MEDICINE VERSUS MILK

IN previous issues reference has been made to the value of Milk as a Food, and to the proved capacity of Milk to protect the human body against disease and health, due to under-nourishment. On this occasion it is thought worth while to a few pertinent comments recently made by the Chief of the Public Health in Great Britain, Sir Kingsley Wood, on the subject of "Medicine and Milk."

At a meeting some time ago of the London Insurance Committee, at which Sir Kingsley Wood, in the course of his remarks, expressed the somewhat surprising opinion that England was becoming a nation of confirmed medicine drinkers. In support of this, he quoted the fact that whereas in 1918 the number of prescriptions dispensed to patients was 4,377,000, the figure for last year had risen to 4,822,000.

The fact that the number had nearly doubled itself since 1918 without any corresponding increase in population, was most significant. This eminent authority went on to say that he doubted whether such a general increase in the use of medicine was good for the Nation. He further said that England many patients had come to regard a visit to the doctor as synonymous with the receipt of medicine. The situation was different in Scotland, since the people apparently had no love for bottles of medicine, and Sir Kingsley Wood thought the standard of medical treatment was lower or the results less satisfactory in England.

It is not proposed to attempt a comparison between our Australian people and the Old Country view in this regard. It is not unlikely, however, that we suffer from a similar falling. We cannot blame our medical advisers for this in any sense many of us, I suppose, would not invariably be satisfied at all times with professional advice without medicine being ordered.

It should be made clear in passing on these interesting comments that it is a moment suggested that Milk can be substituted for medicine, especially where conditions indicate the necessity for prescribing appropriate medicinal treatments.

One may, however, be permitted to quote Sir Kingsley Wood's concluding inference that he would prefer to see people drinking MORE MILK and LESS MEDICINE. The inference to be drawn from this is quite clear, viz. that the daily consumption of proper ration of Milk by all people would so improve the national health that it would be much less need to use medicine.

For Breakfast—

GNOCKIE
 Ingredients: 1 pint milk, 1/2 cup butter, 1/2 cup raisins, salt, pepper.
 Method: Put the milk on to boil, stir in the butter and cook slowly for 10 minutes. Add the raisins and butter and salt and pepper to taste. Turn on to plate and when cold cut into shapes. Sprinkle with a little grated cheese, then bake in the oven till brown and serve very hot.

SOMERSET FRUMENTY
 Ingredients: 1 pint wheat, 1 pint milk, 1 pint water, 2 eggs, 1 cup raisins and currants, 1 tablespoon flour for thickening, nutmeg, sugar to taste.
 Method: Stew wheat in stew-pan or casserole in oven three to four hours until quite soft, add more water if required. When cooked, strain away any water left, add milk, raisins and currants, bring to boil and thicken with the flour mixed with beaten eggs (eggs may be omitted if liked). Add sugar to taste and sprinkle nutmeg.

For Luncheon—

EGGS LOS ANGELES
 Method: Hard boil 6 to 8 eggs and wash, scale and cook a bunch of asparagus into 1 inch lengths. (Thin asparagus may be substituted). Shell the eggs and cut in halves lengthwise. Arrange half of them, yolks up in the bottom of a greased casserole. Spread the asparagus over the eggs and then arrange the rest of the eggs on top. Store in the ice chest until 1 hour before required. Then prepare 2 cups of well-seasoned white sauce with 1 pint milk, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 tablespoon flour, and 2 tablespoons finely chopped onion. Pour over the asparagus and eggs. Top with one half cup of buttered crumbs and bake in a hot oven for half an hour.

BLUSHING BUNNIES
 Ingredients: 1 tablespoon flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, little pepper, 1 tablespoon butter, 1/2 cups milk, 2 cups tomato puree, 6 eggs, 12 tablespoons grated cheese, 6 slices cooked ham or bacon, 6 slices buttered toast.
 Method: Melt butter, add flour, pepper and salt. Stir till smooth. Cook for a few minutes. Add cold milk. Stir till boiling and boil for a few minutes. Cover saucepan with lid and stand at side of stove. Heat tomato puree in frying pan. Drop eggs in carefully. Sprinkle with half cheese and cook gently till set. Arrange bacon on buttered toast. Lift one egg on to each slice of toast. Add tomato puree to white sauce. Pour over eggs, and sprinkle with the rest of the grated cheese.

Cold Sweets—

FAIRIES' FARE
 Ingredients: 1 packet lemon jelly crystals, 1 cup water (boiling), 3 cups milk or 2 cups of milk and 1 of cream, 3 eggs, 1 dessertspoon powdered gelatine, 3lb marshmallows cut in quarters, 1 cup sugar.
 Method: Put the milk on to heat and add the water to the eggs and beat. Heat thoroughly but do not let boil or it will curdle, take off fire and let cool. Dissolve the jelly crystals, gelatine and sugar in the hot water and when cool add to the milk mixture. Lastly add the whipped whites of the eggs and the marshmallows. Delicious mixture with cream. Pour into a wetted mould to set.

CREAMY CHOCOLATE RICE PUDDING
 Ingredients: 3 cups milk, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup rice, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 cup vanilla, 1/2 cup cream whipped.
 Method: Add chocolate, rice and salt to 2 1/2 cups milk, and cook in double boiler, 15 minutes, stirring occasionally. Cover and cook 1 1/2 hours longer. Combine gelatine with remaining 1/2 cup of milk and let stand 5 minutes. Add sugar. Add gelatine mixture to hot rice and stir until gelatine is completely dissolved. Chill. When slightly thickened, add nuts and vanilla; fold in whipped cream. Chill until mixture thickens again. Serve in sherbert glasses, with or without additional whipped cream. Serve 6.

NUTRITIVE VALUE OF MILK
 Its Composition

The chemical composition of cows' milk is shown to contain the energy giving nutrients, protein, fat and carbohydrate; all the known essential vitamins; calcium, phosphorus, iron, sulphur, iodine, magnesium, potassium, sodium, chlorine and copper, many of the physiological roles of which are known; and a number of other elements, present only in minute amounts, such as manganese, zinc, and fluorine, the exact functions of which are not fully understood, but which would seem to be necessary for normal nutrition as any of the other constituents. Even if it were possible to state the chemical composition of milk in full a very imperfect idea of its nutritive value would be obtained, because it would not mention many important physico-chemical and biological properties on which its nutritive value largely depends. For example, the physico-chemical states of its constituents, the degree of its acidity, its osmotic pressure, its relationship to the different constituents, one another ensures normality of its nutritive value; the nature of its protein and its mineral elements, notably calcium and phosphorus, and its high content of other inorganic elements, all make for its nutritive value. It is a very high value as a nutritive food.

Nutritive Value

The nutritive value of milk is a valuable human food, particularly when new babies are being born. Within one year of its birth, the child has gained weight and height. The evidence has been brought forward, which has shown that cows' milk is the most valuable food known for the promotion of growth and health in children. Some of these investigations, like those of Mann in Scotland and McCallum and others in the United States, have been carried out under carefully controlled conditions in residential institutions. Others, like those of Orr and Leighton, and Leighton and McKelvey in Great Britain and of other workers in New Zealand, France and Japan, have been carried out on large numbers of school children living at home.

The general conclusion to be drawn from these investigations without exception is that milk is an essential item in the diets of children for optimum growth, physique and the maintenance of health. Many other investigations have been carried out in institutions and elsewhere by M. Mellanby and her colleagues, and in the United States by Dr. H. H. S. Gandy and others, the results of which confirm that milk is an essential part of the diet of normal healthy children.

From the results of these and many other experiments too numerous to mention, it can be predicted that the nutritive value of milk will continue to increase in the consumption of milk at present prevailing in this country. The present consumption of liquid milk is about 10 pints per head per day, on the average. This is a little below the amount which would be obtained if the average consumption of milk to about one pint per day would result in the improvement of the general health of the community, and in the case of children, in whom it would cure better bone formation and increase in stature and physique. It would also decrease the incidence of disease, including rickets, and increase resistance to dental caries.

Amounts Of Milk Required

The desirable amount of milk for children would seem to be from one to two pints per day, and for expectant and nursing mothers according to Mellanby and others it is about two pints per day. In regard to other adults there is a consensus of opinion that enough milk or milk products should be consumed to secure a sufficiency of calcium. Dietary surveys have shown that calcium and animal protein are very frequently deficient in diets in this country, but while deficiencies of protein can be made good by meat, fish, eggs, the best and most convenient way of assuring a sufficiency of calcium is by increasing in the diet an adequate amount of milk. In would of course enrich the diet with all other valuable nutrients, including protein, present in milk. It would seem that a minimum of about one pint of milk daily is obtainable for an adult.



Breakfast Dishes

Oatmeal And Cheese
 Ingredients: 1/2 lb cheese (rub through a 1 cup wheatsalt; 4 cups milk; 1 cup water; salt to taste.

Method: Roll together 1 cup of water, 1 cup of sugar and a thin strip of lemon rind. After 3 or 4 minutes boiling, thicken slightly with 1 teaspoon of cornflour blended with water. Allow to boil, then remove from fire and stir in the contents of 3 or 4 passion fruit. Put a couple of tablespoons of the above mixture in each glass, fill up with milk, stir well, and it is ready. A tested and delightfully refreshing drink.

Method: Dissolve 2 tablespoons malted milk in a quart of milk; add a little fresh cream. When cool add a bottle of soda water. This is a delicious summer beverage and may be flavoured with tea, coffee or chocolate. It left standing for a length of time, stir briskly.

Method: Mash bananas, mix with fruit juices, chill. Add milk, beat thoroughly. Serve cold.

Method: Beat up an egg yolk in a pint of fresh milk, adding the juice of 2 oranges and 2 tablespoons of ground almonds.

Method: Select a firm white cauliflower, snip off the florets, cut the stem into inch pieces and boil in the usual way. Prepare 1 pound of honeycomb tripe and cut into inch squares. Peel and cut into quarters 4 onions, cook onions and tripe in the usual way. Cooked drain off water. Butter a large pie dish, into it put alternate layers of tripe and onions and cauliflower. Sprinkle each layer with grated cheese and parsley. Next make a cream sauce by melting two tablespoons of butter in a saucepan, to this add two tablespoons of plain flour mixed smooth, then add 1 1/2 cups milk. Gradually stir the sauce until it thickens. Pour this over the contents of the pie dish. Sprinkle the top with browned bread crumbs and 3ozs grated cheese. Put into hot oven and bake 10 to 15 minutes. Serve piping hot with mashed potatoes.

Method: Take 3 sweet eating apples and grate them finely. Put in a glass dish and mix with sugar and 1 cup whipped cream. Have prepared milk jelly made of 2 cups of milk, sugar to taste and 4 dessertspoons gelatine. When the milk jelly is set, beat finely with a fork. Mix it with the apples and stir in 1 winglass of Port wine. Serve in glass bowls with whipped cream and scented milk chocolate on top. Put a water in each bowl.

Method: Stew 1lb pears. Dissolve a packet of raspberry jelly in 1 pint milk. Put a thin layer in a glass dish to set. Put the halves of pears together after filling the centres with whipped cream. Arrange pears on the set jelly, pour the rest of the jelly over them. When set decorate with cream and walnuts before serving.

Method: Put in tin of condensed milk in oven until a nice golden brown. Put caramel in saucepan with 2 cups sugar and 3 cups of water; boil for 10 minutes. Strain, and when cold add vanilla essence to taste. Add a tablespoon of this to a goblet of lead milk. For a lighter drink, and for milk-bar use, add a pony ice cream and whisk well with drink mixer, and a much lighter drink will result.

Method: Blanch and crush the almonds. Thoroughly. Pour the milk over the almonds until cooked. Mash well, add the cold milk and add. Let it just come to a boil and add marmite to flavor.

Popularity Of Rock Gardens Planting For A Spring Display

EARLY AUTUMN is with us and most gardeners are quite content to sit back and admire their show of blooms—a just reward of their work in the garden during Spring.

Reluctant as we are to bring them out of this pleasant vacation it is time for the enthusiast to begin planning his show. Preparations should begin now.

Autumn Planting For Spring Show

AUTUMN PLANTING.—The subjects for autumn planting cover a wide range, including seedlings, bulbs, shrubs, etc., and most use should be made of each subject according to the effect desired.

Seedlings (annuals).—Practically all of the hardy annuals may be planted now, to provide a bright show for the spring. The following should provide a subject for all purposes:

Pansies.—Most suitable for edging of borders, whilst a bed of assorted colors makes a marvellous effect if planted in a mass.

Poppies.—Suitable for borders, or for growing in clumps in front of taller growing annuals. Ideal for cut flowers.

Violas.—Very effective when grown as edgings or for carpet bedding.

Stocks.—"The Beauty of Nice" or early flowering varieties have been found most suitable for home gardens, making a

good show in the garden as well as being ideal for indoor decoration.

Ageratum.—Lovely bedding plants with beautiful lavender-blue flowers. Very effective when massed.

Antirrhinum (Snapdragons).—Are adaptable to practically any conditions, and often succeed where other plants have failed. The smaller varieties (Semi-tall and Tom Thumb) are most popular for bedding purposes.

Calendula.—Very showy, hardy annuals with free blooming habits, suitable for borders 18 inches to 2 ft. high. Orange King and Hybrids mixed are probably the most favored kinds.

Cinerarias.—Autumn seedlings will produce plants for spring and summer blooming. "Malmesbury" is a highly scented strain. The "Margaret" type is a free bloomer which does exceptionally well in a sunny position.

Cinerarias.—Are more tender annuals which require protection from really warm sun, when first planted, and later should be protected from frost if a successful show is desired. Protection of trees or large shrubs.

Callitriche.—The perennial type is composed of a blending of a wide array of colors, whilst "Lorenziana," an annual type, is very effective when grown as borders, growing about 1 ft high.

Godetia.—Pretty hardy, annuals, the type "Azalea-folia" being a big improvement on the older varieties.

Larkspur.—Or annual delphinium as they are sometimes called. Tall branching mixed is probably the most useful variety.

Primula.—(Malacoides, this type is wonderful for open air cultivation. Planted in the autumn it blooms to perfection in winter or early spring.

In addition to annuals, bulbs if planted in their correct position and conditions help to improve the garden's appearance, whilst wherever possible, use should be made of flowering shrubs to give a permanent effect to the garden.

MAKING A ROCKERY . . .

ROCK Gardens are now becoming very popular, and the best time for making one is early in Autumn. Later built rock gardens are more liable to disappoint. The soil has a chance to settle if the stones are placed in position early in Autumn, and hollows and cavities, as they appear, can be filled in, and everything packed firm before planting takes place from late Autumn onwards.

This setting of the soil is an important part, for it is not merely a question of pushing stones a little into the soil but rather a matter of taking soil to the stones and packing it round them. No space should remain between the surface of the soil or surface stones.

The most usual fault in setting rock is that of so placing the stones that they seem to have no connection with the soil, instead of as the base of the rock garden, hardly showing their upper edges above the earth.

The rocks should be placed neither too high nor too low level; let them settle in such a way that they are not washed over them, but are not so low as to be completely covered by the one below it. Use care to make the stones level.

of small stones. The latter quickly become hidden, and if stones are not seen here and there the rock garden loses its most striking feature.

The rock garden should be made in full sunshine, away from the drip of trees. It is best to avoid a general level, therefore, a hollow with its shallow bank sloping up gently to the natural floor of grass provides the most suitable location, and, dying away to a natural level, will give a quite informal and natural look to the arrangement.

Many are deterred from this, thinking alpine plants are difficult to grow and require special soil. For all ordinary purposes good garden soil will suffice if mixed with leaf soil and sand.

This should constitute the upper nine inches of soil; lower down anything will do, with plenty of stones to ensure perfect drainage.

Thorough drainage is essential, for although the majority of alpine plants delight in plenty of water during the growing season, they object to water hanging about them for any length of time.

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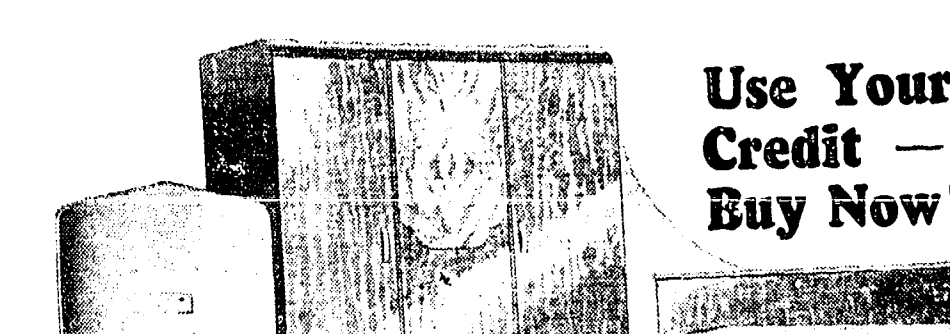
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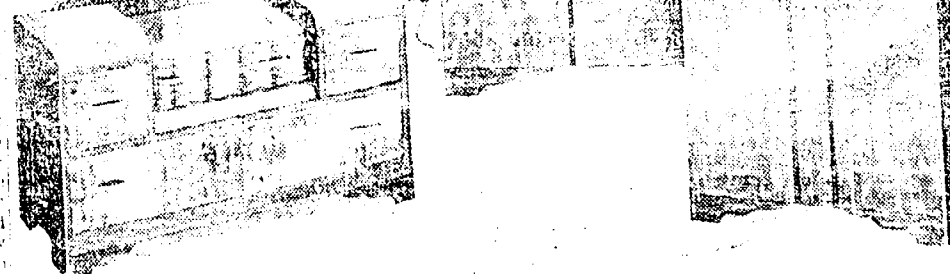

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GAMING CHARGE FAILS

Robert Thomas Stephenson, South Croft, Dennis, was proceeded against at Northcote Court on March 4 on a charge of having had the care and management of a common gaming house.

Constable Geer said that on January 13 he entered premises at 72 South Croft, Dennis, by a special warrant. The premises were a comfortable shop, library and post office. Stand at the door was a man named Osborne. As witness came to the library, he saw Osborne remove a book from a shelf. Defendant was seen to enter the room at the back, which was a kitchen. Osborne followed defendant who went into a lavatory. Defendant had part of his hair pulled the chair with the other hand. Witness pulled defendant away.

When the police were on the premises a man entered with a slip of paper which he placed in his pocket when he saw witness. Witness took the paper and 1/6 from the man and handed them to Sen. Constable Kerr Taylor. The back door was shut, and under the knob was wedged the back of a chair. When defendant was asked why the place was locked, he said he had a lot of money there. Witness said he placed his hand in the lavatory bowl but did not find anything.

Senior Constable Kerr-Taylor said he was with the previous witness at the time. When the defendant's arm was wet to the elbow. On a table in a room behind the post office was a writing block and a page of newspaper containing racing information. On the table certain horse names were ticks. In a kitchen was another newspaper similarly marked and also a playing card. A woman came to the room and when she saw the police she placed a piece of paper down her blouse. Later she saw a slip of paper under the bed. When asked about the card, the defendant said they were customers. I would say I had some money on the card. Defendant declined to make any statement.

In reply to defendant's counsel, witness said that he had come over the defendant's shoulder to see the card. Defendant said in evidence that the card was on the table on January 13 he took no card and did not conduct an establishment for betting. Osborne had worked for defendant for some time, but had received some of money on the premises. Witness never heard any statement by Constable Geer that he was a fellow-traveller. He did not attempt to get a card of any betting material down the lavatory. The marks on the newspaper were not made by him. The limit on a card was 100. Defendant had a few cards for three years. None of his marks shown on the slip of paper did correspond to his betting.

To Sen. Constable Kerr-Taylor, witness said the reason why he had his arm in the lavatory basin was because he was cleaning it of evidence. The bench said that defendant had wiped the premises were used for betting, and had given an answer to the charge. The case was dismissed.

Its Composition

The chemical composition of cow's milk is shown to contain the energy giving nutrients, protein, fat and carbohydrate; all the known essential vitamins, calcium, phosphorus, iron, sulphur, sodium, magnesium, potassium, sodium, chlorine and copper, some of the biological roles of which are known, and a number of other elements, present only in minute amounts, such as manganese, zinc, and fluorine, the exact functions of which are not fully understood, but which would seem to be as necessary for normal nutrition as any of the other constituents. Even if it were possible to state the chemical composition of milk in full, a very important part of its nutritive value would be obtained, because it would leave unmentioned many important physico-chemical and biological properties on which its high nutritive value largely depends. For example, the physico-chemical states of its constituents make for easy digestion and assimilation; the relationship of the different constituents to one another ensures normality of bodily function; the nature of its protein and of its mineral elements, notably calcium and phosphorus, and its high content of other inorganic elements and vitamins make for satisfactory growth and give it a very high value as a protection against disease.

Nutritive Value

The fact that milk is a valuable human food, particularly when new tissues are being formed, has been recognized from the earliest times. With increased years much experimental work has been done, and it is now possible to state the nutritive value of milk in terms of energy and other factors. In the United States by Davies, Blunt and others, the results of which have shown that milk is all-important for the development of normal teeth resistant to decay.

The wheatmeal mixture could be made overnight to save time. Other cereals can be used in this way too.

Amounts of Milk Required

The average amount of milk for children would come from investigations of Sherman, Deane and others to be from one to two pints per day, and for pregnant and nursing mothers one pint to two pints and one to two pints per day. In regard to other adults, it is a consensus of opinion that enough milk of milk products should be consumed to ensure a sufficiency of calcium. Dietary surveys have shown that calcium and animal protein are very frequently deficient in diets in this country, but while deficiencies of animal protein can be made good by meat, fish or eggs, the best and most convenient means of assuring a sufficiency of calcium is by including in the diet an adequate amount of milk, which would of course include the diet with all the other valuable nutrients, including protein present in milk. It would seem that a minimum of about one pint of milk daily is desirable for an adult.

A Milk Club is simply an orderly method of arranging for the purchase and consumption of milk by employees during their working hours. By arrangement, a suitable cool cabinet, operated by gas or electricity, is installed at the factory so that the required number of bottles of milk supplied by a local dairy can be kept cool and fresh until required by employees during lunch hour or other convenient periods. Employees pay for the milk according to their individual requirements. Most employers will gladly allow a member of the staff to attend to the effective operation of the club.

Some delightful . . . MILK RECIPES

★ Breakfast Dishes

Wheatmeal And Cheese
Ingredients: 1lb cheese (rub through a grater); 1 cup wheatmeal; 4 cups milk; cayenne pepper and salt to taste.
Method: Heat the milk to boiling point, add salt and stir in the wheatmeal very slowly. Cook in a double boiler one half hour. Add cheese, stir until melted; add seasoning to the wheatmeal mixture, and pour into a shallow pan. When cold, cut into squares, dip in fine crumbs, which have been seasoned, then in beaten egg diluted with a little milk, again in crumbs, and fry in deep hot fat. Serve with tomato sauce.

Mince Souffle
Method: Make a sauce of 1oz butter, 1½ ozs. flour melted, and mix well, add 1 cup milk and the same of milk. Into this sauce put any kind of cold minced meat, salt, pepper and a little nutmeg. Cook a few minutes and turn into a pie dish. Add a slice of bread, over it pour three quarters cup of hot milk, beat it up with a fork. Spread this over the mince and lastly beat up an egg and spread all over the mixture. Place in a quick oven till brown. It will rise and be very light and most tasty.

Brain Savoury
Ingredients: 3 sets sheep's brains; 2ozs butter; 1 stick celery; 1 pint milk; 1oz flour; 1 tablespoon cream; chopped parsley; pepper and salt to taste; 1oz cheese; Juice of half a lemon.
Method: Let brains soak in cold water to which a teaspoon of vinegar has been added, for 1 hour. Remove skins and place in a saucepan and let simmer gently for 10 minutes in water to cover. Then lift out. Melt 1oz butter in small saucepan, stir in flour which has been mixed thoroughly and free from lumps; let it cook. In a few minutes, without letting it color, stir in milk by degrees and bring to the boil, stirring all the time. Add pepper, salt and grated celery and cheese and cream and the lemon juice and chopped parsley. Put brains in pie dish and cover with white sauce. Sprinkle liberally with grated bread crumbs to which a little grated cheese has been added and put small lumps of butter on top and bake in an oven for a few minutes till top is brown.

★ For SWEETS

Gentlemen's Rarebit
Method: Take 3 sweet eating apples and grate them finely. Put in a glass dish and mix with sugar and 1 cup whipped cream. Have prepared milk jelly made of 2 cups of milk, 1 cup sugar and 2 dessertspoons gelatine. When the milk jelly is set, beat thoroughly with a fork. Mix it with the apples and stir in 1 wineglass of Port wine. Serve in glass bowls with whipped cream and scraped milk chocolate on top. Put a wafer in each bowl.

★ Luncheon Dishes

Spaghetti Marine
Ingredients: 1lb spaghetti; 4 tablespoons butter; 4 tablespoons flour; 1½ cups milk; 2 teaspoon salt; 1 teaspoon curry powder; 1 teaspoon shrimps; 1 teaspoon lemon juice; 1 tablespoon chopped parsley.
Method: Cook spaghetti until tender, drain well. Make a cream sauce by melting the butter, stir in flour, gradually add milk, salt, curry powder and shrimps, cook 7 minutes, add lemon juice and parsley. Place spaghetti round edge of a platter as ring. Fill centre with shrimp sauce, sprinkle top with few grains of cayenne pepper, garnish with chopped shrimps.

Cream Of Steak
Ingredients: 1 pint fresh milk; 1lb gravy beef; 1 small onion; salt and pepper to taste.
Method: Put gravy beef and onion through a minceur. Put in a buttered pie-dish then fill the dish with the milk and bake in a moderate oven 1½ hours or longer, smaller or larger quantities can be used as desired. This is a very tasty dish and can be used with vegetables or without. This dish sets and can be cut out in squares when cooked.

Cream Of Pumpkin Soup
Ingredients: 2lb pumpkin; 1 tablespoonful of butter; 3 pints of boiling water; 3 pints of milk; 2 tablespoonful of wholemeal flour; 2 teaspoonfuls honey.
Method: Peel the pumpkin very thickly and cut into pieces, put into saucepan with water and simmer till cooked. Mash well, add the milk and honey and butter, mix the flour with a little cold milk and add. Let it just come to the boil and add marmite to flavor.

★ Cold Milk Drinks

Caramel Fluff
Ingredients: 1 cup sugar, 2 tablespoons water.
Method: Put in tin or enamel plate in oven until a nice golden brown. Put caramel in saucepan with 2 cups sugar and 3 cups of water; boil for 10 minutes. Strain, and when cold add vanilla essence to taste. Add a tablespoon of this to a goblet of ice milk. For a lighter drink, and for milk-bar use, add a penny ice cream and whisk well with drink mixer, and a much lighter drink will result.

Almond Milk
Ingredients: 2 ozs. sweet almonds, 1 oz. bitter almonds, 1 pint milk, 1 dessertspoonful sugar or honey.
Method: Blanch and crush the almonds thoroughly. Pour the milk over the almonds.

Popularity Of Rock Gardens Planting For A Spring Display

EARLY AUTUMN is with us and most gardeners are quite content to sit back and admire their show of blooms—a just reward of their work in the garden during Spring.

Reluctant as we are to bring them out of this pleasant occupation it is time for the enthusiast to begin planning his Spring show. Preparations should begin now.

Autumn Planting For Spring Show

AUTUMN PLANTING—The subjects for autumn planting cover a wide range, including seedlings, bulbs, shrubs, etc. and most are should be made of each subject according to the effect desired.

Seedlings (annuals).—Practically all of the hardy annuals may be planted now, to provide a bright show for the spring. The following should provide a subject for all purposes:

Pansies.—Most suitable for edging of borders, whilst a bold of assorted colors makes a marvellous effect if planted in a mass.

Poppies.—Suitable for borders, or for growing in clumps in front of taller growing annuals. Ideal for cut flowers.

Violas.—Very effective when grown as edgings or for carpet bedding.

Stocks.—"The Beauty of Nice" or early flowering varieties have been found most suitable for home gardens, making a

good show in the garden as well as being ideal for indoor decoration.

Ageratums.—Lovely bedding plants with beautiful lavender-blue flowers. Very effective when massed.

Antirrhinums (Snapdragons)—Are adaptable to practically any conditions, and often succeed where other plants have failed. The smaller varieties (Semi-tall and Tom Thumb) are most popular for bedding purposes.

Calendulas.—Very showy, hardy annuals with free blooming habits, suitable for borders 18 inches to 2 ft. high. Orange King and Hybrids mixed are probably the most favored kinds.

Carnations.—Autumn seedlings will produce plants for spring and summer blooming. "Malmaison" is a highly scented strain. The "Margaret" type is a free bloomer which does exceptionally well in a sunny position.

Cinerarias.—Are more tender annuals which require protection from really warm sun, when first planted, and later should be protected from frost if a successful show is desired. They generally do exceptionally well when planted near the protection of trees or large shrubs.

Gaillardias.—The perennial type is composed of a blending of a wide array of colors, whilst "Lorenziana," an annual type, is very effective when grown as borders, growing about 1 ft high.

Godetia.—Pretty hardy annuals, the type "Azaleafoia" being a big improvement on the older varieties.

Lakapur.—Or annual delphinium as they are sometimes called. Tall branching mixed is probably the most useful variety.

Primula.—(Malacoides). This type is wonderful for open air cultivation. Planted in the autumn it bloom, to perfection in winter or early spring.

In addition to annuals, bulbs if planted in their correct position and conditions help to improve the garden's appearance, whilst wherever possible, use should be made of flowering shrubs to give a permanent effect to the garden.

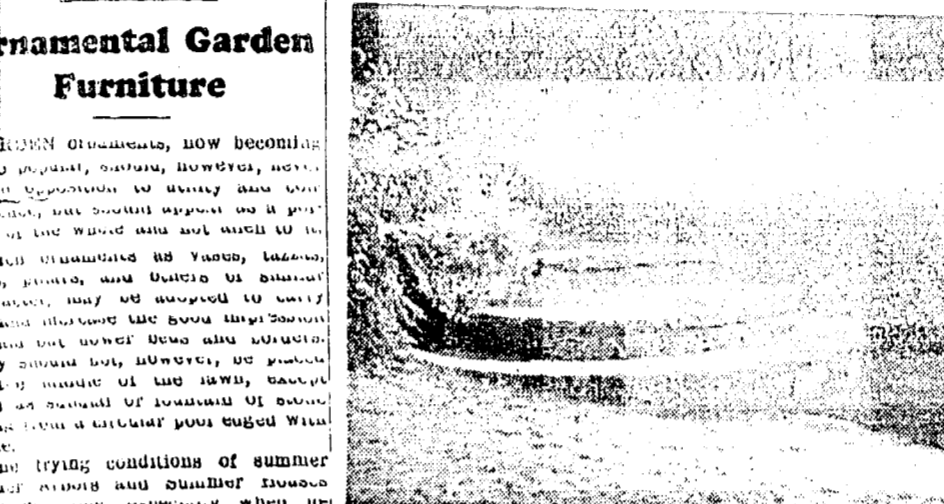
Rock Work in the Garden MAKING A ROCKERY...

Rock gardens are now becoming very popular, and the best time for making one is early in Autumn. Later built rock gardens are more liable to disappoint. The soil has a chance to settle if the stones are placed in position early in Autumn, and hollows and cavities, as they appear, can be filled in, and everything packed firm before planting takes place from late Autumn onwards.

This setting of the soil is an important part, for it is not merely a question of pushing stones a little into the soil but rather a matter of taking soil to the stones and packing it round them. No space should remain between the surface of the soil or surface stones.

The most usual fault in setting rock is that of so placing the stones that they seem to have no connection with the soil. Instead of as the base of the rock garden, barely showing their upper edges above the earth.

The rocks should be placed neither bolt upright nor dead level; let them slope in such a way that the soil cannot be washed over them, and such rock must be selected from the one below it. Use care of considerable importance in the

of small stones. The latter quickly become hidden, and if stones are not seen here and there the rock garden loses its most striking feature.

The rock garden should be made in full sunshine, away from the drip of trees. It is best to avoid a general level. Therefore, a hollow with its shallow banks sloping up easily to the natural floor of grass provides the most suitable location, and, dying away to a natural level, will give a quite informal and natural look to the arrangement.

Many are deterred from this, thinking alpine plants are difficult to grow, and require special soil. For all ordinary purposes good garden soil will suffice if, mixed with leaf soil and sand.

This should constitute the upper nine inches of soil; lower down anything will do, with plenty of stones to ensure perfect drainage.

Thorough drainage is essential, for although the water of alpine plants delight in plenty of water during the growing season, they object to water hanging about them for any length of time.

Don't For Gardeners

Don't forget to keep your soil well aerated. Cultivation is the secret of success.

Don't sow all your vegetable seeds at one time. Make successive sowings.

Don't let your ground get hungry. Requires nourishment the same as human being.

Don't plant out of season. This is the cause of many failures. Ask the seedsman's advice.

Don't overcrowd. Plenty of room tend to better plants.

Don't neglect your garden implements. Clean and sharp tools make a pleasure.

Don't forget to prune rose and fruit trees freely.

Don't always rely on the largest plants when planting out. Smaller ones are not so liable to receive a shock, will make sturdier growth, and do not bolt or run to seed.

GLASS CURTAINS

How full should they be? Full width of the material, or twice the width of the window. The neatest looking thing in the world is a skimpy glass curtain. How long should they be? To the top of the window, but never 'in between' these lengths just because you hate cutting of some material. Go ahead and cut! How should they be finished at the top? With a shirred heading, or a French pleat. How pleasing is an interesting material for glass curtains, what additional yardage should be allowed for the hems, heading, and casings? Seven inches for each curtain. Should ruffled curtains always be tied back? Yes, the one exception being when they are used to show just a few inches beyond a fabric hanging drapery. Chiniz draperies of ornamental ruffled glass curtains can be very effective when used this way. Tie-backs must rather high up the window or more over half way down, if the glass curtain is very wide, are more pleasing than when they are tied back in the exact center of the window. What kind of curtains should be used on porch or glass doors? What about colors? Preferably the same fabrics as those used for glass curtains at the windows. If something more opaque is desired, silk or rayon segment cloth, shantung, soft silk, or nonpareil may be used in color of the glass curtains. How should they be made and hung? With gathered or shirred heading, stretched back at top and bottom of the glass panels.

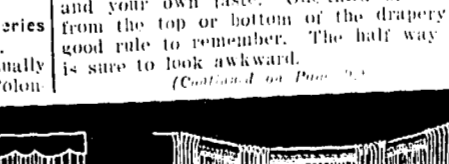
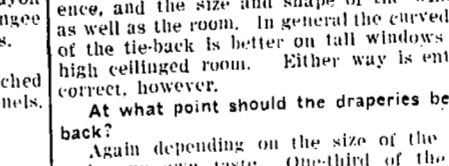
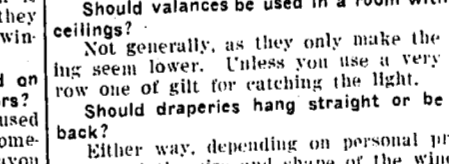
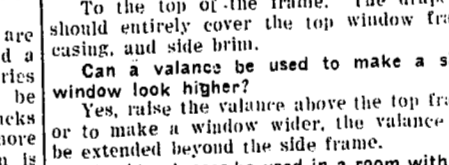
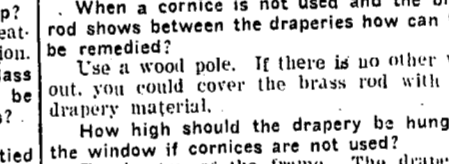
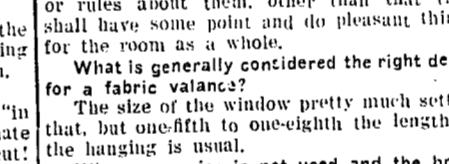
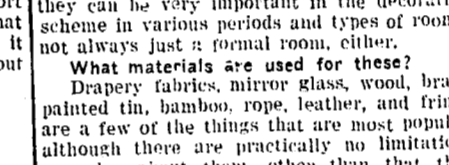
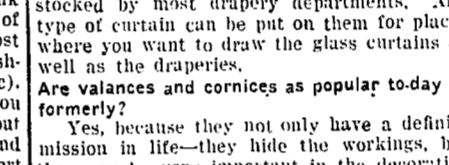

Half the joy and delight if you do not know the wonderful quietude of a friendly home, and a whole purpose of the article on this page is to be no more than advisory to the young home-makers to attain the pleasant beauty of HOME as first.

Notes On Good Taste

AVERAGE persons of to-day derive a great deal of pleasure in furnishing and decorating their homes. This pleasure, in the case of the new bride, is increased a hundredfold. This fact is having a vitalising effect on those engaged in supplying such needs. Of late years the attempts to sell Mrs. Jones, of suburban, hideous and cheap representations of various "period" furniture settings has practically to our great relief, ceased. The demand (now becoming a cultured demand) for beautiful, economical and carefully planned furniture, has been of immense advantage to all. It has allowed a measure of standardisation in manufacture but has at the same time overcome the deadly dullness of "sameness". In furnishing your home let GOOD TASTE be your yardstick. Study carefully the house, each room, and the various built-in accessories, etc., which it may possess and which may probably dispense with certain items of furniture. Give long consideration to the disposal of the various rooms and then to the individual layout of each room. Remember that it is the wife who has to live most of the time in the home, on her shoulders falls most of the work entailed in keeping the home attractive and livable. Plan it therefore with this fact in mind. Buy furniture that pleases the room and you buy furniture that will please you.

The Growth Of "Functional" Furniture

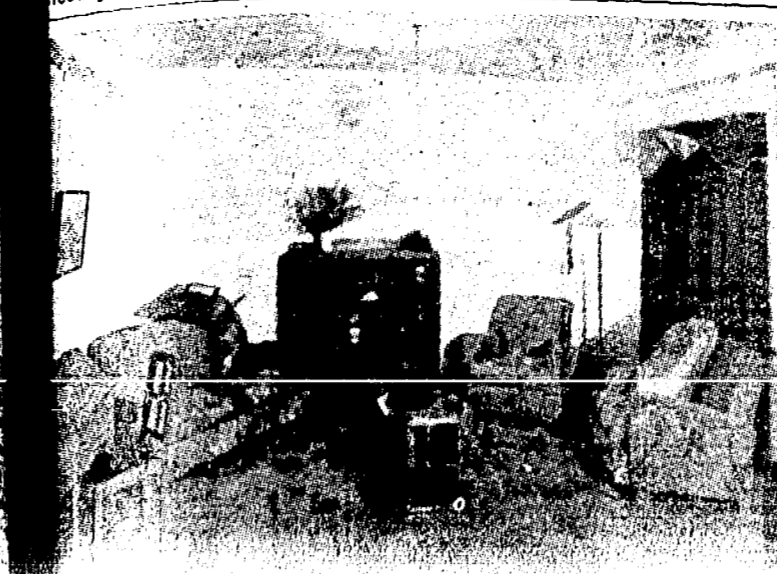
PERHAPS great aunt Susan didn't have a practical thought in her head when she purchased that hard, slippery sofa with all the roses carved on the back, or that whatnot that seemed to serve only the purpose of gathering dust, or that writing desk without room to keep writing paper, bills, clippings, or anything else. Probably she never heard the word "functional" and would turn over in her grave if she could listen in on an earnest discussion of how to make one piece of furniture do the work of two, or how to put to work that corner that never did anything more useful than shelter a fern. But if she were here today and could see with her own eyes the results of our practical point of view, we're willing to bet she'd raise her hands in delight and say "Sakes alive, Polly, I never would have thought you had it in you. Here you are, as content as can be, and I'm proud to see my favorite niece with a house full of things as comfortable to live with as an old shoe. If I could have found pieces like this in my day your uncle and I would have had a lot more comfort." She wouldn't have had to learn to like "new-fangled" modern, either. She could, and you can have plenty of good functional furniture in the mahogany or maple you have always had in your house and always want to have. We believe in having a place for everything and everything in its place. And it's simple enough if you give a thought to the work you expect of every piece of furniture you own under the different sets of circumstances that arise in the course of ordinary living.

Kitchen Lay-Outs

A GREAT deal of nonsense has been perpetuated on this kitchen question. The problem, after all, is a simple one. It is how to arrange the "workshop of the home" in such a way that work becomes as near a pleasure as possible. Should the room that is to be your Kitchen lack many of the built in advantages of the modern home, then make the purchase of your kitchen suite and kitchen furniture compensate for these disadvantages. Buy those suites that possess a high degree manifold utility advantages. Don't crowd your kitchen; make every single item of furniture in this important room fill a definite need and fill that need better than any other item of furniture could. This is one room where the indispensable predominates. Common sense dictates the position of the various pieces of equipment in relation to each other, though there is of course no cast-iron rule of thumb. The sink and the washing copper, for instance, make mangle and rinsing easier if they adjoin, and the vitreous enamelled tops of the wash-copper and the refrigerator make a cool working surface on each side of the cooker, which should have pans, cooking utensils, and favorings very near to it. It is by now a platitude to mention the importance of aligning surfaces for ease of working; as it should be to recommend that all equipment should be flush with the floor and the bases undercut to leave room for toes. Some provision for airing or drying wet clothes is indispensable. With regard to the general provision and placing of cupboards, there should be plenty of storage space, but not a bewildering confusion of cupboard doors.

THE EQUIPMENT FOR THE WORKSHOP OF THE HOUSE

Flavourings should be very near to this... This can be kept on the ledge of the casing door to sink... Nine times out of ten this is given pride of place... The top makes a cool working surface... Live this, instead of a confusion of doors and drawers... This makes mangle and rinsing easier

 "The peoples of the world who have consumed generous quantities of milk are noted for their fine stature, their longevity and their health."—Dr. Julia Outhouse in Illinois Health Messenger.

Sherman at Columbia University have shown that increasing the proportion of milk in the diets of laboratory animals results both in increased vitality and in longer life. 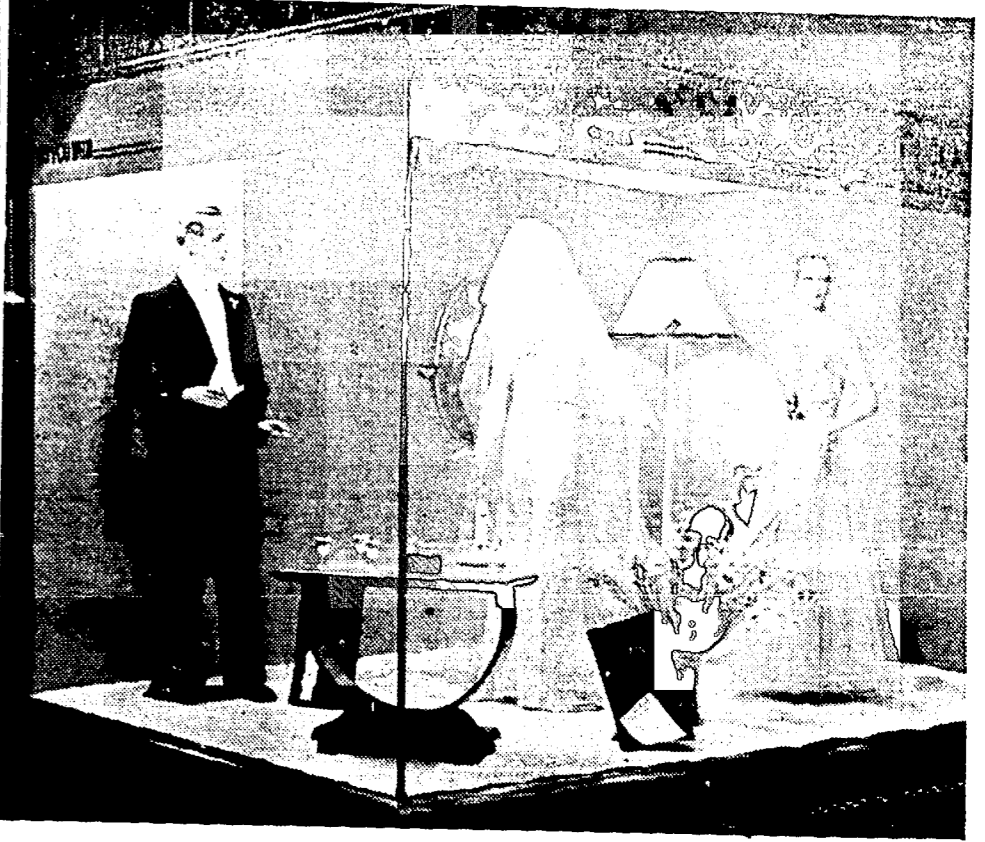
