Air Raid Precautions MORE CLASSES OPERATING IN NORTHCOTE

Apathy Must Be Overcome

It is to be hoped that the Federal Government has not seen fit to take the public more fully into its confidence regarding its attitude and endeavour to place on a better working basis the air raid precautions scheme.

Not one person in every 500 in Northcote knows practically anything about what is expected of him (or her) in case of emergency caused by air raids, although the District Warden (Mr. J. A. Thomson) has endeavoured to get as many classes established as possible. Two classes went through the course some months ago, and other classes are now pursuing a systematic course of instruction.

Not a little of the apathy that has been exhibited towards the scheme has undoubtedly been brought about by the conflicting opinions of Federal Ministers, despite the statement the Prime Minister has made to the contrary. Last January the "Leader-Budget" urged citizens who were in a position to do so, to take the opportunity of attending the proposed classes and by so doing, become important units in the community in time of emergency. But Northcote residents, in company with those in every other suburb, did not respond very enthusiastically to the request. Why? Because they could not envisage an air raid on Melbourne.

The possibility of air raids on Australia must be foreseen as a possibility and precautions must be taken accordingly. Apart from anti-gas measures, there are other aspects of A.R.P. training and organisation. The effects of incendiary and high explosive bombs require to be minimised; essential services must be maintained; training of aid raid wardens must be carried on, to mention a few of the things which must be done.

WANTED A New Town Hall

INADEQUATE FACILITIES AT PRESENT BUILDING

A comparison between the Northcote Town Hall and halls in a number of other metropolitan municipalities is not favourable to Northcote in some respects. It was stated in a recent issue of the "Leader-Budget" that something would surely have to be done in the reconstruction of the Northcote Town Hall at the conclusion of the war to meet the growing demands on its resources. Since then, another instance has occurred whereby the position becomes more urgent.

One State School committee had to conduct its juvenile ball at the Collingwood Town Hall because the Northcote edifice had not a balcony sufficiently large for the convenience of parents and friends. Those who were present at the Collingwood Town Hall found the facilities admirable. On the contrary, those who organised the Hutton St school juvenile ball held in the Northcote Town Hall were not so favorably placed. Spectators were gathered four and five deep around the dancers, which made for congestion and unenjoyable conditions. The principal entrance to the hall was blocked to an uncomfortable degree, and the announcer had repeatedly to appeal to people to move on. The dancing space was cramped and the children were hampered in their evolutions. Compare how smoothly matters went at Collingwood when the children had the spacious floor completely to themselves, and were marched into an adjoining hall after each item, with the cramped conditions at Northcote. The latter suffers severely by comparison.

The small balcony at one end of the Northcote City Hall is large enough only to seat little more than a full-sized orchestra. It has other drawbacks which cannot be removed unless a big reconstruction scheme is carried out. Recent events have shown how necessary it is that something should be done. Of course it must be admitted that the balcony was part of a scheme of reconstruction some years ago, and the best possible use was made of the conditions under the circumstances.

It is but right that these matters should be mentioned now, so that when the opportunity occurs for councillors to take some definite stand (which might be next year, or five years hence, depending upon the duration of the war) it will not be a question of what congestion is likely to occur in the future, but what has already occurred in the last few months.

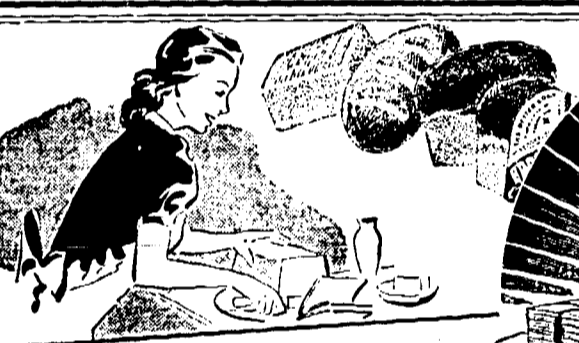

possible aid. In listening to Mr. Curtin's speech, one would wonder whether there was any real basis for the opposition. Mr. Curtin said that he had six good men who were asking for a continuance of the aid to the British Government. THE VALUE OF THE A.I.F. Without naval escort and other primary products, valued at over £100,000,000, the British Government would have reached the money for the aid to keep the whole of the industry going round in the pollin areas. What a justice state Australia would have had in had the Menzies Government had entered into negotiations with the British Government in the early days of the war to long the ships carrying these products of the industry to their destinations without I.R.A.N. and I.R.N. escort. When the British Government in October 1939, decided to increase naval escort to a level of a possible 100,000 men, the prominent member of the League Party urged no increase. In fact, he would have been pleased if the Navy were scrapped. There was no place in war time for a person holding such views in the Parliament charged with directing war efforts.

AUSTRALIA WAS DOING SOMETHING

At a dinner function recently he had heard a gentleman from England touch on several matters connected with the war. One man had said that Australia was doing nothing. Mr. (George Brand) said: "Well, if I knew a little about it as you, I would be doing nothing, too. I would be firing ammunition made in Foch, England. But it would not be wise to tell them that because he might say they were 'showing' ammunition in England. These thousand men were working in the aircraft factories, the Fishermen's Bond, and from January 1 until a plane a day would be turned out there. This country could not be run by dictators."

A YOUNG MENZIES

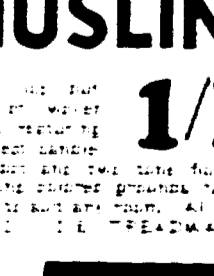
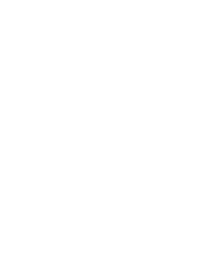
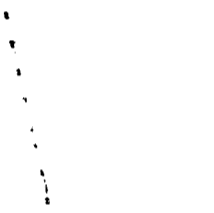

A TRIP TO COLOMBO Northcote Man's Impressions

By L. Ruxton, Northcote. (yours truly, with white suit and the disconcerting at Colombo, cork hat) or "American Gentleman" feelings are somewhat, shall I say unbecomingly, for when you land on the little pier from the launch you are puzzled to know you are in the tropics. It is not until you see beautiful terraces like paddy (rice) fields being worked. There are miles and miles of them, the preparation of which consists of an island of mud, 18 in. deep, being churned over and over again by pairs of buffaloes and a sort of wooden hoe, each so-called "Kandy" being treated separately. On other paddy fields are to be seen native girls in bright hued clothes, wedding. The scene was quite a picturesque one, with the sun shining brightly. The scenery in the mountains on the way up was beautiful, and one wonders how human ingenuity could have overcome the difficulties.

The Kandy train is invaded by hotel guests, similar to our lodge on the hotel, and are interesting, even if they do smell rather stinky. Thousands of natives, intermingled with the rickshaws, bull wagons and rickshaws, running alongside your rickshaw and offering for sale their flowers, cigarette cases, cheap jewelry, clothing, etc. and every conceivable article that could be carried, including the "good master" to buy. The more back-slash you display, the larger naturally becomes your following. That is but human.

Shave Island is another native quarter about a quarter of a mile west of Colombo. The island was named, I understand, because the Dutch used to keep the enslaved on it as slaves.

Another trip worth while is to where the Kandy Kings reside. The Kandy Kings have a rather peculiar appearance, with their shaven heads, long yellow hair, and begging bowls under the arm. These priests solicit alms from the houses, and there is no necessity for Kandy priests to follow such a course as they are supported by the rent from the sacred grounds. It is stated that the last Kandy King used to have condemned criminals placed on sharp pointed stakes and watch them die.

Motoring is much cheaper in Ceylon. A party of four can go on a two days' trip of 100 miles for 100 rupees, which is about 17/6 per car mile. At Habarana, we put up at a hotel. These are provided all over Ceylon, about every 20 miles apart, and are under constant supervision. In these places you are always certain of accommodation, but are not allowed to stop more than 24 hours in each. If you call for lunch the hotel will tell you it will be ready in 20 minutes. Usually two bowls are brought and mottled, and your lunch is ready in time.

In the Palanayakara district is the King's Palace, containing 1,000 rooms. This was the home of King Tapasirama and his 200 wives. The palace and temple are over 1,000 years old, and are seven stories high. A visit was also paid to Yalamunan and King and King Yacabaya's temple. The Buddha in this temple is 27 ft high. Then there is the Rock Temple, cut out of solid rock, the reclining Buddha is 11 ft long and as perfect as the day it was carved. The standing Buddha is 27 ft high, and the sitting one 12 ft.

The next place of call was Kandy, another beautiful city, and a beautiful view, which was built by the local queen. In the city of Kandy, it is said that only one of the 100,000 inhabitants has a car, and as a result of this, the roads are very clean. We then returned to Colombo, and the oldest and largest cathedral in Ceylon, with 1,000 seats, at water side.

The next place of interest is the Galle, some three miles from Kandy. It was a beautiful and historic city, with the Galle River at your feet, with its many bridges, and the Galle Fort, which is a very interesting sight. 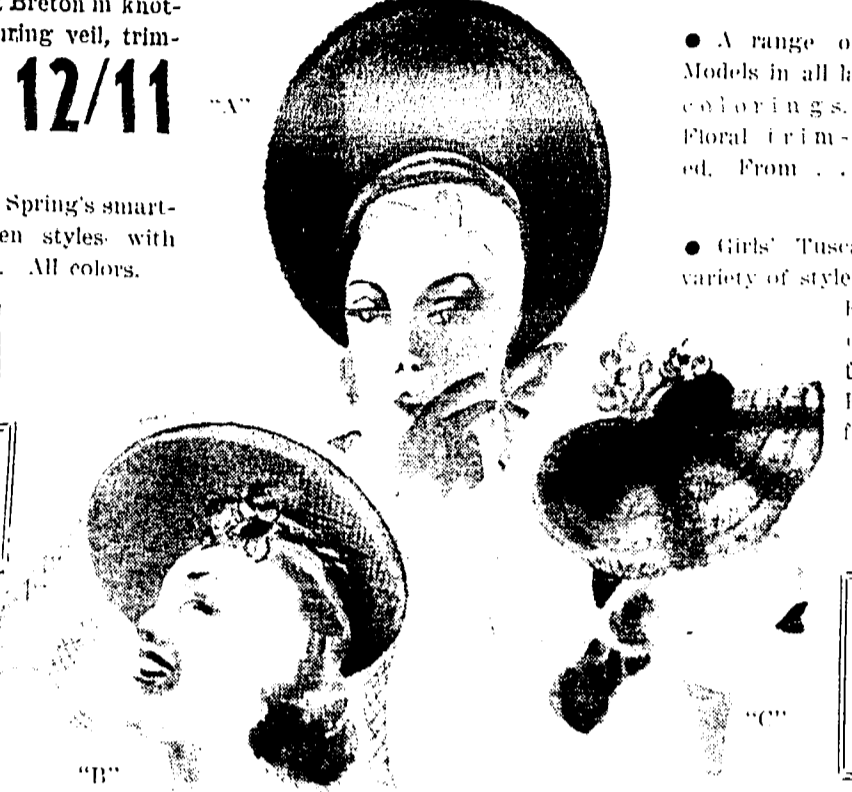

ARE TRAMWAY EMPLOYEES BOUND BY REGULATIONS?

Sir—Are tramway employees supposed to observe such regulations as would be a danger or menace to passengers on the High St. cable tram route? I have followed the line of argument which appeared in the "Budget" some months ago relative to the discussty or otherwise of both conductors and gripmen, and it would appear from what I saw recently as if some of these men are bound by convention or regulation from which they dare not depart, or behind which they shelter. Council . . . Jottings

The following items were among the business discussed at the meeting of the Northcote City Council last week:

West Ward Progress Association, re fencing of an easement from Zimmings St to Beconsfield Pde, asking how this had come about. — To be informed that the council had owned the land, and had sold it, feeling that it was the best interests of the residents of that locality that the land be enclosed.

The West Ward Progress Association also wrote asking that it be prohibited the exercising of dogs in St. George's Reserve unless they are muzzled.—Cr. Turner said that this matter had been before the council a number of times.—Referred to Committee of the Council.

The West Ward Progress Association wrote asking the council, the traffic inspector be put into uniform, and quoting the experience of Prahran Council, that the uniform in no way hindered the traffic inspector in carrying out his duties.—Committee of the Council.

The council decided to write of £219/4/2 in current rates, 3/10d. arrears of rates, and £22/10/- for private crossings.—Cr. Jones said that portion of the large amount was due to reductions in valuations, and the loss to the council was not nearly as large as might be thought.

Cr. Bird voiced a complaint re unauthorised tipping of rubbish in Arthurton Rd near the Merry Creek. He thought that the owners of the land should be forced to fence it, as the rubbish lay all over the place, to the annoyance of near-by residents.—Finance Committee to obtain a report.

Cr. Findlay spoke of the outer ground on the south-western pitch on Mayer Park, which was very rough.

Cr. Bird said that apparently the ground had been driven over the ground whilst it was soft.

Cr. Jones said the engine had the matter in mind.

Cr. Meadon said he had inspected the park on the previous Sunday and had seen a lot of cars there, including two which were apparently racing.

Patriotic Funds

TRANSFER OF MONEY OVERSEAS
The opinion was expressed at the meeting of the Northcote City Council on September 16, (when the launching of an appeal for the victims of bombing in England was being discussed) that it was possible that the banks might be getting a "rake off" in the matter of exchange between England and Australia.
It is only fair to the banks to point out that there are no "exchange charges" by banks for the transmitting of patriotic funds overseas. The disparity between the amount available in Australia and the amount available in Great Britain after transfer is explained by the fact that the Australian £1 is worth only 16/- in English money.
The value of a country's currency in relation to that of other countries overseas, is governed largely by internal economic conditions. The Australian £1 for some years has been "pegged" in relation to the English £1, and by this the Australian primary producer exporting goods to England has benefited.

Federal Elections
MR. BRENNAN'S REDUCED MAJORITY FOR BATMAN
Although Mr. F. Brennan (Labor) retained the Batman seat in the Federal elections on Saturday last by a substantial majority of 10,672 on the figures available to Monday evening, Cr. A. Peters, the U.A.P. candidate, improved his figures on the 15th election which were: Brennan, 36,439; Peters 21,013.
Last Saturday's figures were: Brennan 33,735; Peters 22,062. The swing over in Batman has been typical of the majority of Victorian constituencies. It came as no surprise to Labor officials that Mr. Brennan's majority was so substantially reduced, because they had forecast that such would be the case.
If any personalities were included in during the campaign, it was not on the part of the two candidates. Both parties worked hard, but in the time at their disposal failed to cover the electorate as thoroughly as has been the case in former contests.
