Double Fatality At Regent

TRUCK—MOTOR-CYCLE
COLLISION

A head-on collision between a truck and a motor cycle and sidecar resulted in the deaths of two young men, Wilfred Arthur Barnard, 24 years, of Arden street, North Melbourne, and Montague Noel Brooks, who lived with relatives at Brighton.

The scene of the accident was in High street, Regent, where, on Saturday afternoon the truck was driven by Edmund Anthony Cronin of Fitzroy street, Fitzroy, and a motor-cycle ridden by Barnard. The truck and motor-cycle collided head-on. The wrecked motor-cycle and its occupants (Brooks was in the side-car) were dragged across the road for nearly 30 yards, and were forced against the window of a branch grocery store owned by R. Olver and Sons.

When extricated from the tangled mass of the motor-cycle, Barnard was dead, and Brooks was critically injured and unconscious. He died on Sunday morning in St. Vincent's Hospital.

A passenger of the truck, Henry Hutchinson, 33 years, of Islington street, Collingwood, was also admitted to the hospital suffering from minor injuries.

After interviewing the truck-driver, the police alleged that he did not hold a driver's license. Subsequently, he was submitted to medical examination, and later was charged with having driven a motor vehicle whilst under the influence of intoxicating liquor. At a later hour he was charged with manslaughter.

MONDAY MAY 31

Correspondence

The following correspondence was dealt with:—

Metro Board of Works notifying proposal to extend water supply in Victoria road from Flinders to Collins streets and requesting permission to use explosives—Received.

National Safety Council re proposal for erection of flags "children crossing" on poles in the vicinity of schools with a view to the preservation of child life, notifying that seven flags are being forwarded, and asking that arrangements be made to fix same in the vicinity of the Helen street, Pender's Grove, and Clarke street schools.—Referred to officers.

40 Hour Week — Electrical Trades Union of Victoria, requesting that the council receive a deputation urging the introduction of a 40 hour week.

Cr. Turner: I suggest they have a case to hear, and we have nothing to lose in hearing them. Some municipalities have adopted the 40 hour week. I move we receive the deputation. Cr. Bird seconded the motion, which was carried, and the date for hearing the deputation was fixed for June 21.

Northcote Unemployed Association asking the council to receive a deputation in regard to winter relief work for local unemployed.—Received.

E. Price re (1) condition of footpath and roadway Railway parade, between Beaver's road and Elm street; (2) re condition of footpaths and channels, Beaver's road. The first request was sent to the Public Works committee; and in regard to the second, the writer is to be advised that the street was listed to be made.

Municipal Control of Football—City of Coburg inviting two representatives to a conference to discuss the question of football administration. The suggestion is the control of football clubs by municipalities which control the grounds on which Association football is played with a view of improving the present position and raising the status of the game.—Received and referred to the committee of the council.

In connection with this letter Cr Green said it was most desirable to send two representatives to discuss the matter. Using the ratepayers' money for sporting fixtures is another matter "We should send delegates to attend the conference without committing the council, but they should be instructed to say that this council is not in favour of municipal control"

Cr. Green further stated that the patronage of the League games was due to the psychological view of the followers of football. People were attracted more by the crowds than by the football played at League fixtures Here we play as good a game as any League club."

"THE BRIDGE THAT ISN'T" . . .

Representatives of Northcote and Preston Councils Meet at Miller Street Bridge

FOLLOWING an exchange of letters, representatives of both councils met on Wednesday, June 2, at 4 p.m. at the Miller Street Bridge, to discuss the possibilities of re-building it so as to accommodate not only the trams but also vehicular and pedestrian traffic.

Cr. Jones (Northcote) moved, and Cr. Croft (Preston) seconded that the scheme involving an expenditure of approximately £11,000 be recommended for consideration by both councils, informing the municipal bodies concerned that the conference favoured the above scheme in preference to one involving £20,000 to £30,000 expenditure.—Carried.

The Mayor of Northcote (Cr. A. V. Peters) was elected chairman of the meeting which was at-

tended by the following: Crs. Peters (Mayor), Jones, Turner and Green (Northcote), Crs. Croft, Mott and Pike (Preston), the Town Clerks (Messrs Thomson and Williams) and the City Engineers, (Messrs Bradley and Johnson) were also present, as were also a number of Northcote business-men, Messrs Anderson, Gray, Nelson, Stevens, Johns and Langfield.

The details of the meeting with full particulars of the scheme recommended will appear in next issue.

Ejectment

For having sold, on February 25, chopped meat which contained sulphur dioxide, a preservative at the rate of 3.8 grains per pound, when it was not permissible to add any preservative to meat of this description. G. Peake, butcher, of High street, Preston, was fined £2 with £2/17/ costs.

No Receipts.

James A. Robertson, of George street, Reservoir, sued Mrs. Lehmann of Pine street, Reservoir for a balance due on some chairs purchased by the defendant.

Mrs. Lehmann told the court that she gave money to her young son to pay Robertson, but the latter did not give him any receipts. She said she owed the complainant 2/-. The son corroborated this, and the court made an order for the amount admitted. Adulterated Cream.

A slight trace of alkaline, and a small percentage of preservative were found in a sample of cream purchased by the Health Inspector of the City of Preston (Mr. James O. Hes) from A. M. Perkins, of Bell street, Preston.

"The rightful person who should have been prosecuted should have been the wholesaler who supplied the cream to Perkins," said Mr. R. T. Cahill (for the defence). "Perkins, by force of circumstances, has found himself in the role of defendant."

A fine of £2 with £3/7/8 costs was imposed.

Before Mr. E. E. O'Grady, P.M. A long list of traffic cases was dealt with by the court.

Vernon Lancaster, 18 years, of Holden street, Fitzroy, was charged with having ridden a bicycle without lights on May 5 in St. George's road. Evidence to this effect was given by Constable Maher, who said that he motioned defendant to stop, but defendant tried to dodge him. A fine of £1 in default three days' imprisonment, and 5/- costs was imposed.

Charged with having passed the intersection of High and Collins streets, Thornbury at a speed greater than that allowed by the regulations, John Joseph Parker, of Kenilworth parade, Reservoir, was fined £3.

Evidence was given that the defendant travelled at a speed of between 40 and 50 miles an hour on April 11.

Bennell Still Undeclared

In defeating Terry Reilly of Victoria at Fitzroy last week, "Rocky" Bennell, of New South Wales, preserved his undefeated record, but appeared to be fortunate to escape being knocked out during the first round. Bennell seemed to off-balance when a right caught him behind the ear, crushing him against the ropes. Helpless, he was a target for the few half-hearted punches that Reilly released, enjoined to do so by his second, and the bell sounded at a very opportune time. Recovering quickly, Bennell gave a taste of his quality by right-crossing Reilly in the third, and following up with a hard right to the body. Agile and dexterous, Bennell was a right which he used too infrequently characterised Bennell's work throughout the remainder of the contest, but it was noted that he did not accept punishment with the same calm as Reilly, who in his usual style, battled along until the end. Although down again in the 15th, more through losing his balance than anything else, Bennell clearly had a good lead on points, and was duly crowned by the referee.

DEALT WITH BY NORTHCOTE COUNCIL

DISCOURTEOUS BUS DRIVER
Following several complaints from ratepayers, and from his own personal investigation, Cr. O'Over at the meeting of the Northcote council on Monday evening lodged a complaint against a bus-driver on the Dundas street-Victoria road route, who had apparently adopted the practice of starting his vehicle immediately passen-

COOKERY NOOK

DO YOU LIKE CURRY?

Curries are hot-country dishes but they are so comforting in cold weather that we prefer them in winter-time!

Beef or Mutton Curry.

If you are making a curry of fresh meat, allow a quarter of a pound of lean beef or mutton to each person. Cut this into small dice, and set aside while you make your curry sauce.

Curry Sauce.

For this peel and core a cook- ing apple, and peel and slice two onions. Chop both up very finely. Melt 2 oz. of butter in a sauce- pan, fry the apple and onion small- ly, then add one small onion, and a dessertspoonful of flour and a des- sertspoonful of curry powder. Stir for a few minutes, then add a pint of good stock, and a sliced tomato and seasoning and the diced meat. Bring gently to the boil again, then simmer very gently for half an hour.

Corned Beef Curry.

A tinned beef makes a good curry. Boiled, steaming should be quite sufficient. Boiling, cauliflower, celery, and lentils are all very delicious served with a curry sauce.

Haddock and herrings cooked in the usual way, and served with curriesauce and one of the above vegetables makes a pleasant change.

Poached eggs on spinach may be given a curry sauce also.

Curried prawns and cold curried eggs are great favourites.

COOKING THE RICE.

All curries need rice. With hot curries it should be piping hot and tender. For this purpose, Patna rice is the best to choose. Allow one pound for two people. It should be washed in cold water, then cooked in plenty of boiling salt- ed water. When cooked it should be given a second bath in cold water, and gently reheated in the oven or over a low gas flame. This second rinsing removes superfluous starch, and prevents the grains from sticking together in a mass.

The Right Chutney to Serve.

A sweet chutney is the right one to serve, and the Indian mango chutney is best. This, with a hardy sauce, may be added to the sauce, or served separately.

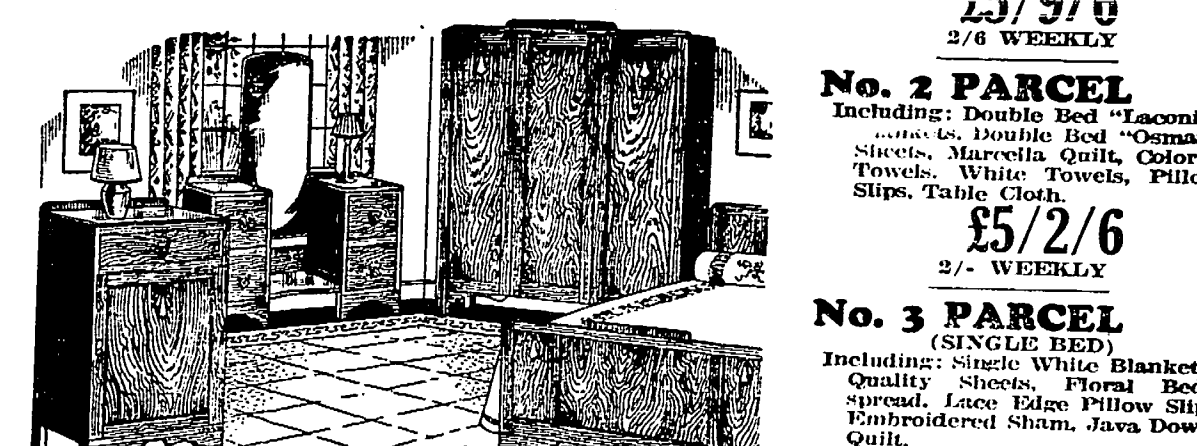

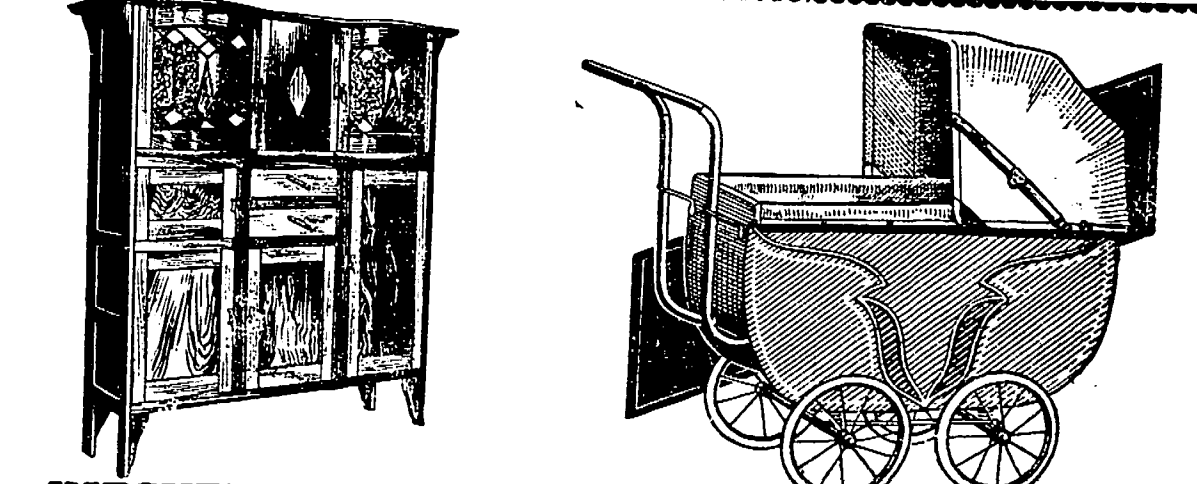

AN EXPERIMENT THAT WENT WRONG

There have been plenty of experiments which have proved costly, and have brought no profit. A notable one in this category was the effort on the part of the American authorities to place a smoke-screen around one of the big naval air-ships. Planes followed the ship across New York and poured out clouds of fog. This smoke was made from a chemical called titanium tetrachloride, and apparently those in charge forgot that this stuff, when released in moist air, forms particles of powerful hydrochloric acid. The result was a rain of acid upon New York. It started everyone coughing. It made people's hands and faces sting; it burned holes in their clothes, and in the tops of motor-cars.

SHIP TRANSPORTED IN A BOX

A three-masted sailing ship, built on the Clyde (England) has just made a 4,000 mile trip while crossing the Atlantic, and so has achieved a record. Yes! You are right. Sailing ships have crossed the Atlantic before, and sailed 4,000 mile voyages. But this ship crossed the Atlantic packed in wooden crates, never touching the water, the sides of the cargo steamer in which it was packed only coming into contact with the water.

THE LEADER GLOBE-TROTTER in ECONOMICS

World Economic Conference—It would seem that tentative inquiries are being made with regard to the prospects of another world economic conference. It is now ten years since the W.E.C. in Geneva, where so much was promised by way of pious resolutions. Since then, the W.E.C. in London (1933) proved among the most sterile in history. Much water has flowed under the bridge since then; and the stream is certainly clearer. Chastened by bitter experience, another W.E.C. might meet in the spirit of 1937, but this time consummate resolutions in action. Above all things, another abortive conference like that of 1933 must be avoided.

Albertian Aspirations.—Mr Albert, finding his budget turned down by the die-hards of his party, looked resignation in the face, but balked. Eventually he agreed to set up a commission to draw up a plan to introduce a sales tax. The necessary bill was introduced into the Albertian Legislature a short time ago. It is hoped that Major Douglas would consent to act as chairman of the commission. Late reports will either consent or else frankly admit that social credit is all hopes pious.

Italian Conspiracy Loan.—Italy has just floated a compulsory loan. All owners of land and buildings (owner of premises valued at £100 being exempt) were compelled to lend the equivalent of 5 per cent of the value of their property. To redeem the loan a tax is being imposed on real estate. The net result will be that, in advance, the lender will get no interest and will not get his capital back. The loan is really the liquidation of the Abyssinian. Apparently the Abyssinian venture is only just beginning.

New Zealand Investments.—Industrial shares fell about 7 per cent between the middle of 1935 and the end of 1936. During the same period they rose about 10 per cent in Australia. For the time being, it is believed that N.Z. prosperity is on the upgrade and her exports are flourishing. Why the sag in the investment market? We need not look beyond the effect of political action on freedom of trade, rising costs and taxation. That N.Z. capital is migrating to Australia is well known. Two new companies, N.Z. and the other time—one in the United States—to conduct the same class of business are interesting examples. The shares of the N.Z. company are 14 per cent below par, and the shares of the Australian company are 30 per cent above par. Nothing is so foolish as to say that capital can account for the difference.

Russian Gold.—Not long ago it was reported that consignments of gold valued at £100,000,000 were on their way from Russia to U.S.A. Russia is not pressed for foreign credits to finance current trade with the United States, therefore, that the U.S.S.R. is anxious to build up dollar reserves in case of contingencies (e.g., war). These consignments may reasonably be expected to continue, as Russia is now a substantial producer of gold. The annual value of her production at present is estimated at about £50 m. This is nearly five times Russia's pre-war output. The annual value of South African output is £25 m.

Swedish Expansion.—Sweden, like other countries, is experiencing the sharp nature of prices. It is recognized that the increase in exports and export prices probably results largely from abnormal demands (directly or indirectly) on the part of the United States. In fact, authoritative opinion holds that a present view towards an exaggerated industrial expansion can be discovered to exist. It may be added that while Sweden is the foremost of democratic countries, it believes in leaving exports' jobs to experts.

THE LENGTH OF NEW CARS

The garage problem is one reason; another is the increasing space long cars take in traffic and parking areas.

WHY BREAD AND BUTTER?

YOU would have to be hungry indeed to enjoy a meal of dry bread and nothing else; but eleven small amounts of butter with the bread, even a fastidious appetite is satisfied. The colder the weather the more food is required by the human body to keep warmth in it, and generally run the human machine. Great heat, however, not only makes the need for food less, but delays the digestion. Now, fat is less digestible than other foods, hence you get the instinctive aversion of the appetite from fats during heat.

Now you will see for yourself why lemon is so useful in hot weather. It is the very opposite to sugar in its action. The only forms of food which can be eaten abundantly in heat are carbohydrates, and without knowing anything of the science of it, coolies have been living on rice for centuries, negroes on cassava and potatoes, and Mexicans on maize.

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

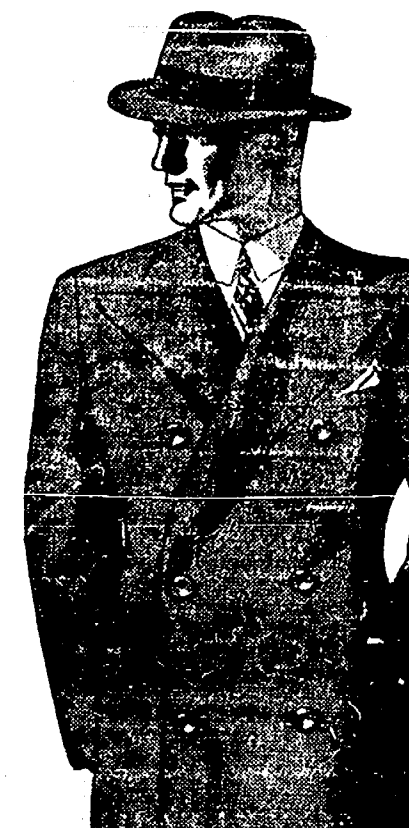

Conference Discusses Miller Street Bridge

Representatives Inspect Site

£11,000 SCHEME FAVORED

Eyesore And Daily Menace

At four o'clock on Wednesday, June 2, representatives of Northcote and Preston Councils met at the Miller Street Bridge to discuss the possibilities of re-building and modernising the existing structure (which at present carries tram only) to accommodate vehicular and pedestrian traffic.

During the discussion the present bridge was referred to as an eyesore and a continual menace to ratepayers of both municipalities, many of whom are daily using it as a footbridge.

The conference was attended by the following:—Cr. A. V. Peters (Mayor of Northcote), Crs. Green, Jones, and Turner, from Northcote; Crs. Croft, Mott and Pike from Preston. The Town Clerks of both municipalities, Messrs. J. A. Thomson and I. W. Williams, and the City Engineers (Messrs. V. J. Bradley and B. Johnson) were also present.

The meeting attracted also a number of Thornbury business people, who are keenly interested in the progress of that part of the suburb. They were Messrs. Anderson (Andersons Pty. Ltd.), Gray, Nelson (Nelsons Pty. Ltd.), J. Langfield, Johns and C. Stevens. The proceedings opened with the election of the Mayor of Northcote (Cr. A. V. Peters) chairman of the meeting.

The chairman instructed the Northcote City Engineer (Mr. Bradley) to outline the propositions which were the outcome of a conference between the Country Roads Board Engineer and the two local engineers.

The schemes were as follows:— Make provision for two lines of road traffic with a single line of electric track. This scheme makes provision for two 5ft footpaths on either side of the proposed structure. The gradients in this scheme would remain as they now are (1 in 14 and 1 in 12). This scheme provides also for a retaining wall and for slight alteration to approaches on either side of Miller street (Ethel street and Railway parade). The approximate cost is £11,000.

The second proposal was for a similar bridge, but the gradients to be made uniform on either side and made more gradual. This scheme requires an expenditure of £20,000 - £30,000.

According to Mr. Bradley, this scheme, in view of such a big expenditure, was not seriously considered, or discussed to any great extent.

A make-shift change, making

only temporary provision and costing only £5,000 was the third scheme. Cr. Jones (Northcote) moved that the scheme involving the expenditure of £11,000 be recommended for consideration by both councils. The motion was seconded by Cr. Croft (Preston).

The motion was carried. From the general trend of the discussion it appears that the financial aspect of the reconstruction is the only item which may retard the modernising and re-building of the bridge.

The question of finance, however, is not going to be discussed as yet. When the visiting business people were asked as to their opinions regarding the present condition, Mr. Anderson said that in no other municipality would such an eyesore be tolerated. The bridge, if reconstructed, would be of considerable benefit to both municipalities.

The main step in the direction of abolishing the "bridge that isn't" has now been taken, and we are anxiously awaiting the second and consequent steps in that direction, which eventually will remove the blot from both councils, who for many reasons (good reasons, no doubt) have by their inactivity, retarded the progress of the district.

During the time the party was present (about an hour) a speaker counted no fewer than 20 pedestrians who crossed the bridge.

Old Crocks' Race
DISCUSSION AT PRESTON
NONE UNDER 30 YEARS

At the Preston Council meeting on Monday evening, Cr. G. H. Mott submitted a report of the recent conference with Northcote Council on the site of the proposed bridge.

Cr. Mott suggested that the Northcote Council be communicated with with a request that the particulars of the £11,000 scheme as outlined by the Northcote Engineer (Mr. V. J. Bradley) be submitted to the Preston Council in writing, as it was difficult to convey all its ramifications in a verbal report.

Cr. Croft seconded the motion, and said that the idea he obtained from the conference was that the Northcote Council would expect Preston to find the bulk of the money for the work regarding the proposed work as "Preston's business".

Cr. Swain: What did you say?
Cr. Croft: Something along those lines was hinted at.
The motion was carried.

It was also decided to ask the Northcote Council if it would consider a modified proposal.

At a later stage in the meeting, it was decided to give the City Engineer (Mr. Ben Johnson) authority to approach the Employment Council with a view to securing a government grant towards the proposed work.

In an event sponsored by the Light Car Club of Australia, to aid the Austin Hospital Cancer Appeal, 27 ancient cars (if they may be termed cars) turned up at the start, Alexandra avenue, and made noisy and fitful progress via East Melbourne, Collingwood, Heidelberg to Warrigal Park. Not all the participants in this veteran race managed to complete the course. Northcote was represented by a French landaulet (built in 1906, and still going strong) driven by Messrs. R. Fawcett and G. Sills.

Thousands of people lined the route and clapped approval as the ancient contraptions rumbled past. Although built 31 years ago (no car less than 30 years old was eligible), the L.C.C. reached the permitted speed of 30 miles an hour.

Keeping the Gas Burner—A rush of cold air into the oven often spoils cakes. To avoid this, keep a small mirror in the kitchen. When you want to reduce the gas in the oven without opening the door of the oven draw out the pan

from underneath, tilt the mirror until the jets can be seen, then lower the flame as required. Be careful to look on both sides in case the gas is not burning evenly. (Mrs. B. Parsons, 154 Separation street, Northcote.)

To Test Mushrooms—When cooking mushrooms place a small piece of karrle with them. If the karrle turns black, the mushrooms are no good, but if it stays white, the mushrooms are all right. This will not affect the flavour of the mushrooms. (Mrs. J. Mathwin, 59 Clarendon street, Thornbury.)

Useful Glue—It is always handy to have some liquid glue in the house. An economical glue is made from horax and shellac. Dissolve one ounce of horax in a pint of boiling water, add two ounces of shellac, and boil in a saucepan until the shellac is dissolved. This will form a very useful cement, which withstands damp much better than ordinary glue. (Mrs. N. Cohen, 48 Normanby avenue, Thornbury.)

What to do with a Lamb's Head—Buy a lamb's head for 5s. Remove the brains and the tongue, and boil the head with vegetables. Boil the brains and put them on toast for your husband's breakfast. Put the tongue in his sandwiches for lunch. After the head is cooled, cut all the meat off, and put it through the mincer with an onion, and make tasty rissoles to be served with mashed potatoes after the soup for tea. (Mrs. N. Free, 84 Bent street, Northcote.)

MAKING DO WITH CHEAPER JOINTS
SUGGESTIONS FOR GOOD NOURISHING DISHES

Now that the price of meat has gone up, the housewife is faced with the problem of how to maintain the standard of her meals, and at the same time keep within her unchanged weekly allowance. The cheaper kinds of joints are very tender if cooked slowly so as to make them tender. It is not always necessary to have meat, if care is taken to use a substitute that is equally nourishing. Dishes made with peas, beans, and lentils are just as nourishing as meat, especially if sweet dumplings, bacon, butter, or fried bread are served with them. Cheese, and eggs can also be used in place of meat.

Economical Joints
For roasting:—Topside of beef. Top rib of beef. Back rib of beef. Ribs of beef (boned and rolled). Half shoulder of mutton (Birds' end). Sheep's heart. Breast of mutton or lamb (stuffed and rolled). Thin flank (rolled and with gristle removed). Thick flank (boned or baked). For Large Families. Half a pig's head roasted is very good, besides being economical and new to many people. Ox heart (stewed for two hours, then roasted). H-bone of beef is an excellent joint, weighing about 11lbs. The butcher will saw it in two. Half may be salted if desired, and the other half baked.

So plain is it that the reader feels that he too, has been Hitler's captive, living as the author's cell-mate, sharing his bewilderment, his hopes, his fears, his sufferings, and his despair. If it were solely a work of art it would be a notable triumph. It is more, for it is plain truth, unadorned in the telling. The Nazis did a bad day's work for themselves when they imprisoned (for six months and without trial) Mr. Stefan Lorant, the brilliant young Hungarian editor of a Munich paper.

"Paths of Glory" - Humphrey Cobb. It is a novel, cool, detached and deadly, head and shoulders above any other war novel, not excluding "All Quiet on the Western Front" or "The Road to Glory" in your bones, do not read this book. This is some of the most harrowing stuff ever written, told with an artistry that doubles its effect. If you are hardy enough to stand it, "Paths of Glory" is your book.

"Cool Customer" - William McLeod Raine. This story is a Western mystery thriller. A young man returns to his home town to clear the name of his uncle and himself. They have been charged with murder and bank-robbery. After thrilling adventures he brings home to the guilty parties the crime so skillfully plotted with an ally, Sucky Cameron is a fascinating hero, and there are two delightful and modern heroines. This is a splendid Western adventure story.

"BENGAL FIRE" - Lawrence Blockman. Mr. Lawrence Blockman, author of that successful novel "Bombay Mail," again chooses India for a fast-moving detective story. The cheerful crowd of wedding guests that had assembled for the wedding of Harrison J. Hoyt, a well-known publicity agent in Calcutta, was hushed into silence when out of an adjacent bride's coach an over-carrying groom to church, fell a lifeless body. Harrison Hoyt was dead. It was as mysterious a crime as even that country of mystery and intrigue had even known. Mr. Blockman exploits his original and unusual setting to the full, and recounts, game extraordinarily, happenings in very readable and racy style.

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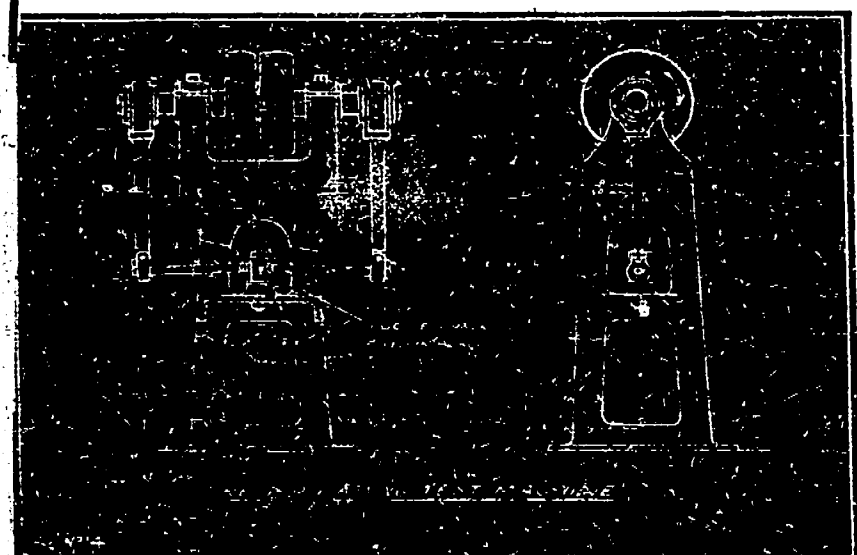

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Garage Proprietor Gets Damages

Before Judge MacIndoe in the County Court on June 18, Leslie Hutchinson Tadich, garage proprietor of High street, Thornbury, claimed from Constable Sydney Emerson £99 damages for alleged assault, wrongful arrest and malicious prosecution.

Opening the case, Mr. Gamble, (for the plaintiff) said that on March 1 Tadich with his wife and three friends went to see the Test match. At about 5.30 p.m. Tadich and his party on leaving the Melbourne Cricket Ground, were walking along the footpath across Jolimont Park. One of the friends, a Mr. Potter was bumped by a car, and a suitcase he was carrying was knocked out of his hand. A few minutes later, another car bumped Potter, who remonstrated with the driver, as the path had a notice on it "No bicycles allowed on this footpath."

A City Council official came up to Potter and asked him to get on the path, and when Potter asserted that he had a right on the path, the parking official called a traffic constable, Emerson.

Tadich put an arm on Potter's arm, saying "You have done nothing wrong," to which Emerson, the defendant in the case before the court, replied "Oh hasn't he, I'll show you." With this comment Mr. Gamble punched Tadich on the jaw and felled him. Mrs. Tadich also fell over with a strong arm grip, he made Tadich walk over to a taxi, and took him to the Russell street police station. Emerson refused Mrs. Tadich's offer to use the plaintiff's car, and Tadich was then charged with obstructing the police, offensive behaviour and indecent language. Bail was fixed at £15, but when Mrs. Tadich, who has assets valued at £5,000, offered to go bail for her husband she was not accepted. Tadich spent three hours in a cell before his wife obtained cash and bailed him out.

Two days later Tadich appeared before Mr. Hauser F.M. and justices and all cases were dismissed. Mr. Hauser after listening to four out of six witnesses for the prosecution said "I do not want to hear any more."

The case for the defendant (Emerson) was used but that if it was used it was done in the course of lawful arrest; that defendant had reasonable and just cause to arrest Tadich, and that defendant believed Tadich to be guilty of offences under various sections of the Police Offences Act.

Defendant denied malice. When giving evidence Tadich said that at Russell street police station his wife was refused the use of a telephone. He denied that Potter was unduly aggressive and he further denied assuming a fighting attitude himself. Four witnesses corroborated the evidence of the complainant.

Constable Emerson gave a totally different version of the proceedings. He said that before he had had time to speak to anyone plaintiff jumped between him and Potter and struck witness in the stomach saying "You can't take him. He's my cobbler." He then pushed Tadich with his left hand and he fell plaintiff got up and rushed towards him in a fighting attitude. He also called him a "mong" and told him "You could not pinch me."

Emerson continuing said that he then arrested Tadich. In cross-examination he admitted being an ex-boxer. He had not punched Tadich.

P. W. Chanter was the only other witness for the defence and he corroborated the constable's story.

Counsel for the plaintiff intimated that his client did not seek substantial damages, but only such amount as would vindicate his action in bringing the proceedings. The jury found for plaintiff and assessed damages at £1 together with £1/4 special damages. Judge MacIndoe entered judgment for plaintiff for £5/4 with costs to be taxed.

IN YOUR GARDEN
 Manure Not Needed.
 It is a mistake to give the bulbs any strong forcing manures and some varieties should not be given manure of any sort. A little very weak liquid cow manure can be given to such varieties as Hyacinths, Tulips, Narcissus, and Crocuses, but we do not advise that it be used on other bulbs. Anemones in particular are very likely to become attacked by a rusty fungus, and die off if they are forced in any way.
 June is one of the best months in which to plant gladiolus corms, which should be put in four inches deep.

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Betting Prosecution Fails On Technicality
UNUSUAL DEFENCE
P.M. OVER-RULED BY JUSTICES
 By two votes to one, two local Justices of the Peace, Messrs J. Hartnett and H. F. Tulloch overruled the police magistrate (Mr. E. O'Grady) when a betting prosecution which came before the Northcote Court on Friday, June 18, was dismissed.
 The defendant was James Cross, who was charged with having, at 4.15 p.m. on June 12, unlawfully used premises at Beaver's street for betting.
 Senior Constable Kerr-Taylor said that at 4 p.m. on June 12, with other police, he went to a dwelling in Beaver's street. Cross was standing at the back door, and had a number of betting slips in his hand. Witness took Cross into the kitchen and read to him a search warrant. On the kitchen table was a racing guide to form. Cross handed it over to the witness. Mr. O'Grady (for the Crown) asked if he accepted the bets written on the slips, defendant replied "I stayed in the garden, and they were handed over to me the next day."
 Mr. O'Grady asked if he was familiar with Northcote? Not very.
 Do you know that there is no such place as "Beaver's street" in Northcote?
 In reply, witness said that the warrant handed to him referred to No. 10 Beaver's street.
 The Town Clerk of Northcote, (Mr. J. A. Thomson) who knew a Beaver's road in Northcote, but to his knowledge there was no "Beaver's street."
 Mr. O'Grady said there could be no such premises as No. 10 Beaver's street?
 The Town Clerk—No.
 Senior Constable Thomson (prosecuting) for the Crown, said that the search warrant referred to premises in Beaver's street, and could not be amended.
 The P.M. the police apparently knew where the premises were, as the warrant instructed the police to go to No. 10 Beaver's street—a place which was proved by the evidence to be a private road.
 Mr. Ridgway submitted that as the warrant instructed the police to go to No. 10 Beaver's street, his client was therefore unlawfully in court. He rested his defence on the fact that the police on their own admission did not enter No. 10 Beaver's street.
 Senior Constable Thomson: There is no doubt whatever that the police went to the right house.
 The P.M. said that by a majority decision the charge would be dismissed, but he dissented from the decision. He took the view, after hearing the town clerk's evidence, that the premises had been linked up with sufficient exactitude.
 A charge against another man named Watson, for having been found guilty of having a licence in a common gaming house, was adjourned for eight weeks.

REVENGE FOR HIDING
 That nothing can stop the machinery of the law once it has been set in motion, was proved on June 22, in Northcote Court, when Stanley George, 19 years of Union street, West-garth appeared to answer a charge of larceny.
 On May 21 Stanley George asked his elder brother, Thomas Edward George for the loan of a bicycle. In spite of the fact that the request had been refused, he took the bicycle, and consequently received a "hiding" from his brother.
 On the following day Thomas George missed a suit and a pair of shirts from his wardrobe. Thinking they had been stolen, he reported the matter to the police. Constable St. Y. Crawford of Northcote, said that he interviewed the younger brother in connection with the theft, and he subsequently admitted removing the suit and the shirts and hiding them in some bushes along the Merri Creek. Defendant said he took the clothes as a revenge for his brother's "hiding" him. He wanted to withdraw the charge, but was informed that at that stage the matter was out of his hands.
 In court, Crawford said that from personal observation, he had formed the opinion that the young George was "not all there."
 The case was adjourned for 26 weeks.

RECENT IMPROVEMENTS IN SOUTH WARD
 The local reconstruction and improvements to streets and footpaths are well in hand in the South Ward of the City of Northcote. Walker and McLachlan streets schemes are practically completed, making these thoroughfares some of the best in the municipality.

The footpaths of South crescent and the road in Evans crescent have been completed. Work is favourably progressing in Jessie and Green streets, as is the scheme which will connect Cunningham and East streets. BASIC WAGE UP 6/-

By a unanimous decision of the Full Court of the Arbitration Court, consisting of Chief Judge Dethridge, Judge Beeby and Judge Drake-Brockmann, the total basic wage has been increased by 6/- in Melbourne, Sydney and Brisbane, the increase in other States being 4/-

The new basic wage is now £3/15/. The general opinion is that the workers will have more spending power. Naturally the cost of production will go up, and will eventually be passed on to the general public, which does not mean that there will be an immediate increase in the cost of living.

The increase will apply as follows:—3/- per week on the first pay in July; and a further 3/ per week on the first pay on October.
