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ALLEGED SHOPBREAKING AND STEALING YOUTH COMMITTED FOR TRIAL

Five charges of shop breaking and stealing, and one of garage-breaking (the latter involving the theft of two motor-cycles valued at £105), were preferred against William Clarke, 20 years, of Russell street, Northcote, when he appeared before the Northcote court on May 2.

When questioned by Detectives Thomas and Grundy, Clarke admitted six offences, and made statements to that effect. These were read out in evidence.

Clarke pleaded guilty to the following charges: On January 22, breaking into the newsagency of Edwin Samuel Amery, in Station street, Fairfield, and stealing 24 fountain pens, a quantity of mouth-organs and chewing gum, and 2, valued in all at £10; On February 7, breaking into a shop in Fairfield owned by Percival George Collins and stealing £1/18/6, some torch batteries, scout knives, and watches, valued at £3/11/6; On March 11, breaking into the shop of Arthur Swigg, tent-maker, and the electrical shop of Robertson and O'Donnell in High street, Northcote; it being alleged that from the former he took 7/6 in money, and from the latter torch batteries valued at 6/; on the same date breaking into the shop of John F. Need, High street, and stealing three dozen fountain pens and other articles valued at £15/5/5. The charge of garage breaking, which accused pleaded not guilty, was laid in respect to the disappearance of two motor-cycles from the garage of Carl Junker, in Heidelberg road, Fairfield, on April 23.

It was revealed in the statements that when the offences were perpetrated, accused was in company with two other youths.

Clarke was committed for trial on all the charges, bail being fixed at £100 with a surety of £100 on the charge of garage-breaking. On the others, a personal bond of £10 in each case was accepted.

GALA NIGHT AT ST RAPHAEL'S

Last Saturday night was held the opening gala dance at St. Raphael's, West Preston, in conjunction with the Queen Carnival competition. Amongst the large attendance, which numbered 350 people were Rev. Fathers Murray and O'Rourke. The latter, who is at present at North Melbourne, until recently was closely associated for four years with St. Raphael's.

IMPROVEMENTS AT RESERVOIR

Work on the extension of footpaths and drainage on the east side of High street, from Bedford street to Howard street was begun on May 1.

JUSTICES EXERCISE LENIENCY

Two honorary justices (Messrs W. J. Holden and P. J. Kean) who heard a larceny case against William Edward Jones, electrical

linesman of Heidelberg road, Fairfield, at the Northcote court on May 2, after considering the facts and listening to accounts of the excellent character borne by the defendant, decided to adjourn the case for six months.

Jones was charged with stealing 23 bricks, valued at 2/.

On April 7, Rowland Hill, builder, of the Boulevard, Isanahoe, when looking out of the window of his house on to a building in course of erection near his home, saw Jones and his wife standing near a heap of bricks. They were putting bricks into a truck which was pulled up alongside the stack. Witness approached the couple and Jones explained that he was taking a few bricks to complete a footpath at his home. Jones admitted that he had taken the bricks, when interviewed by Detective Donnelly on the same evening at the Fairfield police station.

Accused pleaded guilty, and elected to be dealt with summarily.

The Electrical Engineer of the City of Heidelberg stated that he had known Jones for the past 28 years. For 16 years he had employed Jones, who bore an excellent character. The Heidelberg Council was aware of the occurrence, and although Jones was suspended for three weeks, his employment had not been terminated.

In adjourning the case for six months, the chairman of the bench said Jones should have known better than to be tempted by a few bricks. "It was quite immaterial whether the bricks were on the allotment or on the footpath."

Preston Engineer's Report

Mr. Ben Johnson, C.E., has made the following report to the Preston Council:—

Reconstruction Works.—The modernising of kerbs and channels in Station street has been completed. The contractors have completed concrete path in Garnet street, and are well advanced with the kerb and channel in Mary street. The paving of these footpaths had been delayed to enable the P.M.G.'s Department to lay conduits. Reconstruction and re-sheeting of Bell street, from High street to Plenty road, completed. Balance of Motor Omnibus grant will be spent on Bell street from High street, westwards. Precast slabs in Edgar street and Byfield street replaced with concrete in situ. Precast slabs in front of new Planet Theatre relaid. Asphalt paths in Austral avenue resheeted. Resheeting of eastern end of Wood street completed; also Larns froye and Brighton avenue. Drain along r-o-w at rear St. George's road cut. Modernising of kerb and channels in Elwardes street and Spring street now in progress.

Loan No. 19.—Paving of Spring street with pre-cast slabs, from Edwardes to Ralph street, completed. Similar paving in High street, from Howard street to Northernhay street, will be put in hand as soon as reconstruction of kerb and channel is completed.

Loan No. 21.—Contractors have completed paving in Tennyson avenue. The paths in Station street will be commenced as soon as roadwork is completed. Then paths in Bowden street, Shakespeare avenue and Wood street will be done.

Parks.—Oakover road park levelled and graded. It requires trimming up. Fences around Milton street tip removed; levelling is in progress.

Buildings.—Alterations to the sustenance office to provide a waiting room have been completed. Re-siting of roof of municipal offices has been delayed owing to wet weather.

Country Roads Board.—Plans, etc. for modernising kerb and channels, reconstruction of flanks, and re-sheeting of roadway in High street, were submitted to the Board. The proposal is to carry out the work in three stages, doing the kerb, channel and flanks on the eastern side, from Howard street to Northernhay street, this year at a cost of £2,500. Similar work on the western side next year at an estimated cost of £2,500, the re-sheeting of the road to give a 40 ft. carriage-way, the following year, at an estimated cost of £2,500. The Board's approval has been obtained and a start has been made.

Private Streets.—The Howard street group is completed with exception of trimming up and a drag sheet coat on Howard street. McDonald, Kane and Evelyn streets just on completed. Sheffield street in progress. Plans are in hand for Miller and Kimber streets, Railway place and Maynard street, as well as several rights-of-way.

Mayoral Activities

On April 27 the Mayor and Mayoress of Northcote (Cr. and Mrs. J. W. French) were present when Mrs. Tutton gave a Travel Talk on her flying trip from San Francisco to New York.

On Friday last the Mayoress attended a meeting convened by the Lady Mayoress of Melbourne, at the Melbourne Town Hall in connection with the Women's Voluntary Register. The Mayoress intimated that a similar meeting would be convened in this suburb in the near future.

On Tuesday, May 2, the Mayoress attended a card party held by the Northcote Branch R.S.S.I.L.A. at the Memorial Hall, High street, while on Wednesday she attended a similar monthly meeting at the Santa Maria Convent.

Yesterday the Mayoral couple were the guests of Mr. E. C. Yeomans, President of the Northcote Cricket Club, when he entertained a number of ladies and gentlemen at the Westgarth Theatre.

YOUTHS ON JOY-RIDING CHARGE

Bound Over At Preston

When evidence for the prosecution was tendered in a case where two youths were charged with illegally using a motor-car, it was revealed that the owner, Terence McLaren, radio engineer, of Arthur Street, South Yarra, had made each youth pay him 25/- for alleged damage to his vehicle.

The Preston bench of justices which heard the cases against Ronald Edward Ellard, 19 years, Bartlett Street, Preston, and William Thomas Reid, 18 years, Mary Street, Preston, imposed sentences of one month's imprisonment each, but released them on their own recognisance of £20 to be of good behaviour for two years.

Two men, James William Harvey, of Newcastle Street, Preston, and William Alan Johnson, Martin Street, Thornbury, were charged with having the care, management and conduct of a common gaming house. The cases against these two were heard separately and were dismissed after Mr. Addison, P.M., found that the premises were not used as a common gaming house.

Subsequently the charges against the other 81 men who were charged with being found in a common gaming house without lawful excuse, were also dismissed.

That was why he was in the room itself the police found a large number of people, three billiard tables and three card tables. The card tables were marked off into six tables each. When interviewed, it was suggested to him that this was for the purpose of playing a game called "Craps" and American. "Dear Sir, The Hon. J. Napier, Chairman of the Banking Commission, has referred to me your letter of April 21 regarding the Par. 504 of the report of the Commission. (1) The statement in the paragraph mentioned is the fact that the Commonwealth Bank cannot in the interests of the community make money available to Governments or others on such terms as to choose, even by way of a loan. Without interest or without requiring either interest or principal. (2) However, apart from the limitations shown in the report, to the exercise of this power, it will be seen from a perusal of the report that the Commonwealth Bank cannot in the interests of the community make money available to Governments or others except on the conditions generally governing the business of banking. We are aware of the present government of the Banking Business, also that portion of the report which states that the present government should supersede the opinion of the banks.

The letter is from the Secretary to the Treasury, and as your space is valuable, I would crave space to comment on it in next week's issue—Yours etc.

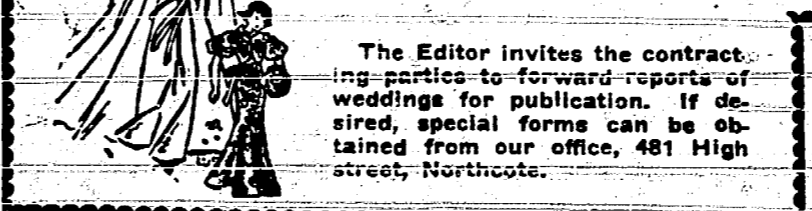

FEEDING THE BABY NATURALLY

WHY DO SO MANY MOTHERS STILL FAIL TO DO THIS?

In these days of intensive mothercraft education, there are not many mothers who do not appreciate the advantages of feeding their babies naturally. Yet it is a pity that many mothers do still fail to feed their babies as Nature intended. The full period of nine months is necessary to ensure that some explanation of this. What is it?

It is the answer of the Director of Maternal and Baby Welfare, who states that "Failure to breast-feed the baby is nearly always due to lack of preparation. Difficulties can generally be prevented by carrying out the following simple directions:—

"1. The nipples are sore, and sore, or are not properly developed, the mother cannot expect to be able to breast-feed successfully. These faults need not occur. During the last three months of pregnancy the nipples should be subjected daily to a hardening process, and if the milk is pulled out daily between the oiled right forefinger and thumb.

"The hardening is carried out by scrubbing with warm water once a day—using a new soft toothbrush and super-fatted soap. As the first tenderness is overcome, a harder toothbrush and subsequently a stiffer brush should be used. In this way all possibility of cracked or painful nipples will be avoided.

"If mothers could only realize that artificially-fed babies are severely handicapped and that no infant can be deprived of his natural food without detriment, they would not neglect these simple preparations. For would they listen to so-called "experts" who advise them not to try and feed their own babies themselves, or who suggest that they must not be able to manage it. Women who can produce a baby can produce the food for it.
