Conspiracy To Evade Enlistment

Northcote Doctor Guilty: Remanded For Sentence

In the Criminal Court on November 26 afternoon of two hours jury returned a verdict of guilty against a doctor, a barman, and a winter laborer on charges of having conspired to aid persons liable to enlist in the Defence Forces to evade enlistment, and of having conspired for the unlawful purpose of obtaining a bribe for Dr. Loyal Alan Downes, a Commonwealth officer.

The accused were Dr. Loyal Alan Downes, 11, of High St., Northcote; Walter Nelms, 60, of Collingwood, barman; and Leslie Thomas Day, 31, Collingwood, winter laborer.

By direction of Mr. Justice Gavan Duffy the three accused were found not guilty on a charge of conspiracy to enable persons who were medically fit for service in the Defence Forces to be classified falsely as being medically unfit.

The trial lasted three days. The Crown alleged that on February 17 Downes was a captain in the A.A.M.C. He had the duty of examining men at Collingwood called up for military services. Dets. Burgoyne and Suttie, under the names of Bullock and Cattaeh, had become acquainted with Nelms, a barman, through frequenting an hotel near the area office at Collingwood.

On February 17, it was alleged, Burgoyne and Suttie told Nelms that they had received notices and asked whether he could do anything for them. Nelms said he knew someone at the area office, but it would cost £20. Later Day came to the hotel and said £10 each might be enough. At Day's suggestion Nelms wrote down the names of two men. Later Dr. Downes came to the hotel and was called over by Day, who said "These are the two men I was talking about."

Downes told the two detectives that he had a stomach ulcer, and the other called Burgoyne and clasped him as Al. Downes certified Burgoyne as unfit.

All the accused denied the charges. Unsworn statements were made from the dock by Downes and Nelms. Downes said that when the detectives took him to the police station he was questioned for four hours. He had no recollection of having made a statement. When he examined the Bull he told him he had a stomach ulcer. Accused asked Bullock if he had been X-rayed, and he replied that he had. Accused then altered Bullock's form to "medically unfit."

Accused were remanded for sentence.

CHRISTMAS GIFTS FOR FIGHTING SERVICES

Mayor's Fund Reaches Satisfactory Dimensions

A. Thomson) in making the funds as representative as possible.

Both the Mayor and Mayoress have expressed a sincere hope that peace will come during their year of office and that it will be a lasting one. This would be the signal for universal rejoicing, but it is almost too much to hope for although recent events have brought about a much stronger feeling of confidence in Victory than was the case six months ago. However whatever does happen Cr. and Mrs. Glanfield will know that they have done their best to make the lone men from Northcote who are fighting, the battles of the Empire for the retention of a glorious freedom and democracy a little happier. We join with the Mayor and Mayoress in hoping for a speedy termination of hostilities, and with them we lift our hats to the men from Northcote and every other corner of the British Empire who have hazarded their names on the scroll of fame, whose speedy return to their homes have rung throughout the world, and also to those men who have paid the supreme sacrifice.

New Tram Stops Criticised

A letter was received at the meeting of the West Ward Progress Association on November 21 from Mr. James Boulton, of Emmanuel St. a returned soldier, protesting against the elimination of the tram stop at Emmanuel. The rearrangement of the tram stops, wrote Mr. Boulton, had meant that he had lost five weeks' work and he was not in a position to keep losing time.

Mrs. Boulton, who was present at the meeting, said that her husband was suffering with paralysis and the excessive walking had a bad effect upon him. He had been compelled to follow his employment.

Mr. T. J. McInish said he had taken note of the tram stops in North Fitzroy which called for comment. Necesses had been established where the stops formerly were in some places, but there were now no recesses where the trams did stop. He thought a deputation from the Northcote City Council and the association should wait upon the Tramways Board stressing the disabilities under which residents were placed by the stops in the Croxton or Thornbury area.

The trams were driven faster to make up leeway, he said, but the depot were not concerned about the safety of the people. Five per cent of the conductresses had broken up under the strain. If the Board did make £1,000,000 last year it had not the right to place so many restrictions on the travelling public.

Mr. Dixon said the Board claimed to be saving electricity by the new arrangements, but it was peculiar that the trams stopped in front of the Merri Theatre only two car lengths from where they stopped again.

It was decided to seek further information on the matter, and in the event of no satisfaction being secured, it be left to the executive to make arrangements regarding a public meeting of protest.

The president (Mr. W. Cross) said that there should be a compulsory stop at Hutton St. instead of the "hall car" sign. Different people had expressed their protest against the cutting out of Emmanuel, Benvera Rd. and Emma St. stops.

We think it still a wise and necessary thing to joyfully celebrate the Season despite the War and its tribulations and sorrows—but use your sense of proportion!

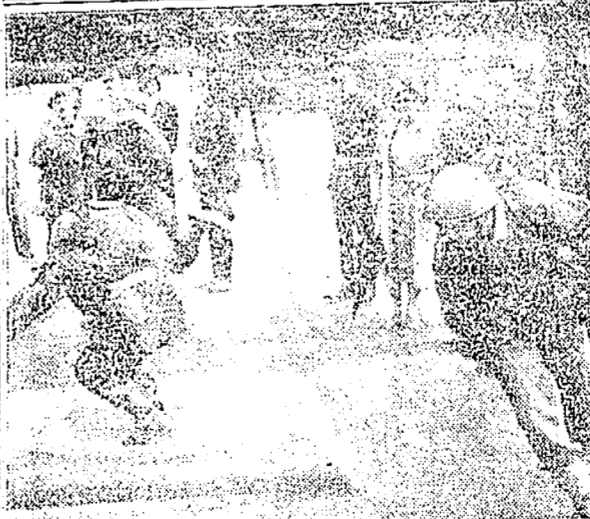
This year we must, as our Prime Minister asks, like a little more austere. Spend, yes, but not on the basis of peace time spending.

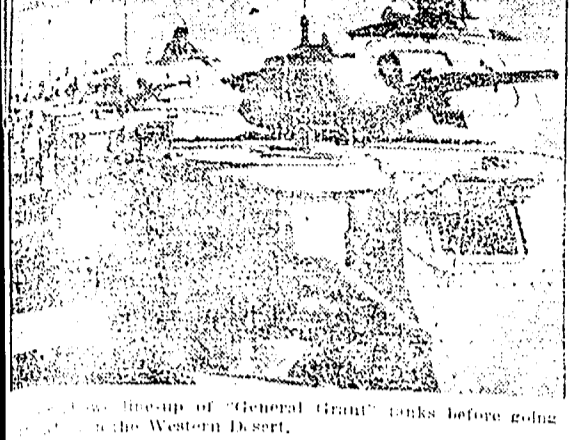
