Northcote Man's Surprise

Savs He Found Men in His Home

At the Northcote court on Tuesday, George William Bishop, of Howitt street, Northcote, told how he found a window broken, and stranger in his home on the night oy July 31 after a temporary

William John Herbert, The Esplanade, Clifton Hill, was charged with housebreaking and stealing. kit-bag etc., valued at £6.

Bishop said that he left his home with his wife at about 8 p.m. on this night, and when he returned at about 9.20p.m he saw a light inside the house. The leadlight in a door was broken, and peering through into the house, Bishop saw a man walking along a passage.

Continuing Bishop said, "I kept watch and saw the man leave the premises. I asked a passing motorist to call the police, and with them I followed the man to Fairfield Park, where he was intercepted. He was carrying a kithag belonging to me, and in it were a number of articles which had been taken from the house.

Later I found blood-stains in the bathroom,"

First Constable Shaw said that when the defendant was intercepted, he refused to explain where he had got the bag. His right hand was bleeding, and later he said that he had had a few drinks, and had broken the window with his fist.

Herbert was committed trial at the court of General Sessions. Bail was fixed at £100 with a surety of a like amount.

Northcote Parking **By-Law**

FIRST PROSECUTIONS

HUSBAND AND WIFE CLASH

Small Son Throws Brush at Father

A story of domestic strife was told at Northcote Court last Tuesday. when Ella Elizabeth Flores. Dennis Street, Northcote alleged that her husband, Herbert Victor Flores, had unlawfully assaulted

The complainant said: On Friday, July 31, I returned home from shopping, and my husband was home from work. He followed me from the backyard into the bedroom and swore at me. Then he followed me from room to room demanding money. Finally he hit me. I managed to get outside and went to a neighbor, and later to the police.

Crass-examined: never assaulted your husband? Did you throw a carving-knife

at him?—Never. You did not throw a cup of hot

ea or a shoe at him?—No. Did your husband cut his hand on your hand-bag when struggling with you —Yes. I saw blood on my hands afterwards. Stanley Flores, the ten-year-old

son of the parties, said: I saw my father and mother quarrelling. He would not let her leave the house. In the struggle my father smashed my mother's bag. threw a brush at my father and hit him on the back of the head.

The defendant said: On the day in question I was ill and wanted my wife to give me some attention, and she refused. I tried to get her to forget the quarrel, but she rushed out of the house. She lashed out with her hand-hag and I grabbed it. My wife has assaulted me before; she threw a knife at me and I had to go to a doctor to have the gash dressed. I give her all my weekearnings of £3/10/. the last 12 months we have been at loggerheads. I did not strike her at all

Dr W Henricksen, High street. Thornbury, said: On several occasions the defendant has visited me for medical attention. Once his elbow was bleeding and clothes gashed, which could have been caused by a knife. On July 31 he visited me with a wound in his hand. He complained of a pain in the legs and shoulder, and in my opinion was incapable of assaulting anyone.
