FIRES AT TWO ROMAN CATHOLIC CHURCHES

No Reason For Causing £3500 Worth Of Damage

AN 18-YEAR-OLD HAWKER COMMITTED FOR TRIAL

Bail Refused

When the Crown case against Robert George Albert Marsh, 18-year-old hawker of bootlaces and cottons, was closed at the Northcote Court on April 4, and accused after altering his plea from "Guilty" to that of "Not guilty" was committed for trial on two charges of arson, the police raised an objection to bail being allowed.

Det. Dawson (prosecuting) said that in view of the lad's mental condition he had been instructed to oppose bail.

Marsh, when interviewed by Detectives Egerton, Thomas and Dawson at his home in Wantirna road, Ringwood, offered no explanation when accused of setting fire to two Roman Catholic Churches, which were completely destroyed.

The charges against Marsh were that he on March 27 did maliciously and wilfully set fire to St. Anthony's Church in Austin street, Alphington, and also did commit a similar offence at the church of Our Lady, in Durham road, Sunshine.

Father Francis Molan, Parish Priest at St. Anthony's, said the church was intact at about 9 a.m. on March 27. When he returned to the church at 10.45 he was told something in consequence of which he went to the sacristy, and on opening the door found flames licking up the back wall. His efforts to extinguish the flames with buckets of water failed. He was driven back by the heat and flames, and could not enter the church. It was completely destroyed. The church and its contents were insured for £2,320.

The caretaker of the church, John Joseph Walsh, said accused called at the church hall where witness was working, at about 10.30. On being told that the priest was out he asked to be directed to the church. He mentioned to Walsh that he had to see the priest about some bootlaces. About 25 minutes after accused's departure in the direction of the church, witness saw the building in flames.

Robert Gregor Milne, station officer of the Northcote Fire Brigade, said that an alarm was received at 11.6 a.m. Within 32 minutes the fire was under control. Ivanhoe and Northcote brigades responding. The church which was an old wooden structure could not be saved, and was burned to the ground.

Similar evidence was given by a senior fireman in respect of the Church of Our Lady, Durham road, Sunshine.

The parish priest of this church Rev. Father Ryder, said that on March 17, while sitting in the presbytery, he heard a dull roar, intermingled with crackling, and

Det. Egerton said "It is alleged that on March 27 you set fire to St. Anthony's Roman Catholic Church in Austin street, Fairfield?" Marsh admitted that he was in Fairfield on that day, but did not set fire to the church.

Det. Egerton said "You went to the convent, and after you left there you went to the church. You were seen leaving the church just before the fire." Marsh replied: "Yes, I did set the church alight."

Det. Egerton: "How did you light the church?" Marsh: "I went in by the front door, which was open. I then went to the back of the church where I found some matches near the candles. I set fire to a piece of paper and put it on a fluffy rag."

Det. Egerton: "It is also alleged that on the 17th of this month you set fire to a Roman Catholic Church in Durham road, Sunshine." Marsh asked: "What day was that?"

Det. Egerton replied: "That would be a Friday." Marsh: "I did set fire to a church on a Friday."

Det. Egerton: "How did you set fire to this church?" Marsh replied, using the same words as in the answer given to the query regarding the first church.

Det. Egerton next asked Marsh why he set fire to the churches, to which accused replied: "I do not know."

Accused was then taken to the Northcote police station where he made two statements admitting setting fire to the two churches. In the statement it was revealed that after setting fire to St. Anthony's, and the Church of Our Lady, Marsh walked away and continued to hawk his wares for a few hours. He also heard the arrival of the fire brigade at Sunshine, but did not bother to look

back. On looking out the window, discovered the church was on fire. Dense smoke and flames prevented him from saving anything. The church and contents, which were destroyed, were insured for £1,330.

Police evidence was given by Detective H. J. Egerton, who told the bench how Marsh was interviewed by the police at his house at 6.45 a.m. on March 30. He was taken to Ringwood police station,

Young Rescuers

The presence of mind of two little boys, Bruce Jenkin and Johnny Campbell, was responsible for Harold Dymond, aged eight years, of 42 Beavers road, getting off rather lightly after he fell some 80 ft into a clay hole off Dennis street.

The boys were playing together on Sunday afternoon last near the hole, when Dymond slipped and fell to the bottom of the hole. His companions, instead of running home and saying nothing about it (which is so usual among children), made a descent to where Dymond was lying. They brought the unconscious boy up, and carried him to High street, where a passer-by was accosted, and the ambulance called.

Dymond, who received severe concussion, abrasions, and a broken wrist, was taken to the Children's Hospital, where he was treated and allowed to return home.

Accused was given the usual caution after the Crown case was closed, and he then pleaded guilty to both charges. He was allowed however, to speak to his father, and later altered his plea to one of not guilty.

Accused was committed for trial to appear before the Supreme Court, by the two justices who heard the cases.

When accused asked for bail, Detective Dawson, who prosecuted, said "In view of the lad's obvious mental condition, I am instructed to oppose the granting of bail."

Marsh was refused, and Marsh, who did not appear to take much notice of the proceedings, was led away.

NORTHCOTE COUNCIL

ORDINARY BUSINESS

The following matters were brought up—

Cr. Peters spoke of the unduly long time during which the railway gates in Arthurton road remained closed to road users. This practice was not adopted by every gatekeeper on duty, but to his knowledge gates were shut while the train was pulling out of the Thornbury station and remained so while the train pulled into Northcote station. Cr. McAdam mentioned the condition of footpath in Walker street, west of High street.

Cr. Shewan drew attention to dangerous condition of footpath in Claudio street. He knew it was listed for construction but repairs to some holes should be undertaken at once. Referred to officers for attention.

To an inquiry by Cr. Shewan as to when the footpath in High street (which was recently torn up by the P.M.G.'s Dept.) was to be repaired, the city engineer (Mr. V. J. Bradley) said the slabs would be made available one week after Easter.

Cr. Peters drew attention to the condition of footpath on the north side of Sumner avenue, between St. George's road and Ryan street—Referred to P.W. committee.

The last item under ordinary business was brought up by Cr. Hayes. It referred to Station street and the work being carried out there. He contended that this work was unsatisfactory. The excavation was far too deep and blasting operations were carried on without necessary caution. Large sized rocks had been flung on to adjoining houses. It was decided that the surveyor report.

An Early Morning Collision

UNLICENSED DRIVER ON DANGEROUS DRIVING CHARGE

Returning at 3.10 a.m. from a church dance held at St. Anthony's Alphington (which has since been destroyed by fire) a car containing two young men came into collision with another car, the driver of which faced the Northcote bench on Friday, March 31, on a charge of driving in a manner dangerous to the public. Defendant, Edward Albert Webster, 21 years, of Fitzroy street, St. Kilda, was also charged with driving without being the holder of a driver's license. He was convicted on both charges, and fines of 15 and £1 respectively were imposed.

Robert Bird, 24, printer, of Alexandra parade, Clifton Hill, said that his companion and he were returning from a dance at Fairfield. After passing the Clifton Hill railway gates, and while proceeding south along Hoddle street, they became aware of a fast travelling motor car coming in the opposite direction. It was being driven on the wrong side of the road. The speed of defendant's car was about 55 miles per hour. Witness, who was driving, thought the man behind would swerve out of his way as defendant was slightly on the wrong side of the road. Defendant did not do so, and the two cars collided with great force. Considerable damage was done to witness' car, while the vehicle driven by defendant swerved across the road and crashed into the picket fence running parallel with the railway lines.

The accident occurred practically outside the Clifton Hill police station, and Constable Riley, who was on duty heard the noise. He ran out and examined the scene of the collision.
Constable Riley told the bench that judging by the marks, the impact took place a foot or two inside the white traffic line on the eastern portion of Hoddle street, thus bringing defendant's car on to its incorrect driving side.
The defence was a denial of dangerous driving, and that the collision was caused by a "blow-out" of a front tyre, which caused the car to swerve on to its wrong side.
Mr. Addison P.M. who with two honorary justices heard the cases, accepted the version of the prosecution, and fined Webster £5 on the dangerous driving charge, and £1 for driving without a license, also ordering defendant to pay 10/- costs.

A charge of driving on the wrong side of the road without justification was withdrawn.
Senior Constable Bean appeared for the prosecution.

Onions will not shrivel up when fried if dipped in milk before being put into the boiling fat.

My radishes ran to tons, with nothing underneath. I cut out the biggest leaves and cooked them in half a cup of water, soft and a deserts-top butter. I served it as spinach and no one knew the difference.

Equal parts of olive oil and Indian ink mixed and rubbed lightly on black nappa gloves will make them like new. Finish with a polish rub with a silk handkerchief.

High Cost Of Speed In Petrol
To ascertain what difference driving methods have on petrol consumption, an interesting test was conducted at Northcote recently. Three 1 1/2 h.p. cars, identically equipped were used for the demonstration. To the test, all tanks were drained, and were then refilled with carefully measured quantities of fuel. The cars were driven 200 miles along the London-Torik road, which carries a heavy volume of traffic. The fastest car, an average speed of just under 35 miles per hour, and the others at approximately 25 miles per hour, and 40 miles per hour respectively. At the conclusion of the runs, the remaining petrol was drained from the tanks and measured. The resultant petrol consumption figures indicate very vividly to what extent fuel economy is affected by methods of driving.

The car that averaged 25.18 miles per hour recorded 38.06 miles to the gallon; that which averaged 34.69 miles per hour averaged 32.02 miles per gallon; whilst the fastest travelling vehicle, averaging 45.64 miles per hour travelled only 22.89 miles per gallon.

These figures are very enlightening, and show how varied petrol consumption can be while driving on a normal main road in a family saloon car. It also serves to demonstrate why the man who buys the road always complains about his poor mileage per gallon.

CANKER
The majority of cases of canker are caused by parasitic invasion of the ear. A mite of the mangle kind is the primary irritant. This mite is also responsible for many of the more serious cases of canker. Water dogs, such as spaniels and retrievers are perhaps the most frequent subjects. The ear of the dog has its inner surface two kinds of glands, which secrete wax and an uncuous matter for lubricating the ear soft and pliable. These glands, when irritated by parasites, or other agents, become inflamed, and instead of lubricating and protecting the ear, they give out an acid matter of inflammation, and which causes ulcers. The best treatment is to bathe the affected ear with a solution of either of the following: a teaspoonful of either pint of warm water. After bathing the ear carefully with the solution, dry thoroughly with a dry boracic into the ear. This will soon clear up the canker, and relieve the dog from the first application.

DOGS AND THEIR CARE

FITS IN DOGS
Convulsions are most commonly met with in young dogs, and may be traced to some irritant in the diet, or to the natural changes in the teeth. One type of worm in particular, assaria marginata, is very commonly the cause of convulsions, and even death. Fits and convulsions often occur in distemper, and are of shorter duration. Treatment is to keep the patient quiet and give water to the head, and give light nourishing food. Worms are suspected, a course of castor oil capsules or Krect worm puppy syrup will be found the most effective treatment for removing the cause of the dog's convulsions.

EMIPLEPSY
In epilepsy the dog is convulsed involving the body, face, eyes, jaws, etc. The fits and convulsions occur frequently, and during another short interval of a few minutes, but sometimes, though rarely, several days intervene. The duration of the fits is not long, varying from a few seconds to several minutes. Epilepsy is caused by external injury, or by internal causes, such as irritation of the bowels, constipation, spinal and brain disease which occurs in pure epilepsy. There is at present no actual cure. These fits come on at uncertain intervals, sometimes months elapsing between each attack. IF WAR SHOULD COME

THE TRANSPORT PROBLEM
If the exigencies of war necessitated the reservation of all available petrol supplies in Australia for military needs, what would be the fate of the many thousands of private cars, which now rely on cars for transportation? It is not a situation that many country car owners, with no other means of transportation, can contemplate with equanimity. Of the 58,000 cars now registered in Australia, probably in the region of 75 per cent would have other facilities available, such as trains and trams, so that though they might be somewhat inconvenienced, they would still have means of transport. The other 25 per cent representing some 14,700 cars, would be faced with the alternative of finding some other means of transport with their petrol supplies, or following pastoral or agricultural pursuits.

THE TRANSPORT PROBLEM
The bugles and horses of old are no longer available, consequently quite a million country people of Australia, if lack of their automobiles, will be laid up. So far, little has been heard of serious attempts to make provision for the putting into production of suitable producer-gas out of fitted motor cars and trucks. Such a scheme is hardly one that private enterprise can be expected to initiate, because such a power plant may never be needed to tide over a war emergency. Should such a necessity arise, however, the call for an answered without many months' delay unless the essentials of such a plant have been investigated and provided for in advance.

THE TRANSPORT PROBLEM
There have been successful demonstrations in Australia with commercial producer-gas outfits for outstanding one being a motor truck run by the Commonwealth Government, the vehicle having run 7,500 miles on 1,400 lbs of charcoal. With a five-ton load on a level road, the vehicle could travel at 44 miles per hour and make 100 miles without refuelling. The container, which is made of steel, is the fact that provision already has been made in Japan for fitting charcoal gas outfits to some 20,000 cars. They cost about £40 each. LIQUID PLANT FOOD

A spatful of well-rotted natural manure stirred well into five or six gallons of water yields a rich plant food. Always let the mixture stand overnight or a little longer, and drain the liquid off to use without much sediment. Throw the sediment round tomatoes or marrow plants. Stir 2 oz. general fertilizer into a gallon of water, allow to settle, and apply. This too, may with advantage be made up overnight. To promote growth, use 1 oz. of sulphate of ammonia, nitrate of soda or Floraphos to a gallon of water. For general use, use 1 oz. of the above, 2 oz. of sulphate of potash.

PRESSING CLOTHES

Pressing is one of the most important lessons the home dressmaker has to learn for any garment, no matter how well sewn will look home-made if it is badly pressed. Correct pressing is very different from ironing, and various materials must be treated in the correct way. Generally speaking, all woolen materials should be pressed with a hot iron over a damp cloth, but before you start to make up the material should be pressed with a warm iron on the wrong side. A cloth is not necessary, but don't have the iron too hot or you may spoil the color, or, in the case of some artificial silks, take a piece right out of the material. Cotton, of course, can be ironed the usual way without coming to any harm.

HEAVY BRAKING MEANS HARD WEAR

Sudden braking and quick acceleration help to shorten the life of motor tyres. The indulgence by many motorists in this driving technique tends to the belief that such motorists consider the effect on their tyres hardly worth bothering about. Yet, the quick getaway and hard braking driver generally cuts down by half the mileage built into the tyre by the manufacturer.

A test carried out in England provides evidence that it is not drivers in this country that they can save many pounds a year by the moderate use of brakes and accelerator pedals, says the Dunlop "Fleet" Bulletin. A Londoner who uses a fleet of private motor cars in his business decided to ascertain exactly what difference varied methods of driving made in the cost of tyre upkeep. New tyres of identical make and equipment were placed at the service of three of his employees. They were not told that a test was being carried out.

The first man reported that he needed a new set of tyres after 1,000 miles had been covered. His covers were worn smooth, with fabric showing on the rear wheel. This driver specialised in fast getaways, and he indulged in hard braking and fast cornering.

The second man asked for new tyres after covering 18,000 miles. His tyres were worn smooth on all four wheels. This driver prided himself on the smooth handling of his car although he travelled fast. His method was to glide away at the start, allowing the vehicle to find its own momentum, and when he got into the "50's" and "60's" he held it, easing off some distance from the corners and crossings. His times on runs were just as good as the get-there-quick driver who wore his tyres out in 14,000 miles.

Months later the third man sent in his requisition for a new set of tyres. He reported having covered 28,000 miles before the tread of his covers had disappeared. He had seldom driven at more than 35 m.p.h., usually slower. Corners he took at 15 to 20 m.p.h., in fact, he was one of the "what's-his-name" drivers who used his car for safe transport.

Such figures may awaken "get-there-quick" drivers to the fact that they are wasting the life of their tyres by their driving technique, in addition to materially increasing the wear and tear on their car. The experiences related may also help to allay the feelings of some motorists, who, because of their harsh treatment of tyres, declined not to use the same make of tyre again, because the mileage was not up to expectations. The fault lay with the drivers, not with the tyres.

Now that the football season is almost on us, the thoughts of followers of the great Australian winter game are centred on the prospects of the boys' football in the senior competitions. While it is good to see such enthusiasm shown, it is as well to ask what is being done to encourage boys to take up this fine sport and foster healthy "competition" amongst those of more tender years.

It is a regrettable fact that for the past few years there has been no junior competition in Northcote at any rate, to encourage the boys who are the potential senior players of the future.

"APPLE BREAD"

New American Idea.

"Apple Bread" graced the festive board in many American homes last Christmas. It is a new American invention, and over there it is known as "apple bread" because it does contain apples, although it has no apple taste.

The secret of the new bread is an apple sauce formula by which 20 to 30 per cent of apples may be added to bread dough without resulting in a soggy loaf. On the contrary, this apple content is claimed to make for a light loaf containing vitamins, and also prevents the bread from becoming stale.

Industry has taken to the idea, and vast quantities of apples have been prepared and canned, and so great is the demand that in some parts the entire crops of apples have been bought up for the purpose. From 30 to 35 lbs of apples are required for every 100 loaves.

Poaching Eggs

To keep fried or poached eggs in a neat shape place a small saucer in the fat or water. Then break the egg and pour into the cutter. When cooked, the egg is round and compact, and two can sit on a slice of toast. To poach the egg, the cutter should be greased with butter.

On the average the outlay on petrol by American motor owners last year was a little short of 10/- a week per vehicle, or £25 a year. Of that amount 29/15/- went to pay Federal and State petrol taxes, which combined averaged less than 3d per gallon.

Statistics issued by the U.S.A. On the average the outlay on petrol by American motor owners last year was a little short of 10/- per week per vehicle, or £25 a year. Of that amount 29/15/- went to pay Federal and State petrol taxes, which combined averaged less than 3d per gallon.

Crude oil stocks in U.S.A. are now lower than at any time during the past 16 years, and are 6 per cent lower than at the end of 1937. The production of crude oil for 1938 was 1,213 million barrels (42 gallons), from which was produced 556 million barrels of motor spirit. All told, 19,338 new oil wells were completed as compared with 23,678 bores in 1937.

A comparison between the average petrol consumption by automobiles in U.S.A. and Australia shows that the motor cars and commercial vehicles of this country, on the average, are only consuming about 270 gallons per year—as against 575 imperial gallons per annum in America. On the basis of an average of 18 miles to the imperial gallon in U.S.A., where there are practically no small cars as in Australia, and an average of 20 miles per gallon throughout the Commonwealth, it appears that an American motor owners use their cars considerably more than do Australian motorists. At the respective miles per gallon mentioned, the all-round average mileage in U.S.A. per automobile would be 10,350 miles per annum, as against 7,400 miles in the Commonwealth. Lower running costs, made possible by cheaper petrol etc., and lower automobile taxation, no doubt partly account for the wide difference in the annual fuel consumption per automobile in the U.S.A. and in the Commonwealth. If Australia's motor vehicles were each on the average, driven 10,350 miles per year as in America, this country would require in the region of 450 million gallons of petrol per annum, instead of the 350 million gallons now imported to cover the needs of transportation on land, sea, and air.

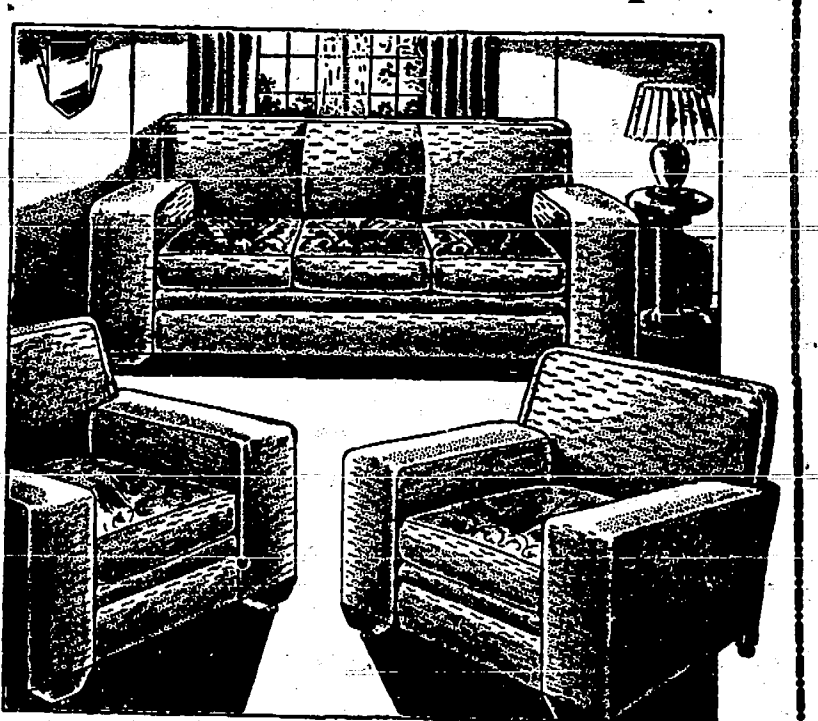

HOME-GROWN HERBS

Will Prove Most Useful

The average household requires a few only of each of the main herbs, and with the exception of parsley they are all perennial in habit. They may be grown from seed but the best idea is to procure rooted portions of the perennial forms. Herbs that have been freshly picked from the garden are preferable to those which have been dried. Every household should have a few roots of the following herbs, even if he or she does not make a practice of vegetable growing. Mint.—This requires a moist position. As it is inclined to spread and become a nuisance, it is best grown in a kerensan tin, or in some confined area. Thyme.—In addition to its value as a culinary herb, thyme makes a good edging plant for the vegetable garden. Sage and Marjoram.—These are also easily grown, and may be used for seasoning, particularly with the more fatty meats. Parsley.—This herb is grown from seed, and in a few weeks grows in the autumn and spring there should be a plentiful supply of parsley throughout the year.

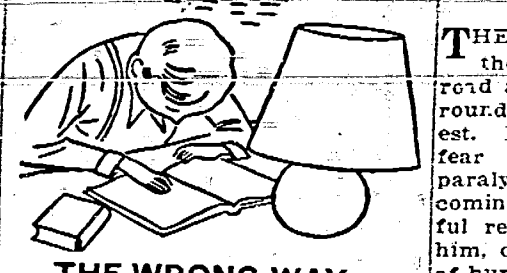

DISPUTE OVER A TRUCK

Investor Loses Case

THE evidence in a case heard by the Northcote bench on April 14 disclosed that while a man was held in custody on a charge of alleged murder, a person who financed him in his venture as a fruiterer repossessed a truck.

The vehicle was bought in August last. When he was released on bail, Philbert Dante, of Station street, Fairfield, called on the investor, James Leaney, Nicholson street, Fitzroy, and later took away the truck, Leaney reported it stolen. The wireless patrol followed the truck and questioned Dante, who was able to satisfy them that he did not steal the truck. No police action was taken against Dante. The Northcote bench was asked on Friday by Leaney to order the return of the truck to him, alleging that the vehicle was being unlawfully detained by Dante.

After lengthy evidence, in which the main statements of both parties were in conflict, the court accepted the evidence of Leaney and dismissed Leaney's application. The case for the complainant was outlined by his solicitor as follows: Leaney had financed Dante to start in a fruit business in Victoria street, North Richmond. The shop was originally controlled by a man named Cafarella. Later it was taken over in partnership by Dante and a man named Speranza. This partnership was dissolved, and Dante remained the sole owner. Leaney bought a new truck, which was subject of the case before the court. When the truck was purchased, it was hired by Dante at the rate of 15/- per week. It was registered in the names of Dante and Leaney.

Some time later, when Dante was in custody, he refused to return the truck. He refused to do so, saying that arrangements had been made for the truck to be sold. The witness for the complainant, John Ronald Barton, from whom the truck in dispute had been bought, gave evidence that Leaney came to buy the truck. Leaney said Dante would be driving the truck. A witness suggested that the names of both parties should be placed on the registration certificate. Leaney could not remember the exact conversation which took place between Leaney and Dante.

The next witness for the complainant was Constable Lannigan of the wireless patrol, who said that on March 17 the patrol had on the list of stolen cars the Chevrolet truck referred to in this case. It was seen by the patrol in Bridge road, Richmond, and followed Dante, who was driving it. It was questioned and taken to Richmond police station. Witness said the truck "seemed to be stolen," and he said "I can soon fix that." Defendant produced the certificate of registration on which the names of Leaney and Dante appeared. This information was verified while Dante was at the police station. The police took no action.

Witness in cross-examination could not remember when Dante told him that he owned the truck, and that only a small amount was owing. John Stanley Collins, business agent, said that on March 14 he went to the Coburg goal with Leaney. An agreement in which was mentioned the business and all it contained as well as the truck had been made prior to them going there. This agreement was not signed, but another one was drawn up as Dante disputed the ownership of the truck. Dante said "I might want the truck when I come out."

In cross-examination, Collins said he did not remember anything about buying the truck, and that terms had been mentioned at the office of the governor of the goal. COOKING MUSHROOMS

SUNDAY RAIL FARE REDUCTIONS

An important innovation was the introduction during 1938 by the Victorian Railway Commissioners of greatly reduced Sunday day-return fares for travel on the electrified lines. These fares provide particularly favourable facilities and arrangements for parties desiring to make visits of trips to the hills and seaside. The inter-suburban special fares to Melbourne were also very materially reduced. A milestone in the continuous plan of accelerating passenger trains was introduced in 1934 — was passed in 1935 when the total weekly reductions in travelling time exceeded 700 hours — 703 to be exact.

LONG WELDED RAIL SPANS

During the year, a further programme of extensive re-laying and strengthening of tracks was carried out designed to enable heavier trains to run to faster schedules and to make travelling more comfortable. Conspicuous in this plan was the completion of the re-laying of the line between Newport Junction and Geelong. Rails welded to lengths of 225 feet, including two experimental sections of 4,747 feet and 4,321 feet, together with other heavy track construction, make this the longest rail section one of the finest railway tracks in Australia.

ANNIVERSARY OF "SPIRIT OF PROGRESS"

November 23 was the first anniversary of the launching of the "Spirit of Progress." This all-steel motor train has amply fulfilled the predictions made before it entered service. During the 12 months of its operation, it has carried an increase of 25,000, or 15 per cent, compared with the patronage on the "Sydney Limited" for the corresponding period. This increase is more significant because in the busy months of December, 1937, and January, 1938, interstate traffic was seriously affected by the infantile paralysis epidemic. The uniformly good service of the "Spirit of Progress" has fully demonstrated the adaptability, skill and workmanship of Australian craftsmen in constructing one of the world's finest trains.

had been a wonderful inspiration to him. They were all part and parcel of a great Friendly Society movement, but the I.O.R. still adheres to its outstanding principle of total abstinence for the individual, and prohibition for the State. The Friendly Societies were doing a great work for their members, and he advised his listeners to stick to their societies whatever they might be. The community as a whole was faced with many problems at the present time, the greatest of which was unemployment. In this connection, Bro. Findlay stated that it was most important that the actaries of Australia should work out what reserve fund a working man accumulated in his working life so that he could draw on that fund when out of work. He pointed out that this principle was in existence in Friendly Societies, inasmuch as the actary would say what one should pay to draw 20/- per week when sick, also what one should pay to accumulate £20 for funeral benefit. Bro. Findlay also contended that all successful businesses pit by a reserve, yet the working man and woman at the present time had to be satisfied with a bare living wage when working, and he claimed that there should be a reserve which should be a first charge on the cost of living figures to provide for the time when they might be thrown out of employment.

In concluding his address, Bro. Findlay again expressed his gratitude to all for the wonderful gesture to his wife and himself, and appealed to all to assist him in his endeavours to advance the objects of the Order in their entirety.

After remarking that the meeting was continued until 11.30 when the National Anthem concluded another memorable event in the history of the Northcote Tent. The arrangements for this function were carried out by the Tent's Social Committee, with Bro. A. Fillingham and E. Webb as organisers, whilst valuable assistance was given by members of the Frigate of Northcote Ladies Tent.

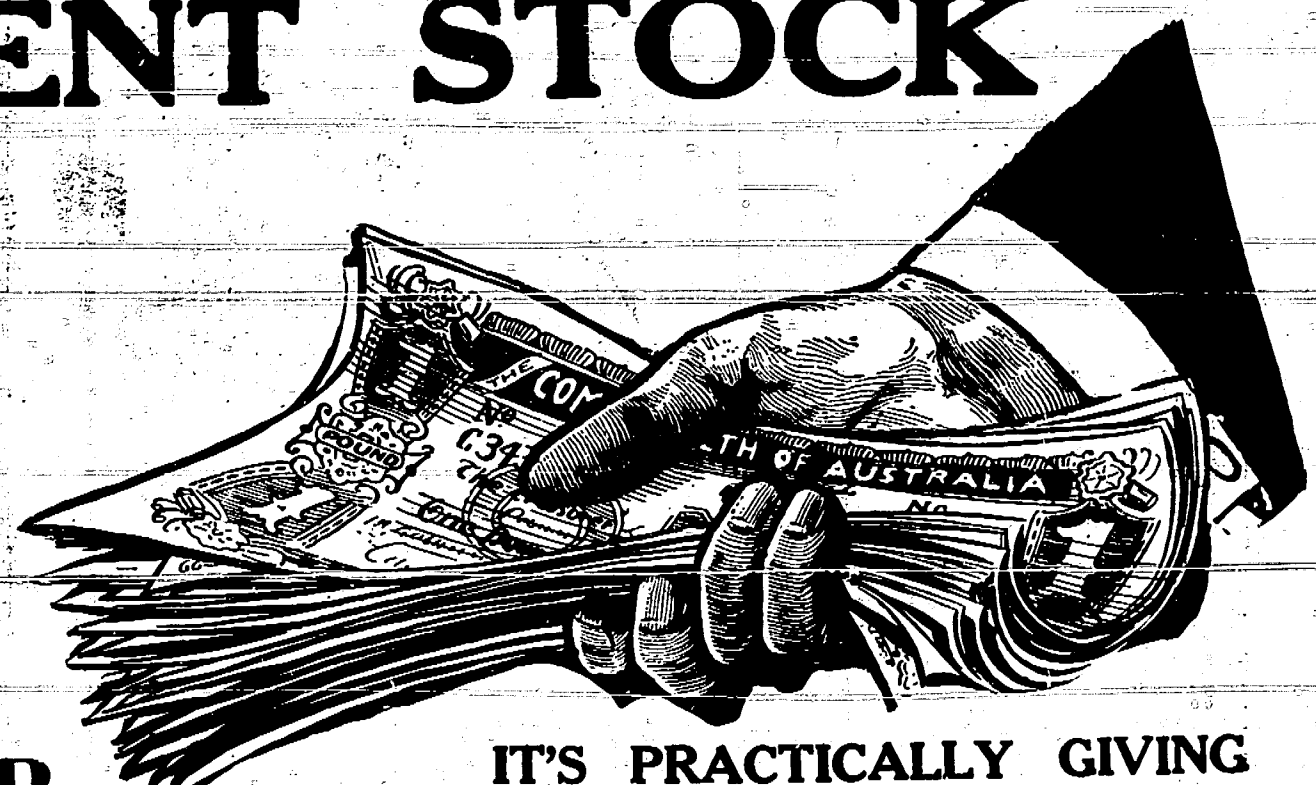
