## Northcote Council

**Letters of Complaint.** - Several complaints were received by the Northcote Council at its meeting on May 29. Mr. M. Heiner complained about the soil piled up against his fence, and the blockage of the storm water drain at Separation street. The condition of Abbott street was the subject of a complaint by Mr. K. Bain; Mr. L. S. Taylor drew attention to the bad state of Bracken avenue, near Keon street. The last writer was Mr. W. Urquhart, who complained of the state of Pearl street and its environs. These matters were referred to various committees.

**Dance Hall Not Wanted.** - Mrs. E. Morris and about 20 other signatories protested by letter against the re-opening of a hall for dancing at the rear of premises in Woolton avenue. The premises, it was stated, are to be used for club purposes, and those who signed the petition said they anticipated undue noise from dances being held there, thus causing annoyance and depreciating the value of adjoining properties. The matter was referred to the Finance committee.

**ORDINARY BUSINESS**  
**Relief for Anderson Road.** - It was stated that portion of the footpath (or at least that part of Anderson road that serves as a footpath) is in a shocking condition due to wet weather. It is flooded, causing those who use the thoroughfare undue hardship. Many ratepayers use Anderson road, and it was asked that some ashes be placed there. Agreed to.  
**A Ratepayer Commended.** - Several councillors commended

the civic mindedness of Mr. Hutchinson who placed a portion of his property at the disposal of the council when it was pointed out that the corner of Beaconsfield parade and Leinster grove was dangerous. The council intends to round off the corner on which Mr. Hutchinson's property is situated. When he was informed that a portion of his front garden was desired for the purpose, he immediately agreed to the request. A letter of congratulation will be sent to him.

**Garbage Dumped on Vacant Land.** - It was agreed that the matter of cleaning up two vacant blocks in Coimas grove be referred to the Public Works Committee; also the matter of erecting a notice prohibiting the dumping of rubbish on these allotments. Two blocks had recently been acquired by the council, and Cr. Bird said it was up to the council to keep them tidy.  
**Cr. Jones Ill.** - Cr. Olver apologised for the absence of Cr. Jones, and explained that it was due to illness. All councillors expressed their sympathy with Cr. Jones, who has been confined to bed since Wednesday last, and wished him a speedy recovery.

**More Protection for Parks.** - Allegations that hoodlums were taking control of Northcote parks and playgrounds was made by a councillor, and it was asked that more effective patrolling be provided. An allegation was made that certain things would be revealed to the Parks Committee which could not be said in public. The matter was referred to the committee.

**BELL PARK.**  
The Preston East War Progress Association has made a request that footpaths in Bell Park be given attention.

**MORE PLAYGROUNDS WANTED IN NORTH**  
Playgrounds of a type similar to the Florence Adams playground (in the East ward), are being sought by the North Ward Progress Association in the northern portion of the city. It has been pointed out that there is need for such facilities for the children to use, and it has been requested that provision be made of swings, see-saws and other playground equipment for children. The letter was "received."

**SWING BRIDGE OVER CREEK.**

Inquiries have shown that the swing bridge over the creek connecting Kendall street, West Preston with Harding street, Coburg, was constructed after the subdivision of an estate in that locality by those interested in the subdivision. At that time the Coburg council agreed to maintain the bridge.

Recently a request was made by Preston residents to their local council to repair the bridge, and the council got in touch with the Coburg council to see if it would contribute towards the cost of the repairs. The Coburg council has replied with an inquiry as to whether Preston council, in view of the development in recent years of this section of Preston, is prepared to share the maintenance costs.

**PRESTON ROWING CLUB**

A request has been made by the Preston Rowing Club that the council receive a deputation to discuss the matter of amount outstanding in connection with expenditure incurred on the erection of the club's boat-house on Edwardes Lake.

It may not generally be known that the land which now comprises Edwardes Park was made over to the council under a deed of gift, and at the time certain conditions were laid down. One of these conditions was that the council might not grant the use of the park for the purpose of raising funds except for park improvement. This clause was quoted recently when the North Ward Progress Association desired the use of the park for the purpose of holding a carnival to raise funds towards the erection in the North ward of a progress association hall.

The Preston Rowing club has raised moneys from time to time by means of carnivals for the extinction of the debt on the club-house at the park, towards the erection of which building they obtained an advance from the Preston council some years back. This advance has been reduced year by year.

Several weeks ago a proposal was made that in view of the good work done by the Rowing Club, the council should consider wiping out the balance of the debt. The Rowing Club has intimated that the deputation will consist of Mr. H. P. Zwar M.L.A. (president) and three other speakers.

**MURRAY ROAD.**

Of late there have been complaints from bus-drivers and others who use the section of Murray road west of Gilbert road, about the rough state of this thoroughfare. The council has now agreed to spend £15 on repairs.

**Electric Supply Interrupted.**

## MATRIMONIAL TROUBLES

### "TOO MUCH MONEY," SAYS P.M.

### "Too Much Ill Treatment," Says Wife

**Husband Still To Have His Say**  
The matrimonial differences of the John family have been going on for a long time, according to Joyce John's evidence at the Northcote Court on Friday, May 26, but they reached a climax on Friday, April 14, when the husband left the home at 10 a.m. and did not return until the following Monday.

Mrs. John, who resides in Cornwall street, Westgarth, asked Mr. Addison, P.M., to make an order for maintenance against her husband, Albert Edward John, Barry street, Northcote, printer. Her version of their two years of matrimony was heard and then the P.M. adjourned the matter for eight weeks to see whether Mrs. John would change her mind and resume matrimonial relations with her husband. In the meantime the husband agreed to pay 25/- per week to the wife and finance her holiday.

Mrs. John said that four months what she had to say to an adjournment. She was struck by her husband. Thereafter there were several occasions on which she was knocked about. She had six or seven black eyes and bore a scar on her nose where she was struck by her husband. After the first assault she went to work and had been working ever since. Her earnings were £2/10/- per week, while her husband's pay envelope varied between £5 and £8. About 15 months ago they separated for three months due to his cruelty. During that time her husband spent some £40 odd out of their savings. They had been boarding most of their married life, as they never had the ready money to furnish a home.

Mrs. John further said that her husband could never keep out of trouble. He often bore marks of fighting on his face. After he returned on the Monday after being absent for a long week-end defendant asked her for £2. She refused to give it to him. They had a joint banking account of £91 and all her husband wanted, she alleged, was his share of it. He told her he did not want her, but only the money.

Witness gave further details of the husband's behaviour to her, which were frequently interrupted by exclamations from the defendant. The P.M., after hearing the wife's evidence, said that, if it were true, he would not expect her to go back to her husband. He said that defendant's behaviour in court had conveyed an unfavorable impression. "Defendant has shown his hasty nature by his behaviour. If he can't control himself here, I imagine what he must be like where he is not restrained. The circumstances are such as to make a happy marriage. But it is possible that they had too much money for a young couple. Plaintiff has given certain evidence which so far has not been rebutted, and on her evidence I would not order her to go back to him," remarked the P.M., who then asked whether the husband would be prepared to support his wife if he adjourned the case for eight weeks.

### A. COOK, OF PRESTON, WINS SENIOR EVENT

Promoted by the Brunswick Amateur Cycling Club the 50 mile senior and 20-mile junior races drew the outstanding amateur riders in Victoria, the senior event having attracted 201 entries and the junior 125. There were 171 senior starters.

Victoria's strongest contenders for selection in Australia's team for the Olympic Games next year were among the entrants in the senior event.

Both of Saturday's races were staged over out-and-home courses. Conditions favored the riders in the afternoon's racing. The scratch men were riding with great determination to overtake the leaders. After taking command at the half-way mark, A. Cook, of Preston, won the open 50 mile amateur senior road cycling handicap at Campbellfield last Saturday. He had a length to spare from his co-marker (M. J. Hartney, Essendon), and S. Rhook, (Brunswick) was third. The winner's time was 2 hours 22 min. 33 sec.

The fastest time went to Bill Dogget (state scratch man) from Footscray, who rode the distance in 2 hours, 7 min. 36 sec.

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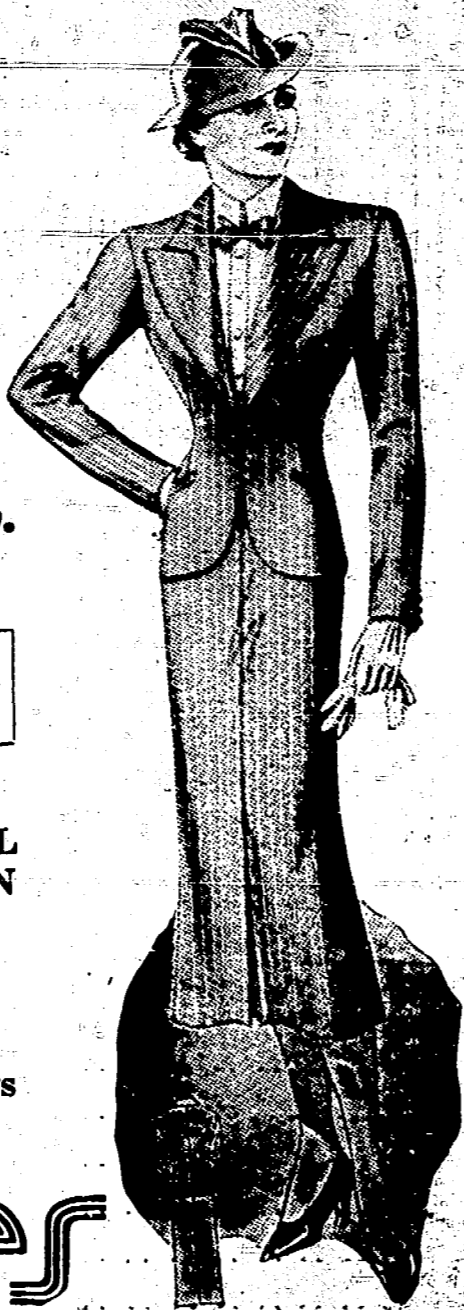

(To the Editor.)  
Sir—When I refer for space to comment on the information contained in last week's letter, I had two reasons for doing so. To make it quite clear to readers interested enough to read my correspondence. That the admission from authoritative quarters on the powers of the Commonwealth Bank, although known to persons of an inquiring mind, have not had any degree of publicity. The importance of the Commonwealth Bank is just dawning on the people of Australia, and with wider publicity a demand is being made that the bank should function as a national bank, and not as the playing field of private financiers. It will be noticed that the experts although dependent on the present financial system for their jobs do not in any way dispute the power of a bank, but suggest that for the benefit of the policy as laid down by private institutions (banks) we refrain from demanding our just rights. Would we be content to allow any of the cheap chain stores to dictate the financial policy of the government? Yet privately owned banks are in this same category, and we have been content up to the present to allow it. All that was required in the past to frighten the lives out of us was a great headline in the daily press, the mouthpiece of the controllers of finance "Hands off the Banks." But I think the control of the country's credit will be restored to its rightful owners if we act now and demand that the Bill before the House to sell the Commonwealth Bank to private interests be given outwards a 2-2 controlling interest be at once dropped. This Bill is designed to prevent any government which swayed the banking for its own private purposes from doing so. And I cannot stress enough the immediate importance of this Bill. It is a Federal representative, Mr. Brennan, to re-gain his vote against this bill irrespective of party interests. Forms can be had from Mr. J. Allen, 6 Harold street, Thornbury, or myself. **CARE OF DOGS**  
(By R. I. Hamilton Ph.C., F.P.S., Preston)  
Irritated. If it is irritated, it is a six-to-look-for ringworm, or seborrhea, or mange. If there is no irritation of the skin, it indicates a deficiency in the blood or nerve supply, or the after-effect of distemper.  
Treatment: Give Krect con- dition powders evening and morning. Apply a special alopecia ointment. The bowels must be kept moving with liquid paraffin if necessary.

**CARE OF DOGS**  
This is a disease of the respiratory tract which is attended by acute, difficult and labored breathing, with a cough and sense of depression. In the early stages, the inspiration or expiration is accompanied by a wheezing sound and the dog becomes restless after even light exercise. Changing from a warm to a cold room also has the same effect. The disease is often attended by distemper and most of its old dogs. Incorrect diet also has a large part in causing asthma as overfeeding with substantial food, and gastric disorders are forerunners of asthma.  
Treatment—Keep the dog warm and the kennel in a warm and dry place; plenty of fresh air and avoid overfeeding. Give raw or tenderly cooked meat in small quantities as the only food. Feed three times per day and keep the levels well oiled especially in fat dogs with liquid paraffin. In very severe cases, a small amount of asthma mixture must be administered, and Krect condition powder must be given every day.

BALDNESS OR ALOPECIA  
Alopecia may be described as a falling out of hair, either from one small patch or from all over the body. The cause should be investigated carefully as it may originate from ringworm or scabies. Burns or scalds are also characterized by bald patches on the skin. Baldness can also be caused by interference of the blood or nerve supply generally. The after effects of distemper may be responsible, or again it may be a symptom of deficient nutritive functions and debility. The hair will fall out from a patch and the underlying skin may be every day.

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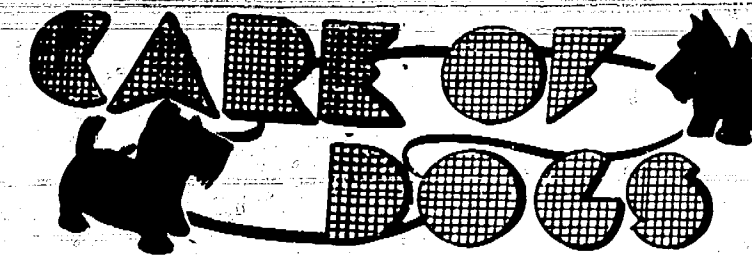

TOURISTS-PENALISED AND COUNTRY BUSINESSES SUFFER

While the Premier continues to...  
 1.—It has put a premium on dishonesty and a penalty on honest industry. It has induced a mass of motorists to make false declarations; (b) it is being openly flouted by the hundreds of resellers in country districts.  
 2.—It is penalising resellers in the outer suburbs, the country, and the border towns along the Murray to the advantage of the metropolitan, provincial, city and N.S.W. border town resellers.  
 3.—Amplifying his points, Mr. McGregor has written to the "Radiator" the official journal of the R.A.C.V.:—"I trust that the motorists who are being put to much discomfort and inconvenience by the petrol restrictions on the sale of petrol are as appreciative as I am of the efforts you are making to secure for them the return of the continuous service to which they were previously accustomed, and to which they are reasonably entitled."  
 4.—In spite of the Premier's recent statements that the Act was a work of art, and that it was a result of the recent Easter holidays, it is being openly flouted, and the Government is being forced to make alterations and amendments to it. Mr. C. McGregor, proprietor of a service station at Rochester, summarises the effects of the Act as follows:  
 1.—It has greatly restricted the cruising radius of many motorists, and has caused a great deal of inconvenience and expense to them.  
 2.—It penalises many motorists with genuine emergencies, who cannot find garage men from whom to obtain assistance in prohibited hours.  
 3.—It adds to the number of laws that are being enforced, and cannot be enforced.  
 4.—"Similar 'Rafferty's Rules' applied" sales during prohibited hours of the remaining days of the holidays. Many motorists in genuine cases of emergency could not find anyone to attend to their cars, without paying the emergency book, got everything they wanted at some places.

**THE GENERATION OF ELECTRICITY**

**NEW BRITISH DISCOVERY**  
 A new discovery in methods of generating electricity has been placed before the Physical Society in London, with the object of fostering further research.  
 The discovery was made by Sir Ambrose Fleming, the eminent scientist, who was the inventor of the thermionic valve used in wireless telephony.  
 The new method of electricity consists of allowing powdered silica to fall through a tube on a perforated zinc plate, this action creating positive electricity. This current is then transferred to a condenser consisting of two metal plates, with a thin layer of ebonite between them. Sir Ambrose Fleming told the society that if these plates are separated their capacity is reduced, and the potential correspondingly raised. They could thus obtain electricity at very high potentials, or many thousands of volts. To prevent it to be used again and again, he had devised an instrument similar to the hour glass. Having allowed the instrument to fall in one direction, the process repeated. By duplicating the hour-glass instruments and creating four spokes of a wheel, it was possible to rotate them, and thus obtain a continuous supply of electricity at high potentials.

Dear Sir,—The Made-in-Australia Council deserve the fullest possible support in their campaign to bring to public favor goods made in Australia. The majority of people do not realize the part played by our manufacturing industries in the affairs of the Commonwealth. A vote of thanks was tendered to the chairman, and also to the organising committee for the hard work they had put in to make the night such a success.

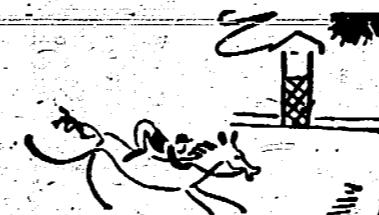

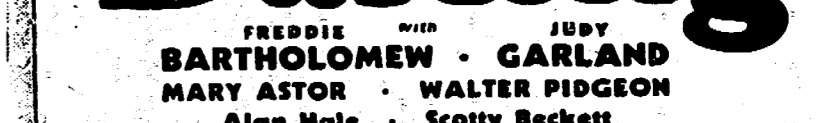

WIFE LOSES MAINTENANCE CASE SAYS HUSBAND TOLD HER HE WANTED TO MARRY ANOTHER

This allegation was made in the Northcote Court on Friday last, June 23, when Mrs. Alma Maisie Carlson, of High Street, Northcote, sued her husband, Thomas Alfred Carlson, of Plenty Road, Mont Park, for maintenance.

The case was a rehearing of a prior action in which, in the absence of the husband, Mrs. Carlson was given an order for 25/- weekly against him.

On Friday last the order, which was made in March, was set aside and fresh evidence was tendered by the wife. A legal submission of the defence was accepted by the bench, which dismissed the complaint.

Mrs. Carlson said that after being married in 1934 at Holy Trinity Church, Thornbury, she and her husband went to live with her father. Both parties at the time were 21 years of age. On August 21 of the following year they had their first child, a son, and left her parents' home and opened a shop in Swan street, Richmond. Mrs. Carlson said that she had followed her occupation as a casual dress maker. The shop was moved to another shop in Madder Grove, Burnley. The first child, a son, was born on August 21, 1935. Mrs. Carlson said that she was informed by her husband that he was going to return to him. She has this remedy no matter how distasteful it is to her, said the P.M. when he dismissed the complaint.

DIVORCE DECREE GRANTED

In the Banco Court on Tuesday, June 20, Mr. Justice Martin granted a divorce suit in which became ill and was ordered by a doctor to abandon the shop. She was moved to her husband's sister's place where her husband previously had moved. Witness of the matrimonial suit was excluded for another month and was just moving about and recuperating. Continuing her evidence, the wife said that one day while she was in a truck in the sun, she found some affectionate letters from her husband with receiving them and she alleged that he had admitted that he had been guilty of adultery. In view of the tone of the letters, and of what she thought had transpired between her husband and the writer, she decided to leave him. Nothing more she would get nothing from him if she left the house. She took a house in Northcote and her two sisters came to board with her. Defendant continued to pay her 25/- a week for 15 months. When he was again taken ill and had a hæmorrhage. Her husband came to see her every night while she was in the hospital and continued to pay her when she returned home. When he suggested they should come together again, she agreed on condition that he bought a new bedroom suite. Defendant refused to do this, and started saving up for his purchase. About six weeks later, when he had saved 50, he told her he had lost the money at the races. On hearing this, she refused to go back to him. Continuing the wife said that her husband still continued to leave her money at his sister's place, but about Christmas of 1938 he said he was going away and would not give her any more money. For a month she received nothing. Then he came back to Victoria and left £1 for her. That was the last money she had received from him. In March she issued a summons against her husband and the case was heard at Northcote. An order was made in favor of her child and herself totalling 25/- a week. Defendant did not appear at that hearing. Since the issue of the order, she had not seen her husband, and he had told her there was another woman he wanted to marry, and he wanted her (Mrs. Carlson) to give him a divorce.

DEATH OF DR. (Colonel) A. H. STURDIE. Many Northcote and Preston residents will regret to learn of the death of Dr. A. H. Sturdie, who for many years has practised in High Street, Northcote. Colonel Alfred Hobart Sturdie was formerly principal medical officer of the Repatriation Department in Victoria, and on Monday, June 19, after a long illness at his home in Gladstone street, Sandringham. Colonel Sturdie, who was aged 76 years, was a brother of Admiral Sir Doveton Sturdie, the first baronet of the Falkland Islands in 1915. "CHEAP TOBACCO" ELEVEN COUNCIL PROSECUTIONS

Concern has been expressed by many members of the Tobacco Reform Movement, who allege that manufacturers and merchants are either unwilling or unable to stop supplies from reaching the price-cutting group. Members of the movement were debarred from competing by an edict of the Retail Tobacco Sellers' Association of Victoria, which they sold at competitive prices and who thus cut traffic buttons. This type of offence the following were fined: Jack Banks, Banger street, Prahran, 30/-; John J. Brain, Victoria Gr., East Brunswick, 21/-; Daley Queen's parade, Clifton Hill, 21/-; Eimer Jones, Jenkins street, Northcote, 21/-; Leo Styles, Canning street, Carlisle, 21/-; Leslie Williams, Ormond road, Moonee Ponds, 30/-; Paul Wilshire, Rae street, North Fitzroy, 30/-.

A letter sent to the Prime Minister (Mr. Menzies) asking for his advice as to a remedy for the disastrous condition of the retail tobacco trade in Melbourne and its suburbs, was read by Mr. Phillipps at a meeting of the Tobacco Reform Movement on Tuesday night of last week. Signatories of the letter were: Mr. J. Knight, Keele (won at 3/2); Mr. J. Double Bard (won), Turf Boy Strategy (won), Firewood (3rd at 6/1), Trill Prince (3rd at 8/1), Parador.

At the meeting it was decided that, subject to the advice of their solicitor, application be made to the Supreme Court to require the Retail Tobacco Association to show cause why applications for membership should be refused.

Mr. W. E. Bott, High Street, Regent, was appointed to the executive of the Reform Movement to represent the Preston group, and Mr. J. Baggett, South Northcote, undertook to organise the Northcote group.

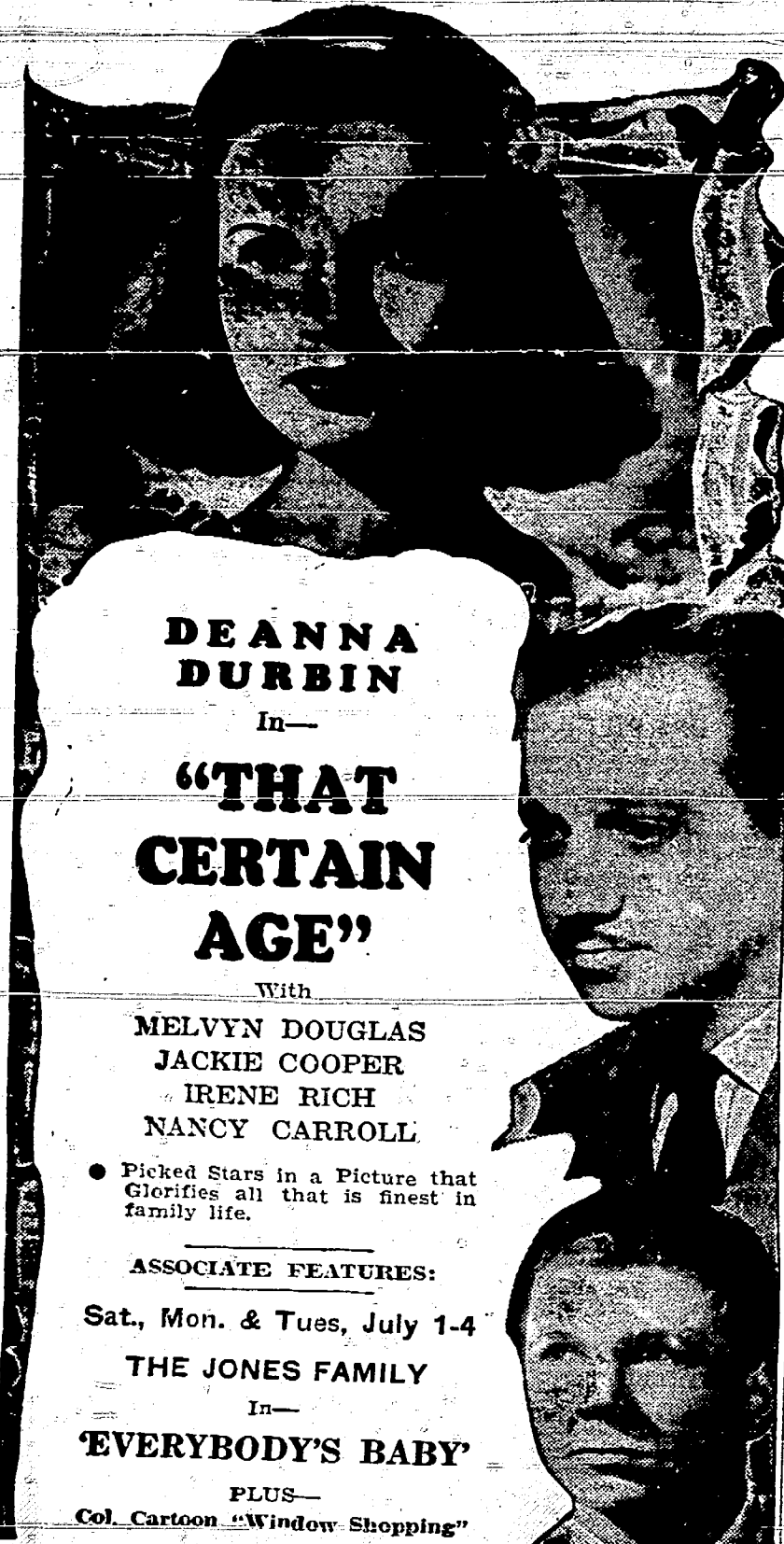

**BREAKING AND ENTERING DRILL**  
**HALL**

**Also Pleads Guilty To Illegal Use of Cars**  
 When, on June 18, the motor cycle patrol saw a car being driven near Campbell Junction the police recognised it as one which had been stolen earlier in the day. They followed the car up to the Gardiner railway gates where they questioned the driver, James Nicholson, of Oxford Street, Northcote. In the car was another youth and two girls. On June 23 at Northcote Court, Nicholson, who is an 18-year-old electrician, pleaded guilty to five counts of illegally using a motor car, and to breaking and entering the Dennis Drill Hall in Simpson Street, Northcote, and stealing one Lewis machine gun, one service rifle, 500 cartridges and other property of the Defence Department valued at £87.

Defendant was committed for trial on the latter charge, while the hearing of the others was postponed until July 14.

Five different people gave evidence as to how their cars were taken from different places in the city and South Melbourne, and how they were subsequently found in Northcote. The cars were taken on May 27, June 1, June 4 and June 6. The cars were owned by Harold Willmott, draughtsman, of Surrey Hills, and had been driven approximately 100 miles between the Melbourne and South Melbourne and the time it was recovered in Northcote. The car was found abandoned in Gray Street, Constable Findley found the magazine of a Lewis gun.

When Constable Peake stopped defendant at the Campbell Junction railway gates, Nicholson said "You can let the young ladies go; they know nothing about it." Defendant was taken to the Melbourne police station, where Detective Marchant questioned him. Defendant subsequently made statements admitting all the offences with which he was later charged.

In the statement defendant admitted that on June 13 he broke into the Drill Hall with the intention of getting some Lewis machine gun and the service rifle, he took them and planted them under the church next to the Drill Hall. He left them there for a couple of days, and later transferred them to his home in Oxford Street where the police discovered them.

The cases of illegally using motor cars, to which Nicholson pleaded guilty, were adjourned until after the hearing in a higher court, of the charge of breaking and entering, together with other charges on which Nicholson had been committed for trial from the Richmond Court earlier in the month.

Mr. Albert George Walshe, of 67 Clarke Street, Northcote, died at his residence on June 23 at the age of 57 years. He leaves a widow (Mrs. Catherine Walshe), four sons and one daughter.

## In Your GARDEN

(By The Clyde Nurseries)

### SEASONABLE OPERATIONS

Advantage should be taken of the fine weather to finish as soon as possible the digging and trimming up of beds and borders, as it is desirable to get this work done early in the season. In digging borders, care should be taken not to cut the roots of a delicate nature or often seriously injured in this way. Now is the ideal time to renovate and replant worn out shrubberies, or beds. This work should be commenced by taking out all useless plants. Lift the remaining shrubs and plants where this may be done without injury, and protect the roots by putting straw or a layer of soil over them.

Then trench the soil thoroughly and work in some well decayed stable manure, or, if this is not available, some good artificial fertilizer, such as bone and super. Before replanting, examine the root system of the plants to be retained, and any that are broken or damaged due to the lifting, should be cut off evenly with a sharp knife to promote the growth of fibrous roots.

Shrubs that have failed to give satisfaction will often respond to a remarkable degree if they are lifted, the old soil carefully removed from their roots, and then replanted in new soil, if it is desired to replace shrubs that have become woody and unsightly. This large variety available makes it possible to select types suitable for any conditions or location.

The planting of roses, deciduous trees and shrubs may be continued. Never plant when the ground is thoroughly saturated. It is always advisable to water until it is in a more favorable condition.

Trim and cut back such climbers as wisterias, teocomas, jasmines and clematis which have grown vigorously and are likely to become unsightly unless kept within bounds.

It is remarkable the number of keen gardeners who fail to realise the outstanding usefulness of the "PYGMALION"

of climbers—or creepers—as they are more commonly called. In any back garden, makes the work a few fences, walls, or outhouses which cause displeasure by their unsightly appearance. As well as eventually covering a fence or building on which they are trained, the large variety of climbers available makes it possible to combine usefulness with beauty. The appearance of the various teocomas in bloom, the wisterias, and the beauty of the blooms of the clematis, are some of the prettiest sights to be seen in any garden. Many other fine specimens include the climbing fig, bougainvillea with its brilliant show of blooms, and of course, the many climbing roses, among which the Blackberry is a general favorite.

Many different kinds of bulbs are now showing well above the ground. The soil should be gone over regularly with the hoe. While proceeding with this work, take up and divide any herbaceous plants which may have grown too large, such as perennials, phlox, hebe, carnations, petunias, sweet william, and geraniums. Any dahlias tubers remaining in the ground should now be lifted, dried off, and stored. Seedlings of pansy, violet, carnation, antirrhinum, primula, and stock can be planted for a quick flowering display, but a careful watch for slugs and snails should be made, as these are usually prevalent at the present time.

### THE VEGETABLE GARDEN

During this month, although there is not much sowing to be done owing to the coldness of the soil, plantings can be made of herbs, rhubarb, garlic and artichokes, as well as strawberry plants for edging the various vegetable plots. Watercress is propagated from cuttings taken from the old roots, and each year should be lifted and replanted in well-trenched ground. The sowing of a few rows of parsnips, early celeriac, leeks and cauliflowers (Late Maturity) can be made. All vacant land not previously dug over should be attended to at once.

"Secondhand Bread"

A DANGER TO THE PUBLIC According to officials of the Bread Carters' Union "secondhand bread" is being sold to the public at first-hand prices. Un-sold stale bread, it is stated, is being returned to the bakers from shops and stores retailing bread in exchange for fresh loaves. The problem is then for the bakers to dispose of this. It is contended that the bread so handled runs a real risk of being contaminated by so much handling. The secretary of the Bread Carters' Union (Mr. H. Maynard) said that clause 10 of the Health Act provided that no bread was to be exchanged or received back from the purchaser unless it was unwholesome. Bread, being porous, was naturally a germ receiver, he added, and by exchanging stale bread it was possible to transmit disease. Private consumers should be on the look-out and see they are not made the victims of unscrupulous bakers. Should there be the slightest suspicion of victimisation in this manner, a ring to the Health Department will ensure the prompt attention of an inspector.

IN THE HOME

Sprains And Strains

The most common forms of backache are injuries to the back and sprains of muscles and joints. These sprains can be acute or chronic. Acute sprains occur when the back is being used to lift or move a heavy object, and are more likely to happen when sudden additional strain is incurred, as by a foothold slipping. Generally severe pain is felt in the back, due to muscle fibres stretching or tearing. After a few days' rest, movements of the back should be begun if a quick and full recovery is to be expected. Chronic sprains generally occur in joints and are the result of long over-use of the back. Shoppers, washer-women, and weavers are very liable to acquire chronic sprains. They do not yield well to treatment, and full recovery is often delayed for a long time. In some cases of acute sprain there is delay in recovery, a quite trivial disability persisting for much longer than is physically explainable. In these cases psychological harm has occurred. The back, like the heart, the thigh, and the stomach, is a proverbial part of the body; and, in the fog of superstition that wraps it, the road to recovery is hard to find.

Boiling Baby's Milk

When a baby has to be artificially fed, and is given cow's milk mixture, the mother may question in her own mind the advisability of boiling the milk for baby's bottle. She may have been misled into thinking that boiled milk was more indigestible. Actually the boiling of cow's milk is desirable and necessary for, apart from destroying disease germs, it renders the curd of the milk into softer particles. In fact, for delicate babies, it is to be simmered from three to fifteen minutes, to ensure easier digestion. The only disadvantage is that the fresh element of this natural food is lost by the application of great heat, but it can always be made good by giving baby orange or other fruit or vegetable juice and water. It should be given midway between feeding times and baby can start having this fresh element at the age of one month. Even a naturally fed baby will gain by this addition to his diet; the new flavor and other methods of drinking, whether by bottle, spoon or glass, will be a further step towards weaning days, with their complete change of methods.

NEW CAR NUMBER PLATES

The first of the new Victorian car number plates, the identification of which is simplified by the combination of letters and numerals, are now being issued from country police stations. They will not appear in Melbourne for a week or so, as stocks of the old plates have not yet been exhausted in the metropolitan area. About 4,000 of the new plates have been distributed to country stations, which are issuing them for new cars, or for cars the registration of which has been renewed after having lapsed. They are not being issued, however, on the normal renewal of registrations. The new numbering system begins at AA-000, continues to AA-999, begins again at AB-000 and continues to AB-999, and so on.

UNIMPROVED RATING SYSTEM

WILL COUNCILLORS OPPOSE IT? At the meeting of the Preston council on Monday evening, Cr. Barling, in discussing the referendum to be held within the City of Preston next August, said he considered the public had only heard one side of the question (unimproved capital values) and that 90 per cent of the ratepayers were being asked to vote on an issue of which they knew nothing. He moved that the council take steps to set out the arguments for and against both systems of rating.

Several councillors spoke against the U.C.V. system as advocated by the West Preston Progress Association which had demanded a referendum and paid the necessary deposit to the council as required by the Local Government Act. Cr. Barling's motion was carried.
