

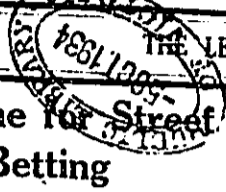

BILLIARD ROOM DISTURBANCE

FIGHT WITH "CHUCKER OUT"

Three Men Fined

At Northcote Court on Tuesday, Frederick John Hibbert, Robb's parsonage, Northcote; Morvyn James Hadlow, Helen street, Northcote, were each charged with offensive behaviour in a billiard room in High street. Hadlow was further charged with having assaulted Constable Erwin. Vernon William Setches, laborer, Nathan street, Northcote, was also charged with offensive behaviour, at the same time and place. There was a further charge of using indecent language in High street.

All the defendants pleaded not guilty to the charges preferred against them.

Senior Constable Nolan prosecuted. Plainclothes Constable Venes said: At about 9.15 p.m. on September 27 I went to a billiard room near Separation street. A fight was in progress and Setches and Hadlow were holding a billiard marker and punching Hibbert. Hibbert attacked the marker and Hadlow said, "If you arrest him I'll have to take me too," and commenced kicking and punching. Hadlow was then arrested. Setches made use of bad language in the street. Hibbert was arrested later.

Cris examined: Setches was marked in the fight?—Yes, I do not think I had hit all his own way with the billiard marker.

Had Setches had some drink?—No.

Plainclothes Const. Erwin gave similar evidence.

Did Hadlow hit you?—Yes, he struck me whilst I had hold of Hibbert. He punched me without any provocation at all.

Senior Constable Nolan: There would be no doubt that the men did not know you were a constable?—I know the men well and they know me.

No defence was offered on behalf of Setches. For Hadlow it was stated that he had been struck by the billiard marker, and Hibbert intended to try and restore peace. Hibbert had advised Hadlow to go quietly when the police came.

Hibbert said: A billiard marker named Eddy pushed Hadlow and then hit him. I intervened to restore peace. I got a kick in the shins and a punch in the face for my pains. I was standing back when the police came, and I advised Hadlow to "go quiet."

Hadlow said: I had had an argument with a man who helped the billiard marker.

Mr. Hartnett: The "thrower out?"

Hadlow: Yes. This man caught me by the throat and I struggled to

SOLDIER'S UNLUCKY DAY

"Took Bets for the Boys"

At the Northcote Court on Tuesday Arthur Higgins, Dundas street, Northcote, was charged that on September 22 he was in Butler street for the purpose of street betting.

Constable Swingler said: At about 3 p.m. on September 22 I saw defendant in Butler street at the rear of the Peacock Hotel. I saw a man hand him a betting slip and some money. He admitted that he was betting and said that it was his first day.

Defendant pleaded guilty. He said there was no bookmaker there and some of the lads asked him to take the bets. He was an invalid soldier with a small pension, and was taking the bets for another man.

Fined £20 in default two months' imprisonment, and ordered to pay £1 costs. A month was allowed in which to pay.

Perjury Alleged

POLICE MAGISTRATE AS WITNESS

Is Awarded Fee

Alleging that untrue statements had been made by a man, who was the defendant in a maintenance case at Northcote Court on Tuesday, September 11, a charge of perjury was laid against Leslie Burnell, of Ballantyne street, Thornbury, on Tuesday at Northcote Court by Dorothy Margaret Belcher, of Normanby avenue, Thornbury.

After hearing the evidence in the case on September 11, the presiding magistrate (Mr. E. C. Tibb, P.M.) gave a decision in favor of the defendant.

The evidence on Tuesday was heard before a bench of justices, Messrs. B. E. Johnson, P. J. Kean, and J. Hartnett, J's.P.

Asked for Fee

Edward Charles Tibb, police magistrate, Alleyne avenue, Malvern, said that before giving evidence he must under the regulations ask for 10/- expenses.

Mrs. Rosanove (for complainant): I will give an undertaking that that amount will be paid.

Giving evidence, Mr. Tibb said that he had presided at the Northcote Court on September 11, and had administered the oath to Burnell in the usual manner.

Numerous Witnesses

A very large number of witnesses were examined, and at the conclusion of the case for the complainant, Mr. H. H. Gray (for defendant) made a number of oral submissions.

Committed for Trial

After prolonged consideration the bench decided to commit Burnell (who reserved his defence) for trial. Bail was fixed at £25, with a surety of a like amount.

DRUNKEN DRIVING CHARGE

"Exhausted, Not Drunk," Says Defendant

POLICE CASE FAILS

AFTER a dance at Wollert, a policeman found Raymond Harry, Broadway, Reservoir, formerly of Epping, asleep in a car in St. George's road, on September 27.

Harry appeared at Northcote Court on Tuesday, when he was charged with having been drunk in charge of a motor car.

Mr. F. P. Walsh appeared for defendant, who pleaded not guilty.

Constable H. Scott said: At 5.45 a.m. on September 27 I saw defendant in a double seated car in St. George's road. I tried to wake him but could not. I called Northcote police and we put him in the back of the car and drove it to Northcote police station. In the back of the car were found 16 empty beer bottles and a glass. At Northcote police station the man woke up, and he appeared to be very drunk.

Mr. Walsh: Did you ask him how the bottles came to be in the car?—No.

Did he say that he had picked the bottles up to bring them home?—No.

Did he say that he had been working very long hours and was exhausted?—No.

Were there any full bottles?—No.

Constable Russell, of Northcote, said: Constable Scott and I could not wake the man. When he did awaken at the Northcote police station he was very drunk and was not in a fit condition to drive the car.

The P.M.: What was his condition? Witness: He could not stand; his eyes were "stary," and he smelled very strongly of liquor.

Harry said: On September 25 I had been driving a milk truck all day, and did not get home until 2 a.m. on September 26. I had been having trouble with my truck. Then after three hours' sleep I did another round, after which I walked from Epping to Reservoir to change my clothes to go to a dance at Wollert. During the night five of us consumed eight or nine bottles of beer. I left the dance at 3 a.m. on September 27, but before I left the hall I picked up a number of empty bottles to take home to my nephew. I took a young woman to her home at Thornbury, leaving the car in St. George's road. When I returned to the car I felt very sleepy and went to sleep in the car. During the night I drank eight or nine glasses of beer.

Senior Constable Nolan: How long would you have taken to drive home from where the police found you?—About ten minutes.

Terence O'Hearn, of Epping, said: I was a member of the same party as Harry. After the dance I drove home with a man named Long behind Harry's car. Defendant seemed to be driving quite safely. We went to my home where we stayed for about an hour, and then Harry went on to take a young woman home. Before Harry's car left the hall I saw him put several empty bottles in the back, and I also put some in.

James Daniel Long, farmer, of Epping, gave similar evidence.

The P.M.: How much beer was consumed? Witness: About nine bottles.

The P.M.: Two bottles each.

Mr. Walsh: That is not much for a long dance. If a man couldn't stand that he should be in the kindergarten (Laughter).

The P.M. (Mr. E. C. Tibb) said he was satisfied there was a doubt, and the case would be dismissed. He, however, advised defendant to leave drink alone when in his car.

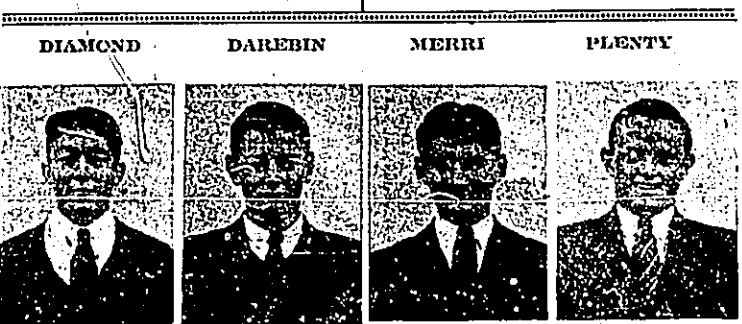
