STIMULATING INTEREST IN RECRUITING

Citizens' Committee Formed To Prosecute War Effort

To assist in promulgating a policy that Northcote can take a more active part in war work by stimulating an interest in recruiting for the A.I.F. by bringing more residents within the scope of the Volunteer Defence Corps and to give practical effect to their efforts, about 70 residents accepted the invitation of the Mayor (Cr. W. Oliver) to attend a meeting in the Town Hall on April 29.

GROWING DESIRE FOR SERVICE

THE Mayor, in opening the proceedings, said the meeting had been called in response to a request by Captain Clarke, Area Officer of 57A, that a committee should be formed in Northcote to assist on the lines set out above. Whilst a big proportion of the people of Australia were quite lethargic in their attitude to the part Australia should play in the war, there was a growing desire for an opportunity of service in the minds of the people generally. He had nothing constructive to put before them but he would welcome suggestions.

SHORTAGE OF RECRUITS

Captain Clark said that practically all present were doing war work of some sort, but those were not the people they were trying to get at. The quota of recruits for the A.I.F. from the 30 square miles between the river and the Merrimack was 250 men a month, but they were not getting 21 a month. The withdrawal that had taken place by Australian soldiers in the theatres of war was because of pressure of numbers of the enemy. Reinforcements were urgently needed.

OLD DIGGERS TO THE FORE

Mr. H. S. W. Marshall, president of the Northcote sub-branch R.S.S.A.I.L.A., said that so far as his organisation was concerned it was ready to do all in its power to make enlistment in the A.I.F. a success. It appeared as if the object of the meeting was for the purpose of

don't overseas. The State Emergency Council which was responsible for the Air Raids Precautions scheme was representative of all public utilities and was controlled locally by the Mayor and Councilors of the city. There were in Northcote 250 to 300 potential wardens. They wanted 600 wardens who would operate in a number of different ways.

FORMER RECRUITING METHODS

Mr. A. H. McNabb said he could not see how a great deal could be accomplished when they were asked to operate in three different ways. To his way of thinking there was nothing analogous between pushing recruiting for the A.I.F. and asking people to link up with the A.R.P. The objects were totally dissimilar. In the 1914-18 war recruiting had been handled by the State Recruiting Committee with their staffs operating from the headquarters of the Federal electorate and excellent results were obtained. There was more personal contact than at present, but if the meeting could concentrate as intended he had no doubt much good would be done.

SPIRIT OF SERVICE AND SACRIFICE

Captain Clark said there was a spirit in the community which had to be fostered. There were thousands of young men who were only too willing to give of their best if their obligations were pointed out to them. What was wanted throughout the whole community was a spirit of service and sacrifice.

MAKE RECRUITING ATTRACTIVE

Cr. Peters thought the services of the military mobilis units could be extended to the suburbs. If such a thing were done, a big demonstration could be held in Northcote. If some life were to be infused into the campaign he did not doubt recruits to the A.I.F. would be forthcoming.

MORE CO-ORDINATION NECESSARY

Cr. A. McAdam said he knew how the Mayor felt in the present position when so many men were prepared to give some practical assistance if only the avenues could be provided through which they could assist. Any committee formed to recruit men for the three services would only be a waste of time unless they could

wipe out many of the difficulties which were confronting them. Not 10 per cent. of the people of Australia comprehended the position as it really was. If the enlisted were desperate, it was not assisted by the attitude of the leaders of some of the parties and by the way things were being "messed up" at Canberra. Throughout Melbourne there were internal rumblings on the way matters were being carried out by the Federal Government. If only they could get a body of real men imbued with the idealism of Cr. Oliver they could not only win Northcote up but the Commonwealth also.

MEETING PLEDGES SUPPORT

Mr. Marshall moved the following resolution, which was seconded by Cr. Peters and carried unanimously—

All present form themselves into a committee for the purpose of aiding in this city recruiting for the A.I.F., the committee to have authority to act in the matter of recruiting for Volunteer Defence Corps and A.R.P.

Captain McGee, Area Officer 57B, said those who would join the Army, the Navy and the Air Force would be handing the citizens their freedom. As old soldiers they had been asking them to get recruits and they would use them. If the 2nd A.I.F. had gaps in their lines the men of the old A.I.F. would fill them. Providing a sufficient number of recruits were secured they would hand them back Australia untouched by any invader.

The following further resolution was agreed to—

That an executive committee of 17 persons, comprising four from the R.S.S.A.I.L.A., four from the Volunteer Defence Corps, four from the A.R.P. organisation and five from citizens be appointed to implement the work of the committee, the Mayor and Town Clerk (Mr. J. A. Thomson) to be members of the committee. Since the meeting the State Cabinet has decided, following representations from the Commonwealth Government, to appoint a State A.I.F. Recruiting Committee to conduct operations on similar lines to the Ed. L. B.

We can only hope that these sacrifices will not be made in vain, and that a grateful people will see that the Mothers of our national heroes are honored and protected.

But every mother has her difficulties to face. She has her burdens to carry and hide from the outside world. Mother is always there to smooth out all difficulties and to act as a guiding star and inspiration to those under her care and attention. Her's is an unselfish devotion which cannot be destroyed. A Mother's love is something mere words cannot describe. It is too deep, too holy, and too emotional, to probe. It is the foundation on which many careers are founded, but few wrecked.

Further Apple And Pear Prosecutions

DEFENDED CASE DISMISSED
IN a case against S. Slater, fruiterer, of High St., Thornbury, in the Preston Court on April 16, of having exposed fruit for sale on January 28 which contained codlin moth, officers of the Apple and Pear Board (estimated having taken possession of the infected fruit which on being found to contain 50 per cent. of codlin moth.

A DEFENDED CASE
Angelo Zino, fruiterer, of High St., Thornbury, was similarly charged. William Jones, an inspector of the Board, said he visited defendant's shop on January 28 when he saw pears infected with codlin moth. He spoke to Zino and his wife about the pears and they said they had purchased them from a transport driver from Shepparton for 1/- per case.

Cross-examined by Mr. A. E. O'Connor (for defendant) witness said the objects of the board were to get at the people who were purchasing rubbish. The fruit was against the glass in the window and also in a case. Witness did not touch the pears in the window. An experienced man would never have purchased them.

Martin McGlity, another board inspector, said he saw a row of pears in defendant's window and there was a dump inside containing others. He did not make an examination of the fruit, but could see their condition. Some were inclined to wither and others were very small. He never heard Zino say he had picked out the pears which were in the window from others. He would swear he saw Zino's assistant take the pears from the window.

William Alexander Bass said he inspected the fruit from Zino's at the Victoria Market and 50 per cent. was infected with codlin moth. Angelo Zino, the defendant, said he had purchased two cases of pears. He had looked through them before the inspectors came and the good ones he put in the window and the other case and a half he put under the counter to throw them out. When the inspectors came they asked him where he bought the pears in the window and he told them. He informed the inspectors he intended to dump the pears in the counter. The pears were not touched by the inspectors and nothing was said by them about having codlin moth. The pears were in the window when the inspectors left. No assistant of his took the pears from the window as stated by the inspectors. Neither did his assistant take the pears from under the window. Witness subsequently took the pears to the Victoria Market.

In reply to counsel for the prosecution witness said he had no time to put the had fruit in the yard before the inspectors came. The fruit in the window was not affected with codlin moth. Inspector Jones never said anything about seizing the fruit, and the evidence given by Jones and the other inspector could be heard by Ellen Zino, wife of defendant, said she could see no sign of codlin moth in the pears in the window. Inspectors Jones and McGlity would be telling untruths when they said they could see the cases under the counter when they came into the shop.

Mr. Hammond, P.M., said he was not satisfied beyond doubt and the information would be dismissed.
