### MR. BELL REPLIES TO CRITICISM

(To the Editor.)

Sir,—On the direction of my Chairman, I forward you a copy of a statement he has prepared in answer to various criticisms on his recommendation that Diesel buses should be used in an experimental service on the Bourke street—Nicholson street and Northcote Cable routes. Yours etc.,

Life of seven years for buses and 25 years for trams, showed an advantage in favour of trams. It had, however, to be kept in mind that with the changes taking place in transport technique, a life of 25 years for trams, although physically possible, was improbable in view of the obsolescence. If through these factors, the life of a tram turned out to be much less than 25 years, then the operating result would be no more favourable to trams than to buses.

The statement is as follows:—

In order to remove some misconceptions which apparently exist in connection with the decision of the Tramways Board to inaugurate a service of Diesel buses from Bourke street to Nicholson street, and Northcote, the Chairman of the Board (Mr. H. H. Bell) states that it is important to remember that a large expenditure on buses would still have to be faced even if the Board reaffirmed the decision reached in July 1937, to electrify the lines. Electrification of the routes would cost approximately £600,000, that sum including the necessary new rolling stock. As in all other conversions, buses would have to be used to provide a service which would approximate the service given by the cable cars, which just now handled 339,000 passengers weekly. The conversion would have to be done in sections, Northcote to Clifton Hill; Clifton Hill and the Smith and Johnston street intersection; and finally, from that point to the terminus in Bourke street at Spencer street. As at least 33 buses would be required, the board would have been compelled to incur an expenditure of between £70,000 and £80,000 for those vehicles. To convert the routes to Diesel routes, on the other hand, meant only £200,000 for buses and their accommodation though eventually a considerable sum could have to be spent on the reinstatement of the roads when the tracks were removed, the amount depending on the materials specified by the councils. It would be seen therefore, that the board had involved itself only in an additional expenditure of £120,000. Even if it was found that the buses were unable to deal satisfactorily with the traffic in and from Bourke street, that £120,000 would in no sense be wasted, as the buses in that event would be available for reinforcing the existing bus services, which were increasing rapidly, and for the exploitation of developmental routes and extensions which could not be attempted with any vehicle other than a Diesel bus.

Another factor of great importance was that of time. The present cable services were proving inadequate, and the tracks in the suburban sections were getting into a condition which would make extensive reconstruction necessary in the near future before electrification could be proceeded with, for the reason that if the Board even now decided to electrify the route, from two to two and a half years would elapse before it could manufacture the requisite number of new trams of the suggested type.

The experience of the Board with the Diesel buses on the East Brunswick and Port Melbourne routes had shown the efficiency of these vehicles and their ability to carry heavy traffic, while the standard of maintenance had proved much lower than anticipated. If the new buses for Bourke street produced similar, or slightly better results, then the estimated surplus would be increased, and it was true that the comparison of the operating results, based on

Diesel buses. These housing schemes were from six to ten miles from the centre of the city, and the Diesel bus had been deliberately chosen because no other type of vehicle approached it from the point of view of economy of operation. I am anxious to see the workers of the inner suburbs removed to better surroundings in the outer suburbs, but that will be impossible unless cheap transport is provided. The Diesel buses are capable of providing such transport, and I feel certain that they will fulfil all the hopes I entertain for them."

Brightening The Children's Hour

YOUNG EYES NEED PLENTY OF LIGHT

It is commonly said that the hardest part of any task is the beginning, yet in the case of educating children to the value of "Better Light—Better Sight," the reverse is the case.

Everyone will agree that during the early years of childhood the mind is its most plastic and receptive period. Therefore, if the youngster is taught the necessity of good light at an early age, he will learn to protect the priceless gift of sight.

Good eyesight is every child's birthright, and every care should be taken to preserve it by parents and those responsible for the upbringing of children. Youngsters who are subjected to a tremendous amount of strain, such as watching a picture book—head in hands, nose buried in the book, and those who are subjected to the glare of the illustrated pages, searching and frowning their brows through the mysteries of the magic code, and read or sympathetically upon the captured princess, who waves a pale hand from the opposite tower. The seeds of eyestrain are usually sown during these periods of intense concentration, which account for the fact that so many school children begin to wear glasses during their teens and continue to wear them for the rest of their lives.

Psychologically, abundant light in the nursery is of the greatest importance. Children, like plants, need light to encourage growth and well-being. We have all seen a plant which has grown in the darkness of a sunken enclosure, pallid, and unhealthy. Surely it is not carrying the simile too far if we say that a child deprived of the influence of good light will possibly develop dark recesses in the mind which could eventually defy eradication.

The fact that a child may not appreciate the artistic qualities of attractive light fittings is no excuse for careless methods. It is of paramount importance to ensure that children are never placed near a glaring light source, and later, when school days commence, to guard against risks of eyestrain when doing home work. A study with a 100-watt Philips Pearl globe is also a useful adjunct in the nursery to give local lighting for sewing, etc., and will prove immensely beneficial to the child when school days are commenced.

Overhead illumination may be provided by a pendant fitting or panels of glass actually fitted into the ceiling. Whichever type is chosen, the lamps should be inside frosted and should be placed, if behind glass to give complete diffusion. Where a ceiling fitting is employed, it should be a totally enclosed unit in opal glass thus providing a hygienic method of lighting which can be kept clean, because the interior is dustproof.

The R. Army illustrated here is illuminated by a recessed frosted panel in the ceiling, and subsidiary lighting is supplied by "Philips" tubular lamps, an ideal combination to protect the safety of young eyes, and to make the "children's hour" as enchanting as their first fairy tale.

Northcote Women's Organisations NORTHCOTE AUXILIARY FOR WOMEN'S HOSPITAL

At a meeting called at the Epiphany Hall, Rathbone street, Northcote, on October 24, 1938, a number of interested ladies decided to form an auxiliary to work for the Melbourne Women's Hospital. Mrs. Herbert Brooke, President of the Central Executive of Auxiliaries for the Women's Hospital, addressed the meeting, and explained the pressing need for assistance from auxiliaries. At this meeting, Mrs. S. Dennis was elected president, Mrs. H. F. Aclary, treasurer, and Mrs. A. W. Harley, secretary. The members, although small in numbers (15 in the membership), manage to do a great deal of work. Sewing and knitted garments are made for the hospital regularly, and the auxiliary has a fund of money. The materials are purchased from the auxiliary funds, and the members convert them into baby dresses and slippers. Contributions to the hospital include bottles, tinned fruit for Christmas cheer, and eggs. Checks for the auxiliary are handed over. The auxiliary is paying off the cost of a flat at a cost of £500, and to date £261/4/0 has been raised for this purpose.

50th Annual L.N.F. Convention Two Days Of Functions

The Irish National Foresters' Society held its 50th Annual Convention at the Dispensary Hall, Thornbury, on October 17 and 18, which coincides with the Golden Jubilee of the foundation of the Michael Davitt Branch of Northcote. Delegates from 47 branches were present, and the functions associated with the convention included a civic reception, a high tea, and a civic night. The convention was officially opened by Archbishop Mannix, who was welcomed by the Mayor of Northcote (Cr. J. W. French), the Parish Priests of Northcote (Dr. Cahill) and Thornbury (Fr. Vaughan).

In his welcome to the Archbishop, the Mayor complimented him on his activities in connection with the education of youth, and on the formation of the Roman Catholic community had provided excellent and lasting monuments in the form of schools and colleges, which were some of the best in Victoria. It was the duty of the community to pay tribute to the memory of the younger generations, and the Roman Catholic had done, and were doing this.

## Northcote-Thornbury St. Vincent's Hospital Auxiliary

"There is nothing but the human touch Can heal the human woe."

Like every other public hospital, St. Vincent's Hospital, Fitzroy has need of every ounce of assistance and money which can be given. To this end the Auxiliary movement was commenced some years ago, and now there are 20 auxiliaries throughout the metropolitan area, giving of their best to help the hospital to render up-to-date service and nursing facilities for its many patients. The hospital, with its 200 beds, is the closest to Northcote, and serves this district for its many casualties, accidents, and imperative cases. Thus it is only just that an auxiliary should be commenced in the Northcote and Thornbury districts to serve St. Vincent's Hospital.

The Northcote and Thornbury Auxiliary for St. Vincent's Hospital was formed at the residence of Mrs. Carew on June 24, 1929. Mrs. G. D. Boycher (secretary of the Central Executive) was present, and explained the requirements of the hospital, and the ladies present decided to put forth all their energies in this direction. Mrs. G. D. Boycher, Mrs. J. Carew, president, Mrs. J. J. Ryan; secretary, Mrs. J. F. Cooper; treasurer, Mrs. J. Gorey. Mrs. W. Jowett replaced Mrs. Gorey as treasurer in 1930; Mrs. L. Roberts became secretary in 1931; and in 1932 Mrs. Kenny was elected to this office which she has held capably and loyally ever since. Mrs. L. Roberts served as president for two years and Mrs. P. Ogden for twelve months and when Mrs. Kenny's main efforts are to raise funds for St. Vincent's Hospital, but it also takes part in any appeals the Mayor of Northcote may make, the late being a donation of £5 for the appeal for Distressed Soldiers. Each year about £200 is sent to the hospital, and this is earmarked for special purposes.

Over the past nine years the total amount sent to the hospital is £1,627/13/7, which has purchased equipment for the laundry and diet therapy department and operating theatre, and has furnished rooms in the Nurses' Home; also a bed and a cot in the new Maternity Hospital.

A Goose Club each Christmas is a splendid way of gathering funds, and affords attractive prizes. Last year £204/12/ was Maternity wing, for which Mrs. O'Neil and Mrs. Murphy are responsible. To celebrate their silver wedding anniversary, Mr. and Mrs. O'Keefe defrayed the expenses of a party, and £40 was the financial result. Last year a wonderful addition was made to St. Vincent's Hospital in the nature of the medical block, at a cost of £27,000, by Government grant. New operating theatres were added, an intermediate section incorporated, and a maternity wing opened. For years the need of a hostel for the aged infirm, and dying has been felt. Public hospitals are unable to take such cases, and so the Central Executive of St. Vincent's Auxiliaries is maturing the idea of acquiring a hostel for this purpose. This is the present object before the auxiliaries, and for this object their donations will be used.

"Auxiliary" means "helping" and this is just why these bodies could not be provided for the convenience of patients, and for the more effective application of the knowledge of doctors and nurses. The Northcote-Thornbury Auxiliary meets at the Committee Room of the Northcote Town Hall on the second Thursday of each month, and a card afternoon is held in the Committee Room of the Northcote Town Hall on the third Thursday of each month.

A Birthday League organised by Mrs. Robins reminds members and friends of their birthday, and in this way helps to swell the funds of the auxiliary.

This year's annual report shows that 1159 out-patients, and 207 in-patients from the Northcote Municipality availed themselves of the services of St. Vincent's Hospital.

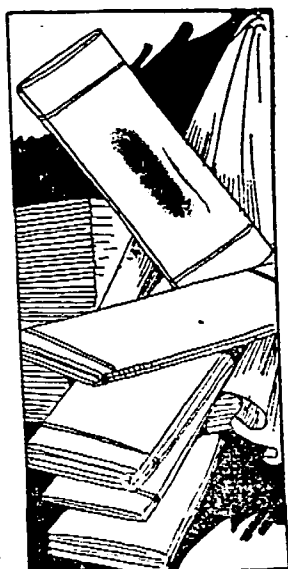

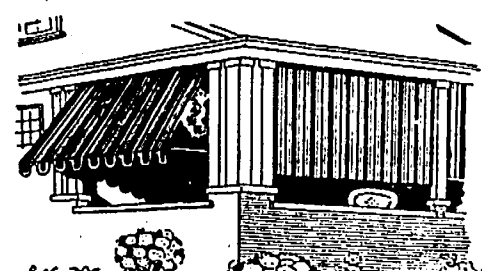

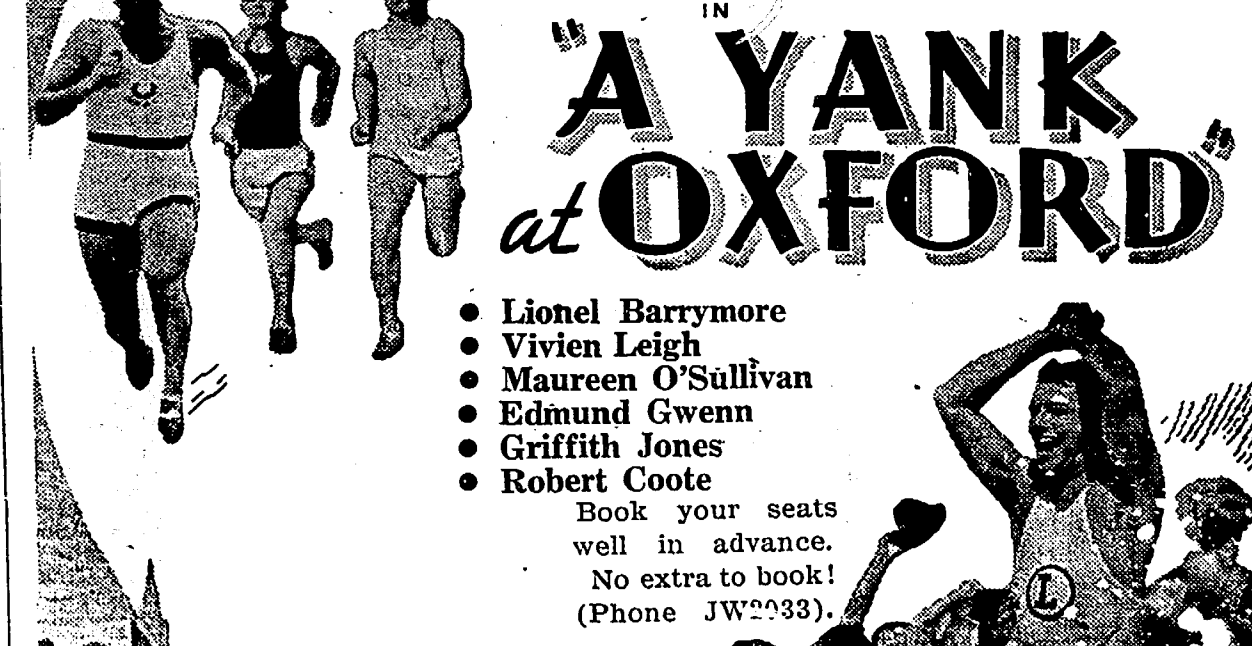

RECIPES

for the Housewife

RUSSIAN TOFFEE - 3 oz. butter, 1 large tablespoon golden syrup or treacle, 2 teaspoons brown sugar, 1 tin condensed milk, 1 teaspoon vanilla.

SHEEP'S HEAD PIE - One sheep's head, one quarter pound raw ham or bacon, four hard-boiled eggs, one teaspoon chopped parsley, one teaspoon water, one tablespoon ketchup, pepper and salt to taste.

MORSEADISH SAUCE - 2 tablespoons grated horseradish, 1 teaspoon castor sugar, 1 teaspoon mustard, pinch of pepper and salt, 4 tablespoons cream (or milk), 1 level teaspoon vinegar.

VEAL SHAPES - 1 lb lean veal; 6 oz. bacon, salt, pepper and mace; 1 level teaspoon chopped parsley; veal stock as required; gelatine.

Put both the veal and bacon through the mincer after removing the rind from the bacon and any gristle from the veal. Season well with pepper and salt and powdered mace, stir in the chopped parsley, and mix well, then moisten with a little stock. Pack into small greased basins or castle moulds, cover securely with well-greased papers, and bake gently in a hot oven for 2 1/2 hours.

GINGER SANDWICH - 4 oz. plain flour, 2 oz. crystallised gelatin, 4 oz. butter, 4 oz. castor sugar, 1 teaspoon baking powder, 1 tablespoon rind and ginger chopped finely, milk, 1 egg, 1 level teaspoon sugar, 1 level teaspoon butter and sugar together, add the grated lemon and then add the well-beaten eggs and a bit of milk. Lastly add the sieved flour and baking powder, and mix well. Bake in greased and sugared sandwich tins for 20 minutes in a fairly hot oven.

When cold, put together with the following fillings: 2 oz. butter, ground ginger to taste, 3 oz. sieved icing sugar, a little chopped crystallised ginger. Beat the butter and sugar to a cream, and then add the ground ginger and chopped ginger. Top with glaze (icing made as follows): Put a tablespoon of warm water into a basin, add 1/2 lb. (113 gms.) butter (water), and add icing sugar, beating all the time. Do not let the icing get more than lukewarm. Beat, adding sugar, till the mixture is of the consistency of thick cream, then spread smoothly over the sandwich. Decorate with crystallised ginger and glaze cherries.

R.V.I.B. - Northcote Auxiliary

"Lighten our darkness we beseech Thee, O Lord." "The light of life for which we live Shines from the heart not in, upon it."

THESE days one cannot open a newspaper without seeing the work of the auxiliaries mentioned, and one wonders how the hospitals and other charities ever managed without this tremendous help.

The Northcote Auxiliary for the Royal Institute for the Blind is a comparatively infant in its class, being barely six years old— but nevertheless an infant very much alive and doing well.

I look twice at that last adjective and let it stand; for to the sighted the lack of sight is the most terrible deprivation — and yet the Institute is a happy place and its inmates are happy people.

Think of the plight of the blind child brought up in the ordinary home — not able to take part in the play of his brothers and sisters; not even find his way about; he is condemned to sit inside all day.

The Institute is extremely proud of Margaret, aged 44 years. Margaret was seven months old when she came and totally blind. After twelve operations she has some sight and it is hoped that when she is 14 years her sight will be normal.

The latest arrivals at the Institute are blind twins aged eighteen months, Rita and Elvera, who are of intense interest to the other blind children.

The Institute has many and varied activities; the factory where the blind workers earn £25,000 per annum. Sighted tradesmen and instructors have to be employed to teach them and many articles necessarily made by hand in the factory have to meet the competition of sighted labor with fast machinery so that the work done at the Institute has to be sold at cost price or under.

By means of monthly efforts, generous giving, self-denial and hard work by all; by means of our loyal Vice-presidents, Mesdames V. J. Clayton, B. E. Johnson, E. Pollock, S. R. Riches, and C. S. Scott; by the unceasing work of our secretaries—Mrs. H. Frouse (nee Johnson), Mrs. L. O. Seebeck, Mrs. J. W. French and Miss Gwendia Riches; by our trusted treasurer of six years, Miss Gwen Holden; and, last and not least, by the personality and enthusiasm of our one and only President, Mrs. W. F. Brownell, whose unfailing tact and courtesy since its inauguration have kept and welded the Northcote Auxiliary for the Blind into a society of happy and devoted members.

### 15 MONTHS' OLD THEFT OF BICYCLE

#### CASE AGAINST PAINTER DISMISSED

A bicycle was stolen on August 12, 1937 from Lawrence Bennett, of McFarlane street, Northcote, when he left it outside Harris and Wright's shop. The sequel happened at Northcote Court on November 15 when Lawrence Richard Prest, painter, of Dundas street, Preston, appeared on a charge of larceny of the machine. After the evidence for the prosecution and defence, Mr. O'Grady F.M. dismissed the information. He said there was no doubt in his mind as to whom the bicycle produced in court belonged. After the dismissal, Mr. A. E. O'Connor (for Prest) stated his client would not claim the bicycle, and it was returned to Bennett.

Formal evidence as to how the bicycle was stolen was given by Bennett, who stated that the machine in court was his property. At the time it was stolen it was valued at £10, and had been in his possession for only nine months. He pressed evidence would be about £2. The back wheel of the bicycle produced was different from the one stolen 15 months ago. When the bicycle was stolen it had a fixed wheel. He could not remember the serial number, but was sure the machine was his.

Detective O'Keefe narrated how he interviewed the Constable Knights, who interviewed defendant at his home on November 9. Prest told him he had bought the bicycle from a man named McFarlane in June last, and paid £10 for it. He said a receipt was given to him, and he had a receipt for the bicycle. He said he had sold the bicycle to Prest further told witness that he and McFarlane used to work together, and McFarlane had referred to sell him the bicycle on several occasions. He refused to buy, but eventually did so, as McFarlane was a well-known man in the country and he himself got a job to which he could ride.

Detective O'Keefe also told the court that on the day prior to the interview with Prest, the frame of the bicycle produced was altered in the shop in St. Albans, and the wheels subsequently at defendant's home. Through the evidence of the witnesses they traced the bicycle.

Prest was summarily dealt with, and gave the same explanation as he had given Detective O'Keefe. The bench held that there was sufficient evidence to dismiss the bicycle.

The case was dismissed, but the bench expressed the view that Prest was the rightful owner of the machine.

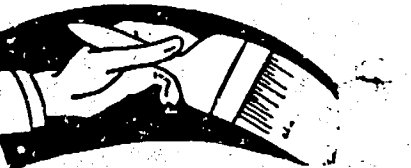
