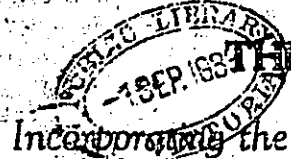

MUNICIPAL YEAR CLOSES

NEW MAYORS AND COMMITTEES ELECTED

SEPTEMBER marks the beginning of the new civic year when new mayors are installed by retiring mayors, and fresh committees elected. Last Monday saw statutory council meetings held in both Northcote and Preston, when Cr. M. C. Jones and Cr. H. P. Zwar, M.L.A., were respectively installed as mayor.

NORTHCOTE

A STATUTORY meeting of the Northcote City Council was held on Monday morning at 10 a.m. to fix the mayoral allowance and elect a mayor and committees for the coming year. Present were Crs B. E. Johnson, A. H. Oldis, W. Oliver, W. Glanfield, J. O. Hughes, W. Turner, M. C. Jones, A. J. Cornish, J. Sutch, A. Peters, W. Hayes, and S. Dennis, M.I.R.

Apologies were received from Crs Green, McAdam and Bird. Cr Oldis was appointed chairman. Mayoral Allowance.—Cr Johnson moved that the allowance be £300 Cr Dennis seconded.—Carried.

Election of Mayor.—Cr Oliver nominated Cr M. C. Jones, whom he said, had given the city splendid service as a councillor; he was a man of ability, was well liked by his colleagues, and the dignity of the council would be well maintained in his hands.

Cr Hayes supported the nomination.

There was no other nomination and Cr Jones was elected unanimously.

Cr Oldis, in installing Cr Jones as Mayor, investing him with robes and chain, congratulated Mayor Jones upon attaining the highest position the city council could offer. He wished him a most successful year and said that with his ability and the co-operation of the councillors, officers, and citizens, he would have a most successful term.

Mayor Jones said that he was proud to be the Mayor of the city. If the spirit of good comradeship among the councillors was maintained to the end of his term, he would be satisfied. Former mayors had set a high standard, and he, with the Mayoress, would endeavour to maintain that plane.

Election of Committees.—To consist of the whole of the members of the council.

P.W. Committee.—Crs Green, Dennis, Oldis, Turner, Hughes, Oliver and Sutch.

Finance Committee.—Crs Johnson Hayes, McAdam, Bird, Peters, Cornish and Glanfield.

E.L. Committee.—Crs Turner Green, Oldis, Hayes and Cornish.

Parks and Gardens Committee.—Crs Peters, McAdam, Oliver, Glanfield, and Hughes.

At the conclusion of the meeting Mayor Jones entertained those present in the Mayor's room. The loyal toast was honored, and the health of the Mayor and Mayoress was toasted at the instance of Crs Cornish and Hughes.

PRESTON

A statutory meeting of the Preston City Council was held on Monday morning for the purpose of electing a mayor and committees for the ensuing year. The mayoral allowance was fixed at £350.

The retiring Mayor (Cr A. E. Newton) was appointed chairman.

In moving that Cr H. P. Zwar be elected for the ensuing year Cr J. W. Adams commented upon the sterling qualities of Cr Zwar saying he was fully equipped to occupy the positions of mayor and chief magistrate of the city. Cr Zwar had had vast experience in public life and had just received the renewed confidence of residents of the Central Ward.

The motion was seconded by Cr G. H. Mott and carried unanimously.

An ovation was accorded to Cr Zwar as he rose to thank the council for the honor which had been conferred upon him. The Ex-Mayor installed Cr Zwar in the mayoral chair and invested him with the robes of office. In going so, Cr Newton, on behalf of the council,

offered to the new mayor the congratulations of the council, and wished him a pleasant term. Cr Zwar was a very busy man, and had done much to assist Preston to progress, and it was fitting that he should now be placed in the highest position which it was in the power of the ratepayers and the council to bestow (Applause).

That Cr Zwar was held in high esteem in the district was shown by the fact that he had been elected as a representative of the Heidelberg Electorate in the Victorian State House, and had shown himself as a man of marked ability. In conclusion Cr Newton said that his mayoral term, which had just drawn to a close, had been pleasant, and he expressed the hope that Cr and Mrs. Zwar, as Mayor and Mayoress, would have an equally enjoyable term (Applause).

The new Mayor was congratulated by each councillor in turn.

In responding, Mayor Zwar said that he realised the great honor which had been paid to the new Mayor and himself, and he thanked the council for the trust and confidence imposed in them. He realised that he had much to learn, but at all times would do his best to uphold the honor and uplift the prestige of the city. He had seen Preston grow from small beginnings, and was proud that he had played some small part in assisting that progress. With the co-operation of the councillors and officers, he anticipated a pleasant term, and the Mayoress also would with the co-operation of the ladies, do her part.

Public Works.—All councillors.

After the newly-elected councillors had been welcomed and congratulated those present retired to the mayor's room.

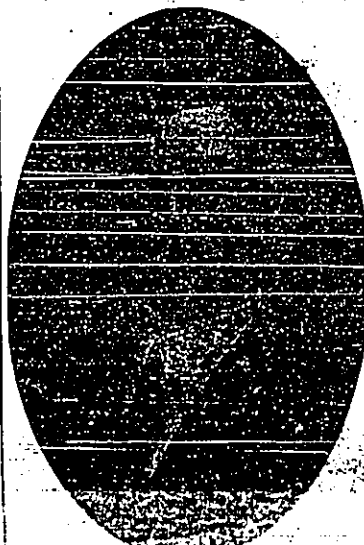

How well these celebrations were carried out, gaining for the city added prestige and widespread publicity, is too recent to need comment. During the year Northcote has added a mayoral chain to the insignia of its chief citizen. One has only to look at a child study taken, say, 20 years ago, and hear the remarks of the child itself.

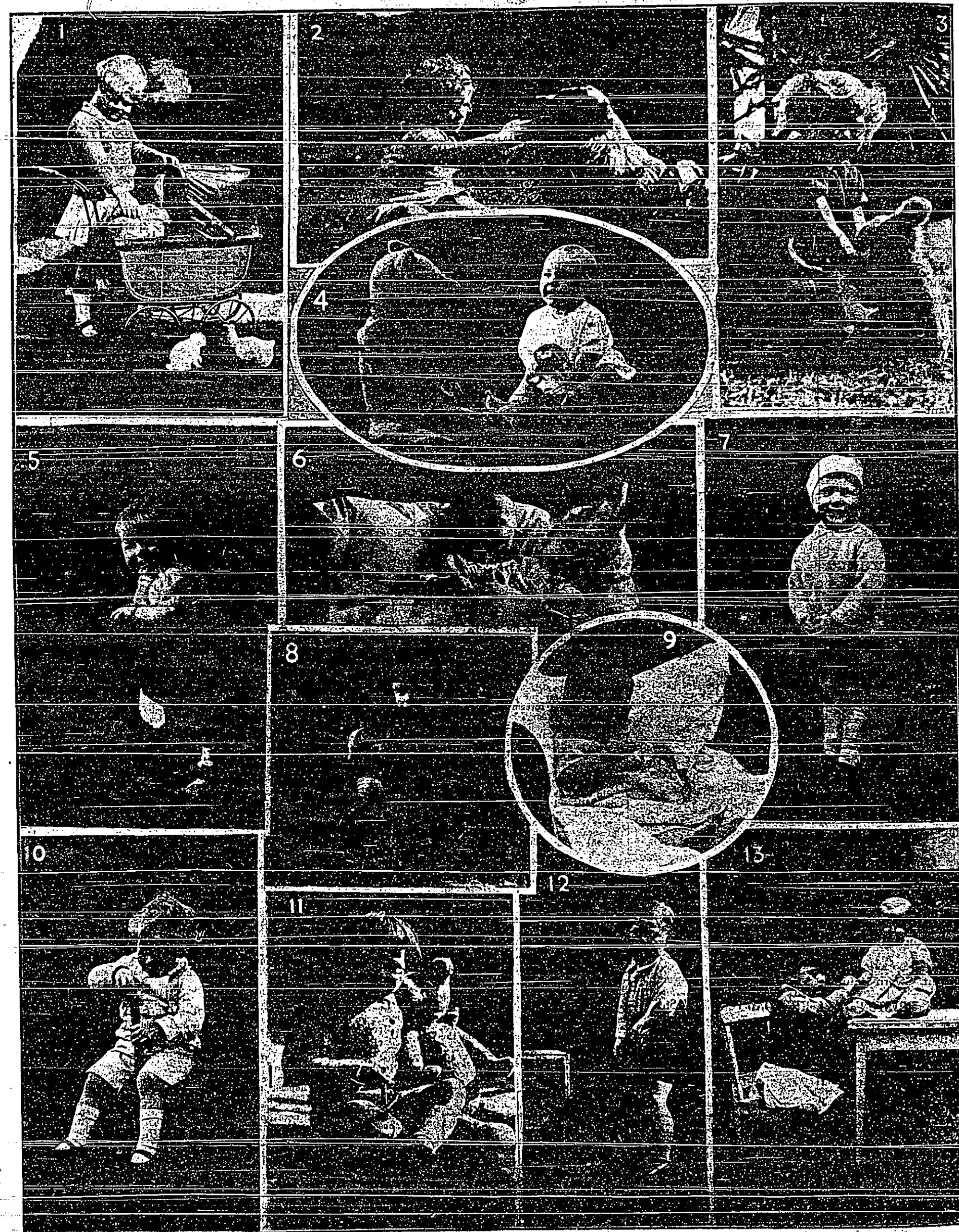

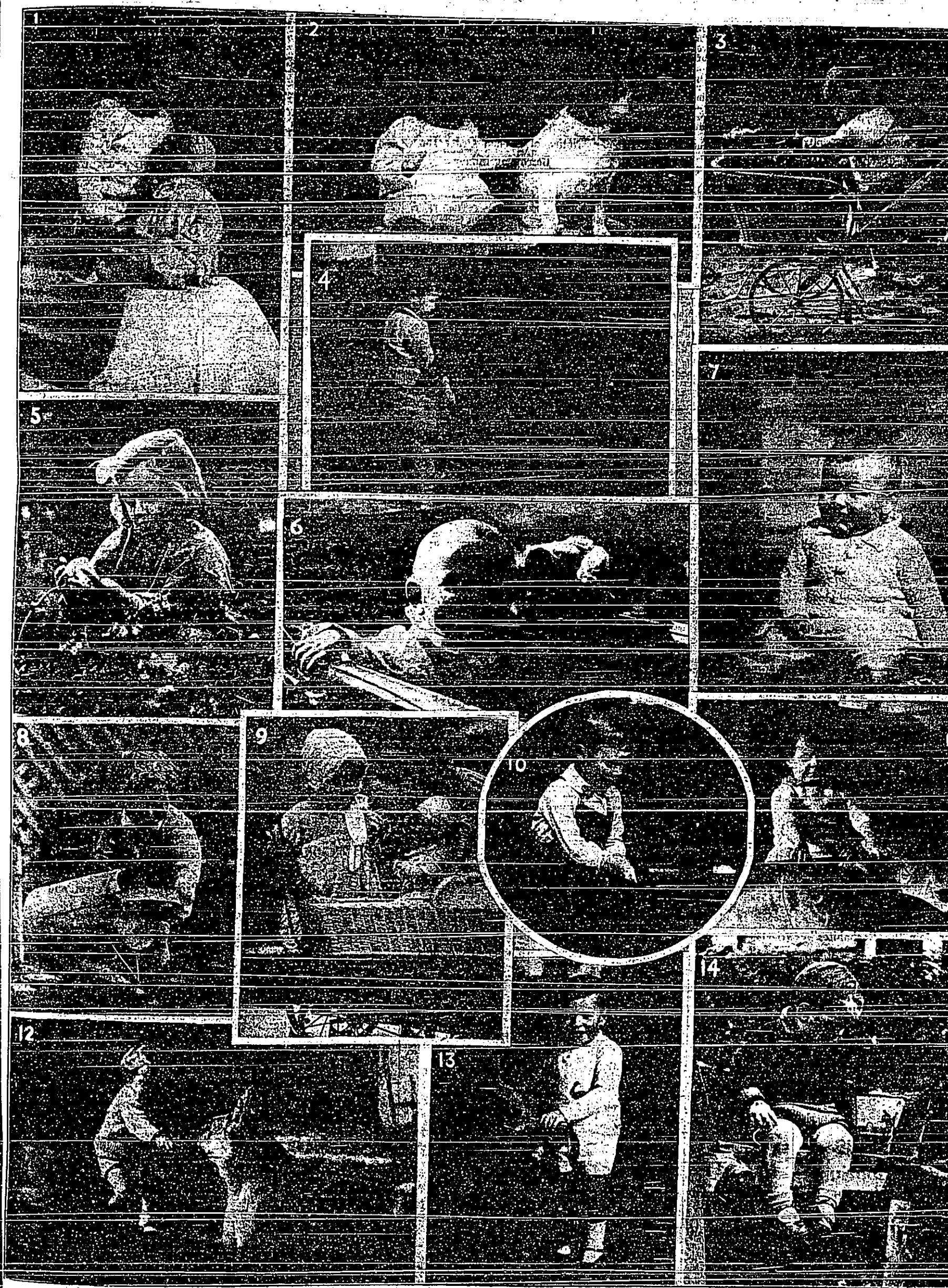

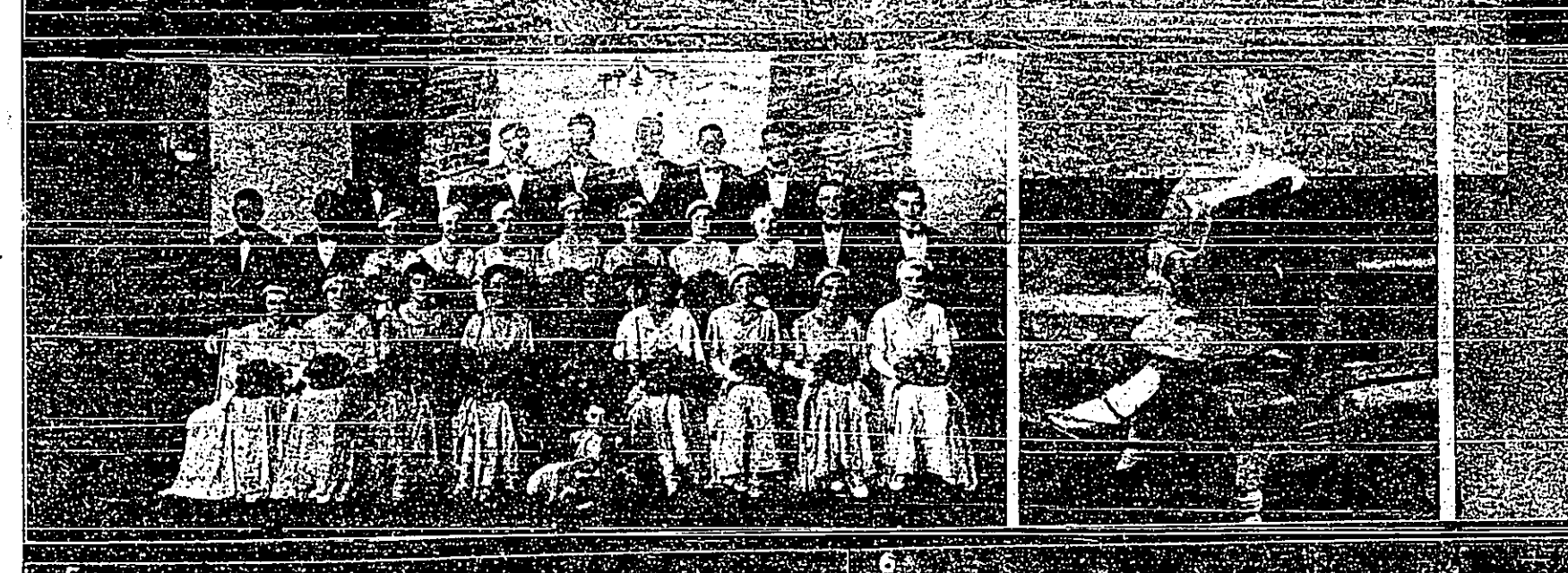

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PRESTON RETURNED SOLDIERS

THE ANNUAL DINNER

(By "The Houseboat")

On Wednesday evening, August 30, the Preston branch of the R.S.S.I.L.A. met in the supper room of the local town hall, the occasion being the annual dinner. The gathering was a pleasant, sociable and altogether enjoyable one. More than 100 returned men foregathered and made merry for over three hours. They talked about war days and listened to interesting speeches delivered by public men and visitors included among the latter were the mayor of Preston (Cr. H. P. Zwar, M.L.A.), Mr. H. F. Nibbett, Cr. W. Holland, State president of the League; Col. J. J. McKenna, G.C. 57th Battalion (Preston), Mr. Don Johnson, town clerk at Preston, Cr. A. E. Newton, Mr. Stevens, president of the Preston Dads' Association, and the Hon. J. G. Membrey. The tables had been prepared and decorated by members of the "Mums", "Wives" and "Sisters" associations. To these women credit is due. Orange was the color scheme in the adornment of the tables and vases of poppies brightened the supper room. To Mr. J. A. Donath, vice credit is due. He acted in a secretarial capacity prior to the function, made an exceptionally good ceremonial steward in introducing the speakers and artists, and had perfected the arrangements. The president of the branch (Mr. N. W. Brown) was also a conspicuous and energetic worker. A committee consisting of Messrs. J. H. Gardiner, J. Hartman, F. Smith and B. Thompson did their part in arranging the function as well as according a cordial welcome to soldiers and visitors.

Shortly after 7 o'clock the lights were lowered and there was a silence of a minute as a tribute to the soldiers who had not returned, and others who passed on after their services at the war.

A playfellow overture by Mr. Ed. Watson opened the proceedings, followed by the loyal toast. Then came the introduction of the visitors by Mr. Donath.

The toast of "The Visitors" was proposed by Mr. A. Windfield, the response being given by the chairman. The returned thanks for the gratifying reception of the toast. Cr. Zwar said the Preston branch of the League was one of the best and largest in Victoria, and he was pleased to see the membership list was increasing. Preston had every reason to be proud of its citizen soldiers, and they should see to it that nothing which had been attained should be flinched from them. (Applause.)

Mr. Noel Bunker favored with "The Recruiter," and gave as an encore "Queen of the South."

Mr. H. F. Nibbett was entrusted with the toast of "The Mums." He said that the services rendered by them was something to be proud of, and the toast of the wives of the returned men was also given with a reception by those present. (Hear, hear.) The Preston branch was infinitely stronger and better for the assistance rendered by the wives, and the toast of the mothers was also given with a reception by the branch had met with a wonderful reception and support from the women. The toast was honored to the accompaniment of "For They Are My Fellow Soldiers."

Mr. D. J. Matthews made a suitable response on behalf of "The Mums."

Mr. Ken Mountain gave a pleasing vocal number.

Mr. S. Osborne proposed "The League," and in doing so congratulated Cr. Zwar on his election to the mayoralty of Preston. Wonderful efforts, said Mr. Osborne, had been put forward by the League on behalf of the soldiers who were unable to help themselves. The League rose to the occasion every time, and the health and happiness of the returned men was the name of Mr. Holland, who was an inspiration to all.

Mr. Holland (State president) expressed the pleasure he felt at being present once again at a Preston function. His experience of the League over a period of years had been most personal, and personally he felt that he had been very great privilege to serve the soldiers in any and every way possible. The League had not reached its highest point by any means. In numbers it had increased from 10,000 to 15,000 and he was satisfied that within a few years' time it would reach 20,000. The average soldier was now 45 years of age, and his health had been affected by war service, so that his span of life would not be equal to that of the average man. The League promised to be one of the greatest institutions in the Commonwealth. Its first plank was loyalty to the Empire (applause), and that demanded that every man should give of his best to the community in general. The health bureau was part of the policy of the League, and this was safeguarded by Anzac House. One of the proposals that the League hoped to bring into effect was a dedicated scheme for vocational guidance for school children. The day when square pegs could be fitted into round holes was gone, and such a scheme was desirable. This was one of the many activities of the League, which were calculated to benefit not only soldiers, but the community as a whole. The more that could be done by the League to safeguard the

community the more would the League be safeguarded. It was also hoped to establish homes for veteran returned soldiers, and already a sum of money had been set aside as a nucleus for that object.

Mr. Tom Lockhart introduced a note of joviality with the singing of many Scotch songs and raising sundry lullaby stories. The latter were responsible for hilarious laughter.

The president (Mr. H. J. Martin) was the next to receive attention, he being marked out by the Preston branch for a presentation, also one to Mrs. Martin. These consisted of two beautiful crystal comports. In handing over the gifts Mr. D. J. Matthews said they all looked upon Mr. Martin as one of the stalwarts of the League and one who commanded the respect of every one. Soldiers resident in Preston felt it was only right that they should pay him a tribute, and he (the speaker) trusted that Mr. and Mrs. Martin would appreciate the gifts, also that the former would be spared to carry on the work connected with the League for many years. (Applause.)

Mr. Martin said it was difficult for him to express his feelings. He thanked them sincerely for the kindly and thoughtful act which he felt sure would be appreciated just as much by his wife as by himself. He appreciated beyond measure visitors who had received from time to time from the Preston branch, and looked upon them as treasured articles which would be prized by him for all time. He had lost a son at the war, and he never regretted his going to fight for King and country. (Applause.)

The toast of "The Artists" was entrusted to Mr. George Ferguson, who did the honors in a graceful way. The response was made by Mr. Noel Bunker.

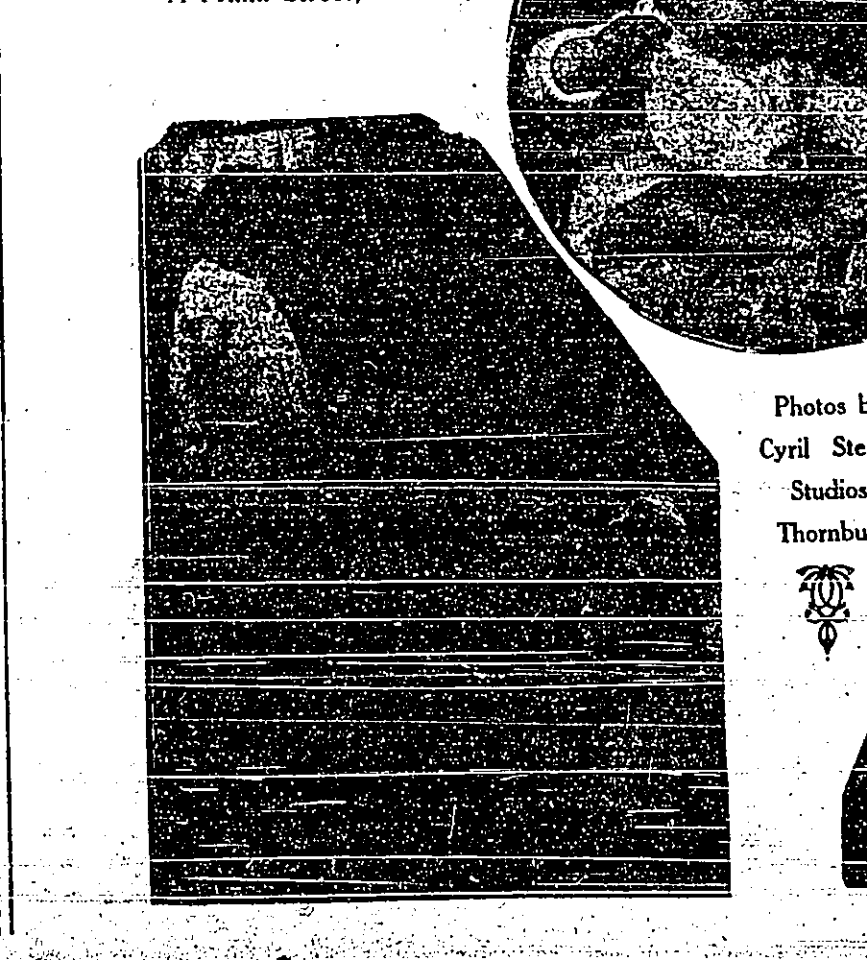


THORNBURY CLUBS



Comprehensive Private Street Construction Programme

Five Years of Inaction—Preston Council About to Launch Project

MANY STREETS MENTIONED

After a lapse of five years the Preston City Council is once more about to proceed with the construction of a number of private streets. The Engineer has been directed to prepare plans for a list of streets to be proposed to make and the construction works will be considered later. It has been pointed out that construction costs were never cheaper, but on the other hand in depressed times property owners, and people in the course of acquiring homes are not, in the main, desirous of undertaking further liability. The owners intended to be made liable will be notified, and will have the opportunity to object to the proposed works if they do not desire them carried out.

NORTHCOTE MAN PROVES ALIBI

While Mrs Esther Harrow was walking along Edgemoor street, Hawthorn on the morning of August 16, a man snatched her handbag and escaped in a motor car which was standing near by. Joseph John Brinkworth, confessor of McDonald street, Northcote, was charged in General Sessions on Wednesday with larceny from the person. Brinkworth, who pleaded not guilty, said he was in the street at the time, but he was in question and that he had never seen Mrs Harrow before. The direction of Judge Waddell, Brinkworth was acquitted by the jury, and he was discharged. Miss Joan Rescance appeared for Brinkworth.

The streets on Monday's list were— from Oakhill avenue to Plenty road; Birchhoff street between Bell and Bruce streets; D-y-lis street, between Clara and Spring street; Nyverson, between P-o-w and Regent street; Olive street and Ashley street, between Henry and Edgemoor streets; Joffre street, Tyler to Queen street; Eichel street, Oakhill avenue to Plenty road; Muttimer street north of Gover street; Josephine street, Murphy grove to Plenty road; Oakhill avenue, north of Queen street; Kingwilliam street, Southernhay street and Northernhay street, from end of present construction to Oakhill avenue; and Zinnar street, from end of present construction to Kingwilliam street. STREET LIGHTS

NEW SYSTEM OF CONTROL AT PRESTON

Electrical Engineer's Enterprise An experiment is proceeding in Preston in regard to the automatic control of street lighting. For some time past the city electrical engineer (Mr. F. E. Bird) has been experimenting with what is known as photonic cells, or "electric eyes" and the object is to arrange that these cells shall switch the street lights on and off according to the hours of day and night.

At present the lighting of street lights is controlled by clocks, which, every week, are set at a predetermined hour. The photonic cell will remove the necessity for these clocks. The principle of the cell is quite simple, and has been successfully applied in other ways. It works on the affinity of metals and their ability to produce electricity in varying degrees of light and darkness. The cell is exposed to the daylight and as day draws in and darkness descends, the cell operates a relay which in turn turns on the master switch and as soon as darkness is of the intensity to which the cell and the relays have been set the lights will remain on. In the breaking dawn, however, the cell operates in reverse and the lights are switched off.

Many advantages have been claimed for the use of this method. It is estimated that street lights will be a relative balance between the lighting and street lighting. The cost of the relays would come under the cost of a street lighting system. It requires no adjustment, and it is estimated that the system will be in operation by the end of the year.

Mr Bird has had a new system of control in operation since last week-end, and so far the results have been entirely satisfactory. The application of this system of control of street lighting is unique, this being the first case of its kind in Australia.

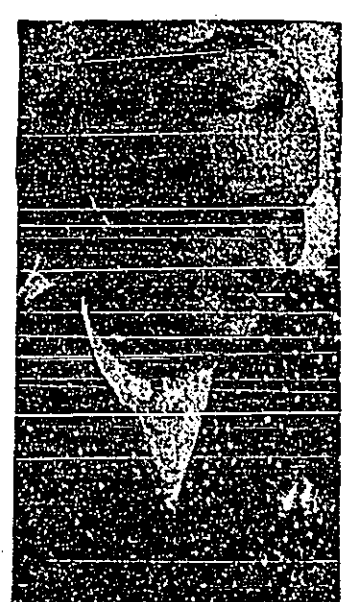
BENSON—PIZZEY

Epsom, Derby and Metropolitan Prospects

CHANCES OF CANDIDATES DISCUSSED

(By "Luteplayer")

The 1933 spring racing carnival will be ushered in with the A.J.C. fixture, which opens at Randwick to-morrow Saturday. On the first day the important races to be decided are the Epsom Handicap and Derby; while on Monday the Metropolitan Handicap, the second leg of the Sydney double, will be run. Some high-class gallopers will sport silk in the events mentioned, and the carnival promises to be very interesting. With tracks in good order, and providing the weather remains fine, it is probable that new time records will be made during the meeting.

Epsom Handicap

For the Epsom Handicap, of one mile, Chatham is the favorite. The winning horse has proved himself one of the most brilliant gallopers that has graced the Australian turf. He won the Epsom last year with 8.14, and on this occasion he has won with 9.10. It is a big weight to him but Chatham has proved his ability to carry big weights, and, having won at three starts this spring, he is decidedly in form. His chief success was in the Hill Stakes at Rosehill when he carried his Epsom weight and ran the mile in 1.54.

That race, was also the other two, however, were under the weight-for-age scale. The weight-for-age has frequently been found that W.F.A. form has not proved a reliable guide to the big handicaps.

On the other side it has to be taken into account that Chatham has proved himself in handicaps as well as W.F.A. events. He will be ridden by Jim Pike, which will be a great deal in his favor.

His record suggests that he has always done best when carefully nursed for his endeavor, as was the case in the Trayway Handicap.

The fact that Turbine has won over nine furlongs, and was narrowly beaten by Kavena over ten furlongs at Flemington, removes any doubt as to his ability to get the mile. This really should be his "pet" distance. Turbine has been carefully prepared for his engagement, and will strip a fit horse.

If his Trayway win was no fluke—he has several good performances in his record to offset that theory—and he reproduces that form to-morrow, I am anticipating that he will defeat Chatham at a difference of three.

THE OTHERS

Inflation defeated Turbine at Rosehill, and then went on to another success at Hawkesbury last Saturday, so that, in giving consideration to his line, one also must pay respect to the New Zealand candidate, for winning the form cannot be ignored. However, I fancy Inflation will find both Turbine and Chatham tough propositions. One must not under-rate the chance of Shaktini. If it is decided to run him in this in preference to the Derby, by which he was only beaten in the last few strides of the Trayway Handicap, and his stable mate, Bilken, had to put up a good performance to narrowly defeat the other two in the Guineas. The three-year-old possesses brilliance and is a decided possibility.

Following his win at Williamstown I thought Top Hole might prove a danger for the mile, but it now seems as though he will be outclassed by horses of greater brilliance. Still he is a good fighter and is not without a chance, and I do not think it would be wise to stretch too much importance to his failure at Victoria Park.

Bronze Hawk I am passing over. On his day he might be returned the winner, but his recent efforts have been disappointing. Durdal was slightly injured in the Trayway Handicap. Subsequently he was given a test at Victoria Park, and failed to gain a place in a field of mediocre, so he would need to improve considerably to win to-morrow's race.

Whittingham, Bold Boy, Carefree and Veta are fair class gallopers who may not be stretch too much importance to them, but they do not appear as strongly as some of the others mentioned earlier.

One has not a great deal of form to work on for the A.J.C. Derby, but of what we know of the candidates Hill Mark and Bilken have the best claims.

Hill Mark, who was the outstanding two-year-old of the autumn, defeated Walsley Lily in the Underwood Stakes at Williamstown after having won the first two of the two lengths start less than a hundred yards from the finish. Going on to the Menzies Stakes at Caulfield, the favorite was beaten into third place by Walsley Lily and Frank Tip. Break Up has always raced like a stayer. Following his third at Caulfield, he was similarly placed to Deputy Butler and Alton at Victoria Park. In the hands of Jim Pike Break Up is likely to give a good account of himself.

Deputy Butler surprised by his win at Victoria Park, and may be a contender. Still there is some doubt of him running out the mile and a half. Jimarch was a good two-year-old. He ran a fair race in the Chelmsford Stakes, and finished third in the Rosehill Guineas. He should stay fairly well, but on the Rosehill form Bilken looks to hold him safe.

If Shaktini runs in this instead of in the Epsom he will be in the worst of the candidates, but the distance is likely to trouble him. My selections are: HILL MARK 1 BILKEN 2 BREAK UP 3

At his first start he showed unexpected brilliance to win a Flying Handicap at Roseberry. Going on to Warwick Farm he won the Spring Handicap, of 11 furlongs, completely smothering the opposition in the last furlong. His third start was in the Chelmsford Stakes at Randwick, when he was narrowly beaten by Roshill, whom he will meet on 10th, better terms on Monday.

RADIO NOTES

Fritz Kreisler In America it is generally expected that the famous violinist, Fritz Kreisler will finally give up his declinatory attitude with respect to the broadcasting of his concerts and that he will shortly appear before the microphone. Kreisler declares, with the well-known modesty of great genius, that he has come out of the old school and that he first wishes to be acquainted with the playing to the microphone before he can have his performance broadcast.

No Shortage of Poets

The B.B.C. have received about 30,000 poems intended for recitation before the microphone. Among those who gave utterance in verse form to their ideas and sentiments about broadcasting, the feminine element was conspicuously represented. A jury is at present engaged in selecting the best poems, from which a programme of "unknown poets" will be compiled.

Television in America

The Columbia Broadcasting Company have decided to suspend operation of the television transmitter at New York until further orders. Since this transmitter was put into service in July 1931, it has been giving television programmes for a total period of about 25,000 hours. The reason for stoppage is that television has not made any appreciable headway since continuing transmissions, especially as the number of receiving sets in America is still very limited and shows no increase. There are 30 other transmitters in the United States with licences for experimental television transmissions. Half of them are situated in the neighbourhood of New York.
