"Hand-Over" Parade of A.T.C. Cadets

A Most Instructive Display

Coburg Oval was the scene of a unique occasion last Sunday, Feb. 28 when a "Hand Over Parade" was arranged. This spectacle was witnessed by many hundreds of people who were very impressed with the efficiency and grandeur of the afternoon.

Among the official party seated on the dais were Wing Commander Cato, Wing Commander Robertson, Director of A.T.C., the Mayor and Mayoress of Brunswick, Cr. and Mrs. Gough, and Messrs. Councillors and their wives from the districts of Brunswick, Coburg, Essendon, Footscray, Northcote, Preston and Heidelberg. The parade was in charge of Squadron-Leader Penny and Air-Marshall Flying Officer Miller.

At 3 p.m. the squadrons, consisting of 500 cadets, marched on to the oval and took up positions in front of the dais. The "National Anthem" was played and a general salute taken.

Wing Commander Cato, in an address expressed thanks to the council for the opportunity given to them of holding the parade on the Coburg Oval and in the presence of civic authorities. He told of the history of the A.T.C. and explained that in addition to the studies entailed in the course, these cadets developed morale, discipline and character so essential to the RAAF. The A.T.C. had commenced in districts south of the Yarra, but due to the enthusiasm of the municipalities of the northern municipalities it was found possible to form a squadron No. 6 at Essendon under the command of Squad-Leader Penny. Squadron 14 had followed and at Northcote was commanded by Squadron-Leader Bushby and Adjutant Walker. Owing to the number of cadets squadrons No. 102, commanded by Squad-Leader Bushby, covering Brunswick and Coburg, and Squadron 103, commanded by Squad-Leader Halliday, covering Preston and Heidelberg had to be formed. He hoped that soon a Brunswick squadron would be formed. He then officially handed over the squadron to the command of Squadron-Leader Bushby. To replace him at Northcote Squad-Leader Walker is now in charge with Flying Officer Ward as Adj.

A pleasant ceremony was the presentation of proficiency certificates to 28 cadets, ten of whom had passed in all subjects with more than 80 per cent marks and had earned distinction passes. Each cadet was vigorously applauded when presented with his certificate and congratulated by Group Capt. Robertson. Group Capt. Robertson said that the course of the A.T.C. was divided into four stages and the awarding of the proficiency certificates marked the completion of the first stage. He outlined the progress of the A.T.C. where in England, after two years of existence 250,000 youths between 16 and 18 years had been trained. There were now branches in Australia, New Zealand, Canada and in the British Dominions, including Gibraltar and Rhodesia. He paid a tribute to Cr. Gough and his fellow councillors for their help in the formation of No. 102 Squadron. The object of the A.T.C. was to train men, mentally physically and morally for the RAAF so that when called upon the cadet could capably handle any situation whether in an air crew or on a ground staff.

Wing Commander Cato, accompanied by Group Capt. Robertson and other RAAF personnel next inspected the parade, and then looked to the cadets as the three squadrons marched past.

Throughout the afternoon the squadrons were being judged and points allotted. For the best performance of the afternoon a flight of 6 Squadron was first, a flight of 14 Squadron second and B flight of 102 Squadron third. Very few points separated the squadrons.

The Mayor, after thanking the A.T.C. for their fine display, presented the cup to Squad-Leader Collins of No. 6 Squadron. The squadrons then left the ground accompanied by the massed bands.

The Brunswick City, Coburg City, West Coburg City and Coburg Central School bands are to be thanked for their assistance throughout the afternoon.

Northcote Constable Murdered

SHOT FIRED FROM TAXI

At 8.15 p.m. on Monday night Senior Constable Frederick Edward Jones, 46, of Robert St., Northcote, was shot dead from a taxicab. Const. Jones was standing at the corner of Church St. and Bridge Rd., Richmond, when the shot was fired.

George Costello, a taxi-driver, told the police that his cab was hired by a young man at the taxi depot at Richmond, the fare asking to be taken to Buckingham St. Here the young man entered a house. He was inside the house for about a quarter of an hour, and when he returned, he had a small rifle with him. Costello was told to drive to Church St. The route was altered several times on orders from the fare. The taxi slowed down near the intersection of Bridge Rd and Church St. and a shot was fired by the man through the window of the cab. The man had been drinking, but was not drunk.

Jones was hit on the side just below the shoulder. The bullet apparently struck the heart, as death was instantaneous.

Costello thought that the man was merely having a shot at something on a roof. The driver was then ordered to proceed to Kew. In Doncaster Rd the man threatened the driver with the rifle and told him to "crack on speed." The engine of the taxi started to give trouble, and the driver said he would have to get out and have a look at it. The fare also alighted and kept the rifle in his hand. Later Costello got back into the taxi, leaving the man behind, the man calling out "Take her away." Subsequently Costello heard another shot. He took a different route home, and informed the police at Birmley.

Det. V. Crowe and Det. G. Lagoni of Richmond and members of the wireless patrol, under Sgt. J. J. Murphy, went to a house in Buckingham St, where they ascertained that a young man had called earlier in the day and had left a small bore rifle, for which he returned about 8 p.m. While the detectives were at the house a young man passed along the street. The detectives recognised this man as similar in description to the man who had been in the taxi. They detained him and took him to Russell St. Inspector H. J. Carey is in charge of a squad of detectives who are handling the matter. Senior Const. Jones, who resided at Robert St, Northcote, had been in the police force for 19 years. For the past 7 months he has been stationed at Richmond. He leaves a widow and a young family.

Candidates For Forthcoming Elections

U.A.P. Uncertainty

With the decks rapidly being cleared for action for the forthcoming Federal and State elections, keen interest is being manifested in the pre-selection of the U.A.P. candidates, and after their pre-selection, whether Collins Street will endorse same. MELBOURNE NORTH PROVINCE

An intriguing position has arisen regarding UAP intentions for this seat. Persistent rumors, as yet unverified, have it that Sir Herbert Olney, M.L.C., will not again contest the seat, thus leaving the field to Mr. J. J. Ryan (Labor) and the as yet unnamed UAP candidate. Certain names are being bandied about, including those of several prominent Northcote councillors. Once again no confirmation can be obtained on whose shoulders the mantle of Sir Herbert Olney is expected to fall. Electors are keenly awaiting the announcements.

STOP PRESS

The Hon. Sir H. H. Olney, M.L.C., having intimated that he will not be contesting the forthcoming Legislative Council election, a meeting was held at the Northcote Town Hall on Friday, February 26 for the purpose of making arrangements for filling the vacancy. Representatives from all areas in the Province were present, and it was unanimously decided to seek a candidate in opposition to the endorsed Labor candidate. An Executive Committee of one representative from each area was formed, with Cr. M. C. Jones, of Northcote, as campaign chairman, and Cr. A. McAdam, of 3 Rucker 1/6.

A further meeting will be held at the end of March to select a candidate from recommendations made by the Executive Committee.

Northcote Pilot Presumed Dead

Official advice has been received by Mr. and Mrs. George Allan, 60 Arthurton Rd, Northcote, that their only son, Sgt. Pilot Reginald Allan, previously reported missing in air operations over France on July 20, 1942, is now presumed dead. Information received via German sources states that their son was buried at St. Marie cemetery, Havre, France. Sgt. Pilot Allan joined the RAAF in March, 1941. He received his Wings in Canada in December, 1941, and finished his training in England where he was later attached to a Spitfire Squadron. He served his apprenticeship with L. V. Howard, city, as a tailor's cutter. His only sister (Jessie, Mrs. Allan Poulton) resides in Ivanhoe.

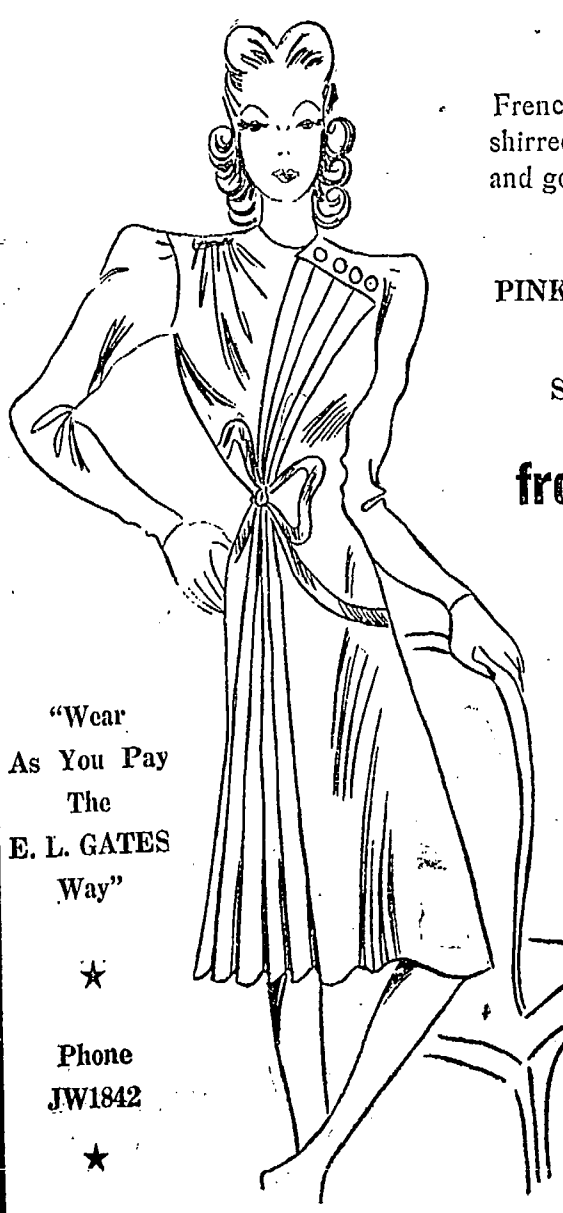

REGULATING PRICE OF MEAT

Customs Minister Acts

With a view to checking rising prices of meat, regulations were gazetted on February 26 deprecating all charges of nature connected with the importation of meat under the prices regulations. Making the order, Senator Keene, Customs Minister, said there was ample evidence of shortage of supplies, because of heavy demands for canning, dehydration, and fresh meats for the services and increased civil consumption on account of higher spending power in the hands of the public. Any further increases would have serious effect in increasing the cost of living upon which the basic wage index was determined.

Papua's £400 For War Effort

"We have collected some money—over one hundred pounds—we give it from the heart."

This is from a speech by Councillor Pike of the Papuan village of Ila. The collection was the result of one hundred pounds subscribed by the villagers to buy War Savings certificates.

Pike meant what he said. Papuan natives have been able to buy War Savings certificates for a little over three months but in that period they have spent £400 on them.

The whole thing is voluntary. There is not even a hint of coercion. The villagers collect the money among themselves and their headmen hand it over to the District Officer. When the certificates are available they give them to the village council for safe keeping. It is impossible to say how many individuals have helped subscribe the £400 so far invited by the Papuans. Many of the young men are away working at home, the old men and women. As Papuan village life is so communal it is likely that everybody, even the smallest children would own a share in the certificate.

In this way the Papuans have found a satisfactory method of disposing of their surplus money until the coming of peace brings once again an abundance of the trade goods they like to buy. This is more in it than this. In his little to fight. The white men fight with aeroplanes and big guns. We do not understand these things but we want to do something to help win the war."

All Meat Prices Pegged

FEDERAL ACTION

The Commonwealth Prices Commissioner (Prof. Copland) on Saturday fixed maximum prices for all classes of meat at prices operating on Friday, February 26.

"This should be regarded essentially as a pegging order," said Prof. Copland. "It will prevent any further increases in the price of meat, and will operate all over Australia."

Butchers are required to display in their shops on or before Wednesday, March 3, notices setting out the maximum prices for principal meat cuts, and must submit a certified copy of this notice to the Deputy Prices Commissioner in each State.

Maximum gross profit margins available to retailers will also be those operating on February 26. Should the wholesale price of any class of meat fall, operators must sell at a price not exceeding the wholesale price operating at the time, plus maximum gross profit margin obtaining on February 26.

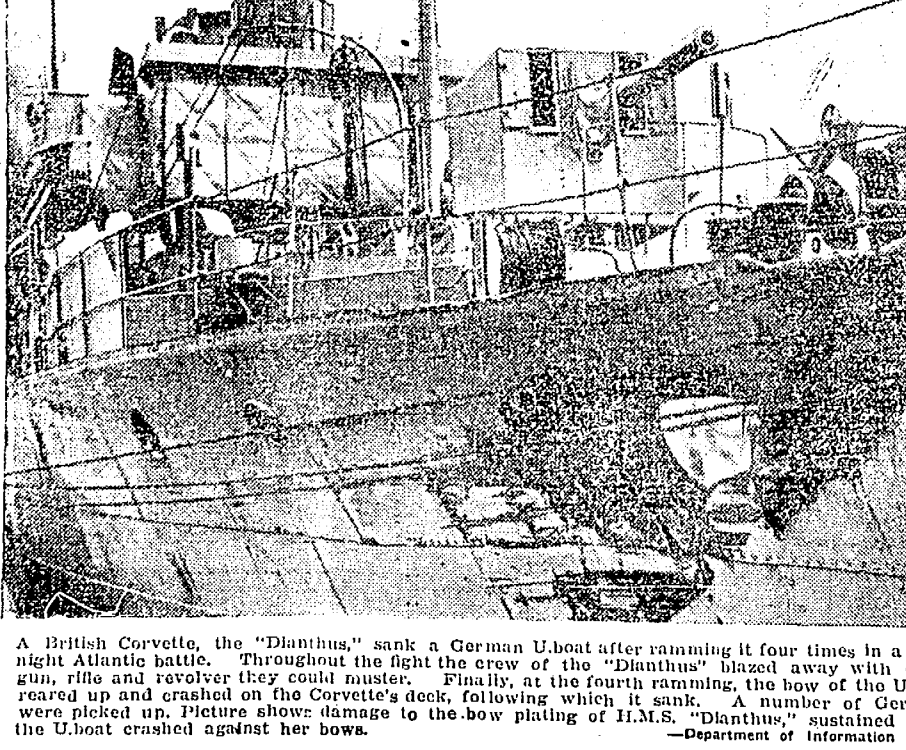
REFERENDUM SHOULD BE HELD

EXAMINING TYRES

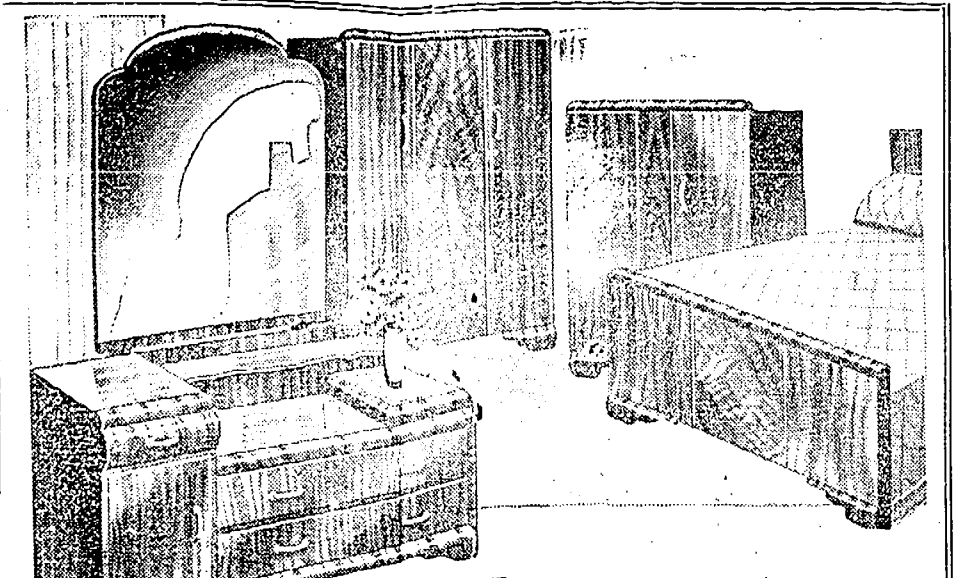

Scarcity Of Rubber Goods

Amongst the rubber goods that motor owners from now on will have increasing difficulty in obtaining are new fan belts, consequently every possible precaution should be taken to ensure that maximum life is obtained from those now in use. The "V" belt depends for its gripping action on bulging as it bends around the grooves of the pulleys over which it operates. If a "V" belt is too loose, the tendency is for the bulging action to force the belt to ride higher in the grooves, with a consequent loss of gripping action which results in slipping. This slipping produces friction which, in turn, causes heat on the sides of the belt, with the result that the construction of the belt is likely to break down and render the unit for further service. A loose belt can also grab suddenly in the pulley grooves, causing a snapping action that may result in the belt breaking.

Correct tension is one of the most important factors in the life of a fan belt. As a general rule, a deflection of the belt between the pulley of one-half to three-quarters of an inch will provide correct tension. The belt slightly light does not harm the belt, but it causes wear on the fan belt bearings, etc.

Dirt and grit on the belt or pulley grooves causes abrasive action, which should be guarded against. Oil and grease are also enemies of fan belts. They not only soften the rubber in the belt and make it flabby and lifeless, but cause a tendency to slip. Under existing conditions, every effort should be made by owners of motor vehicles to extend the life of fan belts, for they will be hard to replace, says the Dunlop Bulletin.

Mass Production Of Aircraft In U.S.

The mass production of aircraft for the war effort of the United Nations in U.S.A. alone is scheduled to build 12,000 planes this year—calls for a different technique to the mechanized conveyor system used by American and Britain's leading automobile manufacturers.

In the first place, the "Flying Fortress" bomber has a wing spread of more than 104ft. and a body some 70ft. long. To build such an aircraft on a conventional assembly line would entail a great waste of floor space. Instead of using the automotive method of assembly, a new production design system has been evolved and adopted by the Boeing Aircraft Co., which handles the production of the "Flying Fortress."

The Boeing system, which is a radical departure from past conceptions of quantity production, has resulted in tripling the output of planes from that huge plant since America entered the war. In the past, the production of these big bombers, seven distinct major assembly operations are involved, each of which builds a portion of a plane. For instance, the huge wings are built on end, in three-story jigs, subject to a hit to the floor and ground enough to accommodate crews of workers. Overhead cranes lift the completed wings out of the jigs. Being retarded the final assembly until the last possible moment and final assembly of the "Flying Fortress" is merely joining together of the several parts.

The Boeing system is a factory space is therefore used by completed aircraft. Boeing's design system of production is designed to be so fluid and simple that when, some months ago, alterations were made involving 400 design changes in the "Flying Fortress," there was no stoppage or slow-down of production.

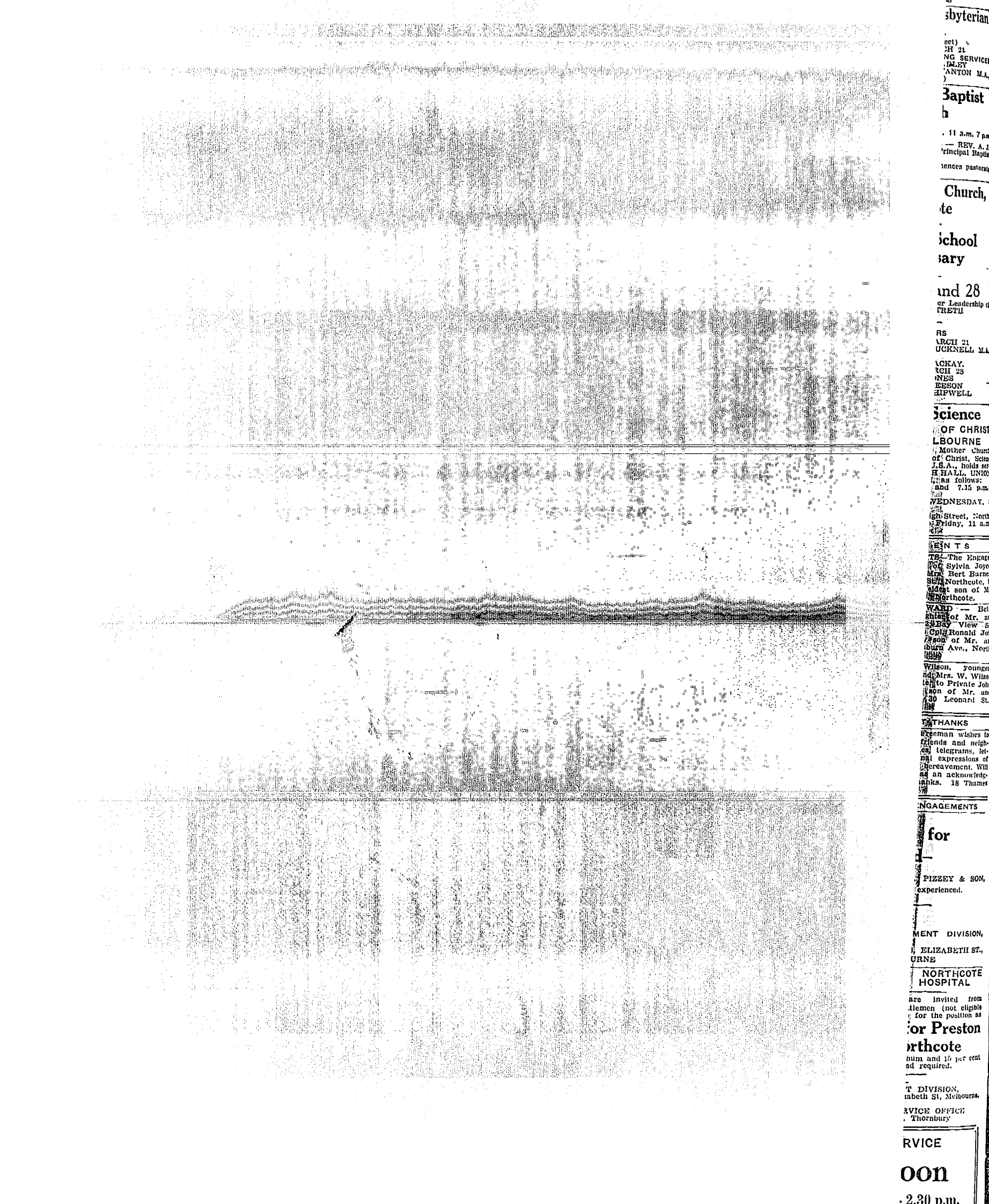

AIR LINER MAKES FORCED LANDING Three Persons Injured

When a Douglas Air Liner at about 6 a.m. on Friday made a forced landing about two miles from Melbourne, on its journey to Sydney and Brisbane the two pilots were injured but all the 12 passengers escaped unhurt. In addition to the pilots, the air hostess, Vena Vernon, 27, of St. Kilda, sustained lacerations to the thigh and a knee injury. Engine trouble caused the pilots to make a forced landing and the plane was in charge of Capt. Douglas B. Barker, 35, of Kew, who sustained severe head injuries and injuries to the thigh and ribs. First Officer Leonard H. Grant, 28, of Northmanby Ave., Thornbury, second pilot, sustained a compound fracture of the leg. Trying to make a landing because of engine trouble, the plane struck the ground, bounced over a fence, hit the ground again, and broke in half. Both engines were torn off and the two wings were buckled. Capt. Barker evidently brought his machine down to dodge high-tension wires. The two pilots were trapped in their seats in the cockpit, which was crushed into a mass of pulped wood and aluminium. They were pulled out of the wreckage by Army men who clambered out of the plane. A doctor passenger attended to the injured pilots before they were taken to hospital by ambulances from the aerodrome.

HOUSEHOLDERS ASKED TO ASSIST IN CLEAN-UP OF STREETS AND LANES
Council's Staff Greatly Depleted
HEALTH ASPECT MOST IMPORTANT

The Northcote City Council extends an urgent and cordial request to every householder to assist in keeping the City clean. Though, nominally, this "Drive" is scheduled for the month of April it is anticipated that the splendid results that will appertain will so awaken civic pride that the working bees formed will continue around the calendar.

The severe drain upon the Council's staff and the great depletion of manpower makes it apparent to all thinking citizens that, in the absence of a full staff of regular street cleaners, the next best thing is for residents to shoulder some of the work themselves.

An appeal to our civic pride in having Northcote streets and lanes as spic and span as our own gardens and back-yards is not new, however, the only consideration.

A clean City is invariably a healthy City and with the menace of secondary typhoid infection, which can arise from filth, dirt and stagnant water, etc.; the drive becomes a more serious and urgent matter for each and every one of us.

Do not, however, get the idea that the typhoid outbreak occasioned this "Keep the City Clean" Drive. The matter of the "Drive" was brought up in the Northcote Council by Cr. A. V. Peters, J.P., as early as February 8th (See Page 1 of our Budget issue of February 17) who proposed the campaign should be planned. Again on February 22, Cr. W. Turner (Chairman Public Works) presented a most comprehensive report from that committee plus their definite recommendation that our Councilors were fully seized with the importance of keeping Northcote clean well before typhoid reared its bestial head.

The reason for scheduling the "Drive" for April is that by the end of that month the worst of weed growth, etc. was over and tidiness of streets, lanes and channels could then be more easily maintained. Mutual co-operation from every householder was essential. By all doing our bit the aggregate result would be excellent and would easily achieve the desideratum — A CLEAN AND HEALTHY NORTHCOTE.

A Most Efficient Body

Northcote Gets Trailer Pump

At the request of Cr. M. G. Jones, the Northcote Fire Brigades Board has given certain information relating to the Auxiliary Fire Service. This letter was read to the Northcote Fire Brigades Board on Tuesday, 23rd.

In 1939 the Auxiliary Fire Service throughout the metropolitan area had 300 members, and now it has 3,022. Uniforms, comprising dance coats and trousers, caps, belts, axes, hose-keys and steel helmets, have been issued to most of the men. 33 trailer pumps and over 100,000 feet of hose have been obtained by the board after considerable difficulty for in case of enemy action, Auxiliaries are encouraged to attend first aid courses, and the permanent staff in order to obtain practical experience. The selection of group officers, deputy group officers, company and section leaders from the ranks of the A.F.S. is giving the men a feeling of confidence, and as the appointments are changed every 4 months, two or three men were found through the leadership stage. The resultant benefit will be that in the event of an emergency there will be a number of men capable of taking charge. The general public, in order that this body of men causing greater interest in the work, and auxiliaries are going to be given a chance to observe other corps at work.

The Fire Brigades Board requested the availability of a trailer pump to act as liaison officer with the local fire brigade and A.P.S. in order that this body of volunteers may be further encouraged.

Mr. Jones (who is also the representative of the Northern Municipalities on the Fire Brigades Board) stated that last year the Board's budget had been greatly increased, £2,000 of which was the appointment of five District Officers to take control of the Auxiliary Fire Service. The result of these appointments was that far more interest was now being taken in the A.P.S. and should it be necessary the auxiliary firemen were ready to give a good account of themselves.

APPEAL**

**Mayor and Mayoress Entertain
Collectors**

To show appreciation of the services of citizens who are acting as collectors in connection with the Northcote Direct Giving Scheme, the Mayor and Mayoress (Cr. and Mrs. W. Claffin) decided to invite them alone to a council meeting and later spend a social hour in the Mayor's Room. Due, however, to the large number who are acting as collectors, it was deemed inadvisable to spread the invitations over two nights. On Tuesday night of last week invitations were issued to the collectors of the South, East and Central Ward Sections to come along, and they responded to the invitation in large numbers, about 100 being present.

The Mayor expressed delight at seeing so many present, and trusted all would spend a pleasant evening. He went on to say that since the citizens were giving splendid service to their fellow men, and the funds that were collected went in the main to the Red Cross and Comforts, and a small percentage was divided among other patriotic funds. The whole of the moneys collected reached the objectives mentioned, there being no deductions for expenses, as all the work was done in an honorary capacity. (Applauds.) The Mayor and Mayoress were proud and delighted at the opportunity of saying "Thank You" to the citizens who had worked so self-sacrificingly and unflinchingly to make the Direct Giving Appeal a success. It was due to the co-operation of citizens such as were present, backed by the liberality of other citizens who were prepared to contribute every week, that the magnificent sum of almost £40,000 had been raised in six months. (Applauds.)

Later in the Mayor's Room the Mayor and Mayoress entertained collectors from the South, East and Central Ward Sections in the Mayor's room. The toast of the visitors was proposed by Cr. J. W. French, A. J. Gill and Cr. V. Peters, who commented upon the fact that just over £40,000 had been raised in the past six months—a wonderful effort, which spoke volumes for the discernment of the collectors in their self-imposed duties, and for the citizens who had given to this effort.

Replies were made by Mr. T. W. Hawthorn (chairman, South Ward Committee) and Mrs. Kettle; Cr. N. C. Jones (Chairman, East Ward Committee), and Mrs. C. Lewis; and Cr. H. E. Ellis (Chairman, Central Ward Committee) and Mrs. Ellis. Funds for the purchase of materials came from the Direct Giving Appeal. The Comforts Fund enabled comforts to be sent to members of the Services and to the thousands that one was able to help in this way should be its own reward. (Applauds.)

The Mayor, in humorous vein, said that he was indeed glad to see many present who had not been to a council meeting before. The extra calls for workers in the various war efforts, and the brought forth a great deal of new blood, and he hoped these ladies and gentlemen would continue to take an interest in the many chances of philanthropic work being carried out. In helping to see that the work is not allowed to lag, even though new demands were being made upon its front, which all could help, and the more who helped, the better would be the work, and the more which could be accomplished.

"We as citizens have made some sacrifices," added the Mayor, "but what we have sacrificed is as nothing to those of the men of the fighting services who have been through hell. We should count it a great privilege that we are able to live in tranquility, behind the bastions built up by our sons who provide a living barrier between us and the enemy. Even if we give our all, our sacrifice can never be as great as theirs, who are prepared to give even life itself for their country. We should be proud to share the honors of their service." In conclusion the Mayor urged that the work of the Direct Giving Appeal be continued; that it should be increased, and he asked other citizens to come forward and help in collecting, and that the Mayor and Mayoress were even more generous in the future with their contributions. (Applauds.)

A dainty supper was provided by the Mayor and Mayoress.


**Drunk and Use of






