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Motoring Topics

THE CARAVAN BOOM IMPROVED VISIBILITY NECESSARY

New York recently held its first show devoted entirely to motor-caravans and trailers. Seventeen leading U.S.A. manufacturers exhibited the newest in vehicles for routes and mobile home-owners. The display ranged from small 2-wheeled trailers to the latest that provides living quarters practically equivalent to those of a first-class private yacht.

The promoters of the exhibition voiced the opinion that, although the caravan building industry of U.S.A. is yet only in its infancy, it is already having a marked social and economic effect on that country. The rapidly increasing popularity of the motor-caravan trailer during the last two years and the clever manner in which their designers have succeeded in getting a lot into a small space has impressed the industry that it is beginning to appreciate that this development points the way to fitting its travel-up with comprehensive mobile show-rooms. The caravan industry movement is still in its infancy, but judging by the results gained, and the rapid adoption of touring in the show-rooms of the U.S.A., it is a valuable adjunct to merchandising which will be long adopted by a good percentage of Australian manufacturers, says the Dunlop Perdiar Bulletin.

In U.S.A. rapid advance is being made in this connection, and several of the largest manufacturers of motor-trailers report that the greater part of their production is being sold for this purpose. Among the big businesses utilizing the travelling "sample case" are the makers of portable appliances, radiolios, lubricating oils, automobile parts and accessories, confectionery, etc., in fact, there is hardly an industry in U.S.A. that has not, in some degree, adopted this type of selling. Manufacturers using these travelling show-rooms find that, where the line is extensive, it is now possible for them to get into a town, contact with dealers, and when possible, make a demonstration in a short time, whereas formerly it was necessary for him to carry round bulky sample cases. set up a display in a hotel sample room, and take a day to complete his business in that centre. All types of portable goods, formerly had to be sold from catalogues, can now be displayed to advantage per medium of the mobile show room.

The show room on wheels appears designed to benefit largely in the merchandising of all types of Australian manufacture, particularly in the outlying districts, for less from its novelty value, it has very real value in enabling the salesman to bring, in a practical manner, his wares before the dealer or consumer.

When well-meaning persons are shocked at the number of traffic accidents and feel tempted to attribute them to a general lack of road courtesy by motorists, they entirely overlook a very important factor, which is the large percentage of accidents which takes place in connection with stolen cars. It is pointed out in "The Radiator," the official journal of the R.A.C.V., that hardly a week passes without accidents being reported in connection with cars driven by persons who have taken a "loan" of their neighbor's car without his consent. The journal contends that it is unfair that accident statistics should be unduly swollen by such occurrences, and goes on to say that the motorist should be made aware of its advocacy of road courtesy and safe driving, but it does not think it right that the reputation of the motorist should be smirched by the foolish acts of irresponsible youths and criminals who have no respect for other people's property. If the law were tightened up to make the crime of taking another person's car more serious, there would be less thieving of cars, and fewer accidents.

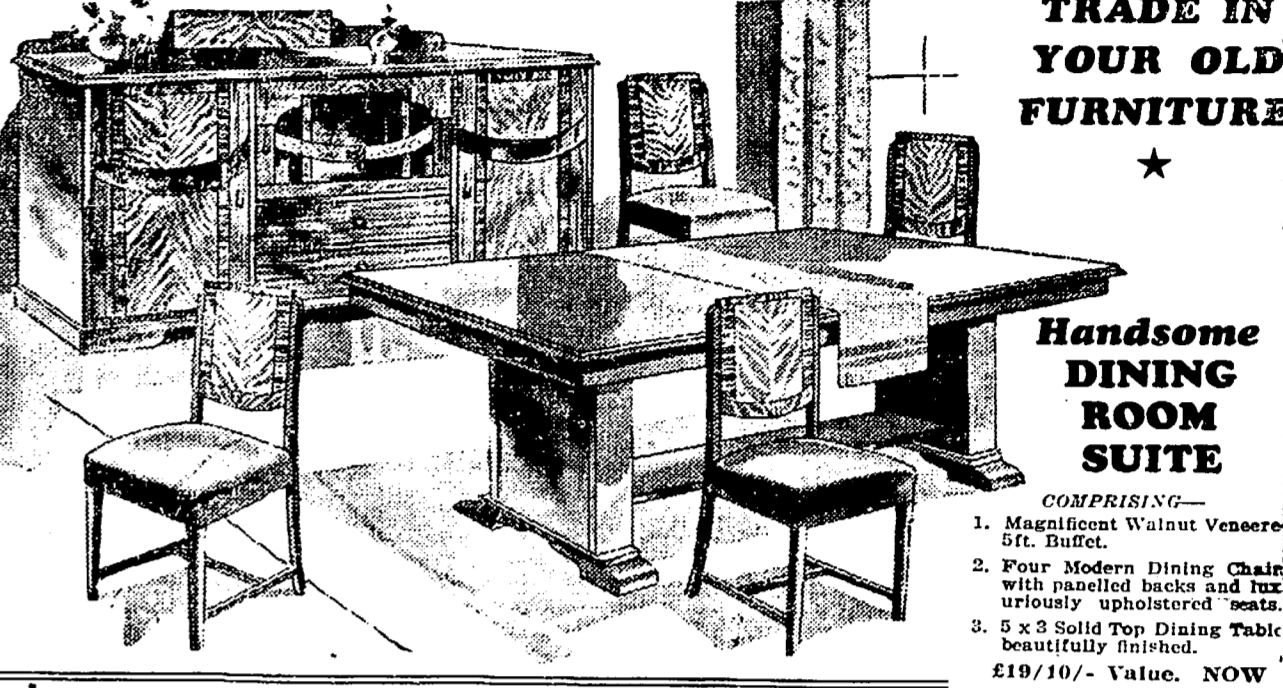
REPRODUCING HISTORIC ROADS
A road half a mile in length, comprising 18 sections, each of which reproduces one of the world's famous highways, has recently been opened in the grounds of the reception building of the Ford works at Dearborn, U.S.A. says the "Motor" (England). 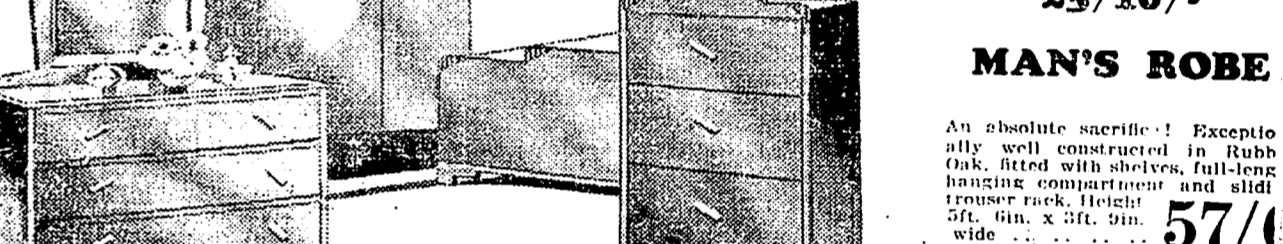

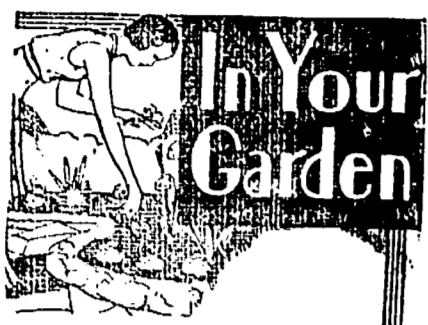

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NORTHCOTE AND THE TRAFFIC CODE

High Street As A Speedway

WILL THE CODE AFFECT TRADE?

ON the recommendation of the Committee of the Council, at the last meeting of Northcote Council, it was decided to incorporate the Traffic Code in the new traffic by-law.

The comments of various councillors on the new by-law and its effects were the highlights of the meeting.

Cr. French, who moved the adoption of the recommendation, said that it was not the council's intention to prosecute indiscriminately everybody who committed traffic offences...

He further said that at present the motorist was the recognized offender against the Traffic Code, but in his (Cr. French's) opinion, pedestrians and cyclists were just as much at fault as the motorist in disregarding traffic regulations.

The appointment of two traffic officers by the council would bring home to possible future offenders the fact that the council expects the community and all who use the streets to reasonably obey the law.

Cr. Turner, in seconding the motion, and he was only sorry the appointments were only of a temporary nature. He hoped that they would eventually become permanent.

Cr. Green said that in the past most of the breaches were the work of football motorists. "If they obeyed the traffic regulations to the letter, we would not need to appoint officers."

The effect of this by-law on business in High Street was discussed by Cr. Showen, who said that many business people viewed with concern the incorporation of the Traffic Code in the new by-law.

"High street gets a lot of trade from outside Northcote, and too rigid enforcement of the code will keep buyers away. There is no need to fear that this will happen, as the by-law will be administered with caution and discrimination."

"Traffic more dangerous than ever" said Cr. Jones, "and it is positively perilous to be on the road nowadays. There were no fewer than six accidents on a recent Sunday at the intersection of Dorothea street and Victoria roads."

He pointed out that most of the pedestrians misunderstood the Traffic Code, and while the code was not enforced, the absence of safety would remain as it was, if not for worse.

"A few prosecutions will soon make everybody obey the laws," concluded Cr. Jones.

THE A.B.C. OF THE TRAFFIC CODE The incorporation of the Traffic Code in the new Northcote Council by-law makes us realize that although many people have heard of about the Traffic Code and the controversy about it in the press, very few are conversant with the provisions of the Code.

In short, the Traffic Code is a mixture of "Safety First" and plain common-sense, and the main points are:

(a) On approaching High Street at St. George's road shall stop before entering such streets.

(b) On approaching the intersection of any two streets in Northcote, other than High Street and St. George's road, shall give right of way to the vehicle or horse approaching from the right.

(c) Shall not pass a stationary tram.

(d) Shall keep to the left of the roadway.

(e) Shall pass vehicles on right-hand side.

(f) Shall, before stopping, indicate subject matter at least 25 yards before doing so.

BOXING

"SNOWY" THOMPSON OUTCLASSED

With only two defeats (to Micky Smith in November 1935, and Bill Hamilton in January 1936) in two years "Snowy" Thompson, the youngest young Victorian welterweight raised his prospects of conquering the Filipino, "Clever" Henry, as distinctly favourable.

The bout took place at Fitzroy on Friday last, when Clever Henry won in the seventh round after dealing out terrific punishment in each round, and it was only Thompson's indomitable courage that kept him going after the first few rounds.

What ringsters thought of the possible result was reflected in the long odds against the Victorian winning. Thompson, however, on making his opponent fight instead of boxing, attacked savagely immediately, but owing to clever evasion by the Filipino, missed with most of his punches.

As a breach of any of these regulations is likely to prove costly to the breaker, the mentioned council list of the main items is worth remembering:

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(c) Shall not pass a stationary tram.

(d) Shall keep to the left of the roadway.

(e) Shall pass vehicles on right-hand side.

(f) Shall, before stopping, indicate subject matter at least 25 yards before doing so.

(g) Shall, before turning to the right, give indication of his intention at least 25 yards from turning point.

(h) Shall when turning into another street on the right, keep to the left of both streets.

(i) Shall not leave vehicle within 50 feet of any intersection, or 50 feet of tram-stop.

(j) Shall not leave any vehicle opposite any street or excavation.

(k) Shall not leave or allow to remain (whether attended or not) in any street for more than 30 minutes.

(l) Shall leave such vehicle not more than ten inches from kerb.

(m) Cyclists shall not ride more than two abreast.

(n) After the public road these items carefully, we hope that we will be spared the necessity of reporting in our columns prosecutions against our readers for breaches of this new by-law incorporating the Traffic Code.

The truck, driven by Mr. Colin McFarlane, of the Preston Ice Works, of Oakover road, Preston, was turning into St. George's road from Smith street, Thornbury, and it is thought that owing to the presence of another truck, McFarlane failed to see the approaching tram. The impact was terrific, and the truck was completely shattered, but McFarlane had a remarkable escape from almost certain death. He suffered only a cut tongue.

The driver's compartment of the truck was extensively damaged, and the driver, James Coudand, 41, of Dow street, Port Melbourne, was knocked off his feet. He was later admitted to St. Vincent's Hospital and detained for observation, suffering from concussion and shock.

Due to the practically complete wreck of the truck it was fully an hour before it could be cleared away and traffic allowed to proceed normally along St. George's road.

FOOD VALUE OF THE POTATO

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# The Truth About Television

An Authoritative Article On A Controversial Subject

In last week's issue of the "Leader-Budget" we described early television experiments in England and America and traced the progress to 1937 when the first regular television transmissions commenced in these countries. This week we will tell you further of this progress, and next week, deal with its prospects in Australia.

We have explained that the television receiver reproduces both sound and vision, but actually the sound and picture are transmitted on two different wavelengths. Television transmissions are carried out on very short wavelengths, which no standard dual-wave set will tune down to. This and other technical reasons make a separate receiver absolutely essential. This is a very interesting point to note as many people no doubt think their broadcast sets can be converted into television receivers. When we in Australia participate in this new radio thrill.

Now however that television transmissions are established in several countries, special receivers are being manufactured that will receive all other transmissions as well.

In attempting to clarify this much debated television subject, we desire to record thanks to Mr. Hannaford, of Northcote, who very kindly gave us some sidelights on its progress in England. Mr. Hannaford was in England at the time of the Coronation, and actually viewed portions of the Coronation procession on a television receiver. He states that reproduction was very clear and distinct, and was even discernible from another room of the room where the actual receiver was being operated. The size of the picture was 10 ins. by 8 ins. and

lid that can be raised. When the listener desires also to do some "looking-in," the hinged top or lid of the cabinet is lifted up, and the screen is apparent on the inside. In most cases the picture is reflected on to this screen, but in other cases the picture is viewed by looking directly at the Cathode Ray valve which is responsible for the reproduction of the picture. For the benefit of readers accustomed to small receiving valves in a broadcast receiver, it must be explained that Cathode Ray valves are giants by comparison and therefore the idea of looking at the valve to see the pictures reproduced can be better appreciated.

Indicative of their size also is the price—some of these valves costing up to £70. Whilst on the subject, we have received information of a television receiver manufactured in Berlin which employs a new cathode ray valve of 20,000 volt operation. The luminosity of this valve is so bright that the picture could not be observed without injury to the eyes, but this marvellous new valve achievement permits enlargement through the usual lens system to a screen 4ft. x 3 ft. in size. This constitutes a wonderful development in the television receiver, and it is another step towards bringing entertainment to an audience in a theatre, where it is ultimately hoped to provide full screen size reproduction.

Television Details. The television studio is equipped with a special valve camera which scans the objects to be televised and generates electrical voltages equivalent to the light and shade variations of the television image. The valve camera has to be focused on objects, by the way, to obtain a clear transmission. The electrical voltages developed by the valve camera are then amplified by numerous other valves until the output is sufficiently built up to be fed into the transmitter, which in turn sends the combined signals over the air.

Readers will doubt have appreciated by now how complicated this television business is, even though we have endeavoured to explain it in as simple terms as possible. Another interesting feature of television transmissions and the reproduction thereof, and further proof of the involved procedure, is that a synchronising signal is sent to enable the receiver to be kept in tune with the transmitter. Usually three engineers are employed to direct the studio activities—one at the microphone, one to take care of the microphones, and the other directing the programme. These, of course are apart from the usual engineering staff attending the transmitter. It can be readily understood that televis-

ion transmissions have to be accurate to a far greater degree than broadcast transmissions, and procedure is more highly involved. It is well known that many people listen to reproduction from a broadcast receiver that is far removed from being natural, and quite often severely distorted, but yet find no fault with it. In regard to vision however, the eye is more exacting, and we could not tolerate blurred or distorted images as easily. (To Be Concluded Next Week.)

### Indecent Behaviour And Unlawful Possession

FINE OF £5 IMPLICATED

When Michael Gerrard Peters, of Penders street, Preston, appeared before the Northcote Court on Friday, November 5, he pleaded guilty to a charge of indecent behaviour on October 30 at the Northcote Town Hall, and not guilty to a charge of having in his possession a drinking glass suspected of being stolen or unlawfully obtained. Counsel for Peters submitted that the evidence did not prove that the glass was unlawfully obtained. Defendant and some other young men were at a dance at Town Hall, and went out to have a drink, which was brought with a drinking glass suspected of being stolen or unlawfully obtained. This was subsequently found in Peters' pocket when he was searched after being taken into custody in connection with another charge. The glass, produced in court, was of a type which could be bought anywhere. It was not marked. After a short deliberation the bench dismissed the unlawful possession charge, and fined Peters £5 in default of 14 days imprisonment on the charge of indecent behaviour. An application for time to pay was granted.

### MEET ALEX. WALKER

WINNER OF P. & A. PARADE £100 PRIZE

There appears to be none, and yet that was what started Mr. Walker off. While laid up at a country hospital, just for fun he was imitating the cry of an apparently illing child, when in came the matron and said: "Who on earth left baby in with you?"—But the baby was not there!

Walker's life reads like an answer to a press-agent's prayer. Who would connect the successful business-man at 238 High street, Northcote with the youngster who started life as an ap-

Mr. Walker was born in Richmond in 1904, and as a youth was apprenticed to a jockey. But the study of these did not cause him to neglect his occupation. He rode 280 winners. During more than a decade in the saddle, he rode over 280 winners. At one time he established what was then a record, and probably still is, by riding 35 winners in three months. His riding took him through N.S.W., Victoria, and Queensland, and at one of the country meetings he performed the remarkable feat of riding five winners out of a six-race programme!

His first public appearance, after many years of study of bird-calls, etc., was made in 1934 with the Foy's Circuit. This marked the beginning of a career, and following one success after another, Alex. Walker has become a Commonwealth-wide figure in the world of entertainment. Those who visit the monthly entertainment of the O. A. and I. Pensioners, which is held on the last Friday in every month, know very well his fine mimicry, and all those who listen-in to the radio, know that his first prize in Section D, for novelty items of the P. & A. Parade, was a well merited win. Mr. Walker is a small man with a big heart, and in all sincerity, we say that his many audiences will join with us in wishing him the best of good luck.

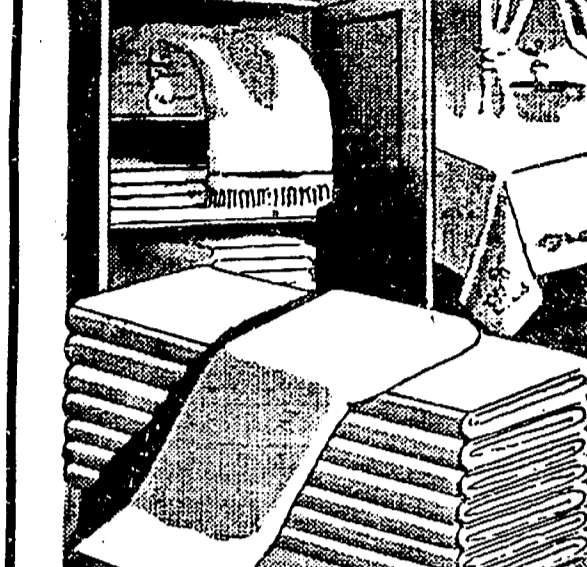

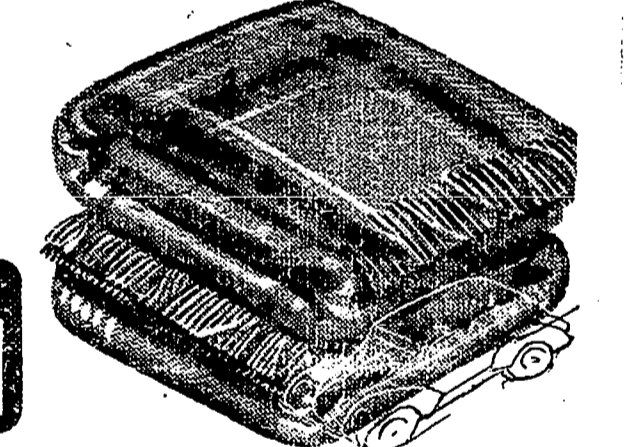

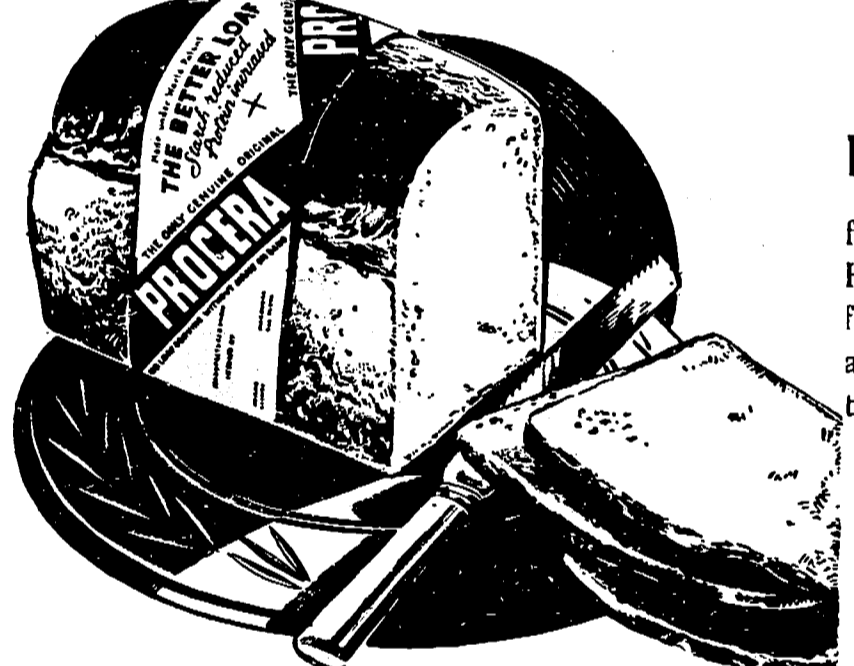

## COUNCILS URGE STOP-LIGHTS ON TRAMS

At the meeting of the Council of Northern Municipalities which took place on Friday last, at the Northcote Town Hall, it was agreed to urge the Tramways Board to provide trams with red stop-lights. It was claimed that this would reduce the number of accidents considerably, and that their installation was necessary for the efficient working of the Traffic Code.

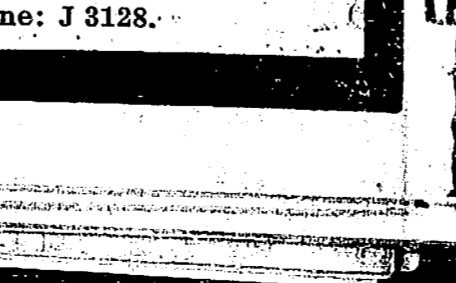
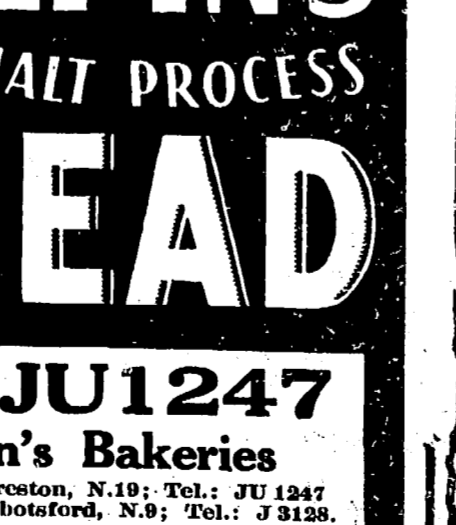

CASE FURTHER ADJOURNED

ALTHOUGH the evidence of both parties in the Lane v Lane case was concluded on the second day of the hearing, on November 19 at Northcote Court, certain features of the case so puzzled the F.M. (Mr. E. E. O'Grady) that he announced that he wanted some time to think it over.

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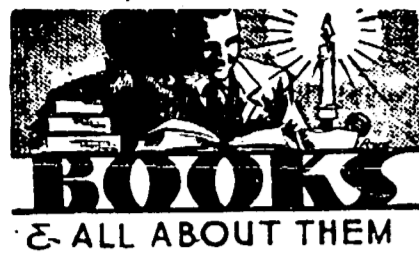

There was such a long list at the court on Tuesday that the bench was divided, the P.M. (Mr. E. O'Grady) taking one session in the magistrate's room, while Cr. W. Hayes and Mr. P. J. Kean, J's. P. continued at the court proper.

Cyclists Fined. After learning from Sgt. Martin that defendant would not appear, as he was attending the funeral of his child, the bench fined John William Dunnell, of Monash avenue, Reservoir, 10/- in default three days imprisonment for riding a bicycle without lights on the night of October 28.

A lighted torch is not sufficient illumination for a cyclist after sunset. This fact was brought home to Percy Fuller, of Clarke street, Northcote, when he was fined 10/- for this offence. In imposing the penalty, the chairman of the bench (Cr. W. Hayes) said that defendant had tried, although unsuccessfully, to obey the law by carrying the torch.

Other cases against cyclists for not having lights were: Albert Summer, Oakover road, Preston, fined 1/- in default three days imprisonment; Harold Lincoln, Madoc street, Preston, 1/-; and William Fitzhugh, Gower street, Preston, 1/-.

Parcel on Wife's Lap Proves Coercive

When John Stanley Johnson, of Highview road, East Preston, was stopped by the police while driving his car on the night of October 15, in High street, Northcote, he was asked why his headlights were not burning. Defendant said that his wife had a parcel on her lap, and it had probably knocked the light switch up. Defendant said that before he started he switched the lights on, and they were in perfect order.

Unlawful Transfer of Number Plates

When motor-cyclist Patrolman Hearn saw a motor-cyclist on October 13 in High street, Northcote, he stopped him and made a few inquiries. The reason for this action was that the cyclist was riding a Norton machine, whereas the registration-plates and disc were those issued to an Ariel motor-cyclist.

Motor-cyclist, Walter Blair Simpson, of Cecil street, Fitzroy, appeared to answer charges of riding an unregistered motor-cyclist, and of having fraudulently used number plates.

Defendant's explanation was that his friend's motor-cyclist was at his place, and he had transferred the number plates from the machine to his own, for the purpose of giving it a run to see if it was all right mechanically as he was going to sell it.

Defendant was convicted on both charges, and fined 12 and 13 respectively.

For failing to produce his driver's license within seven days following a collision in High street, Northcote, on September 17, Alfred Pearce, of McLure street, Alphinington was fined 10/-.

Licensing Cases.

There were many prosecutions by the Licensing police, and heavy penalties were imposed.

A fine of 12s, in default three months' imprisonment was imposed on each of two charges against Vera Harris, of High street, Northcote, for selling liquor without a license.

Lydia Copley, of the Commercial hotel, Northcote, was fined 12 for supplying persons with liquor on Sunday, October 3; and for carrying away liquor from licensed premises during prohibited hours, George Green, Eastment street, Northcote, was fined 11.

A fine of 12 was imposed on Emily Lucy Dalton, of the Albion hotel, Charles street, Northcote, for allowing persons to be on licensed premises during prohibited hours; while Thomas Armstrong, Holden street, North Fitzroy, and John O'Halloran, Scotchman's street, North Fitzroy, were fined 11 each for being there on October 14.

Brunswick Council Loses Case

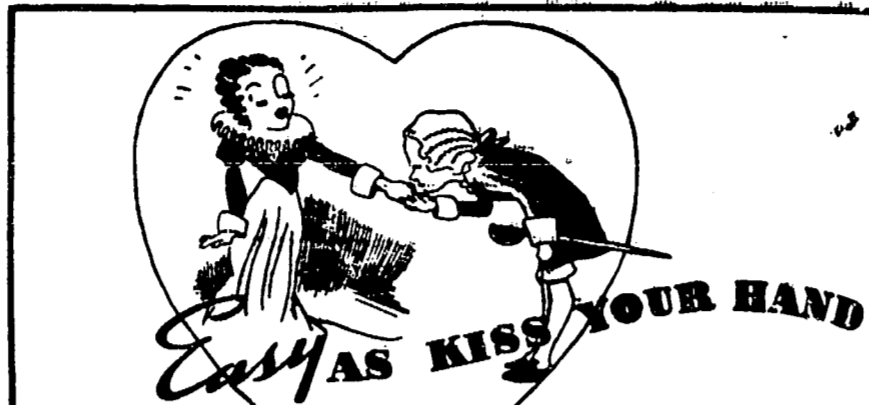
The following account of court proceedings speaks for itself, and serves as a reminder that municipal councils are not always right, and that they must only act within the scope of the powers conferred upon them.

A declaration that he was not chargeable with the cost of making the street known as Daily street, Brunswick, on lands which had been compulsorily acquired from him by the Brunswick Council was granted to Alexander Trotter, dairymen, of Dawson street, Brunswick by the Chief Justice in the Banco Court on November 9.

A further declaration that the council had not properly acquired the land under the Local Government Act was refused. Counsel for Trotter said that the road was constructed by the council in June last year. Before the road was constructed, the council took the appropriate steps under the Local Government Act, compulsion to acquire the land from the owner, but before it went into possession of the land, it served him with a notice under part 19 of the Act notifying him of its intention to charge him with the cost of making the road. Trotter appeared at a meeting of the council and objected that the road was not yet completed, and that the council proceeded to make it. The council over-ruled his objections, constructed the street, and presented him with an account for 184.

For the council it was argued that having compulsorily acquired the land, the council, by the pegging of the road, was entitled to charge Trotter with the cost of construction.

Sir Frederick Mann, in his judgment said that the litigation had arisen from a mistake of action taken by the council. Whatever difficulties there might be at times in applying parts 18 and 19 of the Act with accuracy and in strict conformity with the Act, any attempt by a mere clever and ingenious proceeding to wrest the language of this act from its ordinary, simple, and well-known application, and to apply it in an unusual, strange, and unprecedented way, was always unwise, and nearly always illegal.

FATHER AND SON FINED Result Of A Collision

WHEN a six-wheeler truck, driven by David John King, 18 1/2 years, collided with a cyclist at the intersection of Murray road and High street, Preston, on September 29, it brought the law into action, which resulted in King's appearance before the Preston Court on Wednesday, November 17 on three charges of breaches of traffic regulations.

The prosecution alleged that the cyclist, Douglas James Snell, 15-year-old schoolboy, was hit by the truck when the six-wheeler was on the wrong side of the road after having cut the traffic-button by 18 feet.

Snell said that he did not see the truck-drive but cut his hand when he tried to turn. At that time he (Snell) was travelling at about 15 miles per hour. He tried to swerve, but did not apply his brakes. He was caught under the truck which passed over him, and he was pinned down by the differential. He sustained a dislocated knee, a cut on the head, and minor injuries to his elbow.

Constable Frank Bellard told the bench that shortly after the accident he was called to the scene where he saw a truck and trailer in the middle of High street. The load on the truck consisted of three large logs, which he estimated to weigh about three tons. The tracks on the road, and the unposition of the truck indicated that

the vehicle had "cut" the traffic-button by about 18 feet. There were marks of a collision and impressions of the road where the wheels of the truck had crushed the bicycle into the bitumen. He interviewed the driver of the truck and submitted the truck to a brake-test. The footbrake was totally ineffective, and the handbrake was jammed. The jamming of the hand-brake could have been caused by the accident. Defendant admitted having no driver's license. He said that his father did not feel well, and as no other driver could be found, he drove the truck into the city from the timber camp.

Defendant, who gave his address as 2, Rae Street, North Fitzroy, was fined £1 on a charge of driving a motor vehicle without being licensed; a further £1 for driving without two effective and independent brakes; and £5 for driving in a manner dangerous to the public. The father of the defendant was also fined £1 for allowing an unlicensed person to drive the truck.

LOOK IT UP!

One of the most valuable things for a boy to learn is that the wisest man is not the one who knows the most facts, but the one who knows where to find out the facts.

Knowledge is power, but we do not have to carry the whole power plant in our heads. It is enough to know where the power can be had.

Education is not merely learning a lot of things. It is really learning how to think. It is learning where facts are to be had, and how to get at them, and how to use them.

Every boy and girl, therefore, should early get the reference habit—that is, the habit of going to the great books where knowledge is stored, and finding out the fact wanted.

First of all reference books is the dictionary. Next in importance to the dictionary comes a good encyclopaedia and atlas, or collection of maps.

If every time you hear a word that you do not understand, or hear some subject spoken of that is not familiar to you, you will put it down in your notebook and look it up in one of your reference volumes, you will be on your way toward the best kind of education.

We must bear in mind that it is not just reading which gives us a full mind and makes us intelligent and well posted. It is not just wading through book after book. The reading which does you real good is reading with a purpose. It is "looking up" some subject.

We should go to books as we go to a chemist to get some particular thing that we want. To get the good out of the chemist's shop, we do not have to beem at one end of the shelf and take every drug there is. We have to select the one that we need.

Those who are young nowadays have much greater advantages than those who were young fifty years ago. Then libraries were few and far between. Now there is a good one in almost every town.

Get the habit of spending an hour or two once a week, if possible, in the library looking up subjects in which you are interested. Besides this, if you have time, it is a good habit to be reading less than a dozen books, reading here and there and getting familiar with the great field of literature.

Books contain the treasure of knowledge, the stored-up wisdom of the wise men who have gone before us. And the more we are familiar with them the fewer mistakes we shall make.

BIG MOTOR BUS FIGURES

Statistics issued in U.S.A. covering that country's motor bus transportation for the first six months of 1937, show that figures for the current year exceed those of the record business done in that country for the corresponding period of 1936. Despite competition in the form of cut railroad passenger fares, motor bus traffic is allowed up for the January-June period of this year by 5 per cent, while revenue is 10 per cent higher. When one reflects on the fact that in 1936 the 56 leading bus companies in U.S.A. collectively carried over their 14,600 buses, 1,395 million revenue passengers over 58,285 miles of streets or highways, for a revenue of approximately \$10 million, it will be realized that the improvements reflected in the bus transportation business in U.S.A. this year represent big gains.

Indeed, these buses last year transported 550 million miles of line service and in addition, covered seven million more miles in charter or private hire work. During the first half of 1937, the average bus miles per vehicle operating in the American cities was 19,822 miles. The passenger revenue per mile of route was approximately £1,250, while the passenger revenue earned per bus was about £228. Operating costs amounted to 68.9 per cent of total revenue, the cost per mile being slightly under 9d. per mile. For the six months, the revenue per bus owner was over £63, after paying all taxes, providing for depreciation and amortisation. New units are being added to U.S.A. motor bus fleets at the rate of about 4,000 vehicles per year.
