WOMEN AND GIRL MOLESTED

MAN'S BEHAVIOUR IN BUS

THE behaviour of a man in one of the buses which ply between High Street and Fairfield led to the appearance of Fred White, 58, of Wakanui Street, Northcote, at the Northcote Court on May 27 when he was proceeded against on three charges of unlawful assault—one against a little girl and two against women.

Olive Hayes, married woman, of Trana St., Alphington, said that at about 5 p.m. on May 23 she was in a bus with her two daughters, travelling towards Victoria Rd in Bastings St from High St. A lady drew her attention to accused, and in consequence of something she saw him doing to her daughter, she pulled his hand away and smacked his face. Accused was sitting on a seat at the rear of the little girl, who was five years of age. Witness thought accused was intoxicated at the time. The girl complained to witness, who never spoke to accused. Accused murmured something which witness did not catch.

Jean Booth, a young married woman, of Station St., Fairfield, said she was on the same bus as the previous witness on the day in question. Accused, who was at the rear of the bus, touched her on the legs above the knee. She moved away from him. She saw accused do something to the little girl's clothes and she nodded to Mrs. Hayes.

Witness told Senior Detective Donnelly, who prosecuted, that she did not think a man who was in his sober senses would do those things. When accused touched her, his head was bent down, and he did not look up.

In reply to accused's solicitor, Mrs. Booth said that she did not want to attract attention by remonstrating with White.

Amelia Johnson, Victoria Rd, said she was a passenger on the same bus. Accused touched her clothes as she was leaving the bus at Victoria Rd. She said to him "Cut it out and keep your hands to yourself." White replied, but went up the road after he got off the bus, calling out something. White fell in the bus when he got in, and fell on top of the step when he was getting out. Witness told the bus driver what had occurred.

Walter Henry Gilmour, bus driver, of Auburn Ave., Northcote, said that he was the driver of the bus on which the incidents were alleged to have occurred. His attention was drawn to the actions of the man by several women. At Victoria Rd White fell forward on to a woman's lap. Witness gave him a push and he fell on the step of the bus. On the following day, witness saw accused and handed him over to the detectives. When the bus was drawing near Victoria Rd witness heard a woman say: "We should give

the old devil in charge." Accused had had a few drinks, but witness would not say that he was drunk.

Detective Thomas detailed a conversation he had with accused on May 24, in company with Constable Grundy at the Northcote police station. White said he had been working on the wharf the day previously, and that he had been on the Fairfield bus, and had got off at Victoria Rd. When witness told White it was alleged he had interfered with some women and a little girl, accused said "Did I?" but would say nothing further.

Giving evidence on oath, White said he was a stevedore and had had a lot of drink on May 23. He recalled going to an hotel in High St, but remembered absolutely nothing after that. He did not have any recollection of being on the bus or how he got home.

Under cross-examination by Senior Detective Donnelly, accused said he had no doubt what the women had said was correct. It was an utter impossibility for him to say what he had done after he got to, and left the hotel. According to what his wife told him, a state of drunkenness that she him home as he was so drunk.

Millie White, wife of accused, said that shortly after 5 o'clock on May 23 she saw her husband in Separation St. He was in such a state of drunkenness that she would not walk with him. He was staggering about and did not know where when she went up to him. When they tried to get him home, he collapsed on the road. His eyes were glazed, and he was too stupid to speak. With her son they carried him home. Her husband's clothes were in a bad state through having fallen over.

Accused admitted several convictions of many years back, including a sentence of three years and "the key" for indecent assault. Accused's counsel: 25 years is a long time ago. Senior Detective Donnelly: The public have to be protected. In convicting accused on each of the three charges, Mr. Hill P.M. said that he had taken into consideration that White appeared to be under the influence of liquor. Accused might not have been incapable of knowing what he was doing. If White had not had liquor, he would have sent him to prison without the option, but in the circumstances he would be fined £10 or three months' imprisonment on each of the three charges, with 10/ costs. Accused was allowed time to pay the fines at the rate of £1 per week after the payment of £5 had been made.

Activities of Northcote Branch W.E.A.

TWO CLASSES IN PROGRESS

There is an old saying that one is never too old to learn. For that reason the two popular adult classes being held at the Northcote Town Hall under the auspices of the University Extension Board and the management of the Northcote branch of the Workers' Educational Association, are designed to provide expert guidance and free discussion for the average man and woman.

There has never been a period in the history of the English speaking race so fraught with danger and unpleasant possibilities as the present. The course of 12 lectures which are being given by Mr. N. D. Harper M.A., Dip. Ed., on "The World at War" are provocatively interesting because they provide a background for the understanding of the changing phases of the war, and of the policies of the powers participating. Broad problems of strategy and economic issues are discussed and the lectures are accompanied by comment on significant developments from week to week. "The Problems of the Middle East" was chosen by Mr. Harper last Thursday for the third lecture, and this covered matters relating to Turkey, Egypt and Suez, Russia, the Balcans, Palestine, India, Iraq and Iran. The lecturer handled his subject in a masterly manner.

The other series of lectures is devoted to "The Highway of Music," the tutor being Mr. A. Wright Donnell. They are held every Monday night. The lectures are accompanied by musical illustrations and the opportunity is taken for the hearing and analysing from some point of view the music heard.

Cr. J. W. French is chairman and Miss Fletcher, secretary of the local committee, which is doing its best to inculcate in citizens the ideals of the organisation they represent.

FLASHES FROM HISTORY—3 IN ANCIENT CHINA

ANCIENT China was civilised many thousands of years before our era—and the art of printing was used there many years before Gutenberg and Caxton used it in Europe. THE Chinese were handicapped by the number of letters in their alphabet, it being based on picture writing. Thus if you wanted to express a house on paper you simply drew a picture of a house and so on. As time went on the drawings were modified into curious characters which seem to us to be made up of a series of crisscross lines.

A CHINESE compositor dealt with so many different letter pictures that he found it necessary to have one or more boys to assist him. The letters were kept in racks around the walk and the boys brought him the required ones.

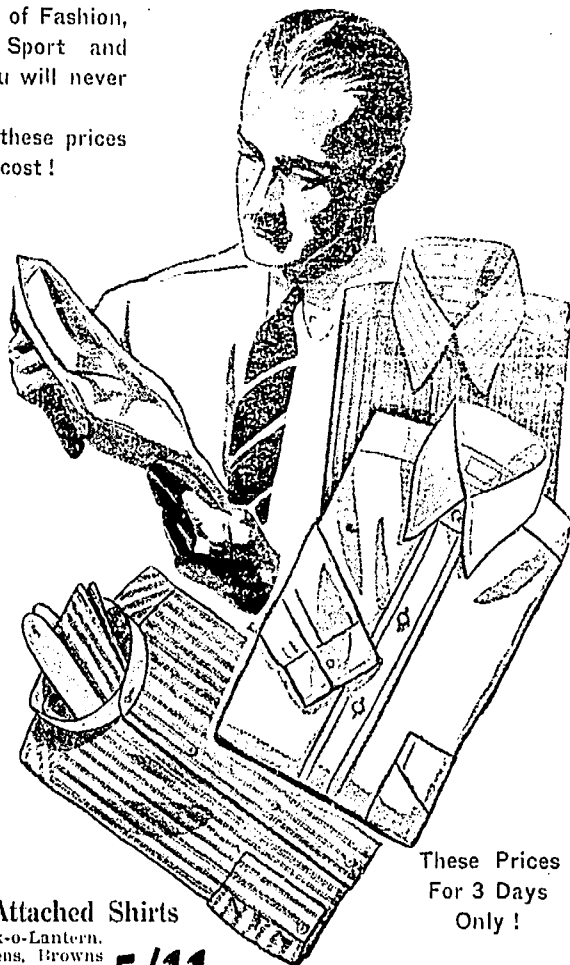
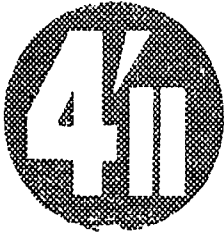

## REINFORCEMENTS FOR A. I. F.

DRIVE TO BE HELD IN NORTHCOOTE

The State Recruiting Committee and the Southern Command are faced with the problem of procuring a sufficient number of recruits as will keep the A.I.F. overseas up to strength and even provide a surplus. This is being found to be a much more difficult task to accomplish than was the case in the 1914-18 campaign when there was not the opportunity for eligible young men to link up with other arms of the service and be absorbed in the manufacture of armaments. How much further this extension of war industry will go it has not been definitely decided.

But it is certain that, with the return of the Prime Minister from abroad, it will be on a larger scale than hitherto. Mr. Menzies talked with Empire Statesmen, learned their plans and views, and having seen and heard so much, has already uttered a warning note that Australia must speed up her national efforts so that everything possible will be done against the combined savagery and science that daily presses nearer the shores of Australia.

Mr. Menzies is competent to give the lead to which it is anticipated the people will readily and confidently respond.

In the State have formed committees whose duty it is to assist in securing recruits for the A.I.F. and one has been established in Northcoote. The young men of Northcoote expanded well when the call went out for help. But it is thought that there may be many more who would be prepared to fill the ranks of the A.I.F., which have been so severely depleted in the last few months—if they had a first-hand account of the gravity of the situation and the urgency of the need for reinforcements.

The recruiting drive and demonstration has been arranged to take place at the corner of Mitchell and High Sts. next Friday night. The Southern Command will provide a number of armaments for display purposes, together with two portable vans and loud speaker equipment. The State Recruiting Committee, in addition, will provide suitable speakers, a band, and a drum band will be included in the itinerary the same night.

The ranks of those interested in A.I.F. work and St. John Ambulance classes have not been closed by any means, and the Town Clerk, Mr. J. A. Thomson, will be pleased to supply any information to those whose services could be placed to the advantage of the community.

**APPEAL IS DISMISSED Demolition Of A House**

FIRST CASE OF ITS KIND IN NORTHCOTE

An appeal—the first of its kind—has been heard in Northcote—against the demolition of a house. The appeal was heard by Mr. Justice Gavan Duffy. A resolution was carried at the presentation to the executive at Howey Court requesting that when speakers are addressing monthly meetings in the city, they should not be deterred from asking for further information of the construction of such addresses.

Control of oil supplies was vital to Britain in a direct connection from coal to oil burning. In 1917 the British fleet was entirely without fuel for days and so was immobilised at Scapa Flow. Since then she has sought to build up a reserve of oil supplies and now possesses controlled more than 60 per cent. of world supplies.

Germany was deficient in supplies of natural gas distinct from synthetic fuel and so was driving towards the Middle East and attempting to exert pressure on Russia to obtain greater supplies from the Caucasian fields. Despite conditions which were still unable to draw sufficient oil from Romania and Russia to fight a long war the new oil supplies were available to Europe by practical means of land transport awaiting further articulation of adequate supply of oil for a modern war of any extended duration. Free access to oil and home supplies was essential to the successful prosecution of a long war by any belligerent.

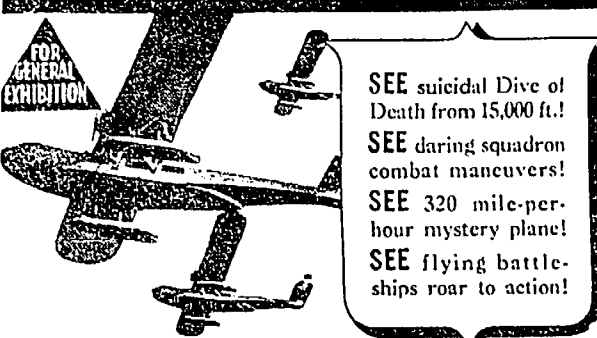

**STIMULATING INTEREST IN RECRUITING**  
**More Northcote Demonstrations**

**MEMBERS OF THE Northcote Recruiting Committee met** Captain Frawley, secretary of the State Recruiting Committee, at a conference at the Town Hall on Wednesday evening last to discuss how best the recruiting campaign for men for the A.I.F. could be prosecuted with satisfactory results in the city.

Mr. C. C. McAdam occupied the chair in the absence of the Mayor (Mr. W. Oliver) through illness, and gave an address on the subject of "The Recruiting Campaign." He pointed out that the State Recruiting Committee had a wide area of responsibility, and that it was essential that the Northcote Recruiting Committee should be able to supply the men of the A.I.F. who were serving abroad.

The secretary of the local committee (Mr. J. A. Thomson) reported on the recent recruiting demonstration which was held in Northcote and said the arrangements had been carried out very satisfactorily. Whether the display had been the means of bringing about any enlistments it was not possible to say but the requests made to it reasonably do what lay within its power. It had been decided to hold three meetings on the night of the demonstration but it had not been possible to bring them off owing to the heavy rain. The visitors who participated had been entertained prior to leaving Northcote.

It was decided to forward letters of thanks to Messrs. Hexter and Eddy, and Freeman and the Northcote City Band for assistance rendered.

Captain Frawley said the matter of getting the recruits necessary to keep up the strength of the A.I.F. was a problem due, no doubt to the reason that the R.A.A.F. was getting far beyond its quota of recruits. The additional recruits were being obtained by the R.A.A.F. in a number of ways, but the most important was the enlistment of men in the R.A.A.F. who were engaged in munition work or were in reserved occupations.

Many people said that the fastest way to get over the difficulty was by conscription. That is, to take some years ago had proved that the people did not want it. It was something that had been put into operation by the A.I.F. powers.

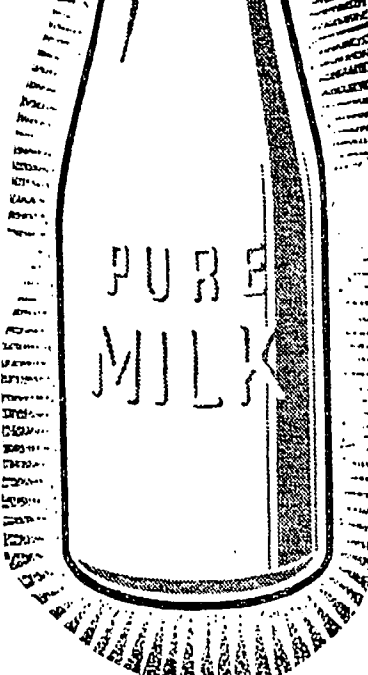
