Preston "Hold-Up" Case Before Court

COLLECTOR BOUND AND ROBBED OF £12

Threatened With Tomahawk in Wash House

THREE MEN COMMITTED FOR TRIAL

THREE MEN were committed for trial by the Preston Court on Wednesday on charges of having robbed a collector of £12/8/- at a house in Wood street, Preston, on July 15.

THE CHARGES.

James Brosnan, Wood street, Preston; Alfred Carlon, Plenty road, Preston, and William C. Boulton, 20 years, Bell street, Heidelberg, were each charged that on July 15 they robbed one Thomas Harding of £12/8/- in money, and at the same time used personal violence.

Senior Detective Halsell prosecuted. Mr H. H. Gray appeared for the defendants.

COLLECTOR'S EVIDENCE

Edmund Thomas Raeburn Harding, of Whittlesea, employed by Alfred F. Deacon, High street, Preston, said: "At about mid-day on July 15 I went to a house occupied by Mr. Keppler, Wood street. I went to the front door, but got no reply. I went round the back and knocked.

"Invited Inside"

A man walked across the porch into the wash-house and said, "All right, you can come in." I lifted the latch and stepped inside the door expecting to see Mr. Keppler, but instead I saw three strangers. One was holding a small axe, and another (Carlon), who appeared to be the leader, said, "Where is it?" I said, "What?"

Money Taken

He then unbuttoned my coat and took some silver from my waist-coat pocket, and some notes from my inside pocket.

The other two defendants are similar in build to the men who were at the house, but I cannot recognise their faces. Whilst the money was being taken two of the men stood behind me, and I did not get a good glimpse at them.

Tied Up With Rope

The man who appeared to be the leader pushed me into the wash-house and said they were going to tie me up. Carlon pulled a piece of rope out of his pocket. My hands were tied behind my back, my mouth gagged, and the man sat me on the floor and tied my legs.

"Had Been Waiting"

When the men were leaving, Carlon said he had been watching me for about 12 months and had seen the lady (Mrs. Keppler) go out, and so he decided to take the chance to rob me.

Cut Bonds With Pocket Knife

After the men left I was able to get a knife out of my hip pocket with which I cut the rope round my wrists.

Going outside I found my bicycle which I had left leaning against the front fence. It had been placed alongside the front steps of the house. The money stolen from me amounted to £12/8/.

Mr Gray: Have you been asked to identify Carlon before?—Yes, on July 26.

You were nervous during the hold-up?—I was sort of paralysed at the time.

Did you try to run away?—No.

How long did the "hold-up" take? I should say about three minutes.

Did Carlon try to hide his face?—He had a scarf partly round it. The

other two men hid their faces with scarves.

Householder's Story

Edward Keppler, war pensioner, said: I have resided at Wood street, Preston, for nearly three years. I have known Brosnan for about two years.

Previous Conversation About Collector About 18 months ago, whilst I was conversing with Brosnan at my front gate, the rent collector came.

On July 6 I saw Brosnan between 10.30 and 11 p.m. at the corner of Gower and High streets, Preston. In conversation he said, "Does the same bloke come for the rent?"

Questioned About Movements

I replied in the affirmative. He said, "Are you going out on Monday?" I replied that as far as I knew I was not. He then asked if my wife was still on the cocoa at school. I asked the reason for the questions and he said, "We are going to 'go' the rent collector. I said, 'You couldn't 'go' an old age pensioner." (Laughter.) He said, "We'll see," and walked away, joining another man near the picture theatre.

After the Robbery

On Monday, July 15, I left home about 8 a.m. and returned about 7 p.m. About 8.30 p.m. Brosnan came to my front gate and asked where I had been during the day. He said, "Can you buy me a 'gat'?" I took this as a slang term for a revolver, and said I did not know where one could be got. He said, "I believe you've had some fun here to-day." I said, "Did you do this, Jim?" and he laughingly said, "Yes and I was lashed." Someone was walking along the footpath and I told Brosnan to "clear out." I do not know the other two defendants.

Mr Gray: Did you tell anyone of the conversation of July 6?—No. I took so little notice of it that I didn't bother. I thought Brosnan was joking.

POLICE EVIDENCE

Detective E. W. Rosewarne said: On July 26 with other police I took Brosnan from his home at Wood street and questioned him about the robbery. He said, "You seem to have me cornered. I will tell the truth. I was in it, but I don't want to tell on my mates."

Conversation With Keppler

In a statement Brosnan said: I had a conversation with Keppler, who said that the collector usually had £75 on him. Keppler also said that he had asked the collector what he would do if he was "stuck up," and the collector said, "I would drop it. It is insured." Continuing, the statement, Brosnan said: We are going to "go" the collector, and Keppler said, "All right. I want a 'fiver' out of it." Brosnan also said that he got £3/10/- out of the amount taken and had spent it.

Detective Rosewarne, continuing, said: Later with other police I saw Carlon at his home, Plenty road,

Man Hit With Iron Bar

COUNCIL EMPLOYEES AND YOUTHS CLASH

On the night of July 25 three Northcote council employees were pelted with stones in High street south by a number of youths. One of the employees seized a piece of pipe and charged the youths, one of whom he hit. The youths scattered and the council employees after a chase caught one of the men, Leonard Woodhouse, of Tait street, North Fitzroy. This man was charged with offensive behaviour before the Northcote Court on Tuesday.

Sergeant Williamson prosecuted.

Henry Thomson, Martin street Northcote, motor driver, employed by the Northcote Council, said: At about 10.15 p.m. on July 25 I was in High street, near Urquhart street. A number of youths were on one side of the street, and some were on the other side. One of the men called out, "Here is the —," and two lots of youths joined forces and commenced pelting stones. I saw the numbers were against us and so I picked up a piece of gas pipe and charged the youths. Woodhouse was in front and I hit him. With other council employees I chased Woodhouse and caught him near the Clifton Hill depot.

Cross-examined: You did not see defendant throw any stones?—No.

Did defendant hit you?—He did not get a chance.

Peter Thomson, Martin street, Northcote, laborer, employed by the Northcote Council, said: Prior to 10.15 there had been a scrimmage up the street. Then I heard someone say, "Here's the —," and this was followed by a shower of stones. I saw defendant throwing stones. After the chase defendant said, "You've got the wrong man."

Stanley Hodgson, Elm street, Northcote, gave similar evidence.

Constable Newton said that defendant was given to his custody at the Northcote watch-house. Defendant, when questioned, said, "One of my mates was hit, and I went over to see what was wrong. Then I was hit with an iron bar."

Woodhouse said: I was walking along High street with three mates. On the other side of the street were two girls whom I knew, and they were being annoyed by some youths. A friend and I decided to accompany them to the Clifton Hill station, and we started to walk along the street. Then another mate cried out that he had been hit. I went over to Thomson and said, "Hey, Jack, what did you hit my cobbler for?" Thomson ran at me and hit me on the hip with a gas pipe. I ran and was walking along with the girls again when three men drove up in a car. I thought they were after me and ran into the tram depot for protection. The men dragged me out and took me to the police station. I did not know they were council employees.

By majority decision the case was dismissed. On the bench were Mr E. E. O'Grady, P.M., and Messrs Johnson and Hartnett, J'sP.

£30 GAMING FINE

Bets Taken in Lane

At Northcote Court on Friday of last week Sydney Betteridge, Lawry street, Northcote, was charged that on July 13 he was in a lane off Elm street for the purpose of betting.

Mr F. P. Walsh appeared for defendant, who pleaded not guilty.

Constable F. Pratt said: At about 1.30 p.m. on July 13 I saw defendant and another man standing in a lane off Elm street. A man approached defendant and handed him something, and then defendant appeared to write in a book. A woman also approached defendant, and he appeared to make another entry. I went over to defendant and said, "You are betting here." He put a book between the railings of the fence. I said, "That is your book. He said, 'No. Give me a chance. I am married and have a family.' I asked who he was betting for and he said, 'Myself.' He handed me £3/4/6 which he said was betting money, and he admitted that he had taken a number of bets that day. I returned the money to him and kept the book.

On the following Monday defendant asked me to drop the betting charge. I said, "No." He said, "It's a pity you did not keep the money and give me back the book."

Mr Walsh (for defendant): Where were you when you first saw the defendant?—I was on a bus, and I got off.

Betteridge said: I am on sustenance. On July 13 I was in the lane when the constable came along, but I did not take any bets there. I went to the lane with a friend to have a drink. When the constable came to me he showed me a book. Where he got it I don't know. He said, "Come to the police station." On the way he said, "How much money have you got on you?" I told him about £2 and he told me to give it to him. I did so and he said, "You'll never see it again. It is betting money and is confiscated." I said, "It is my money, and is to pay my grocer's bills." Soon after that the constable handed me my money and told me to get away home.

Sergeant Williamson: Do you deny the truth of the constable's evidence?—In parts.

Did you call the constable out of the bus on the following Monday?—I did not.

Did you speak to him at all on the Monday?—The constable came to me in Elm street and said, "I'm sorry I 'pinched' you. I thought you were betting for someone." I said, "That is all right." He said, "If you'll only plead guilty I'll make it as light as I can for you."

Did you write in the book which has been produced in the evidence?—Yes.

The P.M. (Mr E. E. O'Grady): The book was in the fence?—Yes.

When was it put there?—At about 8 a.m. that morning. I do not operate as a bookmaker, and never take bets on a Saturday.

How long had you been in the lane before the arrival of the constable?—About five minutes.

Albert Ellis, Wimble street, Northcote said: I went to the lane with defendant about 10 minutes before the constable arrived. No bets were made in this time.

The P.M. said he believed the constable and was satisfied defendant and his witness had committed perjury.

Betteridge was convicted and fined £30, in default two months' imprisonment.

Upon payment of £5 of the fine, a stay of 28 days was granted in which to pay the balance.

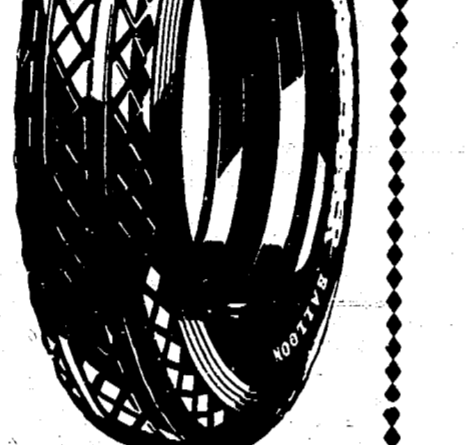

HOT TEA OR LUNCH

Curried Artichokes.—1 lb. Jerusalem artichokes, 2 tablespoons rice, 1 teaspoon each curry paste and curry powder, 2oz. butter, 1 pt. milk, 1 pt. stock or water, 2 teaspoons lemon juice, salt, 1 teaspoon castor sugar, 1 Onion, Blanch the rice. Melt the butter in a saucepan, put in the onion, peeled and sliced, and fry gently for five minutes.

HINTS FOR THE HOUSE

To Boil Down Soup.—The best method of boiling down small bits of soup is to place them, with a very little water, in a wide-mouthed jar, or a saucepan in another saucepan of water, and bring this to the boil. Stir in the soup from time to time. When the soup is thoroughly melted and mixed in smoothly with the water, it should be left to cool, and then cut into pieces.

To Clean Drain Pipe.—An effective method of cleaning drain pipes is to wash them down with chloride of lime, half a pound to a gallon of water. Chloride of lime is inexpensive, and may be obtained from most paint dealers.

Shrimps and Eggs on Toast.—1 tin shrimps, 2oz. butter, 3 eggs, 1 tablespoon milk, squares of buttered toast. Beat the eggs just enough to mix whites and yolks, and the pepper and milk. Melt the butter in a small steppan, put in the mixture and stir over gentle heat until it is thick and creamy. Serve on squares of well buttered toast.
