MILITARY EXEMPTIONS DISCUSSED

Northcote Applications

MINISTER'S ASSURANCE

THE case in which Giuseppe Antonio Buradu, barman, a nationalised Italian, of Thornbury, had been prosecuted at the Northcote Court on June 5 for refusing to take the oath of enlistment (which had been adjourned by Mr. Pyvis, P.M., on an application by counsel for the defence, who took the view that because of the action of the Senate it was difficult to designate any court in which the application could be heard) came on for re-hearing on June 26.

As in a previous case the military authorities failed to produce certain proof which Mr. Pyvis, P.M., considered necessary. He said it might assist the military officers if he adjourned the case to enable them to secure more assistance. When he did announce an adjournment for 14 days, Mr. Pyvis said: "If you cannot get any legal assistance, you will have to do a lot of legal research."

LETTER TO MINISTER

Mr. Cahill, who was instructed by Mr. K. Cargill Rankin, for the defence, said that Mr. Rankin had sent the following letter to the Minister for the Army (Mr. Forde) in connection with the National Security (Conscientious Objectors) Statutory Rules:—

"I am acting for Giuseppe Antonio Buradu, of 814 High St., Northcote. My client was charged at the Northcote Court, of Petty Sessions on Friday, 5th inst. on the information of Capt. Marcus Albert Tower, Officer in Charge of Area 57A, Drill Hall, Raglan St., Preston, for that he did on the 12th ult. when the oath of enlistment set out in the schedule to the Defence Act was tendered to him, refuse to take same. My client in evidence explained that his reason for not taking this oath was that he did not believe in performing military service, and that he was a conscientious objector. It was intimated to the court on his behalf that had he taken the oath he would have been deprived of any right to apply to the court under Regulation 6 of the above Regulations to be enrolled as a conscientious objector. It was pointed out further that in view of the fact that the Senate had on April 29, 1942, disallowed Regulations 8, 9 and 10 of the said Regulations, grave doubts existed as to whether the magistrate had any power to hear the application at all. This was the opinion not only of the prosecuting officer, but of the magistrate himself (Mr. Pyvis P.M.).

In seeking to deprive applicants of any right of appeal against the decision of a police magistrate, the Senate, apparently unwittingly, has also destroyed the right of making application in the first instance to a police magistrate because it was from Regulation 10 that the police magistrate derived his powers to deal with such applications.

The magistrate adjourned the hearing of the application 21 days in the hope that some information could be placed before him at the adjourned hearing as to whether the regulations are to be amended or re-enacted so as to again confer jurisdiction upon him. I understand that many other applications by persons alleging objection to taking part in military service have also been adjourned for the same reasons. I would most strongly urge that something should be done as speedily as possible to clarify the situation, as the time of military officers, court officials and members of the legal profession is being wasted at present on fruitless attendances at courts and elsewhere, and applicants do not know their liability to serve in the armed forces or elsewhere. If the Government decided that conscientious objectors are not to have the right of appeal to a superior court by a re-enactment of Regulation 10, they should at least have the right of application to a police magistrate in the first instance.

At present they appear to have no rights at all. Another most unsatisfactory state of affairs is in connection with application to the court under Regulation 6 (5) of the National Security (Manpower) Regulations, Statutory Rules No. 34 of 1942. Provision is made in Regulation 6 (5) for a police magistrate to grant exemption from service in the Defence Forces to any persons upon whom or upon whose parents or dependents that magistrate is satisfied that the rendering of such service would impose great hardship.

At a meeting of metropolitan magistrates in Melbourne held recently it was decided by a majority of them that magistrates had no power to hear applications from persons who had already taken the oath of enlistment. As the oath is, as a matter of convenience, tendered to and taken by men at the time of their medical examination at the various drill halls, the position is that, on the view of the law taken by the police magistrates as set out above, no applicant has any right of being heard on a hardship application unless he makes his application prior to being medically examined or after that date only if he refuses to take the oath, which refusal lays him open to prosecution under the Defence Act. There are one or two magistrates in Melbourne who dissent from the view of the majority, but of course unless an applicant lives in the district in which such a magistrate has jurisdiction, he cannot have his case heard by him.

The result of the above position is that in many police courts in Melbourne hardship applications have to be adjourned from time to time to await clarification of the law, which so far has not been forthcoming. A simple amendment of the Regulations would be sufficient to indicate that the magistrate had the necessary power to deal with these applications. I might add, further, that at the same meeting of magistrates in Melbourne, it was decided that no exemptions would be given on the ground of "great hardship" unless the "great hardship" was shown to be of a personal and not of a financial nature, and that mere financial loss either of income or capital, no matter how heavy or hard it might press on the applicant or his family, would not of itself be a ground for exemption.

It is the view of many members of the legal profession that in any amending Manpower Regulations there should be set out the matters which magistrates should take into consideration when deciding whether a case of "great hardship" had been proved and that some account at any rate, should be taken of any heavy loss of income or capital (either pecuniary or in the shape of loss of assets of a business) in which applicants may be involved. The latter

Military Service The Fighting Forces

Position Of Men Called Up

Despite items which have appeared in the press from time to time recently about the introduction of amending legislation to permit those men who, having taken the oath of allegiance, desire to make application to a police magistrate sitting as a special tribunal, for exemption from military service, no action had been taken by the Federal Government up to the time this issue went to press. It has been brought under our notice, however, that the Commonwealth legal authorities have expressed the view that nothing having transpired on the lines mentioned, the cases pending will have to be proceeded with.

It has also been stated that once having taken the oath a man automatically becomes a military subject. Relative to this, a military officer has vouchsafed the information that he is not regarded as being in the military until he has been allotted to a certain area. In all cases where men are called up they have to submit themselves for medical examination, but it does not necessarily follow that they will be asked to take the oath of allegiance.

Conserving Waste

MUCH ROOM FOR IMPROVEMENT

At the meeting of the Northcote City Council on Monday, Cr. M. C. Jones said that in a recent newspaper article figures had been given concerning the collection and salvage of waste materials—15 per cent in Australia, 20 per cent in England; and 75 per cent in Germany. He felt that there was considerable room for improvement in collections here, and that more intensive efforts should be made to accelerate the collection of waste. He moved that the question be discussed by the Committee of the Council.

Cr. H. E. Ellis said that in Germany and England the density of population was such that it was more economic to make collections than in Australia, where the population was scattered. In Germany and England, waste was promptly sorted out before being collected. He added that people living in his vicinity had kept waste paper, expecting collectors to call for it, but none had come, and after a couple of months, had had difficulty in getting rid of their collections. Cr. J. C. Watson said that the collection required organisation. There were plenty of Boy Scouts who were seeking avenues to help the war effort, and he had no doubt they would co-operate to collect waste paper if the collectors were put on a proper basis. More deposits could be provided, and this would conserve transport.

Cr. W. E. Findlay said that if charitable organisations would be only too pleased to make monthly collections.

Cr. W. H. Turner said that the first decision of the paper must be taken into consideration. Some firms were coining money from this waste which they brought in, for a very low price, but the public could be assured that no one was benefiting unduly from the waste paper which was collected, he did not think the public would co-operate wholeheartedly.

The matter was referred to the Committee of the Council.

PAY AND PENSION RIGHTS

The Northcote City Council recently made representations to the Parliamentary representatives in regard to pay, pensions and repatriation for service men.

At the meeting of the council on Monday, a letter was received from Mr. Frank Brennan, M.H.R., stating "The rates of pay for members of the armed forces and pension allowances for their dependents. I agree that they are insufficient for their needs, and I will see that the representations of your Council are made to the proper authorities."

On the same subject, Senator C. H. Brand wrote that ex-service men of all parties had formed a committee to watch the interests of the fighting forces in regard to pensions and repatriation. The first success had been the appointment of a Parliamentary committee (all Democrats) to inquire into and report on repatriation. The letter added "Regarding pay, I agree that we must urge for an increase when Parliament re-assembles."

Senator Cameron wrote: "If an application is brought forward for reasonable increases, I will have my sympathetic consideration."

A letter was also received from Senator Keane promising consideration of the requests.

FLYING FORTRESSES IN ACTION

America's giant four-engine bomber, the Flying Fortress, has made a name for itself in the history of the Flying Fortresses to part in the surprising and devastating raid which blasted Japanese-occupied fields, docks and supply ships in the Philippines on April 23 and 24. The raid was made from a secret base in Australia.

It was a Flying Fortress which met General MacArthur's fleet at rendezvous on his dramatic dash from Luzon Island to Australia. These magnificent aircraft daily and nightly are flying deep into Axis-occupied and Axis-controlled territories in both hemispheres to release the captives of their bomb racks in munitions works, troop concentrations, bridges, shipping and fortifications. They are hammering the Japanese to the north of Australia.

The Fort has a galling of about seven miles—far above anti-aircraft fire.

If one of the crew fell out, he would explode and vanish completely. The plane would disintegrate and never be seen again, for as soon as the escape hatch was opened the atmospheric pressure would make the machine wobble and flip.

At 20,000 feet—just under six miles—and upwards, the air is so thin that a high speed plane is difficult to do quick turns and keep his gunights on a fixed object.

Pressure cabins have expedient the oxygen mask and enable occupants to breathe normally. Pressure is regulated by the pilot, fresh air being drawn in through the engine's compressor, and cool air blown out again through the tail of the machine.

INTER-AMERICAN EFFORT
Four main problems now face American and British strategists.

1. How to obtain a pressure cabin that will not explode if hit by a bullet.

2. How to arm stratosphere aircraft with guns to penetrate pressure cabins.

3. How to save the crew if they should be forced to bail out.

4. Bomb aiming through layers of clouds which often intervene between the world in stratosphere flying, and the "boos" in the form of high altitude poolies and research experience.

Crews of the Flying Fortresses are being drilled hard. Medical officers detailed to look after them have themselves flown in the stratosphere to observe conditions.

More than 20 per cent of people are unable to fly at this height.

TOLD TO BECOME UNCONSCIOUS
A tingling below the knee, and a feeling in the most common sensation and above 20,000 feet almost everyone has a stomach ache for a while. At 25,000 feet both ache at above 25,000 feet so crews go regularly to the toilet.

The men are given a count in pressure chambers, before they go in to the Fortresses. They can regulate their own oxygen supply and are told to let their bodies become unconscious a few seconds at least once so that they may realize it is nothing to be nervous about.

Special flying suits have to be worn. No amount of ordinary clothing will do the job and the crew would die if it were not for the suits. Foundation garments, warm sweaters and slippers are worn to retain as much body heat as possible.

Electrically-heated suits are put over the sweater, then parachute, flying helmet and other equipment. The suit is suspended as a radio or electric fire would be. Wrists and hands are kept warm in heated gloves, and feet in heated gaiters.

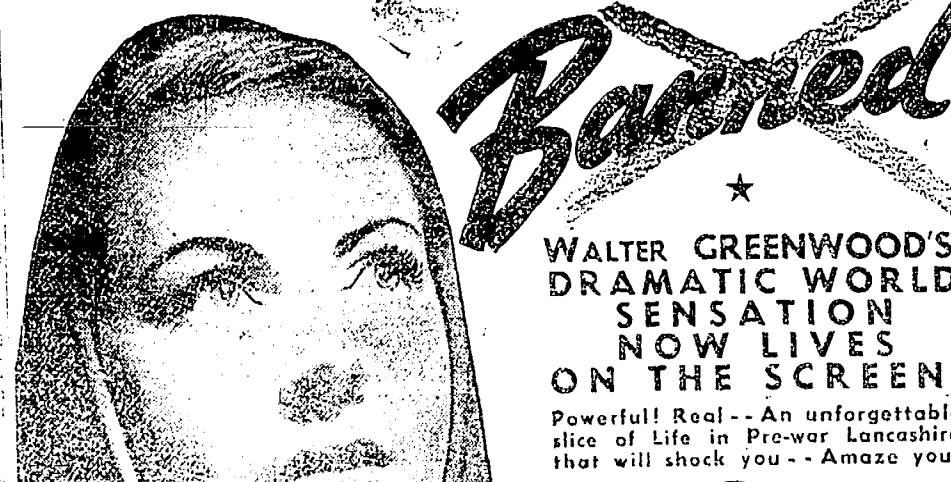

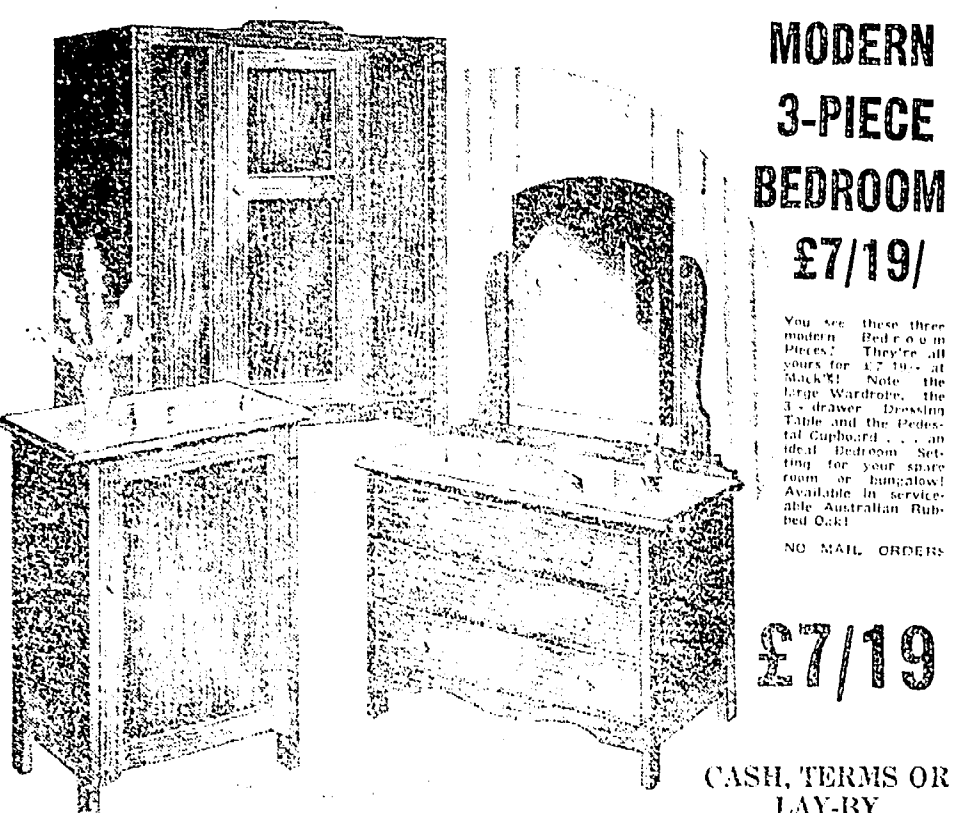

The school has a long history of excellence, and the principal expresses confidence that the future holds many more years of success for the school. He thanks the staff and the community for their support and cooperation.

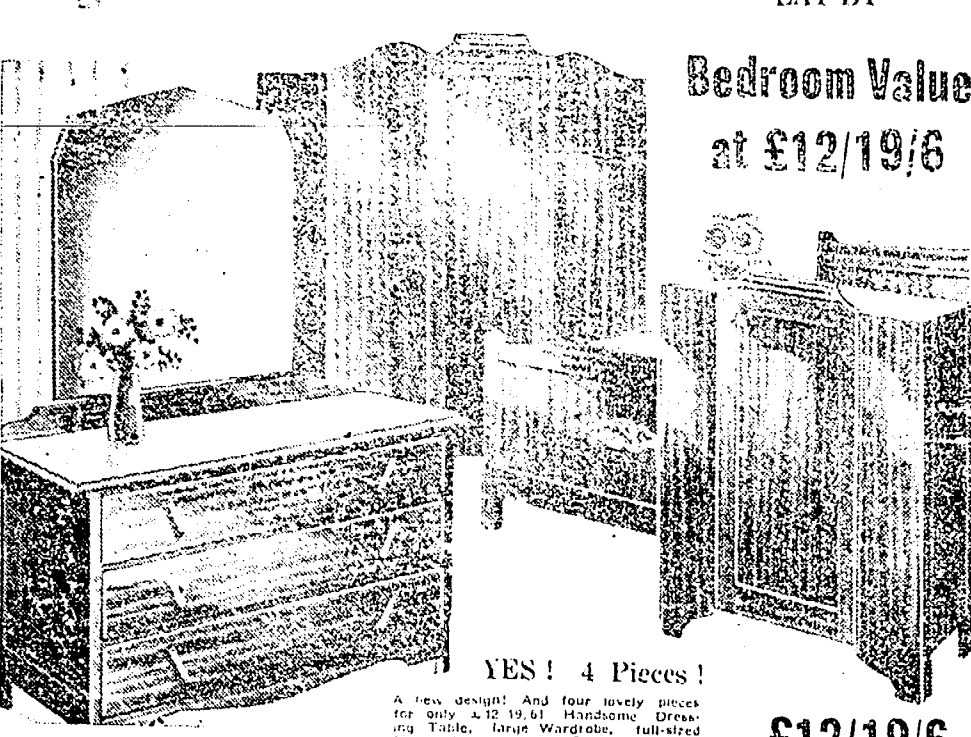
