PRESTON MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS

East Ward Election

TWO candidates are in the field for the vacancy caused by the retirement of Cr A. E. Newton, in the East Ward of the municipality—Messrs H. F. Nisbett and J. G. Kerwood.

MR. J. KERWOOD'S CANDIDATURE

A meeting of friends and supporters of Mr J. Kerwood, who is a resident of Hotham street, Preston, and is offering himself as a candidate at the forthcoming extraordinary elections, was held on Wednesday evening.

Ex-Cr A. E. Newton, who has just retired from the seat, was nominated as chairman and Mr C. W. Jenner, organising secretary.

A committee consisting of 42 was formed with power to add.

The candidate, Mr J. Kerwood, addressed the meeting and gave his views after which a vote of confidence was unanimously carried.

The next meeting has been called for Wednesday, November 7, at the committee rooms, 272 Plenty road, when canvassers' reports will be discussed.

Mr Kerwood has been a resident of the East Ward of Preston all his life, and is a Past President of the A.N.A. Lodge. He has also filled the position of treasurer and is one of the metropolitan committee.

During the six years that Mr Kerwood was president of the Hotham Street State School Committee, the committee were instrumental in having the old school enlarged and remodelled at a cost of over £7,000; in acquiring extra playgrounds for the children; and also raised over £300 for the purpose of erecting two commodious shelter sheds and providing other school requirements.

MR. H. F. NISBETT'S CANDIDATURE

£30 Gaming Fine

Court Orders Confiscation of £14

Upon a charge of having assisted in the conduct of a common gaming house at High street, Northcote, Theodore McQuade, Gore street, Fitzroy, was fined £30 at the Northcote Magistrates' Court. The court also ordered £14/17/7 betting money to be confiscated. McQuade pleaded not guilty. Constable R. T. Roberts of the Gaming Board, said: "At about 1.56 p.m. on October 13, 1934, I went to a bookmaker's shop at High street, Northcote, armed with a special gaming house warrant.

Burst in Door
The front and back doors were locked. I knocked on the back door and saw McQuade, who came to a window at a height of seven or eight feet from the ground. I told McQuade to open the door, and then heard footsteps inside the building.

I forced the door, and as I got inside I saw McQuade with a roll of betting slips in his hand, which he was trying to tear up. I took them from him. Defendant denied that he was the occupier of the shop and said that the occupier, Mr. Eaton, had left the premises at about 1 p.m. Wireless and Telephone.

On the premises were a wireless set in operation and a telephone, which were on several occasions.

I asked McQuade for the betting money and he threw it on a table. When told that that was not all of it, he made no reply.

Asked if he had taken all the bets, he said "I'll say nothing." After being partially searched McQuade produced £14/7/7, which he said was the takings from his shop next door.

Senior Constable Thorburn went away with McQuade, and when he returned said "Defendant is telling lies. There is over £10 in the till of his shop next door."

Continuing, Constable Roberts said: I answered the telephone several times. A woman named Mrs. Hill or Hillman asked for "Theo, and asked for 2/ each way Waltzing Lily. A man named Stewart also telephoned several bets.

I totalled the bets, which ranged from 1/ to £1, and they amounted to over £17.

A few days later, with other police and McQuade, I interviewed Eaton. He said that on October 13 he left his shop at 1 p.m. and when on the footpath had handed his keys to McQuade for his brother, who was to clean out the shop. McQuade said that Eaton left him in the shop.

Cross examined: Was there anyone else in the shop at the time?—Yes. A youth in cricketing clothes. Senior Constable Thorburn gave similar evidence. He added that when questioned about the betting McQuade said "I'll admit some of it," but denied that the whole of the £14/17/7 was betting money.

Mr. Hartnett (for defendant) submitted that the police had not proved that this was a common gaming house.

The P.M. (Mr C. McLean) said that the prosecution had tendered certain evidence and from it had asked the bench to draw certain inferences. The court felt that there was ample evidence to justify a presumption that this was a gaming house, and that McQuade had assisted in the care of it.

In recording a conviction and re-ording a fine of £30 in default four months' imprisonment, the P.M. said that this was not a case of a small tradesman taking bets to oblige customers.

A stay of four weeks was granted.

RECIPES

Banana Mould—Peel and cut up eight bananas and pound them up with a couple of ounces of sugar. Mix well with a half ounce of gelatin which has been dissolved in a little milk and half a pint of whipped cream. If you add a very little rum, the flavour will be lovely. Set in a mould in a cold place. **Fish Salad**—A very simple fish salad can be made by using equal quantities of flaked cold white fish and cold cooked rice, and a touch of mayonnaise. Add a little lemon juice and mix by hand. Dress with a proportion of two tablespoons to half a pint of the sauce. Mix the rice well with a little of the dressing, season with salt and pepper and let them lie for an hour in a dish surrounded by lettuce leaves, garnished with sliced hard-boiled eggs. If you like, with watercress and lemon juice and cover it with the rest of the sauce. **Prawn Patties**—These savory little patties are most useful for a meal in a hurry. They can be made in a few minutes and are very easy to eat. Take 1-4 cooked meat, finely chopped, 1 small onion, 1/2 pint rice water, 1 oz. breadcrumbs, half teaspoon chopped parsley, salt, pepper, and nutmeg. Wash the rice and boil until very tender. Stir often, and cook until the rice has absorbed all the water. Boil the onion separately, chop finely, add the meat, which should be chopped with a little rice water, and mix well. Add salt, but all the ingredients into the rice, mix well, and cook for a few minutes. Turn on to a plate to cool, and when cold shape into small patties. Dip each one in egg and breadcrumbs, fry in deep fat to a light brown, garnish with parsley, and serve with tomato sauce.

PRESTON P.A.C. THE YEAR'S RECORD

The following is the record of operations of Preston Public Assistance Committee for nine months ended October 31, 1934.

Representing Preston City Council and citizens Councillors H. Swain, Mott, Davis, Mosses, Ben Johnson (Town Clerk), Ernest Easton, L. W. Williams, F. H. Smithers, L. Roberts and J. Quin. Cr. H. Swain was appointed chairman; Mr. Ben Johnson, hon. secretary; Mr. L. W. Williams, hon. treasurer; Mr. J. Quin, hon. assistant secretary and investigator.

The number of families receiving assistance at the end of October was 425. The boot repair shop is manned by men working in return for assistance and as relief workers in turn. The number of boots repaired was 4500. Leather supplied by the Government is of the best quality and the work is done to the satisfaction of the public.

The State Relief Committee has supplied to 31/10/34: Men—pairs boots 434; skirts 352; trousers 454; socks 208; Women—pairs shoes 198; singlets 147; gowns 4; bloomers 154; stockings 238; shirts 108; slippers 25; knickers 4; stockings 45; bannels 44. Girls—pairs shoes 295; singlets 116; bloomers 117; stockings 44.

Clothing purchased by the Committee was: Men's suits 45; pairs boots 45; shirts 95; bannels 13; trousers 52; socks 10; underpants 12. Women—pairs shoes 40; singlets 12; night-gowns 3; bloomers 2; layette sets 25; stockings 6; pairs boots 55; shirts 7; knickers 6.

Total—Men's garments 2247; women's 623; children's 1279. The committee participated in the Government's collection of 1000 tons of fire-wood to Preston from January to 31st October 1934, and 24016 individual allotments were made.

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Melbourne's Water Supply

THE O'SHANNASSY WATER-SHEDS. Northcote Council Pays Visit of Inspection.

BOARD'S COLossal UNDERTAKINGS. The average Melbourne resident if asked the source of Melbourne's water supply, would probably mention one of the main reservoirs, such as the Maroonah, but he or she has little conception of the vast magnitude of the schemes which ensure that Melbourne shall have a constant and pure supply.

The Northcote Party. During last week-end, at the invitation of S. Dennis, the council's representative on the Metropolitan Board of Councils, a party of Northcote councillors paid a visit of inspection of the O'Shannassy water-sheds, including the plant of the new No. 1, Walter (Glen) and No. 2, Northcote, water-sheds.

The Melbourne water supply embraces two main schemes, the older one being the Van Yearn system, the latter being the O'Shannassy system. The Van Yearn reservoirs, and the head waters are the Silvery Creek, in the Whitehorse ranges.

Early Schemes. In the very early days of the village of Melbourne, water for household and other purposes was obtained from the Yarra, and was carried in barrels and tanks mounted on drays and wagons. Household tanks filled by rain, of course played a big part in the supply of that day.

As the village grew into a town, and the development became more rapid, it was found necessary to make provision for a better system of supply. For this purpose a dam was built on the Yarra, and a tunnel was constructed at East Hill, near the present site of the Ep and Ho Hospital. From this tank water was reticulated to the town.

The tremendous strides soon made it imperative to make more adequate provision, more so when it was found that there was a danger of the Yarra being polluted, due to the settlement of the banks and the discharge of drainage into the stream. Further, the supply was not always sufficient to meet the demand.

Van Yearn Built. In 1854 Victoria was separated from New South Wales, and the Van Yearn system was made to secure an adequate supply. In the years that followed the Van Yearn Reservoir was built by about 100 feet high across the mouth of a natural basin. The headwaters of the scheme were at Silvery Creek, which was dammed, and the water conveyed by miles of aqueducts to the Tourneville Reservoir, and thence to the Van Yearn.

Open aqueducts and pipe lines carry the water to small service reservoirs after which, whence it is piped for the use of the community. The Silvery Creek watershed embraces an area of 10,000 acres, and the Tourneville watershed of 20,000 acres. Other areas which have since been obtained by the Board are the Upper Yarra watershed of 30,000 acres, and the Thompson watershed of 184,000 acres.

The O'Shannassy Headwaters. The O'Shannassy Dam in the ranges at the back of Warburton, and the Maroonah dam at Healesville, both from the O'Shannassy watershed, are piped through a system of control valves down the old river bed. At a small dam further down the aqueduct is turned into the tunnel. A certain proportion is fed back into the stream, and subsequently flows into the Yarra.

The aqueducts skirt the mountain side for miles at an easy grade. At one point a siphon takes the flow across two gullies and into the aqueduct on the opposite mountain, and the easy gradient may be maintained. Linked with this system, the supply from the Maroonah dam, and from the Silvan Dam No. 1, completed in the past few years.

A vast amount of controlled water is thus within easy reach of Melbourne, and the supply can be easily regulated and the water made available in one of a spell of hot weather. Service Reservoirs. Dotted also round the suburbs are 19 service reservoirs, with a total capacity of 24,858,000 gallons, and 25,200,000 gallons. The largest service reservoir is at Mitcham, and this holds 4,000,000 gallons; and the smallest is at Morang, 3,000,000 gallons. The highest is at Olinda (11,000,000 gallons), and the outlet is 161 feet above sea level.

Capacity of Main Reservoirs. It is also interesting to compare the capacities of the various reservoirs and their outlets above sea level (figures in feet in parentheses). Van Yearn, 2,520,000,000 gallons (138 9 per cent.); West Ward, 1,400 (29 per cent.); North Ward, 1,640 (32 per cent.).

Mr. Cornish said the allotment was not just, and the Central Ward should get more. The allotments should be based on the valuations. Under the present system the Central Ward (140 at the expense of the Central and East Wards).

Mr. Dennis.—The surveyor prepared the report without any instructions from anyone, and it was discussed by the committee.

Mr. Cornish.—The requirements of the Central Ward are not met, and the amount of the proposed allotment, as the paths in the Central Ward are used by all citizens. On the other hand, the Central Ward is not to be repaired, it is expected that the Central Ward should give the same in its proper share. The South and North Wards and West Ward, which the other three wards lose.

Mr. Sutch.—I oppose the recommendation and I doubt the locality of the Central Ward should not be altered, but the expenditure in accordance with the income.

Mr. Dennis.—This you are generally right, but this time (laughter). Mr. Sutch.—It is a plot at the expense of the Central, East and West Wards.

Mr. Sutch.—The West Ward will lose approximately £230 on its usual allotment. The West Ward has the highest valuation, and although the old system has certain shortcomings, that basis seemed to be far more equitable than the system now proposed. The railway traverses the West Ward, and the council should provide footpaths where the railways would not make them. The West Ward members had hoped to continue the old system, but the council that work would be delayed perhaps 20 to 25 years. It was unfair to want the West Ward to bear the whole of the cost of the paths in St. George's road, which should be created by the council as a road which would be new towards the West Ward in sight.

Mr. Hayes.—When I got into the Council (500) was owing to the North Ward for paths allotment, and it has never, as far as I can ascertain, been repaid. The system of works allotment was inequitable. The area of the North Ward is about five times that of the Central Ward, and consequently the North Ward required far more money for development. The council and the members of the North Ward in St. George's road, and that question had not been regarded from a ward viewpoint. The Central Ward did not require more money for ward work and should be paid on its own improvements.

SHAMPOOING OILY HAIR

Apply two or three times a week, after the shampoo.

CENTENARY PHYSICAL CULTURE DISPLAY

COLORFUL EXPOSITION AT THE M.C.G.

AS their contribution to the Centenary fixtures the Incorporated Institute of Physical Culture Teachers of Victoria staged a very colorful, spectacular, and interesting display at the Melbourne Cricket Ground last Saturday afternoon. The items were presented under the direction of Mr N. Malcolm Hay, as President, and Chief Marshal, and Mrs Gertrude Gillies as organiser and Director of Ceremonies. That they succeeded worthily is remarkable in view of the last-minute decision of the M.C.C. to rope off the pitches in the centre owing to the softness of the ground

The Collingwood City Band, under the direction of Mr Frank Johnstone, provided the music which added much to the effectiveness of the assembly. The programme opened with a typical Australian Tableau in which performers formed the word "Cooee" above a huge boomerang of white, then with the beating of hands on knees thousands imitated tom-toms for a realistic corroboree on the centre of the ground, danced by girls in wild aboriginal war paint.

One of the most spectacular items on the programme was a series of health exercises performed by 1,000 senior girls with splendid physique and bearing, demonstrating what physical culture had done for them. Later, these groups appeared again in an exhilarating Gipsy Dance. The Junior groups gave a series of brilliant flag movements very creditably and later a delightful and stately old world gavotte. The ball routine number was a commendable item as also was a pretty rhythmic scarf dance, by hundreds of dainty maidens in orange, blue, green, pink, salmon, and white draperies.

Melbourne's snappiest younger set in the gayest of uniforms executed a military item "Colonel Boney" with smart and perfect precision. The South and Port Melbourne Thistle Society's Ladies' Pipe Band also contributed to the programme by rendering selections between the massed items. The programme ended appropriately with a pageant representing Miss Victoria's Birthday. Miss Victoria (Miss Gwen Taunt) arrived in a picturesque motor float attended by "Centenary Guards" and groups of representatives of different nations, encircled by thousands of performers who paid homage and offered birthday greetings.

After the concluding item Mrs Gillies, amid rousing cheers, was presented with a floral tribute by the display secretary's little daughter Margaret Newton, who was celebrating her third birthday.
