## EXPANDING WAR SAVINGS CERTIFICATE CAMPAIGN HOUSE TO HOUSE COLLECTION FAVORED

AN intimation made at the meeting of the Northcote War Loan and War Savings Certificates Committee on July 30 placed Northcote in a very favorable light. It was to the effect that since March, 1940 (when the certificates were first put on the market) the face value of the sales to July 22 amounted to £62,222. This was arrived at from figures sent in by Northcote banks and post offices.

This figure taken in conjunction with War Loan investments (the amount of which has not been revealed but must be considerable) indicates that Northcote has not been forgetful of the nation's needs. Perhaps later, aggregate sales in other suburbs may be obtained and a comparison made to see just what Northcote has done. Even if the above figures are enlightening, there is a feeling that the people of Northcote are quite capable of purchasing more and more certificates to value of thousands of pounds, and if the energy being put into the local campaign brings commensurate results, the amounts will be swollen considerably. There is no better form of investment for those parents within the scope of the Child Endowment operations than War Savings certificates for their children.

## Conveniences In High St. FINANCE THE STUMBLING BLOCK

Cr. A. C. Bird and W. E. Findlay, who attended the meeting of the West Ward Progress Association on July 29, told members, following a communication from Mrs. Muriel Saunders, secretary of the Northcote Branch of the Housewives' Assn soliciting support for the erection of ladies' conveniences in High St., the letter stating that it was time something was done immediately that the Council was quite sympathetic to the request, but it was a question of finance. The provision of such conveniences would not only mean the erection of a suitable building, but the employment of two assistants as well.

Cr. Findlay said that the Council had had plans drawn for the erection of such a convenience at the corner of High St and Deaver's Rd. But finance was the whole trouble. Money would have to be borrowed for the purpose, and arrangements were being made regular duty if the plan was to fully succeed.

Mrs. S. Dennis expressed the opinion that the churches should be approached and given blocks for their supporters to take in hand.

The Revs. Davey and Jones were confident that the church people would do their share in the proposed work. They both approved of the street collecting scheme as advocated.

The Town Clerk pointed out that the block plan had been prepared for submission to a later meeting called to advance the Red Cross and Comforts Funds Appeals.

Mrs. Dennis feared the plans might conflict, but hoped those interested in either effort would adopt a broad view as each was equally important.

The Council was facing a huge increase in expenditure. He did not believe in continuing to borrow money until such time as the whole of the revenue would be required to meet sinking fund and interest. When the money was available, the matter would receive every consideration.

The President (Mr. T. J. McMahon) said it was not reasonable to expect the Council to waste public money on conveniences which were destroyed. He appreciated the position the Council was in.

It was decided to inform the Housewives' Assn that owing to the financial stringency, it would not be considered wise to expect the Council to do anything at present.

## BULLEN'S DRAIN

### ITS DISGRACEFUL CONDITION

Allegations that Bullen's Drain south of Woolton Ave, had been in a disgraceful state from which it was possible an outbreak of diphtheria might occur, were made at the meeting of the West Ward Progress Association on July 29. It was stated that long-dead cats and dogs had been in the drain, which was a menace to health in its present condition.

Cr. A. C. Bird pointed out that the locality might be regarded as a "plague spot." It had become a "hardy annual," Mr. Jessop (chairman of the Board of Works) had inspected the drain, and had agreed that the covering of the drain was to be the next job carried out in Northcote after the Merri Creek. But the Government departments had received instructions to cut their expenditure to a minimum. Costs in all directions were rising quickly, and in support of this he could point out that it was costing the Northcote City Council at the rate of £700 a year for the payroll tax for Child Endowment.

Satisfaction was expressed at Cr. Bird's statement; but dissatisfaction at the state of the drain.

## COUNCIL CONCERNED OVER CONDITION OF HIGH STREET ROAD DETERIORATING RAPIDLY

Addressing members of the Northcote City Council on July 28 Cr. M. C. Jones said he was greatly concerned about the condition of the roadway in High St, and he thought the view should be taken that the Country Roads Board should take over the responsibility of maintaining the road, which served a large tract of country. He felt that the best interests of the Council would be served if such a course were adopted. He moved, and Cr. Glanfield seconded a motion that the matter be referred to the Public Works Committee.

Cr. H. Shewan said it had been brought under his notice by people living outside of the municipality that there had been a great deterioration in the roadway since the introduction of the double-decker buses, especially at the sides, which were by no means as good a condition as formerly.

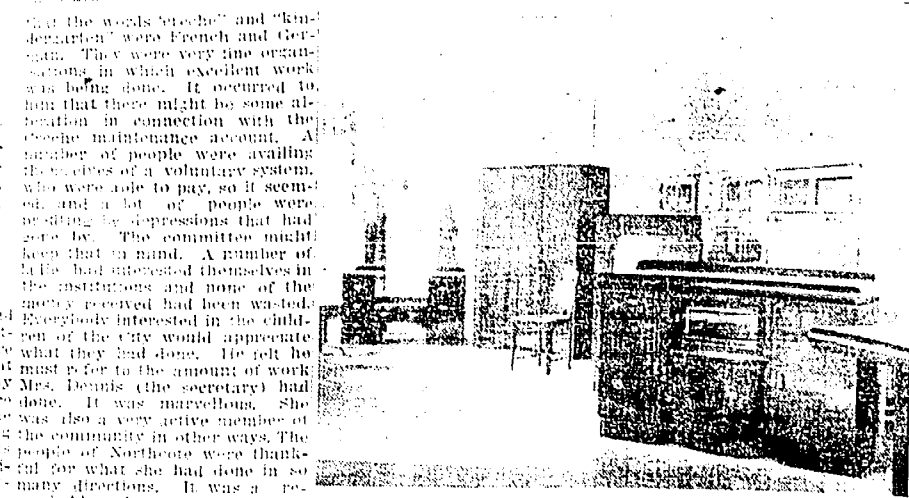

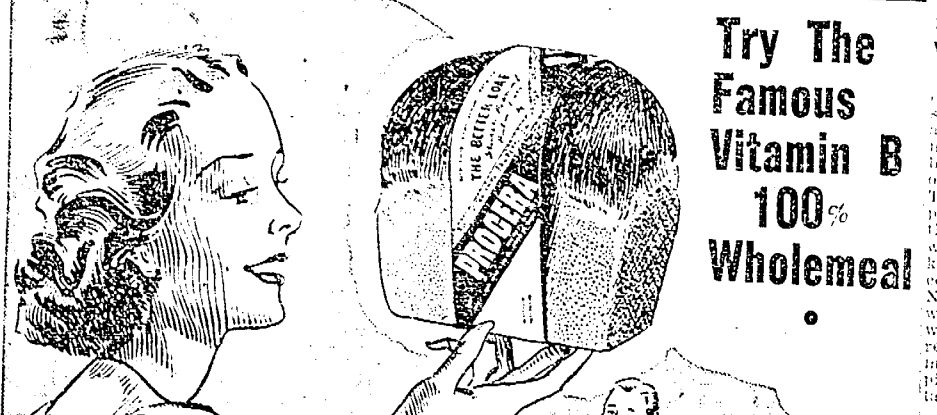

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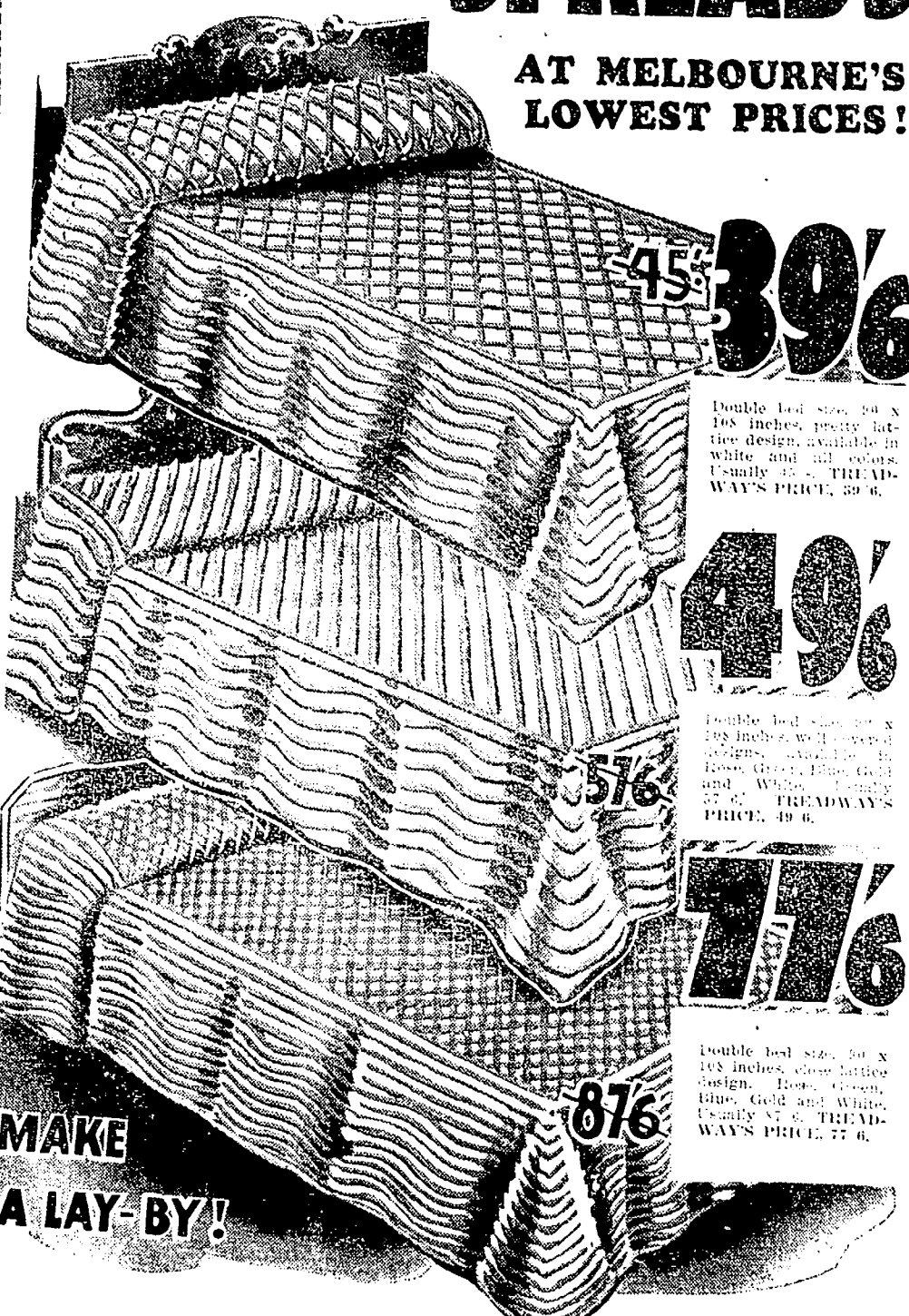

### CRUELTY TO ANIMALS

#### Man's Callous Treatment Of Horses

The charge preferred against George B. Johnson, Mansfield St., Thornbury, in the Preston Court on August 6 was that he failed to provide proper and sufficient food, drink and shelter for six horses at Preston on or between July 3 and 11.

Joseph Willmott, Inspector for the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, said that on July 11 he visited a paddock in High St. owned by J. H. Hutton and saw six horses—four hacks and two draughts—which were in an emaciated condition. One of the hacks in particular showed the signs of a low condition. The draughts were in a low condition. The appearance and behaviour of the animals suggested the want of food and water. In the paddock there was no food or water, and no sign of any having been there. There was no shelter apart from a few open trees, and the allotment was muddy.

Continuing, witness said he saw Johnson at a timber yard in Preston. Defendant said he had brought the animals from the country and as he knew they had no food, he took them out on to a railway property each night for half an hour for exercise and to prevent them from getting too fat. He said that he had taken them to Nolan's property at Ettham. It had been impossible to find Nolan's road, and the ranger said he had horses being brought to the district. Witness saw signs of straw on the paddock, but he never saw any in the paddock.

Mr. Hammond P.M.: What was the condition of the horses? Witness: Their condition was consistent with not having enough food.

First Const. Dunson said he had visited the paddock on several occasions but not in any one instance had he seen any of the horses. She went to work temporarily before they parted and he had told her she could place herself about the matter. On July 19 she returned at about 4 o'clock in the morning. On the following afternoon she found he had gone. He did not return until 6 o'clock the following morning. This had been going on ever since that time. She found him at a place in Nicholson St., Abbotsford. He said he would not give her any money, and had no intention of going back to her. When defendant had been employed at the Commonwealth Aircraft factory his wages were from £12 to £14 per week. Since leaving her, she understood he was earning £8/10 a week as a toolmaker.

In reply to Mr. Pyvis P.M. witness said that before her husband left the Northcote and Preston Court on August 8 as to his ability to pay arrears of maintenance amounting to £12/6 to his wife, sue Peter, of Northcote St., Northcote, Walter Francis Fisher, laborer, of Carlton, said he did not know what took to work when the order was made against him. He understood the order was to remain in operation for three months as he had been employed at Ballarat. He had been told that his wife would get the money part of the business slip if he gave her the furniture and kept away from the house. As a result of being knocked about by a car he had not been able to work for five weeks, and had been living the best way he could.

The bench found that defendant had the means to pay £8/5 and made an order for that amount, with £2/10/6 costs in weekly instalments of £1, 10/- default 14 days imprisonment.

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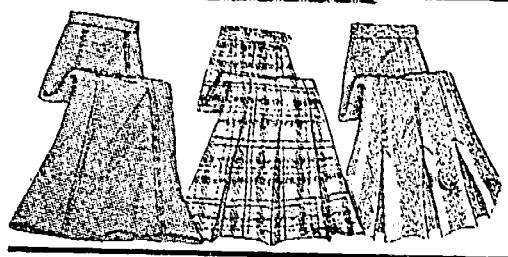

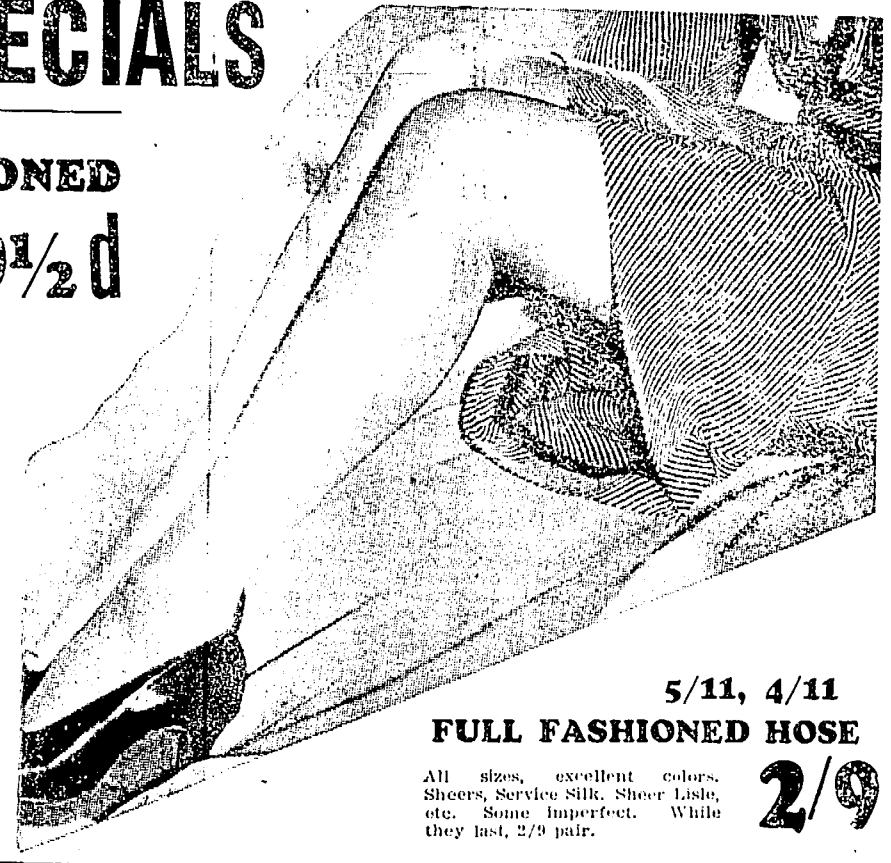
