HOBSON'S BRILLIANT SUCCESS

Despite his very decided superiority over most of the boxers matched with him to date, Hobson of Huelhic Hobson, the Northcote featherweight viewed the outcome of his clash with the Newcastle boxer, Tony Mack, at West Melbourne on Saturday last with some trepidation. Hobson, undefeated in ten professional contests, had done everything asked of him against carefully picked opponents and the wisdom of matching him with the ultra-victorious and experienced Tony Mack was questioned. Wonderfully conditioned, Hobson emerged triumphant and jubilant at a success gained only after his courage, tenacity, durability and boxing ability had been tested thoroughly. Adopting his usual non-stop methods, Mack tore in and disregarded the flashing lefts landing so accurately to his face, striving to overwhelm the younger lad by his whirlwind attack. Hobson accepted the challenge, and apparently relished a toe to toe exchange of punches which lasted throughout the entire second round. Hobson fought with the utmost coolness, picking his spots with care, and used every opportunity given him to sap his opponent's strength with weighty punches to the body. A weighty well-placed jab was admitted to the sent Mack down during the fourth but he came up strong and battled through with a now tired Hobson. The ten rounds, Hobson won this easily, his most important test, and is now asked to meet Mike O'Connor, a clever and experienced boxer, in the main contest at West Melbourne on Saturday night. Hobson is 17 years of age.

Another Easy Win for Hall. Joe Hall, one of the most accomplished boxers in Australia was not extended at any time in his contest with Billy Hamilton at the Fitzroy stadium last week, and won a somewhat dreary affair on a technical knockout in the 8th round. Hall, lacking pugnacity, often shows a tendency to "carry" his opponent, but commenced with a brilliant offensive which threatened to bring an early ending. Heavy punches to the jaw banged Hamilton up against the ropes, and a perfect right to the solar plexus had him hanging on desperately. Tough and durable, Hamilton went on with plenty of confidence but his best punches were usually anticipated and admirably evaded by the graceful Hall. Hamilton showed his habitual determination and pluck, but was outclassed. Worn down by accurate punching, Hamilton appeared weary in the 8th and went down to a left to the body. Without attempting to count, the referee crowned Hall.

Before M. E. E. O'Grady P.M. and Messrs H. F. Tulloch and P. J. Kean, J's P. No Lights. Dennis Dwyer, Lynch street, Hawthorn, appeared before the Northcote court on Tuesday, August 31 charged with driving a truck in High street, Thornbury, on August 25 while under the influence of intoxicating liquor. After hearing the evidence for the prosecution and the defence, the bench imposed a fine of £10. Dwyer's driving license was cancelled.

The prosecution arose out of a collision in which Alan Dacey, of Wilcox street, Preston was knocked off his bicycle at the intersection of Ballantyne and High streets.

A FOOLISH PRANK

A Case Adjudged. The evidence in this case suggested a silly prank, not a criminal offence, and as the prosecution did not raise any objection, the case against each defendant will be adjudged for 52 weeks, said Mr. E. E. O'Grady, P.M. at the conclusion of a case against two young men who were charged with stealing a bottle and some milk valued at 3/2, the property of John Stevenson, Hunter, of Mitchell street, Northcote. The cases were heard at the Northcote Court on August 31.

A municipal employe saw the two defendants in the early hours of the morning on August 8. They were carrying a bottle and a bottle of milk. Their behaviour aroused his suspicions, and he communicated with the police. About ten minutes later he returned with Constable Opperman, and saw the two young men sitting on the steps of the fire-station drinking the milk.

It appears that the two were returning from a party, and looking for a "pick-me-up" decided to use somebody's milk for the purpose.

Sgt. Martin, who prosecuted, said that this was one of the few cases when the police got the offender before the court, knowing anything about it. He further stated that although stealing of milk was an offence prevalent in Northcote, he did not connect the defendants with it. The bench ordered the young

PETUNIAS

The petunia is one of the most popular flowers grown for the decoration of the summer garden, as it makes a wonderful display, and is such an easy plant to grow. It will grow in almost any class of soil, and requires less water than most of the summer-flowering plants. The petunia is a perennial but is usually treated as an annual because the one-year old plants give the best results. The seed is very fine, and it may surprise readers to learn that an ounce of seed contains about 150,000 seeds, so that it will be realized that although the quantity of seed in a packet may appear small, yet it consists of a large number.

The best time for sowing petunias is during August and September. The seed germinates readily, and seedlings can be easily raised provided the proper treatment is given. Being so very fine, the seed should be sown in boxes or seed pans in a compost comprised of loam and sharp sand in equal parts, adding a little well-rotted manure or leaf mould. Put a good layer of drainage crocks at the bottom of the box, as it is very necessary that the soil should be well drained, or the plants are likely to damp off in the young stages.

Sieve the compost well, and fill the box nearly to the top, and then press down the surface with a board, so that it is smooth and even. In order that the soil in the box should be in a moist condition, it should be well watered some time prior to the sowing of the seed. A day prior to sowing, the recommended time to do the watering. As the seed is very fine, it should be mixed with some sand, so that it can be evenly distributed. The seed must be only just covered, so all that is required is a mere dusting with a very fine sandy soil. The reason why many gardeners fail to set petunia seed up is because they cover it too deeply. A sheet of glass should be placed over the box, which should be placed in a warm sheltered position in even light, but shaded from the direct rays of the sun. As soon as the plants show through the surface of the glass, the shading should be removed, or the plants will become spindly and weak.

Who Started The Scare?

MYSTERIOUS "RED" PAMPHLET

Once again, as on the eve of the Legislative Council Election, when a letter was circulated among the electors attributing communistic tendencies to the endorsed labor candidate (Cr. Laurie Marshall) an element of "red scare" has crept into the municipal clash between the retiring (and the now returned) candidate (Cr. M. C. Jones), and Mr. L. Purcell.

It is alleged that a number of ratepayers were swayed in voting for Mr. Purcell, solely due to this mysterious pamphlet. It was an 8 in by 5 in. manifesto, setting out four points of the Labour program in connection with municipal affairs. There is nothing in it to prejudice ratepayers against the Labour candidate, with the exception of the signature which reads: "Authorised by L. McDonald, 3 Hoster Lane, Melbourne. Issued by the Communist Party."

We interviewed Mr. Purcell, and he definitely states that the pamphlet was as much a surprise to him as it was to most of the ratepayers of the North Ward. He wishes to be made public his disavowal from this pamphlet, or from any relationship with the Communist Party. As a matter of fact, during the first meeting of his campaign, held on July 8 at the Dispensary Hall, Mr. Rawlinson, who is the secretary of the Communist Party (Northcote Branch) stood at the front of the audience, and offered help and co-operation of his party to the candidate.

Mr. Purcell's polite refusal of such co-operation was heard by all present, including Cr. Bird. An incident illuminating Mr. Purcell's attitude towards the Communist party is the fact that at a recent union election, Mr. Purcell was defeated on an "Anti-Red ticket."

THE TRUTH ABOUT THE PAMPHLET

On Tuesday, August 31, the "Leader-Budget" interviewed Mr. L. Donald, whose signature was appended to the mysterious "red" pamphlet, which was circulated among the residents of the North Ward on the eve of the municipal election, and which was the basis for rumours spread about Mr. Purcell.

Mr. Donald said: "This material was issued by the Communist Party in pursuance of its policy of assisting the return of all selected Labour candidates in municipal, State and Federal elections. The pamphlet itself was published here without any discussion or consultation with Mr. Purcell."

And that is the whole thing in a nutshell. Mr. Purcell's disavowal of anything to do with the pamphlet or the Communist Party, and as there is no law prohibiting the issue and distribution of such pamphlets, this manifesto duly appeared in the letter-boxes of North Ward residents.

Justices Dismiss Case At Northcote Court

WAS DEFENDANT DRIVING THE CAR?

At the Northcote Court on August 27, the bench, consisting of four justices and the police magistrate, dismissed a charge against Alexander Young, of St. George's road, Northcote, of driving a motor car while under the influence of intoxicating liquor.

The evidence for the prosecution was given by Constable Pennessy, who said that after being told something at 7.45 p.m. on August 21, he, in company with Police Constable Crawford went to High street, near the intersection of Dennis street. There he saw the defendant sitting at the wheel of a badly damaged motor-car. The car was slowly moving towards the tram tracks. Two men held the wheels of the car, steering it by this means. The engine was running. Witness asked defendant "What happened?" Young replied "I was driving down High street, behind a tram when the wife said something to me. I looked around and did not see the tram stop. My car ran into the back of the tram."

The constable said that Young's speech was thick, and his breath smelled strongly of liquor. Defendant appeared to be under the influence of liquor. "I told Young to get out of the car and walk a few steps," continued Constable Pennessy, "the defendant when doing so I asked him how many drinks he had had that day, and Young replied that he had had about eight beers. Then I took him to the police station. At his request, I communicated with a doctor whom he nominated. I told him that I also would get a doctor. Ten minutes later the doctor I called arrived and submitted defendant to a test. When told to walk four paces, Young staggered and was unable to walk heel to toe. He made a poor attempt to place the point of his finger on the end of his nose. The doctor said that in his opinion Young was under the influence of liquor."

Continuing the constable said that the doctor nominated by the defendant arrived a few minutes later. He also submitted Young to a test. Young was in custody for about 12 hours. When witnesses went at 9 p.m. to get Young, he was asleep in the cell. Dr. Cashmore and Police Constable Crawford also gave evidence.

Mr. Hartnett for Young submitted that on the police evidence there was no case to answer, as there was no evidence that Young was actually driving, in the sense of propelling the car. He submitted that evidence of the two men

who were holding the wheels, was consistent with their pushing it. Cross-examining Const. Pennessy, Mr. Hartnett asked him whether he drove the car, to which the constable replied that he took it over to the kerb, but that the front of the car was so badly smashed that it was going in circles.

The P.M. (Mr. O'Grady) after consulting with the justices (Messrs H. F. Tulloch, A. Andrews, W. Jones and A. Ahern) said the justices had decided that there was no case to answer. This was not his own opinion. The case would be dismissed.

In reply to the prosecuting sergeant (Sgt. Martin) Mr. Tulloch, J.P. said that the reason for his decision was the fact that he was not satisfied that the car was actually driven by defendant. The opinion of the other justices was on similar lines.

OTHER TRAFFIC CASES

Prior to dealing with the above case, the bench imposed fines in two other traffic cases. Reginald Wilder, care State Electricity Commission, Rabcon, was fined £1 for having no rear-light burning on the car he was driving on July 24 in St. George's road, Northcote. A similar fine was imposed on William Henry Ashton, Wellington street, Clifton Hill, for failing to stop when entering an intersection of a major street on August 15. Defendant was driving in Arthurton road and crossed St. George's road at 15 miles an hour.

Sensational Prison Escapes



Four men recently made a sensational escape from the Sens prison in Paris. The escape was sensational not because the men used the iron bars of their hood-stands as pike and dug a tunnel through a concrete wall large enough to allow them to slip down a rope of knotted sheets, but because they had no trousers! Every night the prisoners in this goal have their trousers removed, a greater safeguard against escaping, the authorities thought, than locks and bolts. But these men apparently walked the streets of Paris trouserless without attracting attention!

The ingenuity, patience, and courage of the prisoner determined to escape are often astonishing. At the Grudziadz prison in Poland nine years ago sixteen prisoners serving life sentences dug a tunnel 50 feet long and three feet high with their bare hands! Anything that might have been used as an implement was removed at night, and the tunnels must have been literally scratched out of the cement and earth with their nails.

A particularly cunning escape was contrived by a prisoner awaiting trial in Paris some years ago. He was in prison hospital, which at that time was being redecorated. A friend managed to smuggle in a painter's apron and paint.

The prisoner walked out on to the scaffolding, helped in the decoration of the prison until he judged the moment had arrived, and then walked off!

The cunning and patience of prisoners are all the more remarkable when it is remembered that even if the escape is successful the chances are that the prisoner will be back again within a few days or a few weeks. No man has escaped from Dartmoor and not been brought back. Perhaps one should not say "no man," for one prisoner was never caught, although he could not escape "the moor." Searchers found tracks that showed he had ended his days in a bog.

An arrest made in the East End of London some time ago was the signal to an escape in Rhodesia. The escaped convict in the interval had broken off his leg iron with stones, walked right across Africa through the Congo, and worked his passage to Antwerp. He had covered 10,000 miles—but he had not escaped!

Statutory Council Meeting

At 10 a.m. on Monday, August 30 the members of the Northcote City Council assembled at the Town Hall for the purpose of electing the new Mayor, and fixing the allowance, and the election of committees for 1937-38.

Cr. Peters was elected chairman. It was moved by the chairman and seconded by Cr. Jones that the mayoral allowance be fixed at £400. The motion was carried.

Cr. S. Dennis moved that Cr. A. McAdam be elected Mayor. The motion was seconded by Cr. Glanfield, and as no further nominations were received, Cr. McAdam was unanimously elected.

Cr. Peters thereupon left the chair, and after assisting the new Mayor in donning the mayoral robes and chain, surrendered the robes to him.

The election of committees, resumed—

Public Works committee—Crs. Burnham, Dennis, French, Hughes, Jones, Oliver and Turner.

Electric Light committee—Crs. Burnham, Green, Hayes, Johnson and Turner.

Parks and Baths committee—Crs. Dennis, Hughes, Oliver, Shewan, Glanfield.

Finance and Legislative committee—Crs. Bird, Glanfield, Green, Hayes, Johnson, Peters, and Shewan.

The Mayor is an ex-officio member of each committee. He will provide a "dry" cupboard.

Cr. Turner On Selection Of Mayor

When Cr. McAdam, the newly elected Mayor, took his seat, Cr. Turner, after congratulating him on his election, made some caustic comments on the present system of electing mayors, prefacing his remarks by a statement that his comments were by no means of a personal nature.

He said he took this opportunity to inform the council that he was of the opinion of his ward in favouring the councillors' attention to the injustice to the West Ward in this and previous selections of mayors. During the 43 years of the existence of the Northcote Council, only four men from the West Ward were mayors, representing a total of six years.

Cr. Turner said he was sure there was some kind of "unholy alliance" between three wards against the other two, and that unfair discrimination in the selection of mayors was a feature of the Northcote Council. His two colleagues (Crs. Bird and Hughes) had been members of the council for 15 years in the council, and during that time only one important chairmanship of the Parks and Baths committee had been allotted to them. He, himself, after 15 years in the council, was mayor once, and three times chairman of the Electric Light committee. Cr. McAdam, who had only five years in the council, but during that time he had occupied the positions of chairman of the Finance and Legislative committees, and Chairman of the Council, culminating in being elected Mayor for 1937-38. (Cr. Turner) stressed the point that this anomaly in the selection of mayors should be altered.

OUR NEW MAYOR

Cr. Arthur McAdam, who has been elected to hold the office of Mayor for the ensuing year, was born in Cambridgeshire, England, some 50 years ago. After doing his bit during the Great War when he rose from the ranks to become acting-captain, he came to Australia 18 years ago. He took up his residence in Northcote, and since then has continuously resided in this suburb.

SYSTEM FOR THE LICENSING OF RADIO RECEIVERS BADLY REQUIRED

Looking back over the years since broadcasting commenced in Melbourne, it is extremely regrettable to find the selling and repairing of radio receivers has been very haphazard. Listening-in became tremendously popular so quickly that radio shops sprang up like mushrooms, and the sale of receivers became a profitable sideline to almost every other type of business.

Need for Licensing. Before he can carry out electrical work, an electrician must be a certified trade man. A similar idea applied to the radio service-man would protect the public and confine radio repairs to men who have spent years of study to make themselves competent, and who have acquired costly testing equipment which is necessary for efficiency.

Service Clubs. During the last three years or so, many listeners have been taken-in by so-called radio service clubs. Of course, there are exceptions, some clubs giving honest service, but the experience of most who have dealt with such clubs has been unfortunate. In one instance the fee was £1/1/ per annum, and in another 15/ per year. These clubs agreed to replace any valves or parts required during the ensuing twelve months without further charge. Many of these clubs however, did not operate for more than a few months. Then...
