SALE OF WAR SAVINGS CERTIFICATES

CAMPAIGN TOTAL REACHES £17,000

The campaign for the sale of War Savings Certificates, the pioneering of which was entrusted to Cr. H. Swain (Director) and Mr. N. Osborne (Organiser) is being most successfully carried on by these gentlemen, although there has naturally been a slight falling off in the demand for the certificates, following the commitments of the many industrial establishments in the city which have responded so splendidly to the appeal.

The sale of certificates and the response in loans made available by residents (free of interest, now total £17,000—a very handsome sum indeed. When it is remembered that originally £10,000 was the objective aimed at by August, the result has been most remarkable.

The money from the groups is now coming in as the result of the weekly contributions by agreed hundreds of employees who agreed to take up certificates.

Since the list of groups which are operating was last published in the "Post," other firms to establish groups are the Clifton Brick Co., N. Moriarty, E. J. Callender, F. Chatley and F. R. O'Brien.

Mr. Osborne stated that Cr. Swain had rendered great service in the formation of groups and

in the disposal of certificates, by the amount of work he had put into the campaign by addressing gatherings, at which he had explained the way in which everybody could assist. But what Mr. Osborne did not say was that he, together with Cr. Swain, had been the driving force in the campaign which had eclipsed the most sanguine expectations of citizens.

Preston Technical School

At the Northcote Council meeting on Monday, Cr. French reported that a shelter shed had been erected at the Preston Technical School, towards which £100 had been subscribed by the Mothers' Club. There were over 800 scholars at the school, and a large proportion of these came from Northcote. He added that he hoped to see the time when there would be a Northcote Mothers' Club as an adjunct to the school.

There was some difficulty about staff at the school, Cr. French also said, as a number of the members had been transferred to war work.

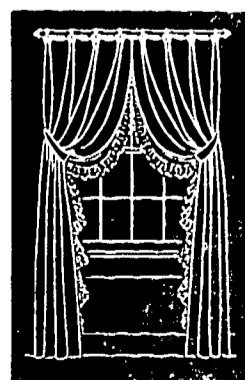

CLOSING OF GADD ST.

PROGRESS ASSOCIATION REVENUE OFFICERS
The reading of a letter from the Town Clerk at the meeting of the West Ward Progress Association on July 21 in connection with the closure of Gadd St. (to which the association has so strongly objected) brought remarks from several speakers to the effect that the council was shirking its duty in asking the association to accept the responsibility of supplying certain particulars.

The letter from the Town Clerk stated that the council had agreed to take Supreme Court proceedings to open the street provided the necessary conditions could be obtained. The claim of Mr. Pitt that a section of the street had been closed for 20 years.

The Town Clerk had previously advised that the council was taking legal advice on the matter, and everything possible would be done to see that the road was reopened.

Mr. Boden said he had secured legal opinion that any railway bus to open the street provided the necessary conditions could be obtained. The claim of Mr. Pitt that a section of the street had been closed for 20 years.

The chairman (Mr. T. J. McMahon) said the council was asking the association to assist in the closure of a hole that it (the council) had got itself into. The council could send an employee through the street and see what it could do.

The following motion, moved by Mr. Boden, and seconded by Mr. Thompson, found unanimous support: "That the West Ward Progress Association does not see its duty in asking the council in the manner indicated in the letter of July 18, and in arriving at that to the association, on the reply, to set out in the Town Clerk's letter of June 24."

The work referred to being the filling of pot holes in Gadd St. west of St. George's Rd. pointing out that it was the opinion of the association that it should not be necessary for such work to be done on a Sunday in a public street.

Rubbish and Metal Dumps

Another matter upon which it was decided to approach the council was the condition of the dump in Gadd St. and St. George's Rd. asking if it was still intended the corner should remain open, and the greater part of the metal had been taken away. It was suggested that garbage be removed from the dump and metal should be deposited at the western end of the allotment.

Wandering Gypsies in Trouble

Described as gypsies, James and Thomas Johan, of no fixed abode, were charged at the Northcote Court on July 26 with being idle and disorderly persons having no lawful means of subsistence. Thomas Johan was formerly charged with having had in his possession £110 of suspected stolen goods. Detective Donnelly, in asking for a remand for seven days, said accused had been brought to Northcote police office by Detective Howard of Durham. It was alleged that in company with a woman they had been taking the suburbs telling fortunes. They had left some of the shoes they had stolen money and missing. From the result of his inquiries, the charges had been laid.

Classes for War Work

Registration forms are available at the Town Hall for those who would care to join the Red Cross Emergency Class in First Aid. This course of instruction is of most interesting description and is also highly valuable in a case of emergency.

J. H. Green Memorial Unveiled ITALIAN WAITER ILL-TREATS WIFE

Blames Mother-in-law For Differences

The indignities to which a number of occasions her daughter-in-law had been very upset and in tears and had told her she could not live with him. When defendant had used an obscene expression to his wife, her son had struck him, and had told him that no man would use language of that description to his mother and sister.

In evidence, defendant said he and his wife had lived with his mother-in-law on three different occasions. His mother-in-law was "the boss of them all in the house" and had told him she would poison him on one occasion in the room he was occupying with his wife, his mother-in-law had thrown part of the first baby was born, he pushed her out of bed and she slept on the floor. When they started to quarrel, defendant still kept coming home late. In November 1937, he made an unfounded charge against her, took her by the throat and nearly choked her. Her throat was sore and badly bruised. On Good Friday, 1938, he struck her when she asked for money and told her she could go on the streets. He also called her filthy names, that night she slept on the floor. Next morning he left the house and was away for three days. She went after him, and he promised he would give her anything she asked for. After six weeks he reverted to his old habits, and she said anything, he replied, "Shut your mouth up!" he shut her out of the house on an occasion when she had left the house, he called her back by the hair.

In May, 1938 when she was pulling the floor, he kicked her on the stomach and used violent language. In July 1938 he bit her on the arm and left teeth marks, and sought blood. In 1939 defendant stayed in a nurse for certain periods, and after being treated by the nurse, she was admitted to the Women's Hospital. When living in rooms, out of this she had to pay 22/6 a week rent and had her own clothes and shoes. She was not to take drink and smoke if he wished her to.

In March 1939 she went to live with her people, and he sent her a letter to say that he had thought to do for her as he had somebody better to take her place. He also said he would shoot her and split her head open with an axe. Defendant was often intoxicated when he came home late in the mornings. While living with her parents, he used to slap her face and otherwise ill-treat her. Her brother had struck a woman for the language he used. On June 25, defendant slapped the wife across the face, and forcibly pushed her against the wall. She then left the house and stayed away for a week. It was five weeks since she had received any money from him. She was not prepared to live with her mother, she was frightened of him. Mary Elizabeth Brinklow, mother of the complainant, said that for some time up to June, 1940 the couple resided with her. There were times when defendant behaved like a fanatic.

Under cross-examination by the wife's counsel, witness said he had no reason to complain about his wife's conduct, and had always found her truthful and straight. His wife's allegations about his conduct were wrong. He had obtained a divorce from his wife, and the money had been handed to the woman. Witness informed Harkin he would have to report the matter, to which defendant replied that he had been worried about the affair as it involved his wife, and that he had been instructed by his solicitor that he could do it as others were doing it. Witness told defendant it appeared he had collected 145 illegals. Witness then drew defendant's attention to the rate of interest. Defendant said that was a "bit hot" but asked why did not the Government regulate the rate of interest? Witness told defendant the Registrar considered the matter should be investigated. Defendant asked if the money were returned less the outstanding balance, would it be all right? Witness told him it was a matter for the Registrar.

Witness under cross-examination by defendant's counsel (Mr. E. F. Fudge), instructed by Mr. A. E. O'Connor) said he did not recall O'Connor that if the money were paid in full the file would be put away and nothing further heard about it. He rang the Repatriation Department and told them he did not propose to give the woman's name, and asked if they were interested. Officials of the Department replied that they would not only be prepared to act against Harkin, but the woman also. Witness denied that he told

Man Fined For Trespassing SAID GIRL OWED HIM MONEY

The persistency with which he went to a house in an endeavour to secure money allegedly owing to him by the daughter of the owner of the house, brought Donald Roy Warren to the Northcote Court on August 6 when he was charged with willfully trespassing on the property of Gilbert Kincaid Moat.

Moat, a secretary of Vauhall St. Northcote, said that on August 3 at 12.30 a.m. defendant came to his house, and on being asked to leave, refused to do so, and gave a lot of abuse. After he had rung the bell, defendant later returned and used abusive language. When defendant left the second time, he later rang up on the telephone.

In reply to defendant's solicitor witness said he was in a position to pay any money which defendant might allege his daughter might owe him. Warren could have had redress without making a nuisance of himself. His daughter denied she owed defendant any money. If defendant gave witness a statement of the money alleged to be owing, he would pass it on to his solicitor. Defendant had previously molested witness's daughter, who had "kept company" with him, and had given him up. Witness told defendant that if he refused to go about his business, he would ring for the police. Defendant asked when the police were coming, and later, after he had gone away, telephoned and repeated the question. When defendant came back the police were there, and he was arrested.

Witness continued that defendant had telephoned four times within an hour, and had been doing this for months. They had to leave the receiver of the bell in order to secure relief, witness said.

Constable Lamb said he saw defendant outside Moat's house at 12.25 a.m. on August 3. Defendant said he would not go to the police. Defendant also said he had rung up on the telephone. Witness told Warren it was a funny time to be ringing up. Warren was then arrested.

Defendant, who gave his address as North Fitzroy, said he met Miss Moat on August 1 and told her it was time the money she owed him was paid. The amount owing was £5. When witness was engaged in an argument with her, Moat came out and told him to get away, and said he would ring for the police. Witness told Moat to get the police to come. When they did not come, he rang the bell to ask the reason why, and then went to the side. When he rang the telephone and asked if the police were there, he was informed they were. When he went around he was arrested and locked up. There was no truth in the statement that he had been at the house several times prior to August 3. If there were, it was three months since he had asked for his money. The reason he had to ask for the money at that time of night was because Miss Moat was working at the munition works, and he had no opportunity of seeing her earlier.

In reply to Solicitor-General Bean, who prosecuted, defendant said he had twice written letters asking for his money, but had received no reply.

Defendant told Mr. Justice P.M. that there was a man named Miss Moat on August 2, and who had threatened him. When he had asked Moat previously to be allowed to see his daughter, he had been ordered off the property. A conviction was recorded and a fine of £2 imposed.
