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Northcote Mayoral Ball

TOWN HALL EN FETE

A SHARP, clear night on Tuesday favored the Mayoral couple, Cr and Mrs A. V. Peters, when they entertained representatives from neighbouring municipalities and Northcote citizens at a ball in the Northcote Town Hall. About 680 were present and enjoyed dancing and social intercourse to the fullest extent.

All routes converged to the Northcote Town Hall for the largest function in Northcote's social year, and eager couples entered in happy anticipation of a night full of entertainment.

Dancing was joyously entered into, and the function proved a wonderful success. The number in attendance had been greater on only one previous occasion, that being the night of the Northcote Jubilee Ball in 1933.

The music was excellent, and the floor, in first-class order, was crowded for every dance.

THE DECORATIONS

Wide steps had been raised from the ballroom floor to the stage and were carpeted in red. The stage had a background of palms, ferns and bamboo; and low pedestals of pink heath and magenta chrysanthemums added a colour note. Pink roses rambled over the balconettes which were backed with deep green heath foliage.

Palms transformed the lobby which was set with chairs, and settees and warmed by radiators. In the supper rooms pink and white native heath in tall silver vases graced the tables, and tri-colour bunting was draped round the walls.

Supper was served in the small town hall, lodge, and committee rooms, but two sittings were necessary to accommodate the guests. Later a buffet was opened. The catering was in the capable hands of Mr. and Mrs. Olorenshaw, of Normanby Hall, Thornbury.

OFFICIAL ENTRY

Led by the Mayor and Mayoress and the Town Clerk and Mrs. J. A. Thomson, visiting municipal representatives, members of Parliament, and councillors and their wives, the official entry was made at 8.30 p.m. The guests were received and greeted by Cr. and Mrs. Peters, and then took up their positions on the stage.

When they were accommodated, the debutantes and their partners entered.

THE DEBUTANTES

Trained by Miss Nell Wigston, fifteen debutantes and their partners gracefully performed a Coronation Waltz, which embraced the Parma, Modern, Circular, and other waltz steps. Each debutante was presented to the Mayor and Mayoress, and at the conclusion of the set, the ball was opened by the Mayor and Mayoress joining in a fox-trot.

Dainty white silk net gowns over taffeta were selected by the debutantes. Taffeta banded the bouffant skirts, and short puffed sleeves and formed the stitched Peter Pan collars. A wide taffeta sash tied in a bow with long ends at the back, and on their hair rested frangipanni blooms. Small ostrich fans with silver handles were carried.

THE OFFICIAL SUPPER

The official supper was held in the small town hall.

After the Loyal Toast, had been honoured at the instance of the Mayor, Mr. J. Cain, M.L.A. proposed the toast of the Mayor and Mayoress of Northcote.

Mr. Cain said he had known the Mayor for close on a quarter of a century, and in those days, little did he expect him to attain the high dignity of the Chief Magistrate of the city. He had entered the council some five or six years ago, and had carried out his duties not only to the satisfaction of the ratepayers of the ward he represented, but also to the satisfaction of his council colleagues, who had accorded to him the highest honour it was in the power of the council to bestow—the Mayoralty. As Mayor, Cr. Peters had carried out the duties pertaining to the office in a capable and zealous manner, and the city had lost no prestige through his occupancy of the chair. The Mayoress had done her job well, and had brought to the exercise of her duties, not only tact and judgment, but enthusiasm as well, which had marked her as an excellent mayoress. Her actions had been a credit to herself and to the municipality. Her actions spoke louder than any words which he could express, and he believed that she was among one of the most able and efficient in the past 25 years. In conclusion, Mr. Cain hoped that both would be long spared to carry on, and perhaps at some future time, they might again occupy the position. (Applause.)

The toast was accorded musical honours.

Replying, the Mayor thanked all who were present that evening for their attendance. He was pleased to see so many representatives of other municipalities present. He gave thanks to those responsible for the arrangement of the debutante set, which was one of the most charming he had seen; and to all who had assisted in the arrangements which had helped to make the ball so enjoyable. been of great assistance to him and their co-operation had made it possible to devote the necessary time to the duties of the office. He also thanked the Mayoress, who had been a loyal and devoted helpmeet. She had given of her best and had faltered at nothing to make the year of office successful.

MANY heated disputes extended the long list of business that Northcote Council had to deal with on Monday night, June 28. To enable a deputation from the Electrical Trades Union to address the council early in the evening, the order of the proceedings was reversed...

NOT ONE RAT! A heated discussion arose out of the reception of a letter from the Thornbury branch of the A.L.P. dealing with three matters: (1) 40 hour working week; (2) re-creation of streets and rights of way; (3) Separation street tip.

Mr. Turner moved that the letter be received. He further moved that the first item be referred to the committee of the council, and the other two to the Public Works committee.

Mr. French wanted to know what was the nature of the complaint in regard to the Separation street tip. Mr. French (Mr. J. A. Thomson) said that the writer complained about the number of rats which were migrating from the tip to neighbouring houses.

Mr. French said that the writer mentioned that the first council to introduce the 40 hour week was Port Pirie council (S.A.). At present over 30 councils have adopted it in N.S.W. Getting nearer home five councils within the Melbourne metropolitan area had followed suit.

HEATED OUTBURST BY CR. JOHNSON Mr. Jones' report of the Council of Northern Municipalities meeting provided another high-light in a somewhat stormy meeting. The matter was linked up with the report of the committee of the council which recommended that the housing scheme proposed by Cr. J. H. Morris of Coburg be submitted to the Government for consideration.

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MARTIAL MUSIC

COLOURFUL CEREMONY AT PRESTON TOWN HALL

The stirring sound of martial music echoed throughout the City of Preston on the night of June 22 when the local battalion, the 57/40th, paraded at the Preston Town Hall.

The parade, arranged in conjunction with the Preston Citizens Committee of the battalion was ably assisted by the Preston Municipal Band, who paraded and played before the function and finally played the March Past of the troops. The Militia personnel of the Battalion, together with many local returned soldiers who occupied a place of honour at the head of the marching column, marched from the Drill Hall, Kipling street to the Town Hall, which, when halted they faced, the column extending the full length of the municipal buildings.

After the independent receiving of the Regimental and King's Colours to the ranks the parade was inspected by General Stewart (Colonel) and the Staff Captain (Captain Lee). At the conclusion of the inspection, the whole parade marched past General Stewart, and returned to the Drill Hall.

Other functions arranged by the same bodies include a dance at the Orde hall on July 12. Kings street and Victoria road.

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Can't Serve Two Masters

CLAIM FOR £50

At the Preston Court on June 23 James Frost, of Highbury, Preston, claimed £50 from Gordon James Ivory, of Park street, Northcote for work and labour done on a car.

Frost, who hires out cars, was engaged by Ivory to attend for his daughter's wedding. During the drive there was a conversation about the merits of the car Frost was driving, to wit a Hudson Terraplane. Frost alleged that Ivory told him that he (Ivory) was going to buy a similar car next week. As Frost is agent for this make of car, he offered to take Ivory to Neal's Motors to view some Terraplanes. In the meantime he brought a buyer for the old car Ivory had.

The buyer, George Stanley Cleverley, employed by the M.B.W., refused to pay £125 for Ivory's car. The next day Cleverley offered £110 which was accepted. Cleverley took the car for a run, and subject to some mechanical repairs being made, the car changed hands the following day. A deposit of £20 was paid by Cleverley. A week later the balance was paid, the cheque alleging that a verbal agreement was entered into, whereby, if the car's mechanical condition did not prove satisfactory, the sale to be declared off, and the money returned. The car was returned on June 3.

In the meantime Frost wanted to earn his commission on the sale of a new Terraplane. The only day Ivory could visit Neal's Motors to view the car was on July 12. This was Coronation Day, and the showrooms were closed, but Frost arranged for a salesman to be present when he brought the prospective client. Ivory, who said he liked the car, said he would buy it but would first bring his wife and a friend to see it first. Up to date Ivory had failed to purchase the car.

Mr. Hartnett's contention was that as no man could serve two masters, Frost was not entitled to an order on his claim. If he was acting for Neal's Motors as agent, he should claim the commission on this sale, which did not take place—from the motor-car firm.

An order for £15 with £4/14 costs was made for the complainant.

"THREE COMRADES"
—Erich Maria Remarque

In his powerful novel, "All Quiet on the Western Front" the author moves another stage in his spiritual pilgrimage. The narrative is realistic in form but idealistic in content, so that the details are never sordid; it is an idealism that is born of that despair, so vividly described in "The Road Back" which followed on the post-war collapse of the old moral values. As in his other works, Remarque's preoccupation is still with comradeship—the comradeship of the trench and the squalor of the trenches and all but lost in the disillusionment of the peace. Here he describes the adventures of three German ex-servicemen, in their efforts to bring a living from the post-war world of unemployment and misery.

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MADE MONEY IN GAOL

In the last few days the daily press commented on a man making money in gaol. The case is of Marco, an orchestra conductor of New Zealand who recently was sentenced to imprisonment for life for the poisoning of his wife.

The papers state that Marco is composing in gaol, and his compositions find their way out of the prison, a London firm being the buyer. The press comments that the money is to be used for the education of the prisoner's son.

The case of Marco is not unique, quite a number of prisoners having made small fortunes whilst serving sentences.

Poems, short stories, and even books are produced not infrequently by those who inhabit the prison. Most of them never see print, but writing them provides long hours of relaxation and forgetfulness.

Incarceration often shows the inventive faculty in a man. He has time to think, and provided he does not dwell on his sentence, he sometimes turns his thoughts into remunerative channels. Fortunes have been made in prison.

A man named David was convicted of a number of years ago of a crime that landed him in Broadmoor. Torn from his beloved art he was a painter, he spent a long time mulling about in isolation. Then someone suggested that he should use his art in the beautifying of the prison, and several very fine paintings were the result.

Later he was allowed to have canvas and brushes for his own use, and he did secure excellent paintings which in Broadmoor. Some of his work were exhibited in London, and fetched high figures. Critics were struck by them and some went so far as to say they were equal to the works of Watts. Useful sums of money were made by David during this time, but he never left Broadmoor.

It is usual for convicts to earn money in prison, for they are paid for the work they do, but Percy Capinette did it legitimately and on a large scale. This Frenchman, who was convicted of murder and sent to the prison settlement of New Caledonia, like other prisoners of good behaviour on these islands was allowed to work the land on a profit sharing basis.

Capinette was a naturally gifted agriculturist, and for some years he made something like £1,000 per year out of his holding. This money he was allowed to send home. He himself was serving a life sentence.

NORTHCOTE'S MAYORS

(To the Editor)

Sir,—Now that another Mayoral year is approaching its end, ratepayers are speculating as to who will be the next mayor. I would like to draw attention to the way in which the West ward is taboed by the council. I have been looking through the "History of Northcote" and find that since the council was constituted as it is today, viz., with 15 members, a period of 46 years, there have been only four West ward representatives to have held the coveted position. They were Councillors A. E. Tharratt, W. J. Gray, W. H. Turner, and W. H. Mayer, the first named having held the chair for three years—or a total of six mayoral years for the West ward in 46! Surely this is not a fair thing to the biggest revenue producing ward in the city. It is now ten years since Cr. Mayer was mayor, and in that ten years the South have had three (Crs. Dennis (twice) and Cr. Green); the East have had three (Crs. Johnson, Oldis and Glandfield), the North have had three (Crs. Hayes, Oliver and Jones), and the Central one (Cr. Peters); but so far the poor old West has been left out in the cold.

There are many ratepayers looking in this ward and feeling in certain directions is running high. Of the councillors who have not held the position, Cr. McAdam has had four years in the council, Cr. Burnham one year, Cr. Shewan, three months, Cr. French, four years, whilst Cr. Hughes has had nine years, and Cr. Gifford seven years. 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A British prison made good use of his time. He set to work to think out an invention that would be really useful. The result was a certain brand of washing powder (it is on the market now). It was worked out in chemical formulae, and not sent out until the original was released. He dared not entrust the secret to anyone outside, but the moment he was released, he got together the necessary ingredients and set to work. For many years this powder was on sale very extensively, and its inventor made a comfortable little fortune while the demand lasted.

Made a Fortune.
One of the most amazing fortunes ever made in prison was that of the French banker Zucco sentenced to several years for an "irregular banking transaction". He promptly set to work to organize a scheme whereby he could get small investors to subscribe jointly for lottery bonds. This he did by bribing a warder and with assistance of one of his bank clerks. For a long time the scheme went on successfully. So well did it operate that Zucco was credited with earning £50 a day as he sat in his cell organizing the campaign. Eventually the authorities came known to the authorities and Zucco and ten of his clerks faced the court.

A fresh sentence was imposed on the brazen banker, and he was transferred to another prison. Adolphe Stefaus was sentenced to life imprisonment for the murder of a well-known New York lawyer. A plea of insanity saved him from the chair. While he has "remained in gaol, his representatives, acting on his instructions, have speculated with his original capital of about £1,000 until it is now ten times that sum.

Wrote A Play.
In at least one case a play written in prison proved a winner. The writer was an Italian, Guido Casali, imprisoned for murder. He chose as the plot for the play, the story of the murder he himself committed. It had a long run, being produced after purchase by the great actress Eleanora Dux.

Forged in Gaol.
A certain man was imprisoned in Manchester. He was an ingenious fellow, and extremely clever with the pen. After his release it was found that a number of forged £5 notes had been circulated in the district. These notes, it transpired, had been forged in gaol, hidden away, and smuggled out when the culprit was released.

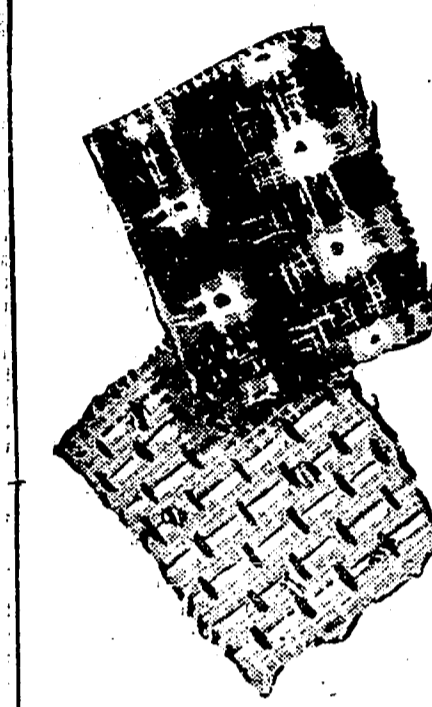

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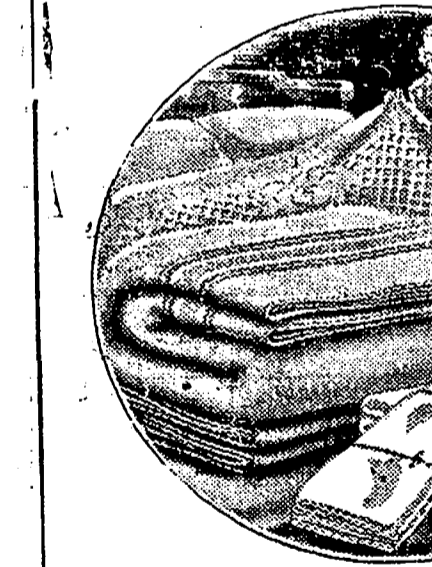
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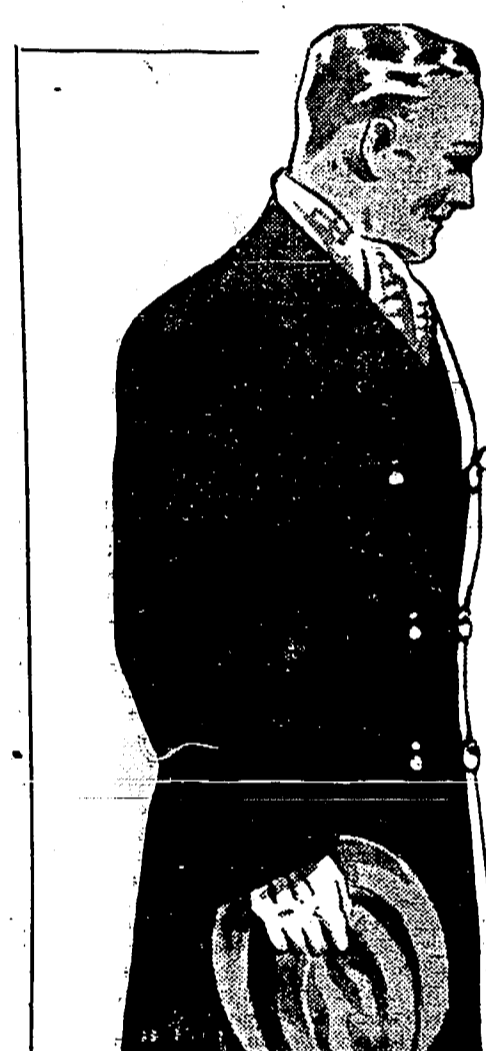

Newspapers for Polishing—After blackleading a one-fire stove, after cleaning tiles of stove recess, or after cleaning and drying windows, clean newspapers folded and used as polishing pads will impart a most brilliant shine. They can also be used as pads for linoleum when short of polishing cloths. (Mrs. T. Holm, 12 Lewis street, Thornbury.)

Preventing Lumps—When making porridge, or mixing flour or any other thickening, use a fork instead of a spoon and the mixture will be free from lumps. (Mrs. C. Checken, 31 Cunningham street, Westgarth.)

To Clean Sinks and Baths—Moisten one tablespoon of dry kitchen salt with a little turpentine and scour the bath or sink well, using an old piece of rag or leather. Afterwards wash with warm soapy water, and the results will be found very pleasing. (Mrs. E. Reid, Jun, 44 Salisbury grove, Northcote.)

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To Prevent Custard From Curdling

When making custard add one tea-spoon of corn-flour to the milk before heating. This prevents the custard from curdling if the milk should come to the boil. (Mrs. D. Sheppard, 40 Claude street, Northcote.)

COOKERY NOOK

Bread and Jam Pudding—1 lb stale bread, 3 oz shredded suet, 1 oz sugar, grated nutmeg, 2 tablespoons jam.

Lay a clean cloth in a basin and put the bread in it. Pour on enough boiling water to cover the bread and let it soak till soft. Then twist the ends of the cloth in opposite directions until all the water is squeezed out and the bread is dry. Turn the bread out of the cloth and mash it with a fork. Add the suet, sugar and nutmeg. Put the jam in a greased pie-dish with the bread on top. Bake in a moderate oven for one hour.

Pineapple Sage—1 tin of grated pineapple, 1 packet pineapple jelly, 1 small tin cherries, 3 ozs. sugar, 2 ozs. sugar, 1 lemon, 1 lb gills hot water.

Put the jelly in a basin. Pour on the hot water and stir till the jelly is dissolved. Pour into a wet mould and let it set. Wash the sage, and pour on the water. Mix the syrup from the tin of pineapple with the lemon juice and add to the cherry syrup, and add enough hot water to make it up to 1 1/2 pts. Boil it, and sprinkle in the sage, stirring all the time.

RETURN OF NUMBER PLATES Police Thru-out Prosecutions Information has been conveyed to the R.A.C.V. that the police intend to prosecute persons in whose names motor vehicles are registered, and who have failed to return the number plates on expiry of registration. The Motor Car Act provides that if the registration is not renewed, or is cancelled, or if the vehicle is sold outside Victoria, the person in whose name the motor vehicle was registered, shall return the number plates to the Motor Registration Branch.

"The Department has not previously instituted proceedings against offenders, says the Chief Commissioner of Police, but the continuous disregard of the provisions, even by motor firms who are conversant with the Act indicates that action must be taken. The onus of returning the plates is on the last registered owner, and the police will not act as collectors of these plates in future."

The penalty for non-compliance with the law is £2, and where negligence was established prosecution of offenders would be seriously considered.

"TIN CAN" MAIL "Tin Can Mail" was a cry that had almost magic power as the "Katoomba" drew near to this great lonely rock of the Pacific. Seven hundred and ten letters, with approximately £9 in cash were placed in a sealed tin, and dropped by the First Officer into one of the two waiting canoes. Another large tin was filled with sweets and some gifts and cash addressed to the Wesleyan Church Tin Can Island, was also lowered. Word came from Tonga that the ship would call at the island, and to the ecstasy of the passengers and crew, envelopes bearing the island's stamp and numerous cancellation marks by the post office were sent aboard as a souvenir of the visit. This mail was the first received from any ship on the Australian register. Prior to 1919 letters were received from passing ships by Rocket Mail. Later the "Swimmer Mail" was instituted when strong swimmers lashed the Tin Can mail to a bamboo and floated it ashore. In 1920 one of these brave men was taken by a shark, and since then the "Tin Can Mail" operates. A little home-made outrigger canoe flies a yellow flag with a simple inscription "Tin Can Mail."

The present postmaster, Mr. W. G. Quensell forwarded a letter stating that the population is 1,275 he himself being the only white man on the island. It is interesting to learn that the U.S. steamer "Marama" landed on one trip 12,000 letters, and last year the "Monowai" 28,000. In eighteen months the "Monterey" and the "Mariposa" sent 56,000 ashore, and this is about a quarter of a million of such letters have left the island.

The passengers and officers of the "Katoomba" greatly appreciated the courtesy of a gift letter to each, and recognised behind it the gracious and thoughtful spirit animating the Royal coat of Tonga.

The Bulbs. Most Bulbs are now showing well above the ground and it will not be long before some of them will commence to show flower buds, especially such varieties as Pansies, Lachenals, and Roman Hyacinths, which, if planted early, come into bloom long before Daffodils, Lilies, Tritonias and Watsonias, which do not come out until their natural time, irrespective of when they are planted.

The beds where the bulbs are grown should be kept very lightly cultivated, and mere scratching of the surface being all that is required to prevent it from caking. Care must be taken in cultivating the daffodils before the plants show their heads, or it is likely that the growth will be damaged. Unless one knows exactly where the daffodils are planted, it is wise to dig the cultivation until they show through the surface.

Annals and Perennials The following varieties can still be planted:—Pansies, Violas, English Marigolds, Hollyhocks, Carnations, Gypsophila, Lunaria, Stocks, Delphiniums, Leptosyne, Antirrhinums, English Daisies, Larkspurs, Polyanthus, and Hens-chera.

Shrubs—Having discussed bulbs, annuals and perennials in our last issue, we now pass on to shrubs. Shrubs that flower in Spring should not be pruned at this time of the year, but summer-flowering sorts such as Lagerstroemia, Erythrina, Cassia, Tecoma, Tecoma Capensis, Tecoma Mackenzis, the Brazilian Glory Pea and the Yellow Broom, as it flowers on the lowest part of the branch, should be cut back late in June. We would not advise cutting back Lantanas until August.

Flowering Fruits Now is the time for planting all varieties of flowering fruits, such as Apples, Peaches, Apples, the flowering currant (Ribus Sanguinea) and the flowering quince (Cydonia Japonica).

Some hedges should be scattered around the shrubs to encourage good growth during the spring.

Summer shrubs require some manure—and bonedust, which is slow in its action, is the most suitable to use.

Cupressus hedges that have not been clipped during the last few months should be dealt with at once, as they are making rapid growth, and will continue to do so during the late winter and the early spring. If allowed to grow too much before they are cut back it will be necessary to cut back the hard wood, and the effect of the hedge will be spoilt for some time.

The cupressus hedges, in order of look well must be cut frequently, so that the foliage will be kept fine.

June is an excellent time for planting such hedges as Cupressus Rhamnus, Karri Apple, the Native Myrtle and Coprosma.

Lawns should be kept cut and clear of weeds. Clover can easily be eradicated by putting some salt sulphate of ammonia on the patches, and rubbing it in.

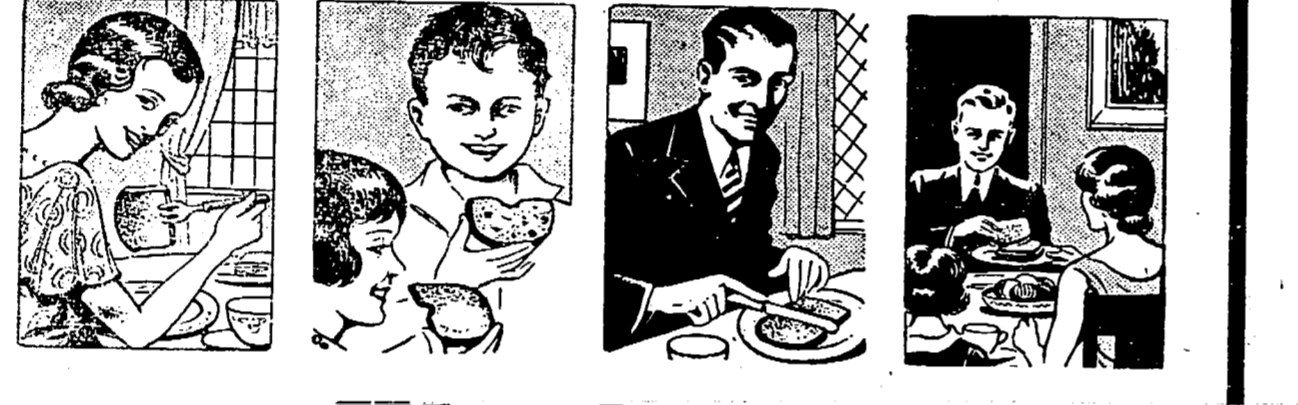

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NORTHCOTE'S IMPROVED PARKS Sportsmen Well Catered For

MERRI CREEK STRAIGHTENING

THE straightening of the Merri Creek, which is now well in hand, will eliminate the horseshoe bend at the Summer Estate.

The new channel will be 500 ft. long as compared with the 1,300 ft. of winding creek as it is at present.

15,000 yards of soil will be made available to the Northcote Council during the completion of the scheme. Of this, 7,000 cu. yds. will be used in top-dressing Merri Park, giving this 12 acres an extra four to six inches of surfacing. The balance will be used on McDonnell Park, which is 22 acres in area.

Merri Park, on which 30 men are at present employed, will undergo such transformation as to make it one of the best parks in the metropolitan area. The alterations, details of which are set out below, will take six months to complete.

A raised mound 20 feet wide, will be laid out in lawn, and planted with phoenix palms at 60 ft. intervals. Twenty seats will cater for the weary, and will be situated beneath the shady foliage of the trees. The brick sheds, which in future will accommodate the park furniture are nearing completion.

The whole of the area of Merri Park will be laid out with four miles of agricultural drain pipes, and will be sown with mixed grasses.

To keep in step with the latest methods, provision is being made for an extensive mechanical system of watering.

The park, when completed, will be kept in excellent order by frequent lawn cutting and rolling so as to maintain an even green sward.

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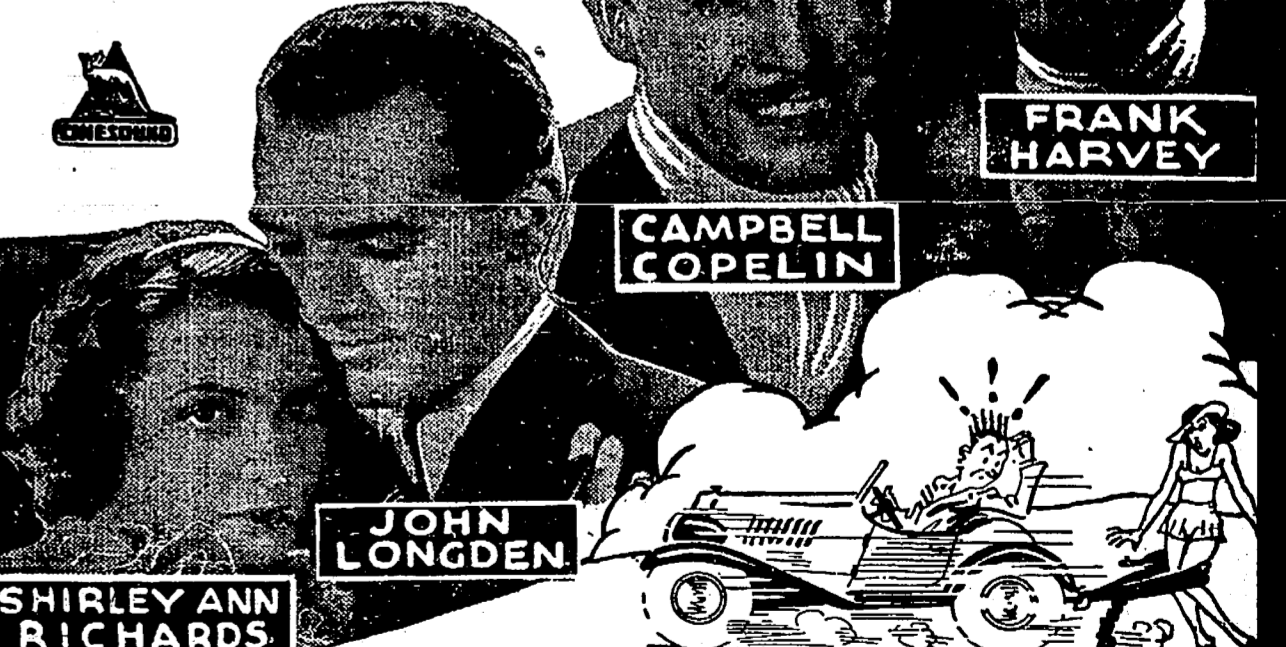

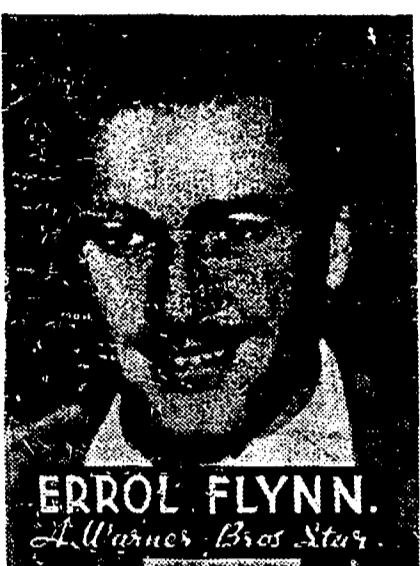
Waitresses finally get film recognition in RKO Radio's new adventure thriller "Night Waitress."

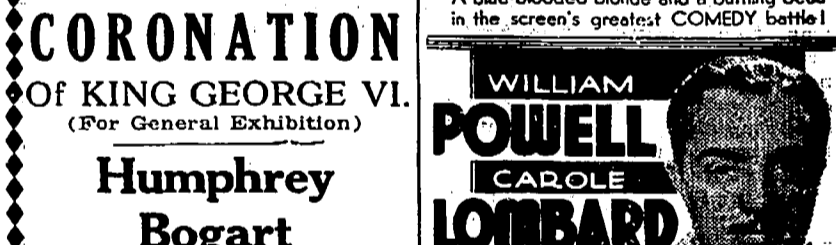
MOTOR-CYCLIST KILLED

TECHNICAL OR GENERAL QUERIES ANSWERED

A SECTION DEVOTED TO LISTENERS-IN

In the early days of broadcasting when radio enthusiasts fervently tickled erstwhile crystals with synthetic cat's whiskers, or the more enterprising extracted weird and wonderful howls from battery operated receivers, Suburbia's skyline became decorated (or should I say mutilated?) with aerial systems of varied designs.

In those days the aerial was of paramount importance and radio fans went to great pains to increase the performance of their receivers by the erection of efficient antennae. Towering masts glistening white graced some houses whilst a couple of clothes props lashed together to gain the necessary altitude served the more easy-going listener-in.

Hundreds of feet of wire were used in some installations, erected haphazardly by those experimenters who erected the "cat's" or "sausage" type of aerial. The umbrella type was also often seen in the old days. Of course, there was also the "Star" aerial, so called because it came out only at night! Oh well, listening licenses were dearer in those days.

With the development of the all-electric receiver the aerial seemed of less consequence, and the sensitivity of the sets increased the apparent necessity for the aerial grew less and less. I say apparent because I would like to stress that no matter how well the modern receiver operates without an aerial, the connecting of an aerial to it improves its performance. This applies in all circumstances other than those days.

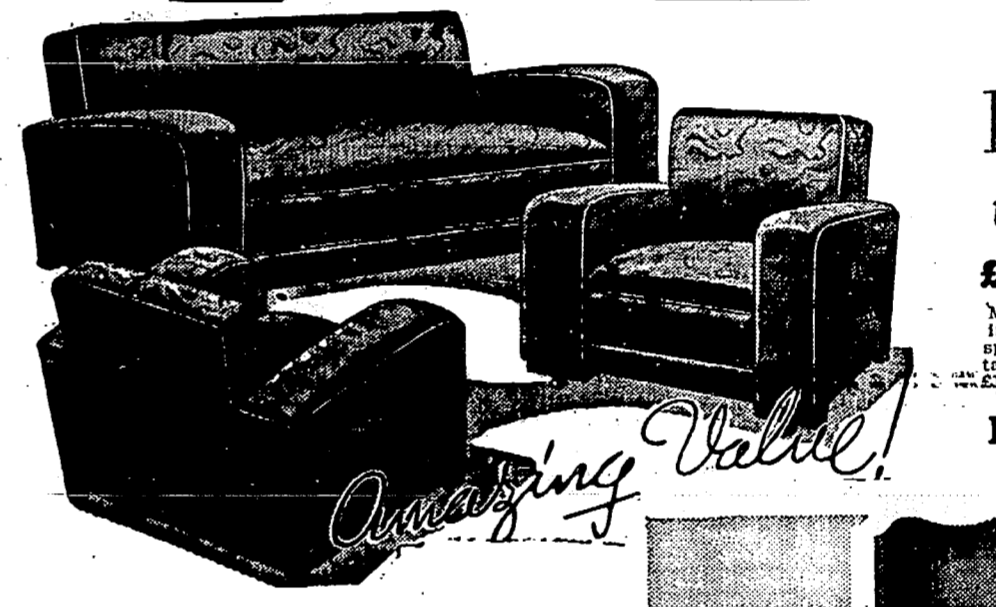

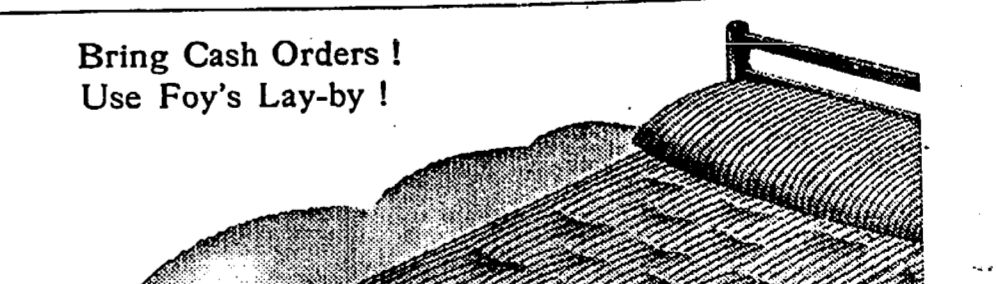

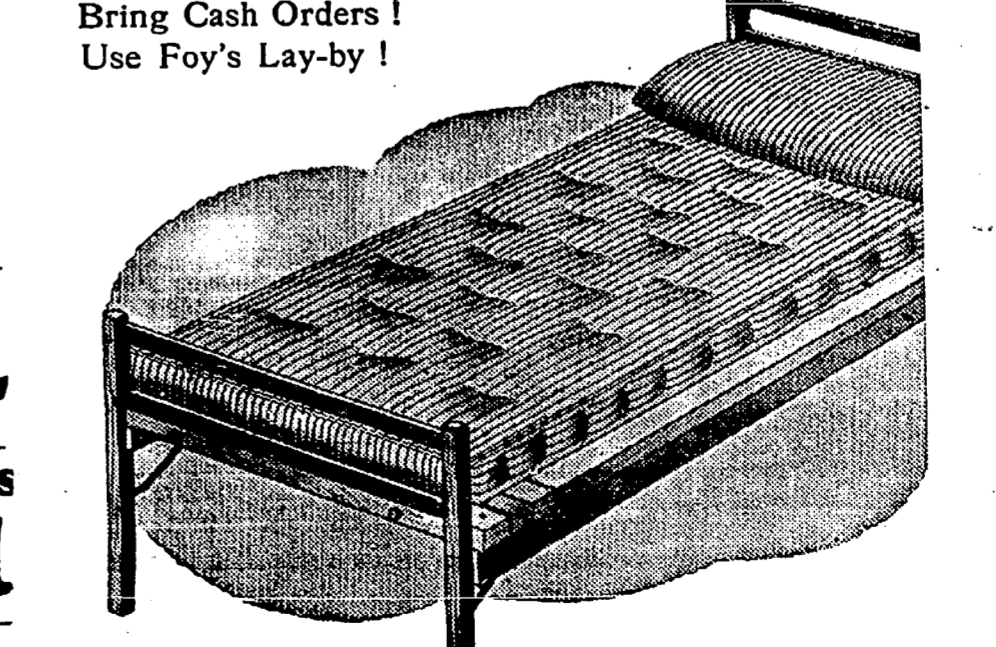

Educating Road Users

One of the main difficulties in educating the road user to the proper use of the road, and coping with offences committed unwittingly by many inexperienced drivers, is that it is impossible for police officials to witness only a very small proportion of the offences against traffic laws and driving courtesy. It is the opinion of many experienced motorists that motor-cycle police patrols, if used in greater numbers, would be materially in observing traffic offences, not solely for the purpose of prosecution, but mainly with a view to the offenders being warned that their offences had been observed, and must not be repeated. Undoubtedly many traffic offences are the result of ignorance or inexperience, and an official warning would, in most cases, prevent repetition.

London now has 800 specially trained police instructors out on the roads to warn transgressors of traffic laws, and, according to the latest reports, these motor patrols are already having a beneficial effect in checking reckless driving on England's main highways, and improving traffic conditions.

In Germany a different corrective medium has been selected, some 6,000 volunteers being enlisted to observe traffic and warn offenders. The volunteers wear a dark uniform, and carry staffs resembling those used by German railway guards. They cannot impose a fine, but only note the numbers on the automobiles breaking regulations, and send their reports to the police. Those who break the rules, but stop when the controller waves his staff, are not reported; they receive a printed list of the twelve main road regulations. All users of a road (cyclists and pedestrians included) are subject to their control. The volunteers receive general training on traffic matters before taking up their duties.

He joins up with a travelling show, holding first the job of the tattooed man, then that of boxing champion—quite by accident. No summary of these, and subsequent developments can give a proper idea of the gusto and broad humor with which Mr. Howard tells them.

"DEISURE FOR LIVING"

—Nelle M. Scanlon
In this book, Miss Scanlon takes for her heroine an English family settled in New Zealand and two daughters—odd, human, slightly variety, but altogether a lovable group. Both in England and New Zealand we are shown the fortunes and misfortunes of the family, their adventures and disasters. In fact the author has evolved a plot which displays to perfection her charm of style, and her talent for clear, brilliant characterization.

TREATMENT OF YOUNG HEDGES

The eventual success of a hedge largely depends upon the way it is cut when the plants are young. Different varieties have different styles of growth. Some plants grow very upright, whilst others are of a spreading habit, necessitating different methods of cutting, in order to get good dense hedges. It is also very important to keep the hedge narrow, as a wide hedge entails a great deal of labour, and does not look as well as a narrow one that is not more than 2 ft. wide.

The correct treatment for the varieties generally grown will probably be of assistance to those who have young hedges to bring up in the way they should go. Cupressus Lambertiana must be staked, and the central growth tied up until it reaches the height that it is desired the hedge should be. Then the centre growth should be cut off. If by any chance the central growth is broken off, the first horizontal growth below the break can be tied to the stake, and will take the place of the broken shoot. The plants must be trimmed regularly on the two sides keeping the growth to within nine inches of the main stem of the plant. None of the top growth of this hedge should be trimmed until it reaches the height required.

Cupressus Tomioides, which is a very upright grower, requires different treatment, and the top and sides of the plants must be trimmed as they grow, as unless this is done, the plants will not become bushy enough to make the hedge dense. So instead of having a level wall of green foliage, each individual plant will show. Cupressus can be staked and treated in the same way as the first-named variety. Kalmia Apple, Duranta Plumier, Privet, Native Myrtle, Rhamnus, and flowering hedges such as Tecoma Capensis, Yellow Broom, and Plumbago Capensis should be trimmed on the top in the same way as described for Cupressus Tomioides.

He went even further than that. Robinsion claimed £1 for some of the tools that were missing. "I'll pay that, if you will take my cheque," said the newly found friend of the accused.

And when the court allowed 10/- costs to Robinsion, the dairy-farmer said he would pay that too!

The P.M. In imposing a suspended sentence of 14 days' imprisonment said that he saw no reason why Whittaker shouldn't be able to live it down, to which the farmer replied: "You won't see him again in this court. Your Worship."

"Driver Drowsiness"

An insidious danger "driver drowsiness" is often caused by faulty ventilation of the car or leakage of exhaust gases into the body of the car. Such potential causes should be investigated. States the Royal Automobile Club of Victoria. In emergency a chemist can supply a harmless mixture containing caffeine, (the stimulant present in coffee) which will banish drowsiness for several hours. A good move is to alter the position of the exhaust to the side of the car to enable the fumes to escape freely. Eddy, under the car, in some cases, force fumes into the car while it is travelling.

"Stella" asks: "How quickly does hair grow?"

Answer: It is well known that some people have hair that grows much faster than others; still it has been averaged out that a quarter of an inch a month is good. I am sure many of you with short hair will think this incorrect, because it always seems to need a trim. But it is a fact that short hair grows faster than long hair. This takes place until the hair is a certain length, after which the rate of growth slows. While we are on the subject of hair growth, I dare say you have heard it said that if you pull out one grey hair, half a dozen will grow in its place. Well, if only that were true, there would be nothing to fear about baldness.

"Could you let me know a suitable diet for gastric ulcers? You cannot, then could you let me know where I can find out about it?"—"M.L.," Christmas street.

Answer: Yours is purely a medical question, and I would advise you to consult your medical practitioner, who, if he cannot deal with it himself, will refer you to a specialist.

"Would you please let me know which is the better for reducing—electrical massage, or the rubber reducing corset? I have put on a lot of weight with my second baby and wondered which would be the better treatment for me, and would be pleased if you would give me your ideas on the two." writes "Fishes."

Answer: Personally I think that the electrical reducing is the safer and healthier way. The electrical plates stimulate muscles to do their proper work, reducing even those deep-seated muscles which without the long period of systematic work necessary if corsets are to have a reducing effect. Rubber corsets besides being hot and uncomfortable, are apt, I think, un-

less specially fitted by a surgical expert, to press the abdominal organs out of place, without stimulating the muscles to any work at all.

"Each spring for the last few years, great big freckles have appeared on my nose, upper lip, forehead. Please advise me." writes "Getting in Early."

Answer: Use a bleaching complexion milk—a honey and almond cream for example—as a base for your powder, and a bleaching complexion wax at bed-time.

I have worked hard, and in working, have forgotten that my hands are one of my assets. I hope you can help me."

Answer: In half a pint of boiling water dissolve one ounce of Epsom salts. When this is dissolved, add enough bran to make a creamy paste, and a few drops of verbena. With the sleeves well up, plunge the hands into the mixture, and keep them immersed for about ten minutes. At the end of that time, scrub the hands thoroughly with a soft brush and super-fatted soap. Then return the hands to the bran mixture, and soak them again for several minutes. After the hands have been dried, try this hand cream: Lanoline 2 ozs. soft white paraffin wax, 2 ozs. almond oil, 2 ozs. rosewater, 12 drops, oil of verbena 5 drops, and powdered finger tips and work the cream well into them, giving special attention around the nails. Do this fingers thoroughly, then the backs of the hands. All the movements should be towards the wrists, and the skin and flesh lifted and pinched to increase circulation. This treatment will help to diminish the size of the hands, and will also help in beautifying them. When most of the cream is worked in, wipe off the surplus, and use this strengthening ointment—A mixture of equal proportions of rosewax and witch hazel.

VISION AT HIGH SPEEDS

Details obtained by the Royal Automobile Club of Victoria from the University of Chicago regarding the effects upon human vision of high speed driving explain why even alert drivers sometimes find themselves in trouble. The experts found that as speed increases, the clarity of foreground vision falls away, and that attention is being concentrated continuously farther away as speed increases.
Even at 45 miles per hour, foreground vision is not clear, and at 50 miles per hour, objects such as potholes and depressions fade away. Side vision is similarly narrowed. At 45 miles per hour, the average driver focuses his eyes 1,270 feet ahead; at 50 miles per hour, 1,479 feet ahead; at 60 miles per hour, 1,800 feet ahead, and at 65 miles per hour, 2,000 feet ahead. Beyond this speed the focal point is the distant horizon of the road.
