HOLIDAY FATALITIES District Residents Killed

MANY OTHERS BADLY INJURED

Numerous accidents are reported as having occurred during the Christmas and New Year Holidays.

Husband And Wife Killed

AS the result of a collision between two motor cars on the Home Highway at Broadford on December 29, Lyell Pocock, 24, a munition worker, and his wife, Beatrice Pocock, 21, both of High St. St. Croxton, were killed, while those injured were Gloria Pocock, 11 months old baby daughter of above, received head injuries; Mrs. Catherine Brown, High St. Preston, mother of Mrs. Pocock, fractured skull and internal injuries; and Desmond Pocock, of Emmaline St. Croxton, brother of Lyell Pocock, fractured skull and internal injuries.

In the car also was Arthur Rudd, of Stewart St. Brunswick, who sustained minor injuries. Rudd was driving the car to Seymour from Broadford at about 2 p.m. when his car collided near the paper mills with another car driven by Jack Riley, of Broadford, who was turning in the road. The left rear wheel of Pocock's car struck the side of the tourer and the sedan then overturned several times.

Lyell Pocock was killed instantly, and nearby residents found Mrs. Brown still in the car and extricated her from the wreckage. Mrs. Pocock had been thrown about 20 feet and the baby was picked up among the trees at the side of the road, about the same distance from the car. The injured were taken to the Broadford Bush Nursing Hospital where

injuries; Kenneth Triffett, 10, a nephew, abrasions.

The party was returning from a camping holiday at Middle Creek, and the crash came with dramatic suddenness. The injured persons were taken to the Morwell Hospital.

Deceased had been in the employ of the Tramways Board for some years and was well known and highly esteemed.

Killed In Collision

John Barnes, 28, Yambula St. Clifton Hill, was killed, and Betty Oliver, 16, of the same address, was admitted to St. Vincent's Hospital with a fractured skull and severely lacerated throat on January 2, when a motor cycle on which they were riding collided with a motor wagon at the corner of Heidelberg Rd. and Dwyer St. Clifton Hill.

Barnes was also admitted to the hospital at the same time with a fractured base of the skull and died an hour or two later.

Schoolboy Killed

PASSENGERS travelling towards Melbourne in the tram on December 30 along St. George's Rd. witnessed a most distressing sight when a boy named Neal, whose parents reside at Woolhouse St. Northcote, was killed just after mid-day. The boy was lying between the tram rails whilst attendants were attempting to stop a copious flow of blood from a wound on the head which had caused a large pool on the ground. A member of the police motor patrol happened to be passing in a tram and he gave what assistance he could to the unfortunate boy, who was found to be dead on arrival at the hospital.

Deceased had been riding a bicycle and from the particulars available it appears that when entering St. George's Rd. from Beaver's Rd. he became sandwiched between a motor-truck and a tram.

Accidents

A motor cycle accident at Toora on December 23 caused injuries to Charles Jones, Harold St. Thornbury, and Douglas Sennitt, Thornbury. Owing to one of their cycles becoming disabled, the three men were riding the one cycle, driven by Jones, to their camp at Welshpool. When taking a bend in the road two miles from Toora the machine skidded and the riders were thrown heavily. Jones was taken to the Toora Hospital suffering from abdominal and other injuries. Newham and Sennitt suffered severe abrasions to the face and body.

Clarence Moore, 13, of Brooke St. Northcote, was thrown from a bicycle when he was struck by a motor car in Bastings St. Northcote, on December 28. He was admitted to the Children's Hospital with a fractured collarbone and serious head injuries.

When a motor car on which he was riding pillion crashed into a brick wall in Hiddle St. Abbotsford, on December 28, Edward Northey, 18, Mansfield St. Thornbury, fractured his skull. The crash occurred after the machine had been turned suddenly to avoid colliding with a car.

Donald Emnerson, 24, Arthurton Rd. Northcote, received a lacerated head and concussion, and Stewart Donnelly, 23, McFarlane St. West Brunswick, a lacerated scalp, concussion, and a fractured ankle in a collision between a taxi and a motor car in Sydney Rd. Brunswick, on December 30. They were treated at the Royal Melbourne Hospital.

Jean Warwick, 18 years, Adeline St. Preston, sustained deep lacerations to the scalp and was admitted to Prince Henry's Hospital when two cars collided and overturned at the corner of North and Point Nepean Rds. Garden Vale, on the afternoon of January 7.

PERSONAL HEALTH

15 RULES TO PRESERVE IT

- Ventilate every room you occupy. Man is not a house animal. Not all is known about Nature's fresh air, but enough is known of its influences to warrant recommending it highly for as many hours of the day as possible.
- Wear lightweight, loose and porous clothing. Arrange to remove layers of outer garments when the atmosphere becomes too warm. Expose the whole body to an air bath and, if possible, a sun-bath once daily (as when preparing the toilet in the morning).
- Get out of doors. Get out without wraps for a few minutes several times a day. If possible, for the stimulating effect.
- When resting for recreation, be sure you are not dissipating by indulging in bad habits.
- Breathe night air at night time. Open your bedroom windows. Have no fires in bedrooms.
- Breathe deeply—100 times each day—in an outdoor atmosphere.
- Avoid over-eating and over-weight.
- Get back to Nature in the matter of foods which you eat. Remember that Nature's original food products are grains, vegetables, fruits, nuts, meat, milk, eggs and water. Man's elaboration of many of these items results in concentrated food products on the one hand and deficient food products on the other. Some have said that the grocery store is a better place to eat than the dining room.
- Select your diet from all the natural food products mentioned in the preceding paragraph; set a certain part fresh every day (i.e., not canned, boxed or bottled); eat the whole slowly and with cheerfulness, leaving your appetite to be your guide provided you eat slowly. Curtail your appetite on man's alteration of foods. Drop fats and foolish notions; chew well and most dyspepsia will disappear.
- Go to stool regularly and frequently.
- Stand, sit, and walk erect, but relax frequently. While inactive, avoid draughts or cooler air currents against the back, loins and thighs. Keep the feet warm.
- Do not allow the well-known habit poisons, such as alcoholic drinks, concentrated beverages and foods, or delicacies of all types, to enter the body. Give particular attention to affections, colds and sore throats in the first stages in which they appear.
- Keep the teeth and gums healthy. Keep them clean. Eat fruits at the end of meals in order to help accomplish this. Clean the teeth before going to bed. See a dentist at least once a year.
- The secret of great personal power is work, play, rest and sleep in moderation. Never permit a piece of work, or stress or strain of any kind, to run along without frequent interruptions in the nature of relaxations.
- Keep serene no matter what happens.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

When a woollen garment is too small, it is a good idea to turn the garment wrong side out and press with a damp cloth. Iron again, stretch the way required. In this way you can lengthen a sleeve or bodice two or three inches.
To remove perspiration stains, soak the affected portion of garment in a strong solution of ginger salts.
Kippers will give practically no odour when cooking if plunged for a moment into a pan of boiling water before being grilled.
Blackberry stains on the hands or clothes can be quickly removed by rubbing with a cut lemon before any water or soap is used.
Before washing a woollen jumper or cardigan, sew up the pockets with wool, otherwise they will drop and spoil the article's line.

- Decide how much money you wish to spend and endeavour to furnish each room to an even standard.
- New style homes demand very modern treatments, therefore older type homes should be treated in quiet manner.
- Special attention should be paid to the color schemes desired throughout the house and remember—do not accentuate any one shade too much. Opposite shades very often give fine effects: such as green and orange, blue and rust, and if in doubt consult a reliable furniture warehouse.
- In the furnishing of any room, the carpet should be the first item chosen, as the range of carpets is more or less limited to a smaller range of patterns. The suite coverings should be your next choice and the curtains last.
- Carpets of bright colorations demand a plain type of lounge suite and vice versa. A sound idea is to select a darker shade for the floor and slightly lighter shade for the suite.

Recipes for the New Housewife

LEMON MERINGUE PIE This is a delicious pie, and we are also giving the recipe for the short crust. The pie is a short crust, adding about 1 teaspoon of grated nutmeg to the sifted flour. Mix together 1 cup sugar, 1 dessertspoonful of lemon juice, and 1 egg white. Add sufficient water to make it into a smooth paste, about 1/2 of a cupful. Beat the yolks of 4 eggs to a froth and add 1 cup of water. Turn the mixture into a double-boiler and stir until it thickens and add 1/2 cup of water. Add 2 table-spoons of butter, the grated rind of 1 lemon, and the juice of 2 lemons. Cook for 10 minutes and cooked pie-shell. Cover with meringue made by beating the whites of 3 eggs to a stiff froth and adding 1 table-spoon of sugar gradually, and continue beating until the meringue is firm. Bake in a slow oven 20 minutes.

Milk Board Bill

The Bill for the Milk Board Act 1933 (No. 1475) was first introduced into the Legislative Assembly on the 11th August, 1932. It was intended to trace the history of the legislation concerning the milk trade since it is sufficient for the present purpose to say that retail dairymen and others interested in the present Bill were formed on the 14th August 1932, and concerned with what might be called the "milk board" question.

It may be said in Mr. Gillies' favor that there is good reason for thinking that the expedient of a milk board was suggested to him and that he was not satisfied that the Bill, as it stood, would give the dairymen a fair chance to show the reasons for his opinion.

The retail dairymen had an Association, the Melbourne and Metropolitan Dairymen's Association Limited, and a meeting was held on 17th July 1932 to raise a defence fund by means of subscriptions from its members, and a meeting on 24th July 1932, when it was proposed by one Mr. Robert Morris and carried that the Association should attempt to give the Milk Board power to fix retail prices.

The City of Northcote offers educational facilities for the growing children within its environs probably unequalled in any other municipality of Melbourne, and when the many schools of different types—all with one object—are taken into consideration, it will be readily agreed that the statement is not one of idle boast.

But for the moment we are not concerned with other suburbs wherein are well-known public schools and colleges where fees are high and outside the limits of the purse of the ordinary person.

There must be the opportunity for children of the middle classes to pursue their studies under the most congenial and favorable conditions—much more favorable than was the case in years gone by, when many school buildings lacked the necessary sanitation, ventilation and conveniences in operation at present.

The Victorian State School system has much to commend it. There are those who contend that the Commonwealth Government should have taken over the education of the children. Even if that were done, it is extremely questionable whether the results obtained at the State Schools in Victoria, or any other State for that matter, would have been any more successful than they have been in the immediate past.

But what is accomplished by the existence of State schools can be further improved by the wonderful opportunities which are provided at the Technical or High Schools, where the children are finished off preparatory to entering some trade or profession. But is it not tragic that youth, in proportion to the large number who pass through these schools annually, should find the avenues of employment closed to them by reason of the supply of bright young people soliciting employment exceeding the demand. But with an overpeopled world and the introduction of more machinery, which takes the place of labor, such a thing is general.

There are instances at present of some of our most brilliant Australian professors who graduated from Universities after very little expense to their parents, coming from humble homes and surroundings. And the education of the parents of these men was not of a high standard. Such cases might be rare, but it must not be argued that they are isolated. If there had not been a

free educational system in operation with further facilities for absorbing knowledge as they passed along the road of experience, these men might belong to the hire army of laboring classes.

It has to be acknowledged that if every child could absorb and retain in his brain an equal amount with his fellow then there would be different altogether and it would be a different world. The day it is a case of the survival of the fittest, so far as brains and intelligence go.

There was a tendency some years ago to regard the school life of the child or children as one of ordinary routine unless the child might have had a dilutes outstanding above his fellows. But things have changed considerably. Old methods have given place to new and it is now possible for boys and girls to make history for themselves by the aid of scholarship.

If the mentality of the children of today is superior to that of children of years ago it would be obvious that there must be reasons. And chief amongst these reasons might be included that of the methods adopted by the head teacher and his staff. The approach to the child is a totally different angle to what it was. Reasoning and explanation will accomplish more than attempting to ram something into a child's head by aggressiveness.

Teachers have much to contend with and are subject to many annoyances. But the teacher of today, in the majority of instances, is humane and considerate. He recognizes the shortcomings of his pupils and resorts to kindly methods to get the best from them. It might truthfully be said that they are not only teachers but psychologists. So it is that the ordinary child tackles his problems with a greater assurance and confidence.

But the Teachers' Association is as much alive as to what is in the interests of the growing child and his future. He, as the Education Department of the State. And, after all, who

could speak with greater authority than the teachers as a body? Recreation and sport play a big part in the school life of the child, and it has been found that as necessary as the other if the body and physique of the individual is to develop on sound lines. A healthy and well-developed body is mostly in keeping with an active and fertile brain.

Another factor which has had an important bearing in school life has been the introduction of the Mothers' Clubs. There is scarcely a school in any part of the State which has not a Mothers' Club. These clubs have not taken the place of the school committees, but they have cooperated with those bodies to a remarkable degree and assisted in introducing an attitude of kindness and concern amongst the scholars. Too much importance cannot be laid on what these clubs have been able to accomplish in many different ways, and they might be looked upon as an ally of the Department which has done a tremendous amount of good.

Money To Burn
THE annual return issued by the Bank of England shows that the total value of notes in circulation is slightly under £500,000,000. The amount issued is governed by law, the notes being backed by gold, silver and securities of equal value. It seldom varies, although the notes themselves are constantly changed. The bank, in fact, has a weekly hoard of notes withdrawn from circulation.

Banknote paper is very thin and will not stand much handling. Its average life, in circulation, is between sixty and seventy days. Whenever a note returns to the bank it is always called in and replaced by a brand new one. The old note is cancelled, by tearing off the chief cashier's signature, and filed for five years. When that time is up the notes are burned in weekly batches.

The bank's furnaces burn money in another sense, for each bank not content about these shillings to produce. Other countries save money by laundering up their soiled notes and sending them on their travels again. The Bank of England believes in taking no chances.

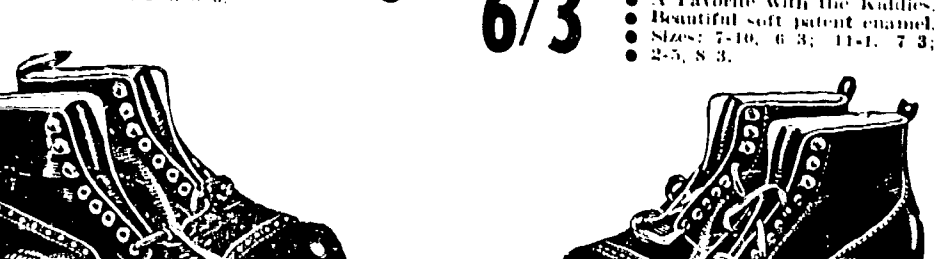

The bank's furnaces burn money in another sense, for each bank not content about these shillings to produce. Other countries save money by laundering up their soiled notes and sending them on their travels again. The Bank of England believes in taking no chances.

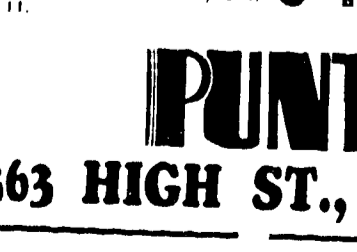

The City of Northcote offers educational facilities for the growing children within its environs probably unequalled in any other municipality of Melbourne, and when the many schools of different types—but all with one object—are taken into consideration, it will be readily agreed that the statement is not one of idle boast.

But for the moment we are not concerned with other suburbs wherein are well-known public schools and colleges where fees are high and outside the limits of the purse of the ordinary person.

There must be the opportunity for children of the middle classes to pursue their studies under the most congenial and favorable conditions—much more favorable than was the case in years gone by, when many school buildings lacked the necessary sanitation, ventilation and conveniences in operation at present.

The Victorian State School system has much to commend it. There are those who contend that the Commonwealth Government should have taken over the education of the children. Even if that were done, it is extremely questionable whether the results obtained at the State Schools in Victoria, or any other State for that matter, would have been any more successful than they have been in the immediate past.

But what is accomplished by the existence of State schools can be further improved by the wonderful opportunities which are provided at the Technical or High Schools, where the children are finished off preparatory to entering some trade or profession. But it is not tragic that youth, in proportion to the large number who pass through these schools annually, should find the avenues of employment closed to them by reason of the supply of bright young people soliciting employment exceeding the demand. But with an overpeopled world and the introduction of more machinery, which takes the place of labor, such a thing is general.

There are instances at present of some of our most brilliant Australian professors who graduated from Universities after very little expense to their parents, coming from humble homes and surroundings. And the education of the parents of these men was not of a high standard. Such cases might be rare, but it must not be argued that they are isolated. If there had not been a

free educational system in operation with further facilities for absorbing knowledge as they passed along the road of experience, these men might belong to the huge army of laboring classes.

It has to be recognized that if every child would absorb and retain in his brain an equal amount with his fellow then there would be different altogether and it would be a different world. To day it is a case of the survival of the fittest, so far as brains and intelligence go.

There was a tendency some years ago to regard the school life of the child or children as one of ordinary routine unless the child might have had abilities outstanding above his fellows. But things have changed considerably. Old methods have given place to new and it is now possible for boys and girls to make history for themselves by the aid of scholastic skills.

In the mentality of the children of today is superior to that of children of years ago it would be obvious that there must be reasons. And chief amongst these reasons might be included that of the methods adopted by the head teacher and his staff. The approach to the child is on a totally different angle to what it was. Reasoning and explanation will accomplish more than attempting to ram something into a child's head by aggressiveness.

Teachers have much to contend with and are subject to many annoyances. But the teacher of today, in the majority of instances, is humane and considerate. He recognizes the shortcomings of his pupils and resorts to "softer" methods to get the best from them. It might truthfully be said that they are not only teachers but psychologists. So it is then that the ordinary child teacher, in his problems with greater assurance and confidence.

Britain Buys Australian Wheat

The terms were completed on January 4, subject to confirmation by the British Government. Each day overseas prices showed a decline, and the Board feared that the British Ministry might ask for a revision of the price.

It is typical of Britain, however, that the arrangement arrived at was confirmed without quibble, but the British Government asked that the price should not be disclosed. The Board was reluctant to see the price for the whole of the 1,500,000 tons of wheat sold, and the price for half of it will not be used until later in the year.

So far the Wheat Board has sold a total of 1,500,000 bushels from the pools.

Money To Burn

THE annual return issued by the Bank of England shows that the total value of notes in circulation is slightly under £500,000,000. The amount issued is governed by law, the notes being backed by gold, silver and securities of equal value.

It seldom varies, although the notes themselves are constantly changed. The bank, in fact, has a weekly bullion of notes withdrawn from circulation.

Banknote paper is very thin and will not stand much handling. Its average life, in circulation, is between sixty and seventy days. Whenever a note returns to the bank it is always called in and replaced by a brand new one. The old note is cancelled, by tearing off the chief cashier's signature, and filed for five years. When that time is up the notes are burned in weekly batches.

The bank's furnaces burn money in another sense, for each banknote costs about three shillings to produce. Other countries save money by laundering up their soiled notes and sending them on their travels again. The Bank of England believes in taking no chances.

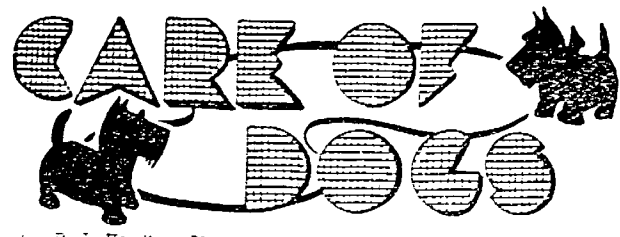

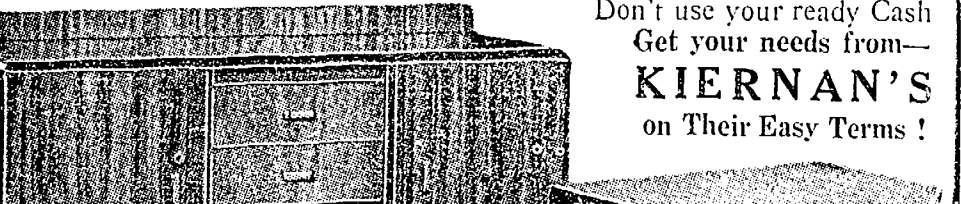

McManus attends regularly every week irrespective of whether the visiting Justice Magistrate is present or not, and is most conscientious, an honorary one, in the appointment of such a condition of affairs it is the intention of the court officials to have a roster of dates prepared for the Justice, which it is hoped will overcome the trouble.

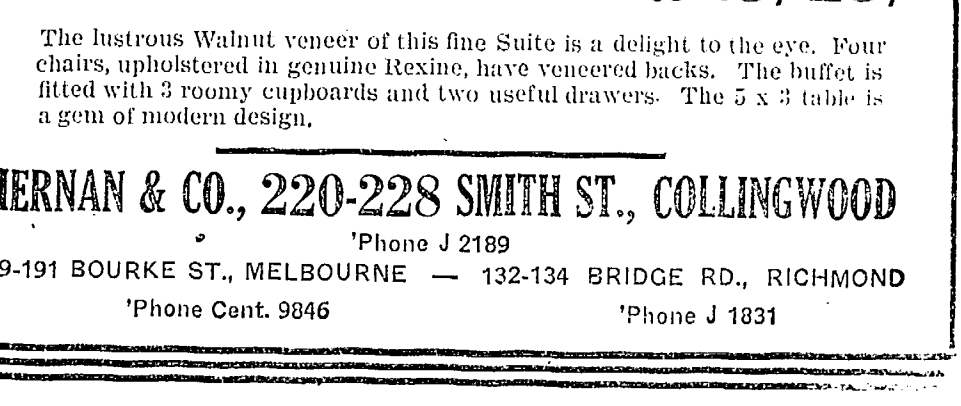
At left: KRIESLER Table Model 5 Valve DUAL WAVE 19 GNS.

Preston's Excellent Educational Facilities . . . Full List Schools . . . Local Retention Results . . . Can Supply All Necessary Equipment

The City of Preston offers educational facilities for the year's work the children within its environs probably unequalled in any other municipality and when the many schools of different types—but all with one object in view—show by the members of the Club, Refreshments provided, the children themselves with a programme, the results were very good.

But for the moment we are not concerned with other suburbs well-known public schools and colleges where fees are high and outside the ordinary person. There must be the opportunity for children of the middle class to study under the most congenial and favorable conditions—much more than was the case in years gone by, when many school buildings necessary sanitation, ventilation and conveniences in operation at present.

The Victorian State School system has much to commend it, those who contend that the Commonwealth Government should have the education of the children. Even if that were done, it is extremely doubtful whether the results obtained at the State Schools in Victoria, or the State for that matter, would have been any more successful than they are in the immediate past.

But what is accomplished by the existence of State schools can be improved by the wonderful opportunities which are provided at the High Schools, where the children are finished off preparatory to entering trade or profession. But is it not tragic that youth, in proportion to number who pass through these schools annually, should find the employment closed to them by reason of the supply of bright young people employment exceeding the demand. But with an overpeopled world and a need of more machinery, which takes the place of labor, such a thing is not impossible.

There are instances at present of some of our most brilliant Australian professors who graduated from Universities after very little expense to their parents, coming from humble homes and surroundings. And the education of the parents of these men was not of a high standard. Such cases might be rare, but it must not be argued that they are isolated. If there had not been a free educational system in operation with further facilities for absorbing knowledge as they passed along the road of experience, these men might belong to the huge army of laboring classes.

It has to be acknowledged that every child would absorb and retain in his brain an equal amount with his fellow then things would be different altogether and it would be a different world. Today it is a case of the survival of the fittest, so far as brains and intelligence go.

There was a tendency some years ago to regard the school life of the child or children as one of ordinary routine unless the child might have had abilities outstanding above his fellows. But things have changed considerably. Old methods have given place to new and it is now possible for boys and girls to make history for themselves by the aid of scholarships.

If the mentality of the children of today is superior to that of children of years ago it would be obvious that there must be reasons. And chief amongst these reasons might be included the methods adopted by the head teacher and his staff. The approach to the child is on a totally different angle to what it was. Reasoning and explanation will accomplish more than attempting to ram something into a child's head by aggressiveness.

Teachers have much to contend with and are subject to many annoyances. But the teacher of today, in the majority of instances, is humane and considerate. He recognizes the shortcomings of his pupils and resorts to kindly methods to get the best from them. It might truthfully be said that they are not only teachers but psychologists. So it is then that the ordinary child catches his problems with greater assurance and confidence.

But the Teachers' Association is as much alive as to what is best in the interests of the growing child and his future in life as the Education Department or the State. And, after all, who could speak with greater authority than the teachers as a body? Recreation and sport play a big part in the school life of the child, and it has been found that one is as necessary as the other if the body and physique of the individual is to develop on sound lines. A healthy and well-developed body is mostly in keeping with an active and fertile brain.

Another factor which has had an important bearing in school life has been the introduction of the Mothers' Clubs. There is scarcely a school in any part of the State which has not a Mothers' Club. These clubs have not taken the place of the school committees, but they have cooperated with them in the management of the school.

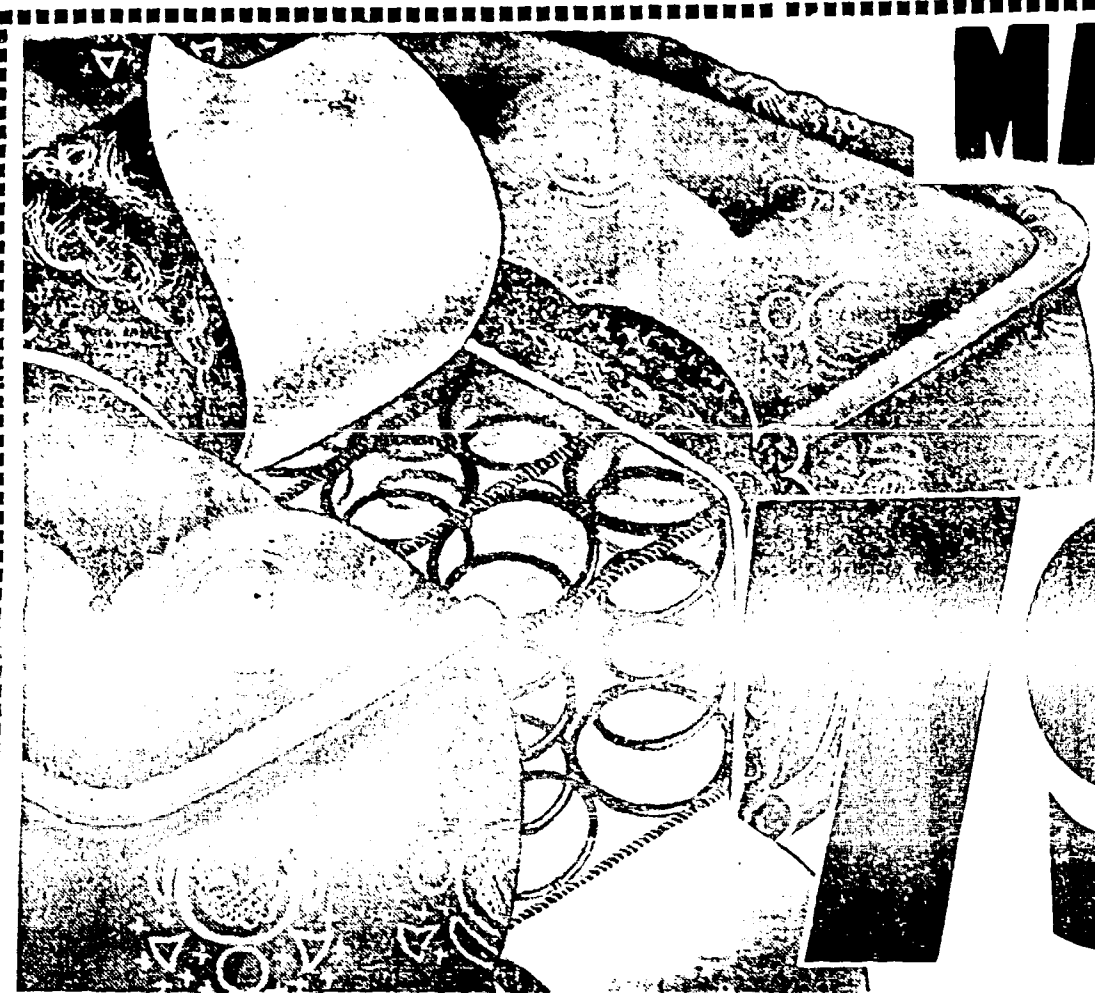

Indefended Maintenance Claim
 Evidence was given by a man who made an application to the Preston Court on January 23 for maintenance for himself and children, that her husband, who was a railway employe, spent a considerable portion of his earnings in drink. Whilst the parties were living under the same roof, the wife said she was compelled to take measures to compel him to provide more equitably for herself and the children. Mrs. Edith May Griffin was the complainant, and the defendant was F. H. Griffin. The wife resides in Oakover Road, Preston.

Soldier's Explanation Accepted
 Robert Stewart, of East Brunswick, who was described as a soldier, but originally a contractor at Olinda, was proceeded against on January 24 at the Preston Court on a charge that he did on October 3, by false pretences, to wit, a valueless cheque, obtain a motor truck with intent to defraud, from James Cameron.

Story Of Valueless Cheque
 Ernest Cameron, Ballantyne St., Thornbury, builder, father of the informant, said that on October 23 he went to his son's house in Gower St. Preston where he saw that his son and Stewart, witness, had a discussion with Stewart, Jack Ernest Cameron, Gower St. East Preston, cartage contractor, acting on behalf of his son. The terms for the sale of the truck were £20 down and £1 per week. Witness had a hire purchase agreement filled in, which Stewart signed and proffered a cheque for the deposit. Witness asked Stewart whether the money was in the bank to meet the cheque, and Stewart said it was and that he had also a house worth £600. Stewart, continued witness, took away the truck and it was taken away as when it was taken away.

Edith May Griffin, said that she had been married for 20 years. There were five children dependent upon defendant's earnings. Her husband was a repairer in the Railways Department, earning about £4/5 a week. Her husband was at home about eight years, but did not provide adequate means for the house, and she had to assist in paying the household expenses. Later they went to Laniva and the conditions were the same; and when they went to Strathmerton three years ago her husband spent freely at the hotels, and she got was not sufficient to meet the household costs. Witness said she left her husband 12 months ago, but he wrote asking her to return, and an agreement was arrived at that he should pay £25 weekly for the house and 10/ weekly for each of the three children.

George Timothy Ryan, clerk in the E.S. and A. Bank, Belgrave, said that Robert Stewart had an account at the bank. On October 23 the balance was £1. The cheque produced was submitted on October 25 and was returned on October 27. There had been nothing paid into the account. Witness had written to Stewart in April, 1939, asking him to close his account and return the cheques unused but that had not been done. Since April 1939 cheques had been received at the bank drawn by Stewart, some of several years past, leading some which had been paid and some dishonored.

It was submitted by defendant's counsel that the case should be dismissed on the grounds that Cameron was not the owner of the car, but that the hire purchase company were the owners. The cheque for the deposit was the value of 5/- or more at their bar of complainant.
 Mr. Meahan, P.M., said that the informant had sworn he had not transferred his interest to the company. The bench thought a prima facie case had been made out against defendant.

Robert Stewart, the defendant, said he was a soldier living at East Brunswick. When he gave the cheque he had not sufficient money to meet it, but anticipated getting the money. A man in Olinda owed him £20 for work and labor done and had promised to pay him. He had the money on October 23. The man had left the hotel of which he had been the licensee and witness had not received his money. Witness had employed to build a bathing pool for £200. After giving the cheques he endeavored to get the £20, but did not get the money.
 To Mr. O'Connor, witness said that before he gave the cheque he had not asked about previous payments. The man who owed him £20, was a Mr. Cronin, an hotel proprietor, who had promised to fix him up in full when he sold out. Cronin had promised him £20 on the previous Saturday night to October 23.

Continuing the cross-examination in reply to Mr. O'Connor, Stewart said that when he gave other cheques he thought he would have the money to meet them. The cheques were not later, however.
 The finding of the bench was that defendant had tendered an explanation which had been accepted, and the case was dismissed.

OBITUARY
The Passing Of Mr. J. W. Bartrop
 THE death occurred on January 23 of Mr. James William Bartrop, of Bell St. Preston, at the age of 58 years. Mr. Bartrop was a very well-known resident of Preston, where he had been in business as a grocer for many years. "Tribal" Class Destroyers
MOST naval critics are agreed that the "Tribal" class of destroyers, three of which are being built in Australia, is one of the best ever built for the British Navy. It is certainly the largest—1870 tons.

These vessels were built by Britain in answer to the huge flotilla leaders, or light cruisers, of other nations. The heavy gun power and light torpedo armament of the "Tribal" type make them exceptionally useful in combating torpedo craft. They mount eight 1.7 guns and eight smaller guns, and have four 21in torpedo tubes. They have a speed of 36 knots or more.

The "Tribal" destroyer can be used for both fleet action and trade defence work. One of the class, H.M.S. Mohawk, was involved in an engagement with German bombers in the North Sea. The heroic commander brought his vessel back to port after having been mortally wounded.
