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Destruction of Bride's Home

BROTHER-IN-LAW CHARGED DETECTIVES' EVIDENCE

AN extraordinary story was told at Northcote Court on Friday when a man was charged with having damaged the property of his brother-in-law.

A young newly-married couple related dramatically how they returned home a few days after their marriage to find that their "dream home" had been completely wrecked, clothes, furniture, wedding presents — everything ruthlessly ruined.

A feature of the case was that the couple told the court that they had been friendly with the defendant and they sat with him throughout the hearing of the case. Evidence was given by a detective that he was certain that an imprint on a piece of cellophane found at the Dockings' home had been made by the defendant.

Mr. Alfred Docking, mechanic, said he had resided formerly at Emmaline street, Northcote, to the extent of £150.

Continuing Docking said: On going back to the house, I found that a hole had been burned in the kitchen floor. My wife found her marriage lines torn to pieces and scattered on the floor of the bedroom.

Man Fined for Offensive Behaviour

A constable told the Preston Court on Wednesday, in a case where Clement Shepard, West-street, Preston, was charged with having behaved in an offensive manner, that, concealed, he had watched a group of men standing at the corner of High and Bell streets, Preston, for three hours.

Constable Gleeson said he saw Shepard standing at 9.30 p.m. on October 25 with other men at the corner of High and Bell streets, Preston, across three young girls, as they passed on the footpath.

Cross-examined, the constable said the defendant had been under his observation for 1 1/2 hours on the night of October 25. Constable Gleeson said he saw Shepard clutch at a girl, who eluded him and walked on up High street. He was watching the group of men at the corner for at least three hours.

Shepard said he and another man, named Dwyer, had accepted the bench accepted the constable's evidence. Girls had a right to walk along the streets without being molested. Shepard would be fined £2, in default of 14 days' imprisonment. A stay of seven days was granted.

MOTORING NOTES IMPROVING CAR PERFORMANCE

It is not generally known amongst owners of middle-grade cars that such vehicles if in good condition, can be materially improved in their performance by having the engine compressed ratio increased. An overhaul that simply replaces worn parts, definitely helps to restore the original power to an old engine, but more than this is now possible.

Most cars made between 1931-1934 have compression ratios in the region of 5-1, and at the time of their building the non-deflagrating quality of petrol was not sufficiently high to warrant compression ratios of this nature.

Higher octane numbered petrols have now made possible the raising of the compression ratio to many multiple-graded cars (still with much of their dependable service usually thereby enabling their owners to obtain engine performance in keeping with that obtained from more modern cars. There are three general methods that may be employed by any competent automobile engineer to increase the compression ratio of an engine—(1) by machining the pistons and the cylinder block; (2) by installing new pistons having a greater diameter; or (3) by installing a gudgeon pin to the top of the piston; (4) or installing a new high compression head.

Drilling Square Holes

It has long been considered an impossibility to drill tools capable of drilling a square hole with a rotating drill. But recently a solution has at last been reached.

Boxing In one of the best contests witnessed at the recent Boxing Club, the N.S.W. welter champion and Jimmy Purcell, also of Sydney, on Friday night last provided a rare treat for boxing fans. The match, a scientific boxing was a feature of every round of the 15, and the contestants were so evenly matched that the referee was unable to separate them at the end of the match. Driving on Water An interesting development in connection with the use of pneumatic tubes for agricultural tractors, is the use of a certain amount of water inside the air tubes to facilitate the necessary weight on the driving tyres, to enable them to transmit the full engine power to the tractor draw-bar.

New Type of Piston An interesting development associated with the design and manufacture of aluminium or light alloy pistons for motor-car engines is announced from U. S. A. One of the problems long associated with this type of piston has been to provide an effective means of compensating for the difference between the heat expansion coefficients of cast-iron cylinder walls and of the piston alloy. Also for the temperature differences between the skirt of the piston and the cylinder walls, so that the clearance between the former and the latter would remain substantially constant under all operating conditions.

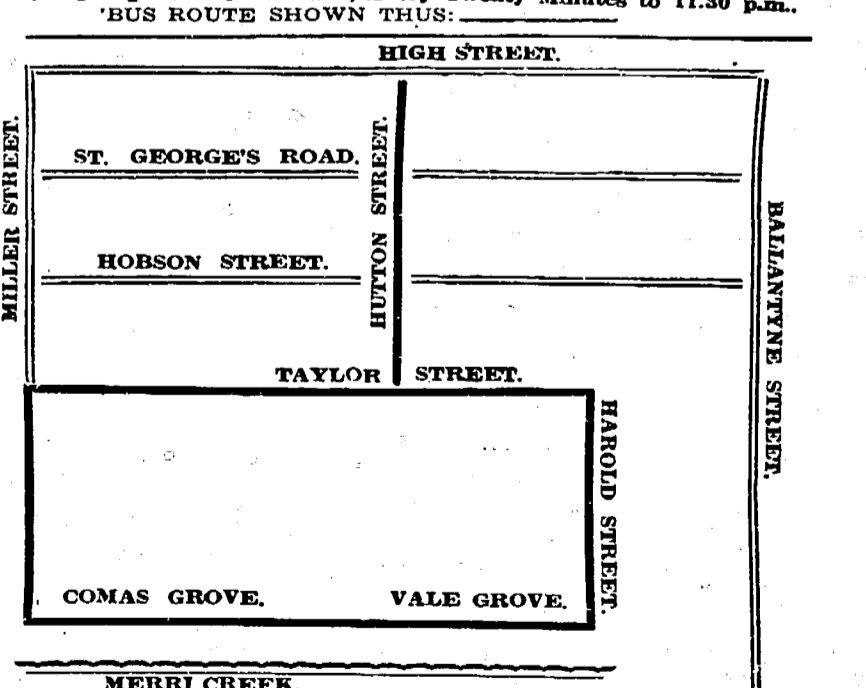

We'll All Live Underground in 2036 Says H. G. Wells

"Things To Come," Shows Marvellous Subterranean Cities Flooded With Artificial Sunshine

The visitors to our shores in 2055 will be spared the eternal query, "How do you like our skyline?"

For by that distant day, according to the celluloid prognostications of H. G. Wells in "Things To Come" our skyline will have vanished like the snows of yesteryear.

As a matter of fact, visitors will have to crane their necks down to view the architectural wonders of our city, which will have removed itself to an enormous cavern under the earth.

A bird's eye view of this marvellous city of the future, as depicted in this breath-taking Alexander Korda production, reveals very little human activity of any sort on the earth's surface—a few flying planes, perhaps, a few gardeners working on wide-sweeping terraces, a few occupied buildings of unfamiliar architecture.

But there is a lot of life going along which flows a continuous stream of streamlined vehicles, coming and going, and entering and leaving the underground city.

Shall we enter one of these strange vehicles and get a close-up of the great city? The streets are laid out in a style which we today might call "modern," and are so generously supplied with plants and blooms and decorative fountains that they give the effect of a great park.

There are also a number of glass, roomy but not large, with gracefully curved domes and no windows, yet the rooms, like the underground city, are flooded with brilliant sunshine.

The secret is this: They generate their own sunlight. And the living room of the future, how will it look? According to Mr. Wells' vision, it will be innocuous of pillars or right-angle joints.

After four weeks, the "city" was finished and ready for the camera. There were little frame structures of an almost forgotten era; there were stately brick buildings for stores; there was a police station.

Save With Ice

It is becoming more generally recognised each season that it is possible to "Save with Ice." A few years ago ice was looked upon as a luxury and no doubt at the prices it retailed at in the past combined with indifferent service, it bordered on a luxury.

With a much improved product, made by highly efficient machinery from sterilized water, combined with rapid delivery, and a moderate price, ice is now a regular household commodity. Every housewife who prides herself on her ability to manage a home in an economical manner, knows what a boon it is to possess an ice-chest. Those of to-day are much more efficient than in years gone by.

It has been estimated that apart from other benefits, the intelligent use of an ice-chest saves in food more than the cost of the weekly ice-bill. An occasional bottle of milk, or cream, meat, and other articles going bad through improper handling is not only costly and annoying, but distinctly dangerous to health. Indications are that this year more ice-chests than ever before will be used by discriminating housewives.

Ice not only keeps food cold and fresh, but also to the range of the menus that can be prepared during the hot weather. Below are given several recipes which may easily be prepared by those who possess an ice-chest.

Moulded Salmon—1 tablespoon salt; 1 tablespoon mustard; 2 or 3 egg yolks; 1 1/2 gills sweet cream; 1 gill vinegar; 1 1/2 tablespoons gelatine; 1 gill cold water; 1 tin salmon.

Make salad with the first six ingredients. Soak gelatine in cold water, dissolve in hot dressing, stirring well. Strain. Remove bones from salmon, break up with fork, add to dressing, put in mould wet with cold water. Set on ice. Unmould, serve on a bed of lettuce, garnish with olives, tomatoes, cucumber or hard-boiled egg slices.

Jellied Beetroot—1 bunch beetroot, 1 pint vinegar, 1 gill water, salt, Allspice, Sugar, Peppercorns.

Cook and skin beetroot. Put vinegar on to boil, add ingredients, then gelatine dissolved in water; strain, and when cool pour over sliced beetroot in a suitable dish for serving. Put on ice to set. Garnish with shredded lettuce or hard-boiled egg.

Brown—1 lb. shin beef; Pig's cheek, cow heel, sheep's head, mace, soup vegetables, bunch herbs, hard-boiled egg, beetroot, peppercorns, allspice.

Put meats on to cook slowly. Remove all scum, add vegetables and flavourings tied in muslin. Remove meat when cooked, cut in neat pieces to mould, put liquids aside to cool. Remove all fat, pour liquid over hard-boiled egg or beetroot. Put on ice to set.


Spanish Cream—1 pint milk, 4 level teaspoons sugar, 1 oz. gelatine, 2 eggs.

Remove milk when cooked, cut in neat pieces to mould, put liquids aside to cool. Remove all fat, pour liquid over hard-boiled egg or beetroot. Put on ice to set.

Prune Jelly—1 lb. prunes, 1 pint water, 4 oz. sugar, 1 pinch cinnamon stick, strips lemon rind, 1/2 oz. gelatine in pint of pure.

Soak prunes overnight. Cook with water and flavourings until quite tender. Add sugar, rub through hair sieve. Colour, if necessary, with red wine. Sherry or Madeira may be added if liked. Pour into wet mould, and put on ice to set. Or serve with cream or boiled custard.

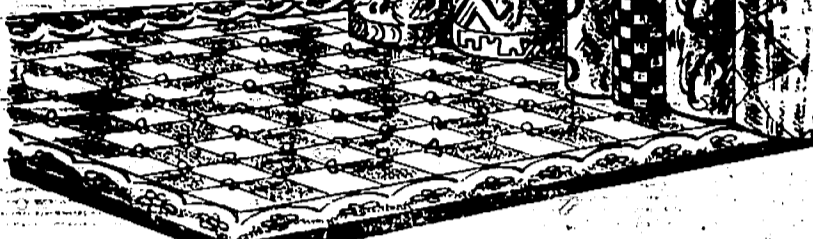

Northcote Horticultural Society

PREPARATIONS FOR GARDEN COMPETITION.

Mr. J. B. Wood, nurseryman, of Ivanhoe, addressed the members of the Northcote Horticultural Society at their last monthly meeting on the above subject, and it is hard to imagine one more fitted for the task. Ever aspect of the subject was dealt with in a most practical manner.

When preparing a garden to be at its best at a given time, the subject advised keeping to those flowers that can always be relied upon. Doubtful performers, however beautiful, should be avoided.

Two types of garden may be planned—the formal, and the informal. The latter was recommended, because of the wider scope afforded to the gardener's original ideas.

For shady positions, tree bogonias can be trained on the fences. In the case of the latter, the plants should be planted in sunny positions. For growing in them will become too tall and hide the second and third rows. Hidden colour schemes are recommended, using as little red as possible. Blue and pink was suggested as the most suitable.

Phlox, Seely and Drummond Pink Begonia, Butterfly Delphinium, Lilliput Zinnias, are all excellent for bedding, with background of Roses, Dahlias, flowering Zinnias, Delphiniums, Cosmos etc. For every dozen Zinnias planted, add two blue Salvias to soften the hard tones of the Zinnias. Agrostis, Marigolds, Petunias, Salvia Bonfire and Portulaca should be planted only in sunny positions. The lecturer answered many questions, and was cordially thanked for his assistance.

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
