New System Of Waste Paper Collection Installed

Saving Of Petrol And Manpower

A great deal of interest has been created almost overnight by the appearance of about 80 Waste Paper collection bins throughout the streets of the City of Northcote.

This development is the result of a progressive move by the Northcote City Council in agreeing to co-operate with the Victorian State Controller of Salvage and the Waste Paper collection authorities, with a view to endeavouring to reduce the amount of petrol and manpower needed for the collection of waste paper.

Munitions From Waste

Waste paper, of course, is used to a very large extent for the manufacture of cardboard. Well over 60 per cent. of cardboard production to-day goes to direct defence uses including the manufacture of component parts for munitions and for cartons and boxes for the packing of munitions, foodstuffs and equipment for the Armed Forces.

For instance, recently it took almost 1000 tons of waste paper to produce sufficient cardboard for the manufacture of one contract lot by the Defence Department for the manufacture of trench mortar bomb containers.

Old Books &c. Can Be Pulped

Every 300 cartridge contains a cardboard wad which can be re-manufactured from one used envelope.

The newspaper can be used to manufacture three 26 pounder shells.

20 old books when pulped will make one trench mortar bomb container.

Twenty breakfast cereal cartons will make one container for a three-pounder shell.

Even such small cartons as cigarette packets are most useful for pulping and are used in the manufacture of ammunition containers.

Citizens Can Help!

Collection of waste paper, which is a bulky product, is difficult and expensive. It is for this reason that a call has been made to the citizens of Northcote to help. Every householder is invited to bring to the shopping centres two or three times a week, old newspapers, magazines, letters, envelopes, and books are carried in their shopping bags and deposited in the nearest Waste Paper Bin.

Collection Can Be Increased

In England the Government have fixed a standard of one ton of waste paper per 1000 population per month as a reasonable figure for collections.

The collections in Australia average about 5 to 8 cwt.

Figures will be published regularly in this paper showing the progress of collections from Northcote bins.

Robbery Of Jewellery

Shop Window Smashed

BIG HAUL FROM WALKER'S

A young man was committed for trial at the Northcote Court on September 29 on a charge arising out of a smash and grab robbery at a jeweller's shop in High St., South Northcote. The value of the stolen goods was stated to be £45.

Donald Robert Homfray, of Sackville St., Collingwood, was charged before Mr. Pyrie P.M. and Messrs W. J. Holden and J. Ahern J.S.D., with breaking, entering and stealing from a jeweller's shop in High St.

William Walker, High St., Northcote, told the court he was a jeweller, and resided on premises behind his shop. On September 21 he securely locked his shop, but at 1 a.m. next morning he was awakened by a constable. He found the plate glass window in the front of the shop had been smashed, there being a hole about three feet square in it. There was a little broken glass inside, but most of it was outside.

A LARGE HAUL

Missing from the window was a large quantity of jewellery, etc., including 31 black opal necklets, 6 stone necklets, 11 brooches, 2 cameo brooches, 6 knife- bar brooches with assorted stones, 1 cultured pearl knife-bar brooch, one tray of gold lined brooches, one pad of dance rings, one pad of dance rings with colored stones, one chromium plated figure table lamp, 9 powder compacts, 1 case of fruit knives and forks and 1 aqua- marine necklet, the total value being £15.

Some of the jewellery recovered was produced in court. It comprised 31 painted oval brooches, 1 brooch, 21 colored stone rings and 1 powder compact. The value of the property recovered was about £5.

FINGERPRINTS LEAD TO ARREST

Const. de la Rue, official police photographer, gave evidence that on September 21, he made photographic copies of finger prints on a piece of glass handed to him, and these photographs were produced in court.

Senior Constable Martin of the Finger Print Bureau, Melbourne, told the court that on September 22 he made an examination of finger prints at Walker's shop. On a portion of the broken window he found fingerprints on both sides of the glass. These prints coincided with the finger prints of accused. Later Homfray was interviewed at Northcote detective office. He denied all knowledge of the crime and refused to make a statement.

Witness gave instructions for the photographing of finger prints found on the broken window and of Homfray's fingerprints. These photographs were produced in court, and witness from 23 years' experience in identification of fingerprints, was positive that the two sets were identical.

JEWELLERY FOUND

Detective H. J. Eerton of Northcote, gave evidence that at about 7.45 a.m. on September 23, with Constable A. Grundy, he interviewed accused at his residence at Sackville St., Collingwood. Accused denied all knowledge of the offence. Later, the jewellery produced in court was found, together with a large quantity of other jewellery. Homfray said it had been brought there, but added "You don't expect me to tell you by whom."

Later at the Northcote detective office Homfray alleged that two other persons had assisted in the offence, but he could not give any names.

On being shown the jewellery recovered and later produced in court, accused told witness it all belonged to Walker except the powder compact, which he thought "came from a place last night." Accused refused to make a statement.

Plainclothes Const. A. Grundy gave corroborative evidence. This concluded the case for the prosecution. Accused reserved his defence and was committed for trial at the Supreme Court, Melbourne, on October 10.

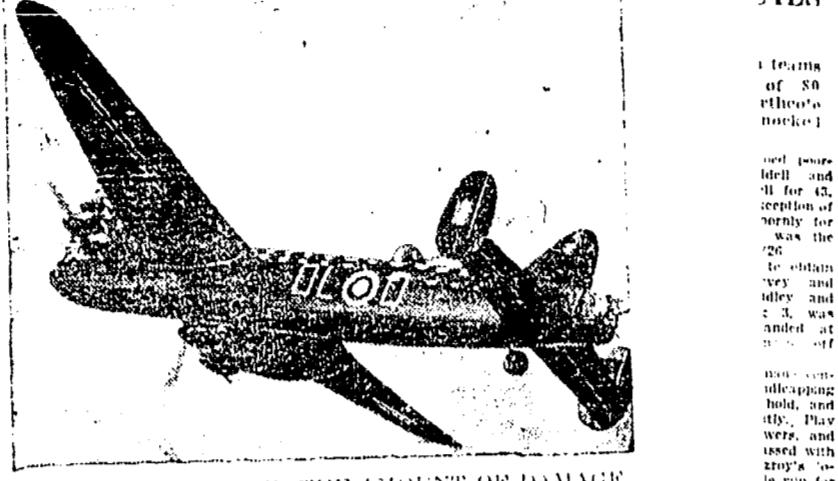
