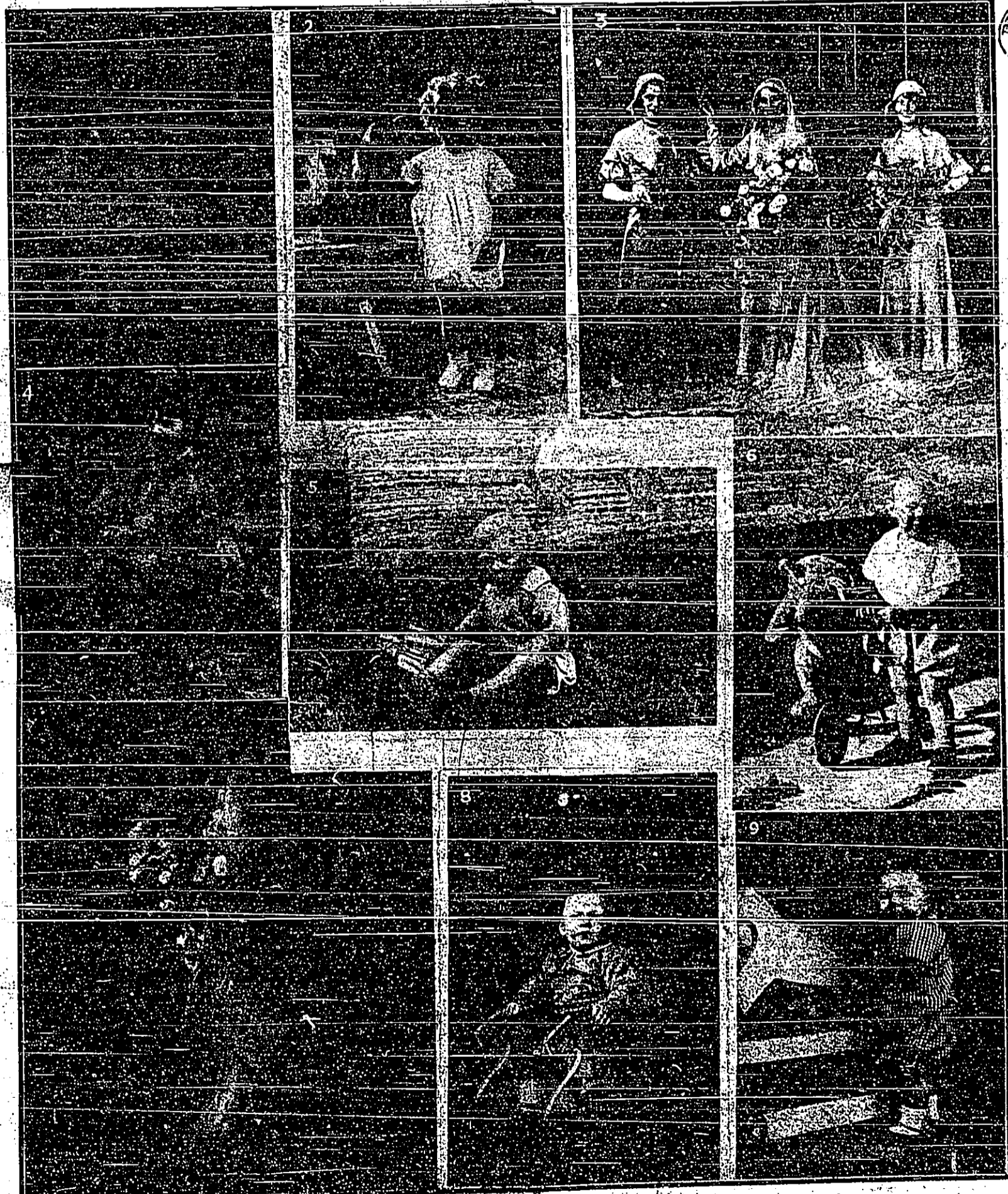

The bold, dashingly, yet almost effortless manner in which Redditch negotiated the five fences in the "lane" caused spectators to realise just what the "thrill of the chase" really means. Redditch completely out-jumped his rivals over these fences, and the jumping had carried him to the front, where he led the straight. Thereafter the race was never in doubt. At no fence did Redditch look like making a mistake, and on the flat he was galloping well to his heart.

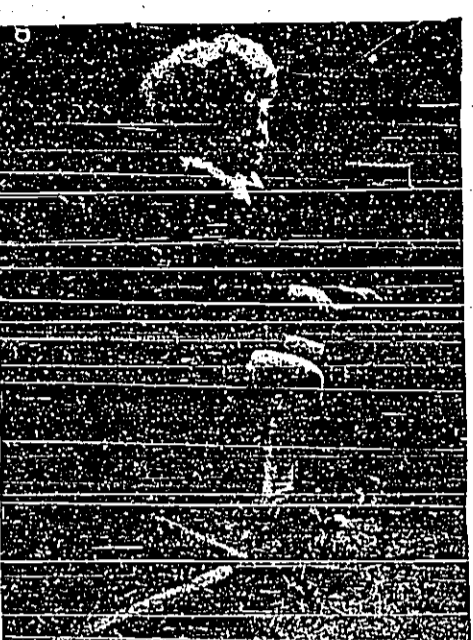

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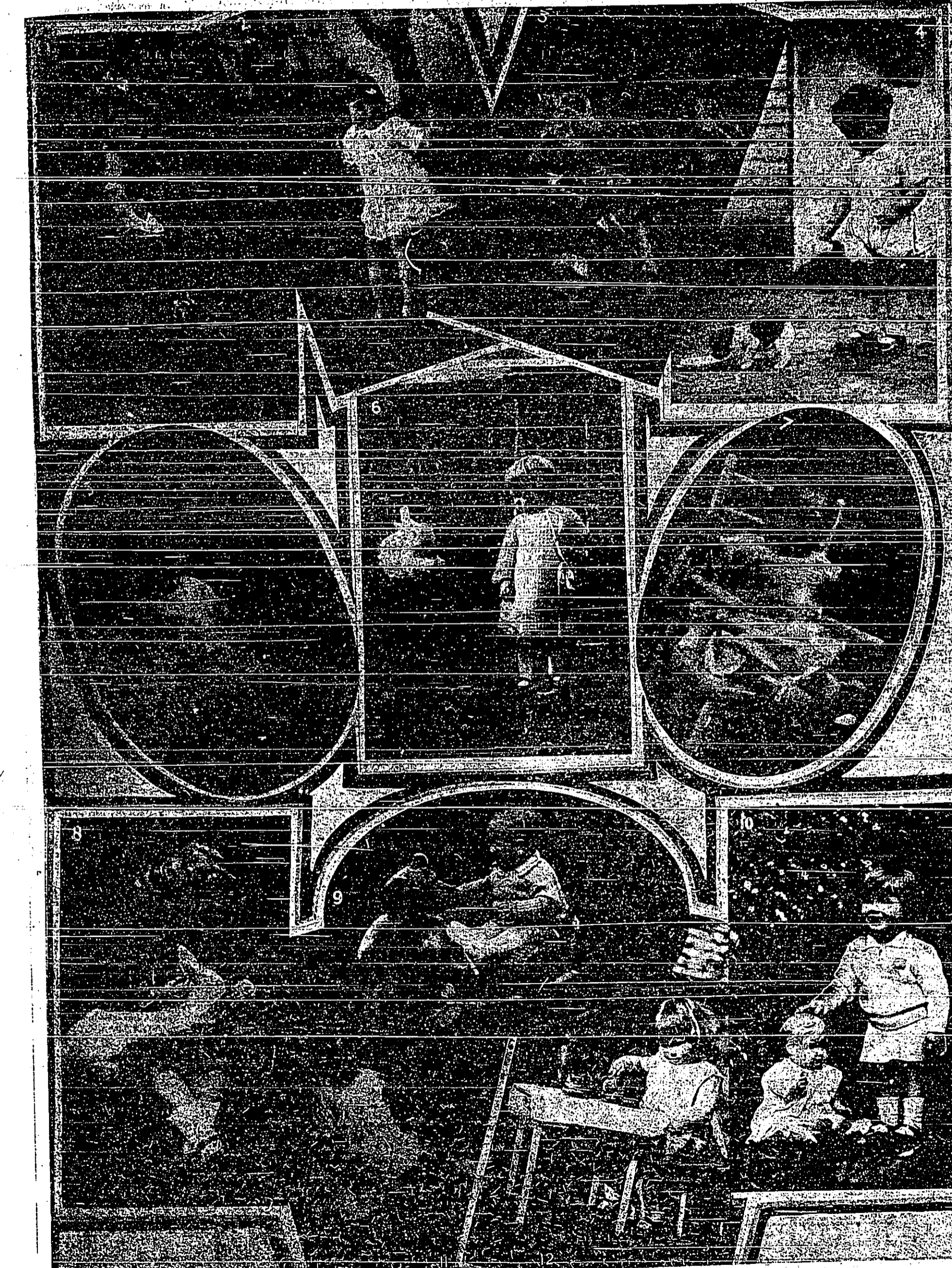

MARMALADE RECIPES

Good Breakfast Marmalade
Nine Seville oranges, two lemons, two sweet oranges, eight pounds of sugar, nine pints of cold water. Cut up oranges and take out all pips. (If the marmalade-cutter is used, cut the oranges in halves, squeeze out juice and remove pips, and press out remainder through the cutter.) Put juice and cut slices together; cover with the cold water and leave to stand twenty-four hours. The pips in a muslin bag and boil gently with the rest until all has been reduced by half. Stand aside till cold, then add sugar and boil again until it jellies.

Ginger Marmalade
One pound of root ginger, two pounds of sugar, half a teaspoon of ground ginger, four pounds of eating apples with peeling and cores, and two quarts of water. Wash apples and cut them into rough pieces. Put into a saucepan, pour the water over them, and boil until apples are pulped. Then strain the pulp into a cloth. To the one-and-a-half pints of the liquid and bring to boiling point; add sugar, ground ginger, and root ginger, cut into small pieces, and boil until the marmalade will set when tested.

Grape-fruit Marmalade
Eight grape-fruit, eight lemons, sugar, four quarts of water. Put grape-fruit into a large saucepan with enough water to come half-way up the fruit. (It seems impossible to cover grape-fruit as they rise in the water and bob about, so it is best to let them sit on the bottom of the pan, then turn them over when one side is done.) Boil slowly until fruit is tender and can be pierced with a fork, and the motif is repeated. Wash lemons and cut them in halves, squeeze out juice and strain into a basin; tie the muslin bag and put these in a muslin bag and slice lemon rind thinly and add it to the juice in basin. Add the cold water and allow to stand overnight. Next day remove the grape-fruit from saucepan and throw away water, in which it was boiled. Cut the grape-fruit in halves, scoop out pulp, put in muslin bag, and squeeze out all juice, discarding the seeds and pulp. Slice the rind of the grape-fruit and put into a preserving-pan with lemons and the juice. Boil slowly until reduced to half. Measure the fruit and add to each one-and-a-half pounds of sugar. Re-boil, add sugar, stir constantly until it has dissolved, then boil slowly from one-and-a-half hours when it is tested on a cold plate.

Mops, Brooms, and Brushes

VACUUM cleaners and carpet sweepers are not for all of us, and even if they were they would not fill all household needs. Some brooms, mops and brushes would still be necessities. The important thing with these is to see that your choice in each case is both economical and labor-saving. A scrubbing brush, especially one for floor work, might well serve as the symbol of drudgery. Some floors still have to be washed and scrubbed (though the floor mop which cleans and polishes may be ideal for others), but it is by no means necessary to use the old-fashioned hand scrubbing brush. There are good long-handled scrubbing brushes with short business-like bristles on the market, and with practical results are as good with these and infinitely less tiring than with a hand scrubber. Long-handled hard and soft brushes may be used instead of the short hand brushes, and no more kneeling is necessary. A miniature long-handled broom, rather like a doll's broom is useful for sweeping up in odd corners when floors are stained or covered with linoleum.

All hard brushes are improved by a bath of salt and water. Immerse and leave the brush in cold salted water for about an hour and dry off. If this is done when the brush is new and before it is used, its life will be more than doubled, whether it is the cheaper or a more expensive variety.

Big washing mops, ideal for kitchen use, especially when one is working constantly round the sink are splendid for mopping up water that gets spilt and for giving the kitchen or bath-room quick wash-over, though they are not of course, quite so effective from a cleaning point of view as the short-bristled scrubbing brushes.

Cleaning or polishing mops and those which serve the double purpose, are of course, best for the floor surface which is kept polished. While on the subject of brushes, the very small varieties should not
