## Air Raid Precautions Expansion

State Member Explains Situation

Before proceeding with his address at the Dispensary Hall last Sunday afternoon on the arrangements which had been made for the evacuation of children and a certain number of mothers—those of children of pre-school age—in the event of air raids, Mr. Creamean, M.L.A., Deputy Chairman of the Evacuation Committee, gave a short resume of what had been done up to a week or so previously in connection with air raid precautions.

The meeting was held under the auspices of the Thornbury branch A.L.P. and the president (Mr. J. J. Ryan) occupied the chair. Mr. J. Creamean, M.L.A., was present. Mr. Ryan expressed pleasure in introducing Mr. Creamean and said he was pleased to see the large number present. Mr. Creamean, in his capacity of Deputy Chairman of the Evacuation Committee, was a very busy man and had many calls on his services but he had kindly consented to explain the evacuation conditions. The position was serious and it behooved them to know where they stood.

Mr. Creamean said there were a number of problems connected with air raid precautions that it was impossible to pass over lightly. He had received statements from the general public which set out the position fairly. General precautionary methods had been adopted by an organization which had followed the State Emergency Council which up to the time it had been superseded had given much energy and time to the disastrous effects of air raids.

Every endeavor had been made to improve the position whilst at the same time setting up committees which would have executive powers—something the State Emergency Council did not possess. The position previously had been that if anything required attention it would have to go to the sub-committees which in turn would submit it to the Emergency Council which in turn would submit it to Premier, and if it was viewed favorably it would perhaps go to the Tender Board. This did not tend to expedite matters and the State Advisory Council suggested that some new get up was necessary.

Cabinet then decided to break up the State Emergency Council into committees with the Premier as chairman. Generally the new system had meant getting results probably after a long wait. He was not saying that all was done that was possible. It was impossible to bring about a perfect system as they did not know what the enemy would do and it was not possible to account for human vagaries. Ninety miles of trenches had been laid down in the State under the Government scheme at a cost of £90,000. With the Melbourne City Council various basements as air raid shelters had been established by the Shelters Committee on a 50/50 cost basis. A policy had been introduced which made it compulsory for employers who

## Two Women Convicted

ON SHOPLIFTING CHARGES

HIGH St., Northcote, was for some time the happy hunting ground for shoplifters from various suburbs. Owing to the vigilance of employers and their staffs, with the assistance of members of the C.I.B., who have tracked their quarry with skill and resource, the practice is not nearly so prevalent as formerly. Owing to the number of convictions recorded, and in some cases the salutary sentences which have been imposed, pilferers in the main are "shying clear" of the locality.

Lavinia Roberts, 56, married, of Clifton St., Richmond, and Alice O'Connell, 25, single, of Duke St., Kew, were charged at the Northcote Court on March 27 with stealing a man's cardigan to the value of £1.1 from the establishment of R. P. Tharratt Pty. Ltd., drapers of High St.

Senior Det. Donnelly prosecuted, and both accused were represented by counsel.

Eleanor May Tharratt said she knew the accused Roberts, and for some years she had been visiting the shop. She had never seen the accused O'Connell prior to March 2. At 12.35 p.m. on March 24 witness was in her office and saw accused Roberts of yards inside the shop. The accused was not very far from the front door, from which she observed she had a partner with her whom she did not know. The two women were near the men's wear counter, and witness drew attention of another employee to the fact that the accused were carrying a man's cardigan from the counter. The employee, Tobin, said he saw the women, and witness observed the women. Shortly afterwards witness saw Tobin coming into the shop by the front door. The older woman looked back in the direction of Tobin, who was going towards her. The other woman had left about half a minute before Roberts. Tobin went to the front of the shop, but witness did not see what became of her after that. There was not a man attendant at the men's wear counter at the time the women were there. It was lunch hour, and a full staff was not on duty. Witness did not observe the women buy anything.

To counsel for accused O'Connell, witness said she was within 20 yards of the front of the shop. The entrance to the shop was behind an island window. The woman who was with Roberts was approximately within 20 yards of witness. There were not many people about at the time. She had no mental picture of the woman who was with Roberts. Cross-examined by counsel for Roberts, witness said there were three separate entrances to the shop. Mrs. Roberts was a couple of yards inside the shop. John Anthony Tobin, salesman in the employ of R. P. Tharratt Pty. Ltd., said that at 12.15 a.m. on March 24 he was in the office upstairs. Mrs. Tharratt directed his attention to two women at the front of the men's wear counter. He had seen Roberts in the store on other occasions, but did not recollect having seen O'Connell previously. Men's cardigans were on the counter near the counter. O'Connell was carrying a case. He saw Roberts take a brown cardigan from the counter and put it into a case which was being held by O'Connell, who had the case against the counter. O'Connell went out of the shop and proceeded down High St. Roberts followed in a few seconds afterwards when he was hurrying through the shop. After looking about, Roberts followed O'Connell hurriedly. Witness followed the two women down the street and noticed

O'Connell very clearly. Both women appeared to be at the one counter. Tobin left her at the slit and went to another position from which he could see the women's hands better.

To Senior Det. Donnelly, witness said the light in the shop was almost the same as the light outside.

Man's Persistency Brings Fine Anzac Commemoration

Eloquent Address By Archbishop

A STRIKING CEREMONY

A striking Commemoration Service was held in the Northcote Town Hall on Sunday, April 26 at 2.15 under the auspices of the Mayor and councillors of the City, M.A., and Northcote Ministers' Fraternal.

The Mayor tendered a warm welcome to the Archbishop and thanked him for his attendance. He expressed the wish that he might live long to continue his good work and congratulated him on his appointment. He also intimated that the collection would be for the Distressed Diggers' Fund.

The speaker was introduced by the President of the Fraternal in a well-worded commendation. Right Rev. J. J. Booth thanked the Mayor and the President for the warm welcome accorded to him. Letters he had received and their good wishes were an encouragement to him in the great work to which he had been called. He outlined the causes of the war and the tragedy that the beauty of the universe should be marred by its horrors. Fear played an important part in encumbering war and greed to possess other lands and territories was also a dominant factor. The loss to the world in life and character and talents was deplored. The state of unpreparedness for the struggle of 1914 was portrayed and behind all the sacrifice was the idea of no more war. The old war, the landing at Gallipoli, the combats in France, the daring heroism of our troops were vividly described and full tribute paid to the other forces who fought the battle on the peninsula. Cold, heat and weariness were fought and the evacuation was a marvel of discipline and careful planning. A thrilling picture of the condition of England after Dunkirk was vividly painted and also the help sent to France. Every gun and every man available were sent. Great heights of expression were reached by the speaker in describing the fortitude, bravery and ability of the Air Force of Britain. The Pride of Race must pulse high in such performance. There was no wallowing in other thoughts than a community, stability and steadfastness in their hour of trial.

Then the Archbishop referred to the great work performed by Russian resistance to the enemy and he scathingly denounced the atrocious part played in Japan that while conferences were being held she stabbed our great ally, USA, in the back. We are assured he said of the assistance of this wonderful ally.

In conclusion references were made to the obligation imposed upon us to see that the races of the northern islands were amply repaid for the goods we receive from them. Eight million Australians with 1000 million of the races in the islands to the North. The issue undoubtedly would be a world where the building up of a people with ample vision and a world created where Christian virtues should prevail. He finished with the beautiful lines on the Shrine of Remembrance.

The address was listened to with great interest and all felt the power of the vivid description and aptly chosen words.

Prior to the address the National Anthem was rendered. This was followed by one minute's silence in memory of the fallen. The hymn "O God Our Help" was succeeded by a Memorial Prayer by Rev. E. E. Thornton, M.A. Next came the Lord's Prayer and the reading of Psalm 46 by Rev. A. E. Davey. "Abide With Me" was fervently rendered, succeeded by the chairman's remarks and an offertory for the Distressed Diggers' Fund. The hymns "O God of Love" and "Eternal Father" were most sympathetically sung and the Benediction and the "Last Post" concluded the ceremony.

The Northcote City Band acquitted themselves admirably in playing the accompaniments.
